Foard County Heart Association was sixth in per-capita giving to the Heart Fund in Texas, according to a report from the American Heart Association. The county's per-capita contribution was \$435. The Foard County Heart Association was organized Nov. 20, 1962, at the school cafeteria with the following officers: Dr. W. H. Stapp, president; Dr. M. M. Kralicke, vice president; Mrs. Sally Archer, secretary; Glyndon Johnson, treasurer. ## ASCS Estimates 22-Bushel Average for County's Wheat

### About \$849,500 in Wheat Certificates To Be Issued

The Foard County ASCS office has estimated that the wheat crop in Foard County averaged 22 bushels per acre. This includes, in addition to the wheat delivered to elevators, an ASCS estimate of wheat stored on the farms and kept back for seed. The local ASCS office also estimated net worth of the 1970 crop in the county as being \$2,251,842 with the office issuing an additional \$849,500 in certificates. ## Small Increase in Take-Home Pay Effective July 1

Millions of wage and salary earners will receive a small increase in take-home pay effective July 1. Your employer will reduce the amount of income tax withheld from your pay on July 1. The 1969 Tax Reform Act dropped the tax surcharge which has been 5 per cent from January 1, 1970, through June 30, 1970, and each of your exemptions will increase from \$600 to \$650 effective July 1. You won't feel like you have quit paying income tax, but every little bit helps.

State Governments

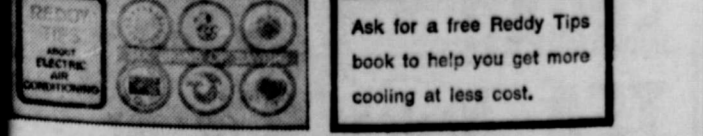

**Heatly Predicts His District Will Be Enlarged**

**Representative Thinks New Tax Bill Coming Soon**

State Representative W. S. Heatly said last week that population has declined roughly 15 per cent in the nine counties of his 80th Legislative District and that redistricting likely will require addition of three to five counties to the district.

He held out hope that the rural nature of the district can be maintained, although he said only two other districts in this West Texas area—the seven-county 61st district which includes Holliday and the seven-county 77th district which includes Dumas—are of such a nature that they do not include major cities that dominate voting.

In a talk before the Vernon Rotary Club, Mr. Heatly also discussed pressures for judicial redistricting.

He said he has requested appointment to the five-member judicial redistricting committee since going to the Legislature in 1955 and has worked consistently to retain rural judicial districts.

He said he has backed creation of new metropolitan courts, when they are needed, but has fought attaching the districts to major cities.

"I don't want to be attached to Amarillo, Abilene, Lubbock or Wichita Falls," he said, adding, "When a man needs a judge in Guthrie, he needs him as badly as the man in Houston."

Heatly said that Texas presently is spending \$3.1 billion annually for services demanded by the people.

But he added that of the \$238 million required for state services, less than nine per cent is utilized to finance state government. Of the total state budget, he said, 45 per cent goes to education, 19 per cent to public welfare, 21 per cent to highways, and 5.8 per cent to public health.

He said Texas has the nation's No. 1 highway system, but is last in the nation in the amount of gasoline taxes.

The House Appropriations Committee Chairman predicted a new tax bill will be necessary during the next session, but he said it

Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamy side of life in America.

But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind. I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970s with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

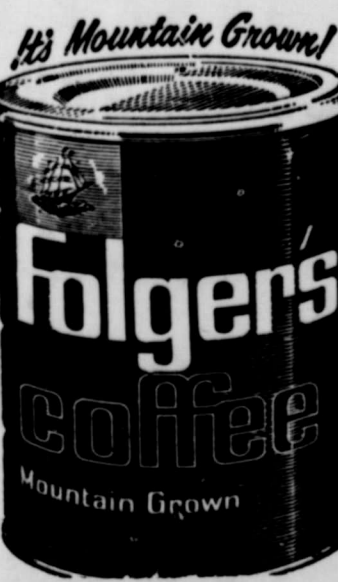

## Total of \$37,000.00 a Month SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS GO TO 487 FOARD COUNTY RESIDENTS

Social security benefits paid to residents of Foard County totaled \$37,000.00 a month as 1969 ended, Wayne Klipping, social security branch office manager, reported this week.

A benefit increase, signed into law by President Nixon on Dec. 30, 1969, has since raised the monthly rate of payment by 15 per cent for the 487 social security beneficiaries in Foard County.

Klipping noted. Of the social security beneficiaries living in Foard County, 371 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 85 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 31 are getting benefits as disabled workers or the dependents of disabled workers.

Klipping pointed out that although the majority of social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60.

In Foard County, 61 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. The 28 who are under 18 are receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.

Of the 5 who are 18 through 21 years of age, most are getting students' benefits under a provision which permits the continuation of a child's benefits past his or her 18th birthday, and up to age 22 if he or she is attending school full time.

But in this 18 to 22 age group, Klipping said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that is

provided working people of all ages under the social security program.

A number are the children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 18 and who will probably never be able to go to work and become self supporting. The benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely and benefits are also payable to their mothers if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Another small but significant group of youthful social security beneficiaries are those who are receiving social security benefits as disabled workers. Under a 1967 change in the law, disability benefits can be paid to a person who becomes disabled for work even if he has less than five years of
