WILDCATS OPEN 1970 FOOTBALL SEASON WITH QUANAH INDIANS FRIDAY AT DICK TODD FIELD

The Crowell Wildcats, under the leadership of new CHS football coach Scott Boyd, will be tackling a strong AA team Friday night when the Quanah Indians invade Dick Todd Field for the first game of the season for both teams. The game will start at 8 p. m.

Coach Boyd listed the following boys as starters on both offense and defense: Kenneth Sellers and Jimmy Glover, ends, Rocky Bachman and Douglas Chowning, tackles; David Myers and Terry Farrar, guards; Jesse Barrera, center; Mike Weathered, quarterback; Junior Urquiza and George Eavenson, halfbacks; and Jim Tom (Frog) Smith, fullback. Of this starting eleven, all are seniors except Bachman and Farrar.

Other Wildcats who will definitely see action in the game are Harry Lee Swan, Bill Erwin, Billy Ray Neal, Rex Driver, Ronnie Naylor and Jackie Thomas.

Quanah also has a new coach this year, Jake Cottrell, and Coach Boyd said Monday that the Indians are a sound, fundamental football team, and he thinks they have been underestimated in the pre-season ratings.

Coach Boyd expressed satisfaction with the Wildcats' two pre-season scrimmages, especially with the defensive unit. He has initiated the "Texas wishbone" offense at Crowell this year. In this offense the two halfbacks line up directly behind the guards which makes for a more compact grouping of the backs for use in the "option" plays the Wildcats will be using.

The Harris rating system has rated the Crowell Wildcats No. 84 out of the 210 class A teams in the state.

Foard County Gets "Good Citizenship County" Certificate

Foard County this week received a "Good Citizenship County" certificate signifying the achievement of an outstanding voter registration program.

Foard County registered 1,266 voters which represents 138.5 percent of the quota assigned by the State Democratic Executive Committee. The quota was based on a percentage of all those over 21 years in this county.

The handsome black and gold certificate was presented to County Chairman Ray Shirley. Presentation was made by State Democratic executive committee members, Rhea Howard of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Dick O'Daniel of Tulsa. The presentation was part of "Operation: Everybody!" voter registration program started early this year by the State Democratic Committee, which helped register a record 4,150,645.

Hearing Set in Austin on Crowell's Waste Disposal Plant

A hearing is set for 10 a. m. October 23, of the Texas Water Quality Board in Austin, concerning a proposed amendment to the City of Crowell's Waste Control Order No. 10638 for a proposed discharge, to be in operation in January, 1971, not to exceed a maximum flow of 200,000 gallons of treated domestic sewage per day.

This will be an increase of 80,000 gallons over the present permitted volume of 120,000 gallons per day.

Long-Time Resident of Crowell Died in Lubbock Sunday

Mrs. H. K. Edwards, 76, of Lubbock, and a long-time resident of Crowell, died Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at 3 p. m., Tuesday, in Franklin Bartley Chapel in Lubbock with Dr. Lloyd Hamilton, pastor of St. Luke's United Methodist Church, and Rev. Lyman Wood, pastor of Oakwood United Methodist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park at Lubbock. The Edwards family lived in Crowell for many years during which time they operated a dry goods store. Mr. and Mrs. Edwards moved to Lubbock in 1964 after closing their store in Crowell.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, H. K. Edwards, Jr. of Quito, Ecuador, and Bob Edwards of Lubbock; one daughter, Mrs. Alton K. Roark of Hereford; two brothers, Clyde Alexander of Oklahoma City and Earl Alexander of Gladewater; three sisters, Lois Alexander of Lubbock, Mrs. C. E. Gatlin of Abilene and Mrs. D. E. Bowles of Dallas; and three grandchildren.

Meeting Held on Proposed Division of S. C. District

Twenty-four Foard County residents attended a hearing Tuesday night on the proposed division of the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District into two districts. At present, the district comprises Foard and Hardeman Counties. The proposal would make separate districts in each county.

Presiding at the meeting was Frank Gray of Lubbock, a member of the state Soil Conservation Board. Other officials present were Harvey Davis, executive director of the state SCS; his assistant, John Millican, both of Temple; and Aubrey Dalrymple, field representative from Lubbock.

Local residents making comments on the proposed division of the district were A. V. McCombs, J. A. Marr, Roy Ayers, Cecil Carroll, Henry Black, Virgil Johnson, Jack Welch, Leslie Thomas, Duane Johnson and Glen Jones. Messrs. Marr and Ayers are members of the board of directors of the present district.

