## More Than 500 People Visit Foard Museum's Western Art Exhibit

More than 500 people called at the Foard County Museum on December 4, 5 and 6 to see a first-class western art exhibit and at the same time visit the museum at the McAdams ranch 15 1/2 miles west of Crowell.

Sponsored by Mr. and Mrs. Otis Gafford, ranch owners, and Lois Grube with High Plains Galleries in Amarillo, area residents were permitted to view the works of two of today's western artists, Kenneth Wyatt of Tulsa and Carl Smith of Canyon. It was the first showing of the Smith paintings in this locale. For Wyatt, he was returning to familiar ground and faces, having been pastor of the Methodist Churches at Chillicothe and Paducah, and on three occasions, he was guest preacher for youth-led revivals at the Methodist Church in Crowell.

Wyatt's paintings were featured in October in Quannah at the First National Bank. He received his most dramatic and biggest boost in Vernon during the 1969

Santa Rosa Roundup when Ken Curtis, Festus of the Gunsmoke series, liked his work and bought seven of his major paintings. His interest in art dating from childhood, Wyatt has ridden full-speed onto the scene with boldness, mastery of technique and authenticity and has had widespread public acceptance. He was one of five West Texans recognized and honored for cultural achievement in 1970 by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Besides being an evangelist of the United Methodist Church, he is a Knife and Fork humorist and speaks to hundreds of civic and religious groups. He also finds time for golf. He, his wife, Veda Mae, son, Mark, and daughter, Jill, live in Tulsa.

Carl Smith, with the exception of a tour of duty in the U. S. Army in Europe, has spent all his adult years teaching art and portraying his heritage. Born in Canyon in 1932 to a pioneer Texas Panhandle family, they survived the dust bowl days when only the strong of spirit stayed on. His parents passed on to him a faith and discipline to live by and the courage of creativity that he translates so well on canvas. This feeling on canvas has already established him as a renowned artist of the Southwest. His works are a treasured part in the art collections of the King Ranch, Lyndon B. Johnson, John Connally, Arthur Godfrey, Bud Wilkinson, and many other public and private collections.

The museum itself, a perfect setting for a western art exhibit, has attracted hundreds of visitors since it was opened in June, 1968. It was the ranch home of Mrs. Gafford's late parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie McAdams. The ranch was established by her late grandfather, J. J. McAdams, almost a century ago.

Literally hundreds of items are on display, many in glass enclosed cases, most of which have been refinished by Mrs. Gafford, owner and curator. Many pieces of furniture have been recreated from her well-equipped work shop. Her talent as an artist and her ability to preserve the western atmosphere as it was in the early day makes it one of the nicest kind of museums. Many classroom groups and club groups make frequent trips to the museum. It is open on Sunday only, except by appointment.

## Mrs. H. Schindler Died December 31 in Shreveport, La.

### Funeral Services Held in Vernon Saturday Afternoon

Mrs. Pearl Schindler, 83, long-time resident of Crowell and widow of a pioneer Foard County dentist, Dr. H. Schindler, died Thursday, December 31, in a nursing home in Shreveport, La.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Saturday, January 2, at the Holy Family Catholic Church in Vernon with Rev. Wilfred M. DeFever, pastor, officiating. Interment was in East View Memorial Park under the direction of Sullivan Funeral Home.

Pall bearers were Henry Reis, Otto Tiroff, A. G. Peckack, Jimmy Peckack, Adolph Kubicek and Charlie Joe Matyssek.

Mrs. Schindler was born March 29, 1887, in East St. Louis, Ill., as Pearl Sentiff. She was married to Dr. Schindler Jan. 15, 1908, in St. Louis, Mo., and they came to Crowell where he had established his practice in 1906.

This remained her home until several years after Dr. Schindler's death which occurred in June, 1946.

Mrs. Schindler was active in all civic affairs, especially Red Cross and allied activities. During the flu epidemic of 1918, she, with the late Mmes. M. O'Connell and George Allison, nursed flu victims all over Foard County.

Mrs. Schindler is the last charter member of the Columbian Club to expire; she had served the club in various capacities, several times as president.

She was preceded in death by her only daughter, Elsie, Jan. 1, 1970. She is survived by one sister of St. Petersburg, Fla., two half-sisters in Decatur, Ala., and her son-in-law, Carl Lawhon, of Shreveport, La.

