Entrance as Freshman at U of T, Austin

The University of Texas at Austin will accept only 5,500 new freshmen for the summer and fall of 1971, combined. Admission requirements now in effect will be unchanged.

If you are a Texas high school senior hoping to enter UT Austin next summer or fall, you should apply for admission before March 31, 1971. In addition, you must take the scholastic aptitude test of the College Entrance Examination Board. Your SAT score must accompany your application form.

If you graduate in the top ten per cent of your high school class, you will be admitted immediately, regardless of your SAT score.

If you graduate in the top quarter—but not the top 10 per cent—of your high school class, you will be admitted immediately if your SAT score is at least 800.

If you graduate in the second, third or fourth quarter of your high school class and meet current admission requirements at UT Austin, you will need a little luck. Your name will be put into a hat, figuratively speaking, with those of others in your category. Those whose names are drawn from the "hat" will be admitted. The "drawing" will occur shortly after March 31.

Second-quarter applicants from Texas must present an SAT score of 800. Those in the third and fourth quarters of their high school classes must earn at least

1000 on the SAT.

All out-of-state applicants must earn SAT scores of 1000 or more. Out-of-state applicants in the lower half of their high school graduating classes are ineligible for admission to UT Austin, regardless of SAT score.

Apart from all the above considerations, if you win a competitive scholarship recognized by UT Austin, and if you meet present admission requirements, you will be admitted. Again, you must apply for admission before March 31.

If you are offered admission as an entering freshman, you must accept by May 1, 1971, or two weeks after the date of the offer, whichever is later. Acceptance of an admission offer must be accompanied by a \$50 tuition deposit which will be applied to your tuition and fees for the semester in which you enter.

The March 31 date is crucial. Even though you are the valedictorian of your high school class, it is possible that you might not be admitted if you do not apply before that deadline. Application forms may be requested from the Registrar, University of Texas at Austin, Austin, Texas 78712.

Austin, Tex.—Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., as Texas' chief election officer, has urged complete overhaul of the state's primary election machinery and voter registration system.

Dies told the House committee studying election reform that Texas faces a crisis in election operations and must, with counties, assume financing and conduct of primaries.

Election fees, although already too high, said Dies, no longer adequately finance elections.

Texas' chief election officer said he personally favors September and October primaries to concentrate the election period, ease the strain on candidates and increase waning voter interest.

Dies also strongly recommends the junking of annual voter registration and substituting the system of re-registration-by-voting used by most states.

Both early primaries (and January 31 voter registration cutoff) and annual registration are under court attack.

If federal judges declare both unconstitutional, Dies told the committee, Texas will be unable to hold primaries or register voters until the Legislature orders changes.

URBAN PANEL REPORTS — Texas Urban Development Commission has recommended creation of new state agencies and programs to help make cities more pleasant in which to live.

Committee's 50-page interim report to Gov. Preston Smith gave primary attention to transportation and housing problems and the need for cooperation among state and local governments.

Group recommended that an Intergovernmental Transportation Council be created to provide adequate planning and assistance for comprehensive transportation systems.

Other agencies recommended for creation were: a Department of Community Affairs to aid local governments, administer planning and housing programs as well as to develop and administer economic opportunity programs; a Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations; a Human Resources Council; a Texas Housing Finance Corporation, and an Urban Assistance Board.

Additional recommendations covered fields of law enforcement, natural resource management (aid for waste water plant construction), health standards, property tax administration, balanced growth and strengthening local government.

Named FHA Farm Family of the Year

**Crowell Could
Gain \$9,428.00 on
Sewage Project**

Taxpayers of Crowell stand to gain \$9,428.00 on the cost of proposed sewage plant improvements if the Texas Legislature acts promptly in approving a \$25,500,000 matching grants program requested by the Texas Water Quality Board. That statement comes from Gordon Fulcher, the chairman of the TWQB.