The two-county board had previously petitioned the state board for a division, and comments made Tuesday night pointed out the local interest in having a soil conservation district composed of only this one county.

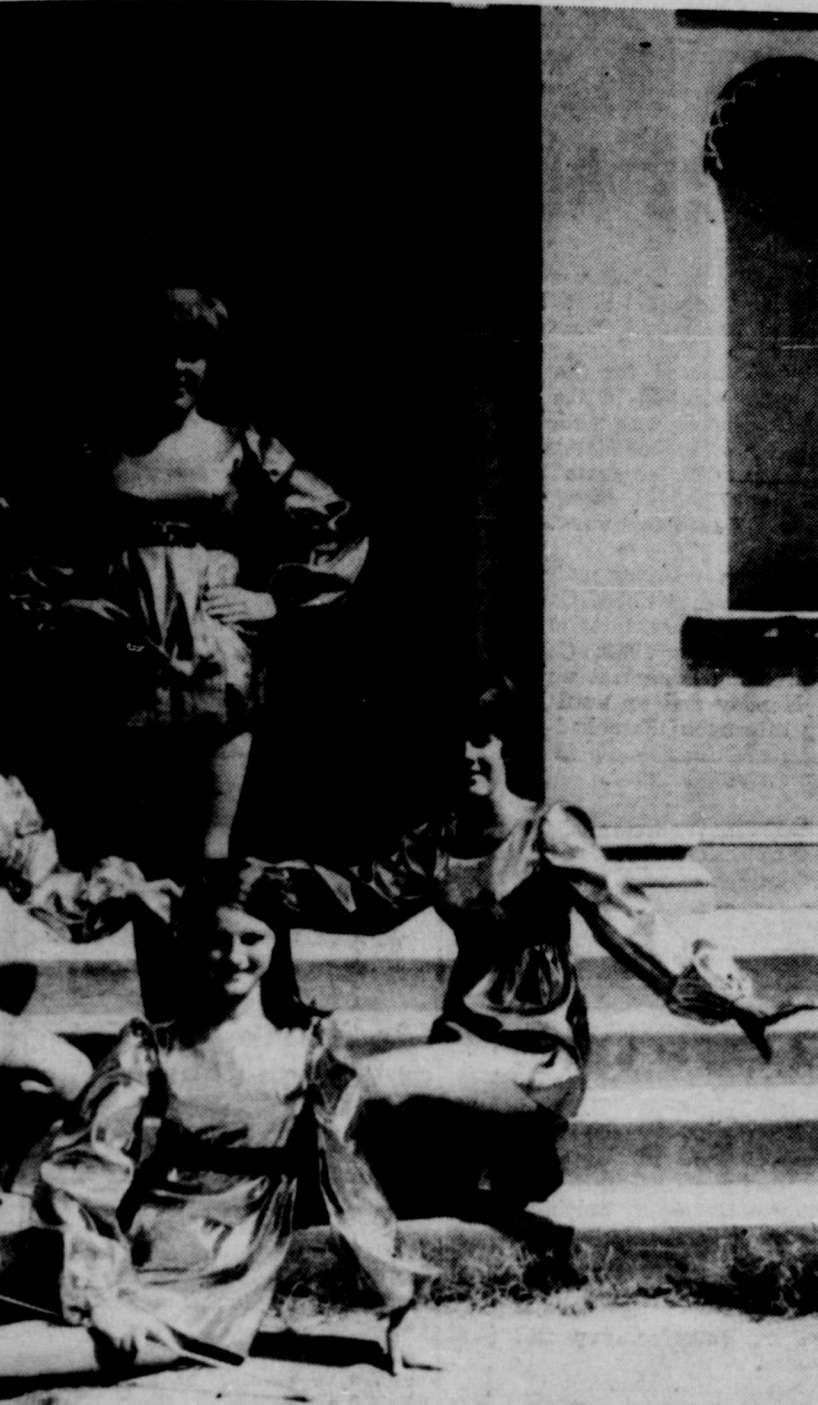
Mrs. Beesinger had made her home in Crowell until about four months ago when she moved to Tulsa to live with her daughter.