Mrs. S. E. Tate, 85, resident of Foard County for the past 75 years, died in the Foard County Hospital Saturday, January 2, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church at 2 p. m., Monday, January 4, conducted by Rev. Berl Cavin of Mesquite, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Walter Driver, and Minister Wayne Oneal of the East Side Church of Christ.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery directed by Womack Funeral Home.

Bertie B. Cook was born in Honey Grove, Cooke County, Texas, on September 28, 1885, daughter of Alexander Cook and Mrs. Bettie Allen Cook Fox. She was married to Sam E. Tate and they lived in Foard County where he was engaged in farming until his death June 25, 1943. She continued to live on the farm until her nephew, Ed Manard, passed away two years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Tate were married Sept. 13, 1901, in the Indian Territory in what is now Eastern Oklahoma.

Mrs. Tate was a member of the First Methodist Church in Crowell, and was an active member of the West Side Home Demonstration Club. She was also a member of the Rebekah Lodge.

## Local ASCS Office Expects Complete Details on Farm Program by March 1

In the December newsletter of the Foard County ASCS to land owners of the county, Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager, said that the general provisions of the new farm program, which covers wheat, cotton and feed grain, has been announced, and full information on all programs is expected before March 1, when program sign-up begins. Mrs. Reeder said, "Newsletters and other material will be mailed as soon as more information is available. We will be glad to discuss with you the general outline of the new program."

### 1971 Wheat Yields

Mrs. Reeder said that the basic provisions for proven wheat yields are continued under the Agricultural Act of 1970. "You may elect to establish a yield for your farm based on actual production rather

than use a yield established by the county committee on a judgment basis only," Mrs. Reeder said. The base period for establishing 1971 farm yields is 1967, 1968, 1969. To prove yields, the producer must have harvested wheat acreage in each of these three years and be able to provide reliable proof of production on the harvested acres. Acceptable proof is limited to warehouse receipts, sales receipts, bin measurements, scale tickets from warehouse or scales used by general public.

### In order to assure consideration, producers may file a written request within 15 days of December 29, 1970. Production data timely received will be considered before notifying the producer of his official 1971 farm wheat yield.

### 1971 Cotton Yields

Mrs. Reeder said that each cotton producer will need to furnish production records for the 1970 cotton crop. Cotton payments will be based on 1968, 1969 and 1970 yields, except that the 1970 projected yield for the farm will be substituted for actual yields for 1968 and 1969.

1970 production records must be by bale number, weight, and farm identification and a certification by the operator that all listed production is from the identical farm. Payment yields cannot be determined for cotton farms until this evidence is furnished. Only 1970 records are needed, Mrs. Reeder added.

## March of Dimes Drive Underway in Foard County

### Mrs. Baxter Gentry Will Service as County Chairman

Mrs. Baxter Gentry is serving again this year as chairman for the Foard County March of Dimes campaign and she said Monday that mailers have been sent out to Foard County residents.

Mrs. Gentry said "Birth defects are the second largest destroyer of life in the United States, out-ranked only by heart disease and greater than cancer and stroke combined. Every year about 250,000 American babies are born with birth defects. Fortunately, some preventive measures are being taken; there is now a vaccine to prevent German measles, and an effective means of preventing Rh blood diseases, two of the major causes of birth defects. There are over 100 rehabilitation centers for children, research centers and the Salk Institute which are supported by the March of Dimes."

Mrs. Gentry pointed out that during the past year the local March of Dimes chapter purchased a wheel chair for a local resident.

"It is through the efforts of many that so many things are now being done that were impossible only a short time ago. So I ask your help; please give generously," Mrs. Gentry added.

## Past Year Is Third Driest Ever Recorded Here

The year 1970 went down in the record books as the third driest year recorded in Foard County. Rainfall records here date back to 1913.

A total of 13.75 inches of moisture fell here, according to measurements by the government rain gauge. The driest year on record is 1956 when 10.28 inches of rain were received. Second driest was 1917 when 11.27 inches were recorded.

Foard County is in dire need of moisture at the present time. The county did not receive any heavy rains last spring to fill stock tanks and many tanks have gone dry or are extremely low.

## C. V. Barker Begins Duties as Pre. 2 Commissioner

C. V. (Jiggs) Barker took over his new duties as county commissioner of Precinct No. 2 at the beginning of the year, in the only change made in county elective offices.

Mr. Barker was elected as commissioner in the November general election.

## George Self Makes Predictions for '71 at Rotary Meeting

At the Wednesday, December 30, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell, George Self brought his summary of things as they now exist and his predictions for the year 1971. Mr. Self has made his annual predictions at the Rotary Club since 1946.

