METHODIST CHURCH TO OBSERVE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF PRESENT CHURCH BUILDING

... Fifty Years Old.

On Sunday, October 11, members of the Crowell Methodist Church will observe the fiftieth anniversary of the completion of the present building by having the man who was pastor here when the building was constructed, and who preached the first sermon in the new sanctuary, back to preach again fifty years later.

Dr. J. H. Hamblen, 92, of Abilene and still an active preacher, will be here Sunday and will be the principal speaker at the morning service.

The church will also be observing its annual Harvest Festival, a Sunday set aside each year to raise money for the church's conference obligations.

Dr. Hamblen, who in later years, established the Evangelical Methodist Church, although retired as a pastor, still preaches revivals, and continues an active life in the service of God.

As early as 1916, plans were begun for the construction of the present Methodist Church building at 324 North Main. Construction began in 1919 with the building committee composed of M. S. Henry, T. L. Hughton, J. W. Bell, S. S. Bell, H. E. Ferguson and Dr. Hines Clark, all of whom are now deceased. The church, built at a cost of \$65,000.00 was free of indebtedness by 1943.

Rev. Walter L. Driver is presently serving as pastor of the church.

There will be no Sunday school Sunday, and the morning service will begin at 10:30 with dinner to be served in the church basement beginning at 12:30.

Mr. Sellers was married to the former Ida Grace Ferguson in Crowell on Dec. 7, 1910.

Resurfacing of Highway 70 East Now in Progress

Work got underway here last week on resurfacing Highway 70 from Crowell east to the Wilbarger County line. The project is for hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement and seal coat shoulders on the road. Jagoe-Public Company of Denton was awarded the contract for the work back in April of this year.

The hot mix plant is set up a few miles west of Crowell.

V. L. Castleberry of Childress is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 100 working days.

Representatives of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department were in Quanah Tuesday morning to finalize the purchase of land from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Gossage for the development of a state park.

The Gossages' three sections of land form an L-shape just north of Pease River and west of the Highway 283 bridge. The land is 8 miles north of Crowell and 12 miles south of Quanah.

Rep. W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah was in Quanah for the transfer of ownership of the property. He and State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon took active roles in assisting this area to secure the state park.

State officials were in this area almost a year ago looking over possible locations for a state park.

The Gossage land is rough cedar breaks, and joins Pease River. It will be only a short distance north of where the U. S. Corps of Engineers is anticipating the location of a lake in connection with federal efforts to stop the pollution of Red River by salt water which originates in the upper reaches of Pease River.

It is expected that it will be about eight months before the development of the park property gets underway.

Rep. Heatly, in presenting the check to Mr. and Mrs. Gossage, spoke of a museum which will probably be built on the park property to house relics of this section of West Texas.

WILDCATS TAKE WIN FRIDAY AT KNOX CITY

The Crowell Wildcat football team scored in every quarter to take a 34-6 win over the big Knox City Greyhounds in a non-district game played there last Friday night.

The Greyhounds were the first to score, but the Wildcat defense contained their every drive during the remainder of the game.

The Greyhounds TD was scored by Charley Lieb who drove over from four yards out. The try for point-after failed.

The Wildcats came back strong and the ensuing Crowell drive was capped by Junior Urquiza, who went the final three yards.

Fullback Jim Tom (Frog) Smith, who scored on runs of 79 and 68 yards, kicked the extra point to give the Wildcats the lead which they never relinquished.

Early in the second quarter, Wildcat halfback George Eavenson raced 15 yards for the second Crowell TD. The kick for point-after failed.

In the third quarter, Mike Weathered, Wildcat quarterback, tossed a 25-yard pass to Urquiza, who scampered the remaining distance into the end zone. Smith booted the extra point.

Smith showed his speed and power in the fourth period when he made two sensational touchdown gallops. The first came on a brilliant 79-yard scamper and the second covered 68 yards. Smith kicked the point-after following both his TD runs.

Frog Smith, Rock Bachman, Doug Chowning and Jessie Barrera continued their excellent play as the front four on defense in this contest.