"If there is not a state matching grants program, the federal participation in sewage plant construction amounts to approximately 50 per cent," Fulcher said. "If the state, however, does have a matching grants program which contributes at least 25 per cent of the cost of an eligible project, the federal participation may increase to 55 per cent. This, then, would leave a city or other taxing entity with only 20 or 25 per cent of the total cost to be raised," he explained.

As an example of possible advantage to Texas taxpayers, Fulcher cites the fact that, during the 1970 fiscal year, over 100 projects were constructed in Texas at a total cost of approximately \$90 million. Of that total, the federal share was approximately \$30 million and shares of the cities and other entities totaled \$60 million. If Texas had had a state matching grants program during that year, shares would have been: federal, \$49.5 million; state \$22.50 million; cities and other entities \$18.0 million, or a difference of \$42 million.

Nut Buying Hints

The outer shells of nuts may give hints on the quality inside. Pick clean, bright shells; they are most likely to contain good kernels. Shells that are dirty, dull, stained or cracked are sometimes indicative of defective kernels. The heavier the nuts, the meatier the kernel. Unshelled nuts, often marked with lower prices, require about two pounds to yield one pound of nuts. Shelled nuts, however, save time, labor and storage space. Shelled nuts keep best in airtight containers in the refrigerator, or even up to a year in the freezer.

DPS Predicts 87 Auto Crash Deaths During Holidays

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, warned this week that traffic crashes in Texas over the Christmas and New Year holiday periods may claim as many as 87 lives.

He said 52 deaths are expected in the 78 hours of Christmas from 6 p. m., Thursday, December 24, to midnight Sunday, December 27. He also estimated 35 traffic deaths during the New Year holiday from 6 p. m., Thursday, December 31, to midnight Sunday, January 3.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will place all available patrolmen on the highways during both holiday periods to enforce the law and aid motorists. He added that many local law enforcement agencies will be joining in this all-out effort to reduce the number of holiday accidents.

The DPS Director said a special "Operation Motorcade" would be in effect over both holiday periods, during which periodic tabulations of traffic fatalities will be made and given the widest possible dissemination in order to focus public attention on the added dangers involved in holiday travel.

"We urge each individual driver to join in these efforts and help us prove the estimate of 87 fatalities too high. Many holiday accidents can and will be prevented if Texans will adopt 'Drive Friendly' as their personal slogan while behind the wheel," Speir added.

Christmas Fruit Bowl

Two Minutes With the Bible

The Triumphal Entry:
Past or Future?

Did our Lord actually ride in triumph into Jerusalem to become King of the Church? Or is His true triumph still to come? True, the townspeople cried: "Hosanna, Blessed is the King of

Israel that cometh in the name of the Lord" (John 12:12,13). But Jesus responded by entering the city, riding "an ass's colt" (vers. 14,15). Surely this was not a very regal sight! Once before, when He knew that they "would come and take Him by force to make Him a King, He departed . . . into a mountain Himself alone" (John 6:15).

He knew that it was not yet time for Him to reign. First must come the cross, then the throne. Zechariah had prophesied of this very entry into Jerusalem, saying:

"Behold thy King!" Look at Him! and then he describes His entrance: "lowly, riding upon an ass; even upon a colt, the foal of an ass" (Zech. 9:9).

At this entry, "When He was come near, He beheld the city, and wept over it" (Luke 19:41). At this entry He entered into the temple, looked about and went out again (Mark 11:11). It was His Father's house, but He could not worship there. It had become a den of thieves. No, this was no triumphal entry. Look at Him, meek, lowly, riding on an ass's colt, and then see Him coming again as Rev. 19:11-16 describes it. How different the symbolism! Once meek, lowly and "having salvation." Now "in righteousness doth He judge and make war." Once, riding "an ass's colt." Now, "Behold! a white horse!" And those eyes, once filled with tears are now "as a flame of fire."

Our Lord's true triumphal entry is still future. According to prophecy He will come again, put down all rebellion against Himself and reign in glory and power. Thank God He has not yet done so! In love He still points to Calvary, where He died for our sins and offers us the riches of His grace. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).