Mr. Self, in his remarks, stated: "The future stands still—we are the ones who move." Here are some of his predictions for the year 1971:

The Rotary Club had an increase of 15 per cent in membership in 1970. He predicted that the club will meet its 10 per cent increase in 1971. He predicted that the water situation here will improve during the year. The city now has 758 water meters, and by extending this into more of the countryside, more meters will be added next year.

A new disposal system is called for and Mr. Self predicts the city will find a way to get a new one in the coming year. Two aldermen and a mayor will be voted on this year and he predicts a one-cent sales tax will also be voted on.

Taxes in Crowell have been kept at a minimum as is shown in the figures of the same rate of taxes for the last 15 to 20 years. The re-evaluation of school taxes is set at \$1.80 valuation and this will bring \$36,000 additional tax money for the school. Foard County contains 750 square miles and there is only \$180,000 against it and this will be paid off in 1980.

Mr. Self predicts 5 per cent less money to farmers from the federal government in 1971. Much restriction will be placed on herbicides and brush control. Thousands of dollars will be spent on the new park. He predicted the general financial conditions will be much improved in 1971.

## Front Sunday Brings Season's Coldest Weather

The coldest weather of the season descended on Foard County early this week as a blast of frigid air blew through here Sunday.

The mercury had plunged to a low of about 12 degrees early Monday and dropped on Tuesday morning to a low of about 5 degrees. There is no official government temperature gauge here, but Paul Bullion operates the government weather station in Truscott and he reported that the official low at Truscott was 5 degrees.

The front was not accompanied by any moisture, although heavy clouds hung over the area all day Saturday.

**Hospital Insurance Under Medicare Increased January 1**

Medicare patients' share of the covered charges while in a hospital were increased effective January 1, 1971, according to Wayne Klipping, manager of the Vernon social security branch office. This increase applies to those entering a hospital in 1971.

The patient must pay the first \$60.00 (up from \$52.00) for the first 60 days in the hospital. For the 61st through the 90th day in the hospital, the patient pays \$15.00 a day (up from \$13.00). For lifetime reserve days, the patient pays \$30.00 a day (up from \$26.00).

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**Two Minutes With the Bible**

**Three Times When the Lord Wouldn't Answer**

In the various accounts of our Lord's earthly ministry we find three occasions when He declined to answer those who appealed to Him or questioned Him.

First there is the Gentile woman of Matt. 15:21-28. Her daughter was possessed of a demon and in her trouble she appealed to the Lord to help her, "but He answered her not a word." Finally, in His grace He did help her, but not until He had taught her the lesson that as a Gentile she had no claim on Him. As Romans 1:28 tells us, the Gentiles had been "given up" because "they did not wish to retain God in their knowledge." In this connection we Gentiles should read carefully Eph. 2:11,12 and see how utterly without hope we are apart from the grace of God.

Next there was a Jewess, in trouble of a different kind. She had been caught in adultery and was brought to Him for judgment (John 8:1-11). Unlike the Gentile woman, she belonged to the chosen race and possessed God's holy law, a distinct advantage — unless you are a law-breaker. Our Lord also helped her in grace, but not until He had demonstrated that the law is the great leveler of mankind, bringing all in guilty before God (Rom. 3:19).

But finally we find how it was that our Lord could show grace — and do it justly — to both Jew and Gentile, for in the third instance we find the Lord Himself in trouble. On trial for His life before the representatives of Hebrew and Roman law, He is accused of all sorts of wicked crimes. But on this occasion, too, he declines to answer.

First Caiaphas, the High Priest said to Him: "Answerest Thou nothing? What is it which these witness against Thee? But Jesus held His peace . . ." (Matt. 26: 62,63).

Next Pilate, the Gentile judge, said: "Hearest thou not how many things they witness against Thee? And He answered him to never a word; inasmuch that the governor marvelled greatly" (Matt. 27: 12-14).

Why did our Lord not answer and defend Himself? Because He

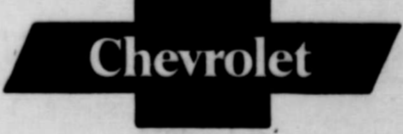

### Children's Barnyard New Feature at Fat Stock Show

Children's Barnyard, an exhibit designed especially for the youngsters, will make its debut at the 75th Diamond Anniversary of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, reports W. R. Watt, president and manager.

"The exhibit promises to be quite an attraction for youthful visitors," Watt said. The anniversary edition of the stock show is scheduled Jan. 29 through Feb. 1.