Bob Main, Former Crowell Resident, Died in Memphis

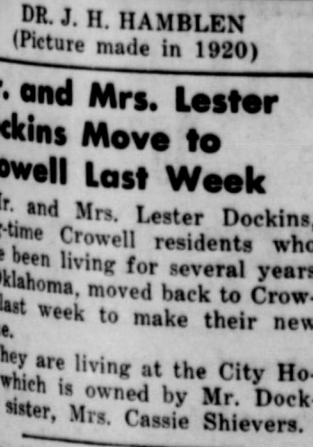
Funeral Services Held Thursday in Roy, N. Mex.

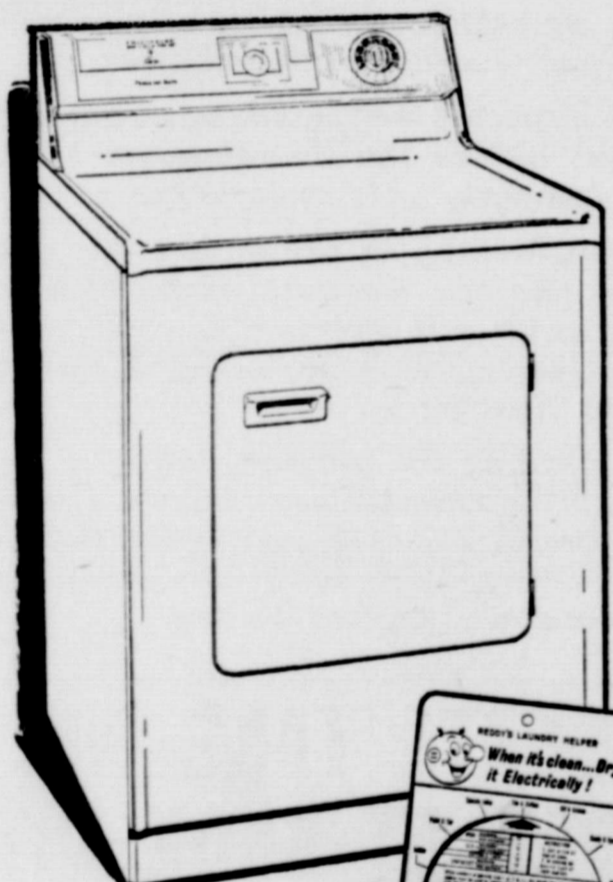
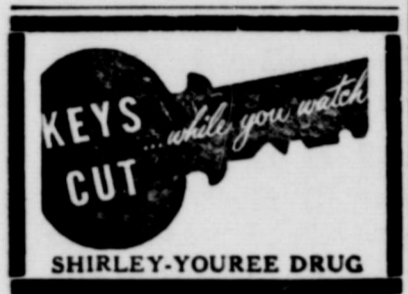

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, October 3, 1940, issue of The Foard County News:

Foard County is preparing for the registration of men between the ages of 21 and 35 eligible for military training in Uncle Sam's first peace time conscription of man power which is the outstanding feature of the preparedness program that is now being launched by the United States. Men registering will be subject to call for military training any time during the next ten years.

Born to Mr. and Mrs. Vernon W. Polk, a girl, Lilly Pearl, Sept. 24.

Foard County has received its largest quota for enrollment in the CCC and a drive is now underway to fill this quota, according to Mrs. R. S. Carroll, Foard County case worker. Twenty-two boys will be allowed to enroll for CCC service from this county on October 17, and at present, twelve boys have filed applications.

Jesse Jones, the Texas banker, has been sworn in as secretary of commerce, replacing Harry L. Hopkins.

Twenty-two year old Lincoln de Cleve has been arraigned in Philadelphia on charges of threatening to kill President Roosevelt. DeCleve has been threatening the President since 1936, according to government authorities.

Broomweeds Can Be Controlled

Results of research studies at the Texas A&M University Research Station at Spur show that broomweeds can be killed with herbicides if the application is made at the right time. Dr. C. J. Scifres of A&M's Range Science Department says facts are not available on whether cattle utilize any of this broadleaf plant in their diet. "We know we can kill it, but whether we should or not is another question," he noted.

