## General Election to Be Held Tuesday

Several contested races and seven proposed amendments to the State Constitution will be on the ballot to be used in voting in the general election next Tuesday, November 3.

The ballot lists Democratic and Republican candidates in ten races, as well as a column for write-in votes.

Selected candidates should be marked with an "X" in the square beside the name of the candidate.

For United States Senator, Lloyd Bentsen, who defeated incumbent Senator Ralph Yarborough in the Democratic primary, is opposed by Republican George Bush.

Democrat Graham Purcell is opposed in his race for re-election as U. S. Representative by Republican Joe Staley.

Democratic Governor Preston is being challenged by Republican Paul Eggers, and in the race for lieutenant governor, Ben Barnes, the Democrat nominee, has Byron Fullerton as his GOP opponent.

Crawford C. Martin, seeking re-election as attorney general, is opposed by Republican Edward M. Yturri. GOP hopeful S. L. Abbott is a candidate for comptroller of public accounts, trying to unseat the incumbent, Robert S. Calvert.

Jesse James, State Treasurer, has Robert F. Koehnke as his Republican opponent.

Bob Armstrong, Democrat, and Harry Trippett, Republican, are both seeking the job of commissioner of general land office. In the other state-wide race with two candidates, Democrat John C. White has Daniel C. Heath as his Republican opponent for commissioner of agriculture.

For State Representative, 80th District, veteran incumbent W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah is being challenged by Republican Zack B. Fisher of Memphis.

A large crowd of Foard County and area friends of Henry Black are expected to be on hand at the community center in Crowell on Saturday afternoon, October 31, when the three service clubs of Crowell are hosts for an appreciation reception. Hours will be from 2 to 4 p. m. and the host organizations are Lions and Rotary Clubs and Women's Service League.

Mr. Black retired at the end of the 1969-70 school term, after devoting a total of 39 years to public school education, with all but the first two years at Crowell. He was principal of Jameson High School, a Foard County rural school that was consolidated with the Crowell system. He served Crowell Schools as a classroom teacher, principal and superintendent, succeeding Grady Graves, now of Stephenville, as superintendent, in 1964.

Upon graduation from Crowell High School, Mr. Black received his BA and BS degrees from Sul Ross State College in Alpine and received his MA degree from Highlands University in Las Vegas, N. M. He taught for three summers in the demonstration high school while attending Sul Ross.

In addition to his teaching experience, Mr. Black served for 3½ years in the U. S. Navy during World War II, was elected mayor of the City of Crowell for two terms, also was elected for three terms as a city alderman. He is a former Scoutmaster, former teacher and steward of the

Funeral services for the retired farmer were held at 2:30 p. m., Tuesday, October 27, from the Truscott Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. Joe Mitchell, officiating.

Interment was in the Truscott Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing.

Mr. Jones was born May 9, 1887, in Clay County, Texas. He was married to the former Lula Vanderford June 19, 1913, at Benjamin.

Mr. Jones was active in church and Sunday school until ill health prevented.

He is survived by his wife of Truscott; two sons, Bryan Jones of Amarillo and Calvin Jones of McGregor; one daughter, Mrs. Ruby Lee Wisdom of Lubbock; one nephew, Harvey Jones who was reared by his uncle and aunt; three brothers, Frank Jones of Plainview, Jasper Jones of San Antonio and Bill Jones of Wichita Falls; one sister, Mrs. Mattie Williams of California; 11 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

### Adult Education Class to Begin Monday Night

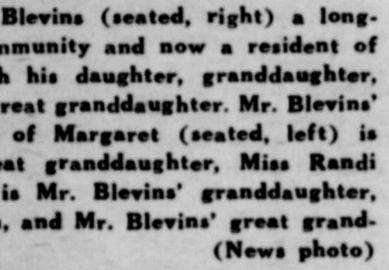
All interested adults are urged to be present Monday night at 7 o'clock in the east wing of the Crowell Grade School for the first session of the Adult Education Class.

Mrs. Dorothy Klepper will be instructing the class. Classes are tentatively set to meet Monday and Tuesday nights from 7 until 9 o'clock.

The class is open to adults ages 17 years and up. Instruction will be given for the beginner up to preparing students to take the General Educational Development (GED) Test. The Texas Education Agency issues a "Certificate of Equivalency for High School Achievement" to adults who have not completed high school provided they meet the requirements. One of the purposes of the continuing education classes is to help these students to meet these requirements.

The class is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency and the local school system and is free to students.

Coffee and cookies will be served during a break in classes.

### Dedication of Dick Todd Field Entrance Set for Friday Night

Pre-game activities will get underway Friday night at 7:05 when the CHS Band will march, doing its routine to be presented in the UIL marching contest. Following will be the dedication of the Dick Todd Field entrance.

The dedication will be followed by the national anthem and school songs just prior to the start of the game.

Scheduled for half-time will be a presentation by the Munday band, to be followed by the crowning of the homecoming queen.

### School Cafeteria Part by New Law

Crowell school authorities have received notification of changes in the National School Lunch Program. Charles M. Hicks, Program Director for Texas Education Agency, has been informed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture that Public Law 91-248 became effective Sept. 4, 1970.

The new law means that the local school cafeteria has been reimbursed at the rate of 10¢ per meal, the reimbursement rate is now only 6¢.

Mr. Jones said Monday that for the nineteen days in the month of September that were affected by the new law, losses amounting to \$327.00 were incurred.

Mr. Jones said Public Law 91-248 will deny Crowell Schools' cafeteria approximately \$3,000 per year which the old law would have provided.