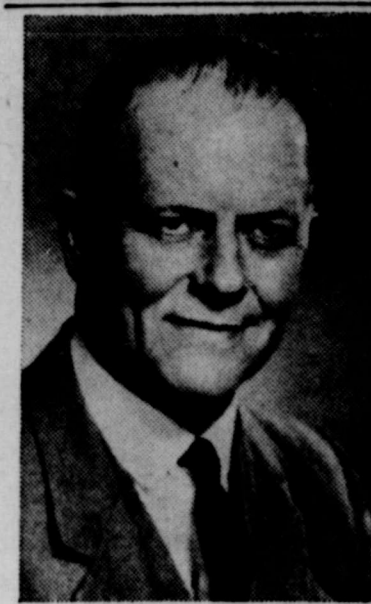

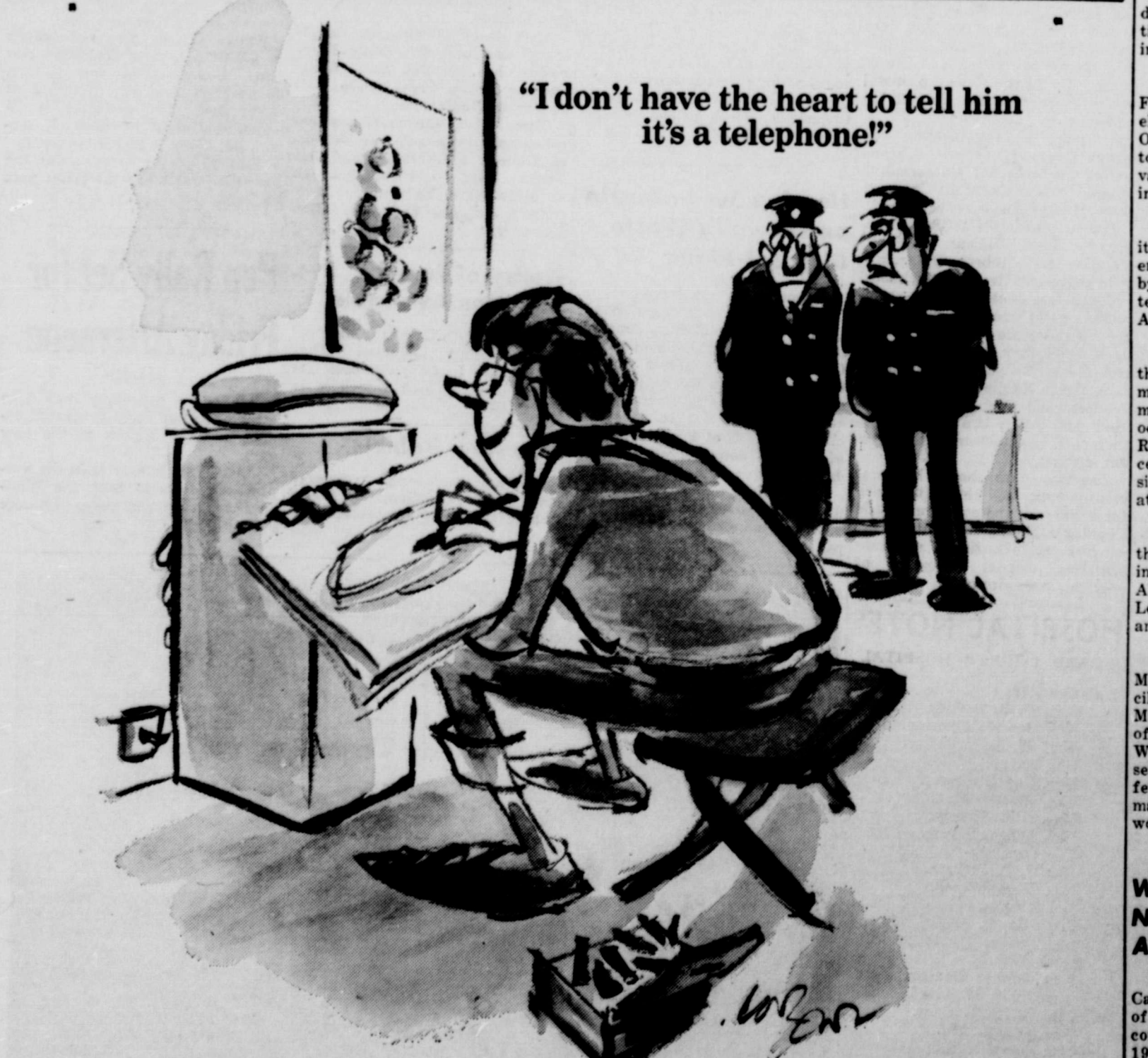

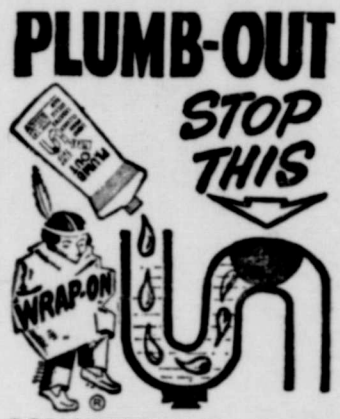
Some 150 agricultural and industrial leaders and farmers and ranchers from throughout the Rolling Plains are expected to attend.