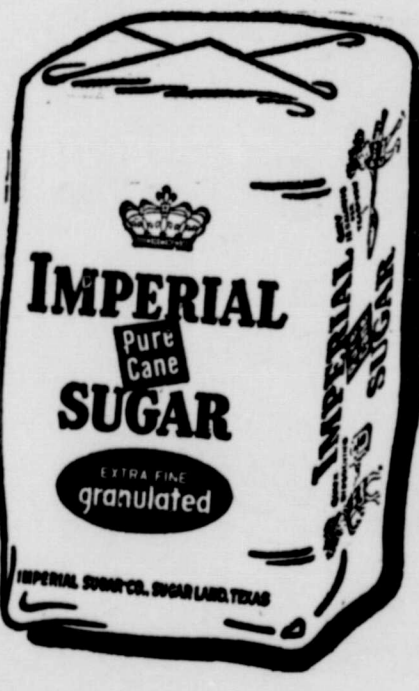

Cong. Purcell Hurls Charges at Post Office Dept.

Washington, D. C. — Congressman Graham Purcell last week announced that the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service, on which he serves, will investigate charges that Texans have unknowingly been made the subjects of experiments by the Post Office Department to determine, in Purcell's words, "just how much people will stand for in the way of reduced postal service without complaining." Among the reductions cited by Purcell were deliberate delays of first class letters, closing of post offices, and reduction of service on week ends, and elimination of individual postmarks in several smaller towns in Texas.

"As complaints have mounted regarding postal service in Texas," Purcell said, "it has become increasingly clear that postal officials have deliberately allowed or actually directed postal slowdowns. Under the guise of saving money, postal officials have deliberately overridden postal regulations by directing that only handwritten letters were to be processed on week ends, with typewritten and business letters delayed until the following Monday. If true, this is clearly an outrage to the public and a violation of postal regulations. Since repeated complaints to the Post Office Department have done nothing to improve service, Congress must now take a hand."

Increase Noted in Savings Bonds Interest Rate

George Self, Foard County chairman for U. S. Savings Bonds, reports that the 1/2 per cent bonus approved by President Nixon means that savings bond owners can realize 5 1/2 per cent annual interest on their holdings.

"The bonus applies both to bonds purchased on and after June 1, 1970, and those bought before, and still outstanding. There will be no need to redeem any bonds to benefit from the new rate."

"The rate increase should be a fine inducement to our Future Farmers, 4-H Club members and other young people who haven't yet begun to save for their futures with the U. S. Savings Bonds," Self said.

Medicare Costs to Go Up in January

Beginning in January, an older person who goes to the hospital under Medicare will be responsible for the first \$60 of his hospital bill—now running about \$750 for the average stay by a Medicare beneficiary.

The present hospital deductible is \$82 and will remain in effect for all Medicare hospital admissions during the remainder of the year.

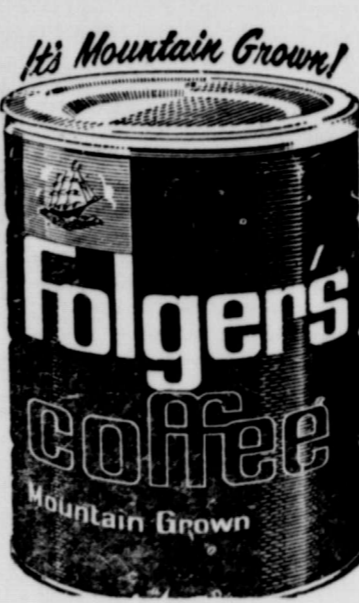

Japan Is First Billion Dollar Off-Shore Customer for United States Farmers

Foard County residents are well aware that U. S. Japanese trade is extensive. R. J. Owens, chairman of the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, commented recently.

"Almost everyone recognizes that Americans are important customers for Japanese goods. I wonder how many of us realize that the Japanese are major customers for American goods, especially for American farm commodities.

"In fact, Japan imports more U. S. agricultural products than any other country in the world—a record \$1.1 billion worth during the 1970 fiscal year," Owens said.

He pointed out that feed grains, wheat and cotton are important farm crops in Foard County and that exports of these farm products to Japan have gone up dramatically in recent years.