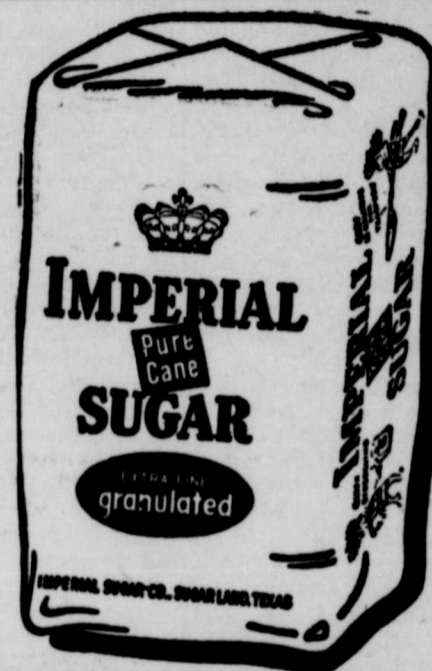

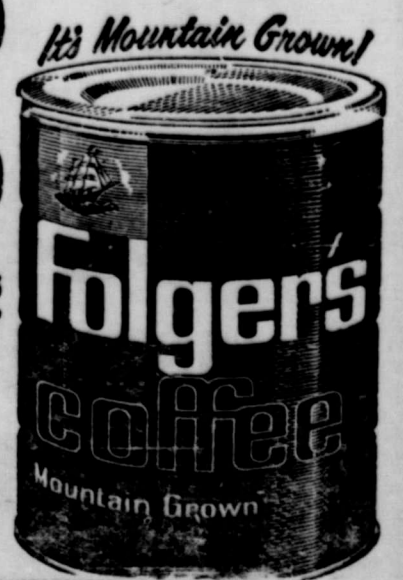

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Austin, Tex.—Frantic preparations are underway to ready the State Capitol for the 62nd legislative session which begins January 12.

Construction workmen still have to complete renovation of the building and completion of new offices and committee rooms. Staffs must be hired and assigned, opening sessions planned and the budget and other major bills drafted.

Surveys indicate that most legislators are agreed that taxing and redistricting of congressional and legislative boundaries are their toughest tasks. But there is no shortage of tough tasks for the lawmakers in 1971.

Legislative Budget Board has pushed the estimated new revenue need to \$645.1 million, and many think it will run a great deal higher, perhaps as much as \$800 million or more. Very few ideas have been offered on how to raise the new revenue.

Political futures of many legislators ride on the redrawing of their district boundaries, which must follow population patterns of the 1970 census.

Among other major problems pinpointed by legislators are:

\* A multi-billion-dollar state budget.

\* Liquor-by-the-drink legislation.

\* Welfare programs, including an increase in the \$80 million a year ceiling on categorical assistance payments.

\* Laws to curb drug use and prevent crime.

\* Revision of auto insurance regulations.

\* Air and water pollution control.

\* Financing higher education, including a proposed tuition hike.

**HIGHER INSURANCE RATES**

—As expected, Texans will be paying higher auto insurance rates

next year. But rates will not be as high as first proposed.

State Board of Insurance has announced an average statewide 13.6 per cent increase for all classes of vehicles and coverages. Actually, that's about a 14 per cent overall increase for private passenger cars.

In establishing the rate, the board, for the first time in its history, took into consideration insurance company income from investments and all other sources. But it backed off from the "net worth concept" which would have produced still higher rates.

Staff members of the state regulatory agency last November recommended an average hike of 23.4 per cent. Industry actually asked 27.7 per cent, and reportedly is disappointed at the end result, since it got only about half of what it wanted.

Board members staunchly defended their findings as adequate, however, and said rates will allow after-tax profit of 5.1 per cent on total assets, or 7.2 per cent before taxes.

Rate of return from policy underwriting reflected in 5.1 per cent profit is only 1.3 per cent after taxes. Profit allocation from interest, dividends and rents is 2.9 per cent after taxes and from realized and unrealized capital gains of 1.9 per cent.

**VOTE FOR 18-YEAR-OLDS**—County tax assessor-collectors have been notified that voter registration certificates should be issued to applicants 18 years and above and those who will be 18 by March 1, 1972.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., chief state election officer, has sent out instructions for implementing the U. S. Supreme Court order giving 18-year-olds the right to vote in federal elections.

Certificates issued to those under 21 will be labeled for "federal elections only until 21 years of age." Same document will contain birthdate so it can be used for state and local elections after applicant turns 21.