### Over Registration Now in Progress

Registration of voters for 1971 has been moving along rapidly in Foard County with an estimated half of the 1200 eligible voters already registered.

Sheriff Dan Callaway said Monday that a check of the voter registration list of last year shows a total of 21 Foard County residents who registered last year and died since last year's registration period.

### Matador Hospital Is Re-Opened

Word was received in Matador Tuesday last week by the Motley County Hospital Board that pending a new inspection by a Medicare team, the Motley County General Hospital will be qualified to operate with Medicare certification.

The board met in a special session to hear the reading of a message from State Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah that the hospital would be in compliance with HEW regulations if it had one registered nurse and three licensed vocational nurses on the staff.

Medicare requirements state that a hospital must have a minimum of 4.2 registered nurses on the staff.

The message was sent by Healy to County Judge Forrest Campbell, secretary of the hospital board.

The board had voted last week to close the hospital because of the lack of the required number of registered nurses. Board members agreed that without Medicare they could not afford to keep the 13-bed hospital open.

Johnny Stevens, chairman of the board, said he "believes Bill Healy and Congressman George Mahon are responsible for getting the rules relaxed" to permit operation of the Motley County General Hospital. He also expressed appreciation to the Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers for publicizing the plight of small hospitals unable to comply with HEW regulations governing the employment of registered nurses. Stevens said he talked with officials at the State Health Department in Austin who confirmed Healy's message.

Matador still has only one doctor, Dr. A. C. Trawweek, but with a new modern hospital qualified to take care of Medicare patients, Stevens said that the town leaders hope to attract another doctor.

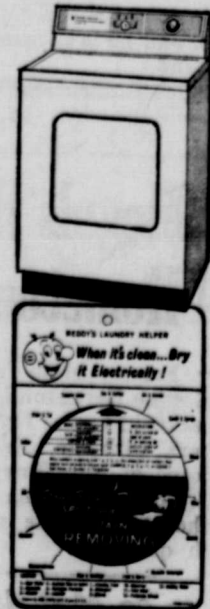

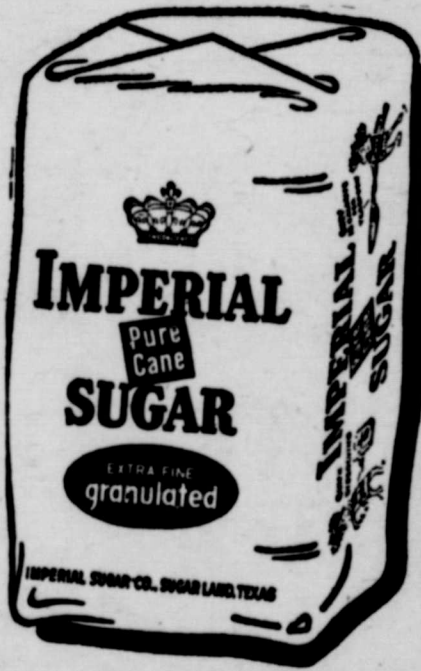

**Proposed Amendments**

Also to be voted on are seven proposed amendments to the constitution of Texas.

No. 1 relates to the removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges, and justices of peace under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2 would repeal the prohibition against open saloons found in section 20, article XVI of the State Constitution.

No. 3 would authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4 would reconstitute the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission.

No. 5 would authorize any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county.

No. 6 would increase the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.

Last week's edition of the News had an article discussing the seven amendments in more detail.

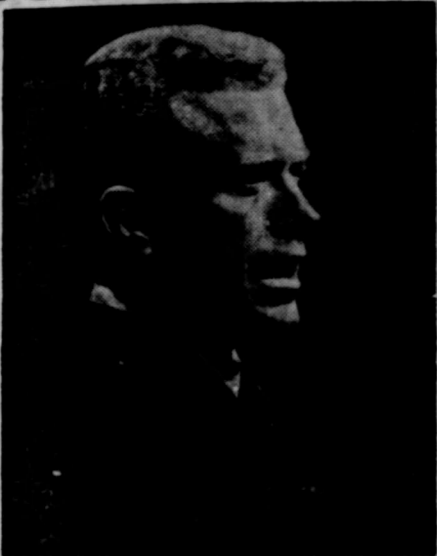

# THIRTY YEARS AGO

Dick Todd of Crowell scored two touchdowns last Sunday in the Washington Redskins' 34-17 victory over the Eagles in Philadelphia to move into a tie for National League scoring honors. This was the Redskins' fifth straight league victory. Todd is tied with Cliff of New York, Looney of Philadelphia and Mullenbaux of Green Bay for scoring honors. Each has scored 30 points.

Approximately seventy-five men and women are employed in the harvest of the big sweet potato crop in the Rayland community. There were more than 100 acres planted to sweet potatoes in that community this year and most of this acreage was under irrigation and a bumper yield is being reported.

**Total of \$647,000 Savings Bonds Sold in Foard County in September**

September sales of Series H United States Savings Bonds in Foard County totaled \$647,000, according to a report from the Treasury Department. A total of \$10,658,000 has been purchased in this county since January, 1969. The 1970 goal of \$70,000,000 is being approached.

Texasans purchased \$150,000,000 in Savings Bonds during the year compared to \$14,480,583 in the same period a year ago. This is an increase of 3.8 per cent. The nine-month period was \$303,218 for 76 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million.

Nationally, new purchases of Series E and H Bonds totaled \$351 million, 9.4 per cent of the 1969 sales of \$321 million. The first nine month sales were \$1.1 billion—39.9 per cent of the 1969 goal. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H amounted to \$182 million, reported for the first nine months—29 per cent increase over \$141 million exchanged in 1969.