More than six million tons of feed grains were shipped to Japan last fiscal year—just about one-third of U. S. feed grain exports. Soybeans exported to Japan had a \$51 million dollar value, and wheat exports \$196 million. Japan is our best cotton customer, taking one-fourth of its cotton from the U. S. and Japan bought \$50 million worth of tobacco from the U. S. during the last fiscal year.

The ASC committee chairman reported that Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin recently took note of the American-Japanese trade story, calling it unprecedented.

Secretary Hardin also said: "The Japanese economy has paralleled that nation's growth in trade. In the years between 1940 and 1965, Japanese shipments in

world trade more than doubled. By 1969, they had almost doubled again, reaching \$16 billion. Shipments to the United States increased in those nine years by more than four times—\$4.9 billion.

"The Japanese householder's disposable income has more than tripled since 1940. His demand for meat, milk, and eggs—a good 'horseback' measure of consumer prosperity—has increased by more than four times in 15 years.

"He is diversifying his eating habits as his income goes up. For example, per person consumption of wheat flour in this traditionally rice-eating society has increased by 30 per cent in a decade and a half.

"Ten years ago, Japan's agricultural imports from the U. S. were \$440 million. In the fiscal year just past, they were more than twice as great—nearly \$1.1 billion.

"But the agricultural exports are only one aspect of a beneficial trading relationship that can be summarized very simply: In terms of total exports, the United States is Japan's best customer, and Japan is the United States' best off-shore customer.

"As you might expect, two-thirds of U. S. shipments to Japan last year were raw materials, mineral fuels, and foodstuffs, while 90 per cent of Japan's shipments to the U. S. were manufactured goods.

"This is the basis of beneficial world trade—and exchange of goods based primarily on production efficiency. It is this principle that led Japan to look to efficient producers on the broad farmlands for the feed grains needed to satisfy its people's rising demand for livestock products.

"As a result, imported feed grains have triggered a rapid expansion of Japanese livestock production. This has brought Japanese consumers more meat and poultry at better prices; it has opened opportunities for Japanese farmers for new and profitable livestock enterprises; it has meant an important and expanding feed grain market for world agriculture. Almost the whole range of U. S. farm commodities finds Japan a leading customer.

"Japan wants, needs, and can afford these products, and the U. S. can supply them in any system

Texans Told How to Cast Absentee Ballot by Mail

Any qualified Texas voter eligible to cast an absentee ballot by mail may now make application to his county clerk for an absentee ballot for the November 3 general election.

In order to vote absentee by mail in this election, a voter must: (1) be unable to appear Nov. 3 at the polling place because of sickness or physical disability; or (2) expect to be absent from his county of residence on Nov. 3 and during the county clerk's office hours throughout the period Oct. 14-30, inclusive.

All applications for absentee ballots must be received in the county clerk's office not later than Oct. 30.

Details as to absentee voting procedure may be obtained from a voter's county clerk. Generally, these provisions apply:

A voter applying for an absentee ballot by reason of sickness or physical disability must mail his application to the county clerk. It should be accompanied by the voter's registration certificate, and by a certificate of a duly licensed physician, chiropractor or accredited Christian Science practitioner certifying to the voter's illness or

of international trade in which price, quality, and availability are the primary factors.

"In a world of competition, export expansion means salesmanship and service as well as price, quality and availability. The producers and marketers of the major U. S. agricultural products have understood this, and they support some 48 private trade organizations formed to develop markets overseas in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture. This is, of course, a mutual effort—with many strong Japanese organizations bringing to it their special knowledge, their special abilities."

In closing, Agriculture Secretary Hardin gave special recognition to the trade organizations for the three commodities which last year accounted for two-thirds of total U. S. agricultural exports to Japan—feed grains, soybeans and wheat.

A voter desiring to vote absentee by reason of absence from the county may either deliver or mail his application for absentee ballot to the county clerk. In the application, the voter must state that he expects to be absent from the county on election day and during the clerk's regular office hours for the entire period of personal appearance absentee voting (Oct. 14-30). The absentee ballot then must be mailed to the voter at an address outside his county of residence. Also, the envelope in which the voter returns the ballot must be postmarked from a point outside his county of residence.

Voter registration in Texas this year hit an all-time high of 4,150,645. On Nov. 3, voters will express their preference in state, district and local races, as well as on seven proposed state constitutional amendments.