Various aspects of the program will be reviewed and progress during the past year will be discussed, points out Norman Brints, area farm management specialist with the Texas A&M extension service and RPEP secretary. The extension service administers the program which was launched in the fall of 1967 to boost the overall economic growth of the Rolling Plains area.

Rev. J. H. Hamblen, 92, Authors Book, "A Look into Life"

Mrs. Roy Ricks of San Bernardino, Calif., has written the News that her father, Rev. J. H. Hamblen, 92, a former pastor of the Crowell Methodist Church, has recently written a book. Mrs. Ricks, the former Lola Mae Hamblen, says the books may be purchased for \$3.25 each by writing J. H. Hamblen, 2100 So. 34th Street, Abilene, 79605. Mrs. Ricks enclosed the following review of her father's book which appeared in a San Bernardino newspaper: "A Look into Life," the autobiography of J. H. Hamblen, 184 pages, \$3.25.

One of the last of the itinerant preachers, Dr. J. H. Hamblen, founder and general superintendent emeritus of the Evangelical Methodist Church, started writing his autobiography at 90 and finished it at 91!

Many years ago, so many that nobody in San Bernardino remembers exactly when, Dr. Hamblen was guest preacher at the Old Presbyterian and St. Paul's Methodist churches.

Dr. Hamblen is the father of former western composer and singer Stuart Hamblen, now a performer and composer of popular religious tunes; and of Lola Mae Ricks, 2122 Chestnut St., Apt. 1307, San Bernardino, Calif. 92410. (Mrs. Ricks has her father's "A Look into Life" on sale there.)

The author lives in Abilene, Texas. On the dedication page he pays tribute to Mrs. Laura T. Stewart of Palestine, Texas, for voluntarily preparing the manuscript for publication. The introduction is by Dr. Cornelius P. Hagard, president, Azusa Pacific College.

Dr. Hamblen starts his narrative with his early life. He was born in a log cabin in Kaufman County, Texas, the son of a widow and widower, who each had one child and then had six of their own. Eight children, of three different "sets," live happily together,

despite a frugal existence and lack of food.

The young Hamblen borrowed money to spend two years in college and then taught school to pay off his debts. He was superintendent at the same time—and this led him to go into the ministry. And what a ministry! One that would wear out 100 preachers today.

In 1946 in Memphis, Dr. Hamblen and a few others, who had left the regular Methodist Church, formed the Evangelical Methodist Church, to "re-establish an old-fashioned John Wesley Methodist Church, free from fanaticism and modernism."

At first, after leaving the established church, Dr. Hamblen seemed very much alone, but soon Dr. E. B. Vargas of Mexico, head of the Evangelical Mission, came to him and said his flock would like to join a new church.

(Editor's note: Dr. Hamblen was pastor here when the present building of the Methodist Church was constructed in 1920 and he preached the first sermon in the new building in October, 1920. During this year's harvest festival, Dr. Hamblen is scheduled to be back to preach this October in the local church. The harvest festival date this year was set during one of Dr. Hamblen's breaks in his busy schedule. He is still conducting revival meetings.)

The books are also available in Crowell from Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the local Methodist Church.

