Announcement Made Monday

POSTPONEMENT MADE OF WHEAT REFERENDUM

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has announced postponement of the national wheat referendum previously scheduled for July 27-31, according to R. J. Owens, chairman of the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation ASC committee. The action was authorized by Congress.

The postponement permits the USDA to delay holding the referendum not later than October 15, 1970, or 30 days after Congress adjourns, whichever ever date is earlier.

Accordingly, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's ASCS, which administers the wheat, feed grain and similar programs, has instructed its state and county offices across the nation to withhold ballots and other referendum materials, Mr. Owens said.

Owens explained that basic farm legislation requires a referendum for wheat marketing quotas. However, the Agricultural Act of 1965 suspended this referendum requirement from 1965 through the 1970 crop year. Unless new farm legislation, now pending, is enacted by the Congress, basic legislation will again go into effect, and a referendum will then be required in 1970 for the 1971 crop year.

OEO Officials Make Inspection of Four-County Program

Two Office of Economic Opportunity officials were in Crowell two days last week making a pre-review inspection of the 4-county Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation which has its central office at the community center in Crowell.

The two officials were Joe Meador of Ralls, of the Governor's Office of the OEO; and James McNeil of Austin, and the Southwest Regional Officer for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The two OEO officials were here to confer with Felix Taylor, EOAC executive director, and Bob Harrison, Mainstream Director, and other EOAC officials about the programs planned for the four-county area of Foard, Wilbarger, Cottle and Hardeman, for the new year which begins in November.

The officials try to determine during their visits to OEO facilities over the state whether or not the people whom they are trying to help have a voice in the selection of the programs to be used, and whether the federal money used in the OEO projects goes for its intended purpose.

The pre-review inspections are usually made about 120 days before the end of the program year.

E. G. Boman, 79, a retired farmer in Wilbarger County and a former Foard County resident, died at his home in Vernon Friday evening after a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m., Sunday in the chapel of the First Methodist Church in Vernon with Rev. A. B. Cockrell, pastor, officiating.

Interment was in Wilbarger Memorial Park under the direction of Dudley Fields Funeral Chapel.

Mr. Boman was born Sept. 4, 1890, in Jack County. He moved to Foard County in 1905, and to Wilbarger County in 1925.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Low Temperature Records Broken Here Last Week

After several weeks of 100-plus temperature readings in this area, most everyone agreed that with the dry and hot conditions, only a general rain would cool off the area.

However, Mother Nature proved otherwise as the cold front which moved through early last week did not bring any moisture, but it did bring some cool weather, and for four or five mornings last week, July low temperature records were broken at the Wichita Falls Weather Bureau, and undoubtedly some of the coolest mornings ever for July were prevalent here also. Several mornings, the mercury dropped to the 50-degree-plus lows.

However, by early this week, the mercury was nearing or topping the 100-degree mark every day.

Dry Grass, Weeds Cause Several

FIRES PLAGUE AREA DURING PAST WEEK

Dry weather across this area has been the cause of a number of grass and weed fires during the past week.

Saturday afternoon, the local Volunteer Fire Department was called to extinguish a grass fire at the Ernest Weaver farm in the Foard City community. Sunday afternoon, weeds and grass burning in the south part of town for a time endangered several

houses, but the fire department extinguished the blaze before any residences were damaged.

Then on Monday morning, the department was called out to extinguish a grass fire near the Jimmy Thompson home in the east part of town.

Other Fires

The fire department was called out Saturday afternoon to extinguish a fire which started in the engine of a truck. The wiring was burned off the vehicle, Fire Chief Leonard Tole reported.

Another fire, Sunday night, was apparently caused by a cat which climbed a power pole and got entangled in a transformer. The resulting blaze set fire to a storage building at the Thomas Black home and destroyed it and its contents.

Late Sunday afternoon fire destroyed the garage and late model car of Mrs. John Ray's at her home in the Rayland community.

**Drought Threat to
Area Crops, Says
District Agent**

Moisture is still needed very badly throughout the 22-county Extension District for all crops, ranges and stock water, District Agricultural Agent James G. Simmons of Vernon reports. In his weekly crop report, Mr. Simmons says that early cotton continues to square, but growth of cotton is generally only fair to poor due to dry weather. Some insect damage from fleahoppers, grasshoppers and boll weevils have been reported. Growth of grain sorghums and guar is generally fair, but both crops need moisture. Farming activities include cultivation, hoeing cotton, irrigating where water is available, hay harvest and plowing stubble. Ranges continue very dry with numerous range fires. Stock water is low in several counties. Cattle are being shipped from some counties.

**Basic Training to Be
Required of Texas
Law Officers**

Within two years, every law enforcement officer in the State of Texas will be expected to have undergone basic training, with regional police academies established to provide basic training for these officers, according to an announcement from the Criminal Justice Council in Austin. Under Senate Bill No. 10, enacted in 1969 by the Texas Legislature, any person employed as a peace officer in the state after Sept. 1, 1970, must complete basic training course. This requirement has been fixed by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education at 140 class hours.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon." Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company. (b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors." "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. (6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature. "B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. (7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission. (9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

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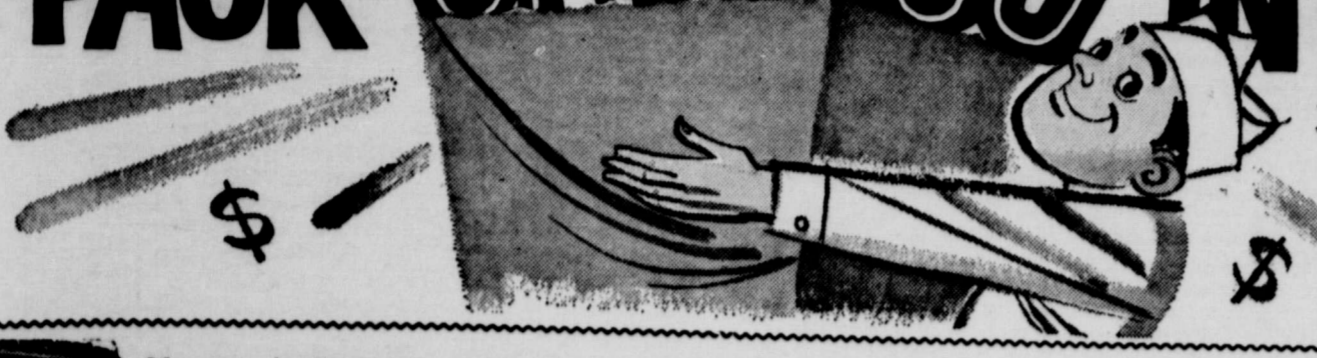

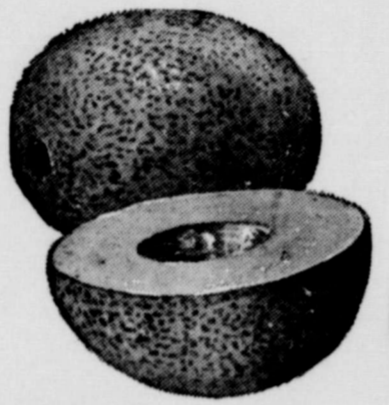