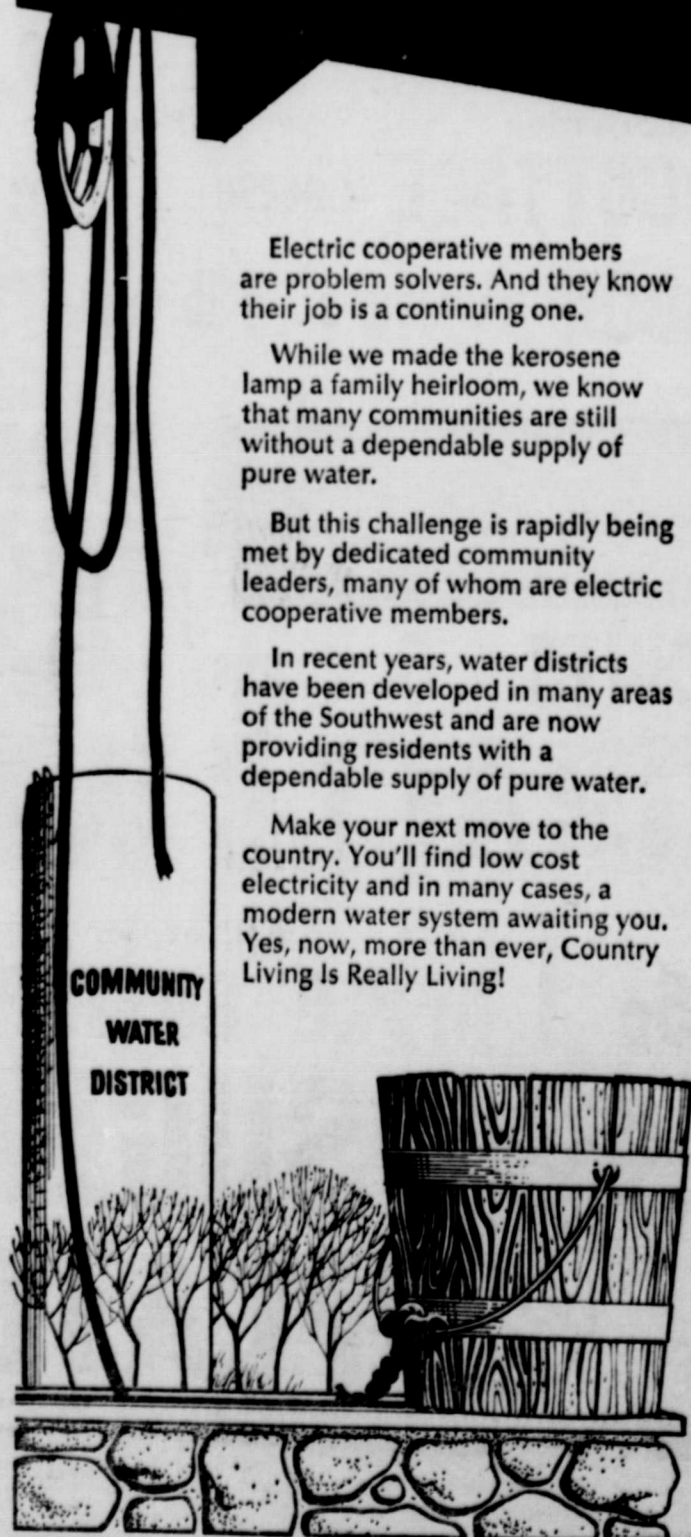

Public Hearing Notice

The City of Crowell, P. O. Box 247, Crowell, Texas 79227, has applied to the Texas Water Quality Board for an amendment to its existing Waste Control Order No. 10638 for a proposed discharge (to be in operation in January, 1971, not to exceed a maximum flow of 200,000 gallons per day (an increase of 80,000 gallons per day over present permitted volume) of treated domestic sewage from its proposed facility (oxidation ditch or "race track" type sewage treatment plant) which is to be located at the southeast corner of the townsite in Foard County, Texas. The effluent is to be discharged into a normally dry unnamed creek, thence into Beaver Creek, thence into the Wichita River. A public hearing on this application will be held in the Texas Water Development Board, Third Floor Auditorium, 391 West Second Street, Austin, Texas, at 10:00 a. m. on October 23, 1970, to receive evidence on the conditions, if any, under which the order may be issued. Additional data will be developed at the hearing, but further technical information concerning any specific aspect of the discharge, if available, can be obtained by writing the Texas Water Quality Board, 1108 Lavaca Street, Austin, Texas 78701.

Destroy Cotton Stalks Immediately After Harvest

Shredding cotton stalks and plowing under all residue immediately after harvest has long been recognized as a good farming and insect control practice, especially for pink bollworms. John G. Thomas, extension entomologist, points out that the larger the area involved in a stalk destruction program, the more effective it will be. Community, county and area coverage is suggested.

Texas Corn Crop Not Affected

Dry weather rather than the Southern Corn Leaf Blight has cut corn yields over much of Texas. Dr. Wendell Horne, extension plant pathologist, said the fungus disease which is playing havoc with corn crops in some states reached Texas a bit too late.

Greatest yield losses apparently occur when severe infestation hit the corn plants at the silking and tassel stage. Texas corn was past this stage when the infestations started. Horne does not see the disease as an annual threat to Texas corn production.
