Charlie Reynolds Died Monday After Long Illness

Funeral Services Held Wednesday at Methodist Church

Charlie H. Reynolds, 76, longtime resident of Foard County, died in the Foard County Hospital at 5 a. m., Monday, January 25, following a long illness. Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church on Wednesday, January 27, at 2:30 p. m., conducted by Rev. Warren Everson, pastor of Bethel Church, assisted by Wayne Oneal, Minister of the East Side Church of Christ. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Serving as pall bearers were Cecil Carroll, R. J. Owens, Ray Shirley, Clarence Garrett, Mike Bird and Bill Nichols. Charlie Henry Reynolds was born February 9, 1894, in Cottle County, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Henry Reynolds. He moved to Foard County with his parents as a small boy. He was married to Fannie Lee Wright Jan. 23, 1928, in Crowell. Mr. Reynolds served in World War I with the Field Remount Squad 335. He received his discharge July 7, 1919. He and his wife moved to Crowell from their farm southwest of Crowell a few years ago after he retired. Survivors include his wife; three sons, John Henry Reynolds of San Diego, Calif., Charlie Reynolds of Lubbock and Donald Reynolds of Washington, D. C.; seven grandchildren; one brother, Harry Reynolds of Denver City.

Cotton Allotment Notices Mailed to Farmers Jan. 20

The new farm legislation provides for sale or lease of cotton acreage very much like past programs, Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager for the Foard ASCS office said Monday. "If you wish to sell or lease cotton, you may enter your name and the amount you have for sale or lease on a register at the ASCS office, which is available to the public," Mrs. Reeder said. The county committee, composed of Bill Cates, R. J. Owens and Harold Fish, has determined that cotton may not be transferred out of Foard County and any transfers of allotments must be completed by May 3. Mrs. Reeder added that cotton allotment notices were mailed to farm operators on January 20, giving the base allotment, yield, price support rates and conserving base for 1971. "Remember," Mrs. Reeder says, "the allotment and base notices you receive are not planting limits but are for payment purposes and for computing set-aside acres. Sign up dates for the 1971 cotton, wheat and feed grain programs are March 1 through April 9, 1971.

School Board Hires Mrs. D. M. Prince For Cafeteria Work

Mrs. D. M. Prince was employed as a worker in the school cafeteria at a meeting of the Crowell School Board last Thursday night. Mrs. Prince will replace Mrs. B. J. Eavenson, who has resigned. Mrs. Prince will begin her new duties on February 1. The board received numerous applications for the job, Supt. Larry H. Jones, said Friday. Supt. Jones, at the meeting last week, told board members of his trip to Austin to attend the School Administrators Conference on Education sponsored by the Texas Education Agency earlier this month. He said that while he was in Austin, he was able to clear up several matters pertaining to the TEA's audit of local school personnel records. In other action, the board voted to back the school principals in their handling of disciplinary problems. The board also worked on the equalization of city property. A committee appointed by the board has been at work for several months equalizing land valuations in the district.

Theft of Pipe from Oil Field is Reported

Theft of oil field pipe has been reported to Sheriff Dan Callaway. The pipe, 2,660 feet of 2-inch upset tubing and about 80 joints of 1/2-inch sucker rods was taken from the Raspberry Field in the west part of the county.

Two representatives of the Texas Animal Health Commission were in Crowell Monday morning to begin an inspection of Foard County cattle for possible scabies infections. The two men are Mack Tiner of Graham and Dee Davis of Fort Stockton.

Mr. Tiner was in Crowell to help get the inspection started, and Mr. Davis will be doing the inspection work, which is expected to take at least six weeks. A visual inspection of all cattle in the county will be made, and when the inspector sees signs of a scabies infection, the owner will be asked to pen the cattle so that skin scrapings can be taken. Any animals found to have scabies will be quarantined, and dipped twice at 10 to 14 day intervals in an approved dip. At the end of that time, if no scabies are found, quarantine on the animal will be removed.

Scabies is a microscopic mite that burrows in the hides of cattle causing extreme discomfort, and causing damage to the hide and effecting loss of weight in the animals. The inspectors said that although scabies is a microscopic mite, its effects to the animals' hides and hair is very evident. The scabies sometimes cause most of the animals' hair to fall out.

Mr. Tiner said that the present outbreak of scabies—the first since December 1965 in Castro County—was discovered in December 1970 in feed lots in Deaf Smith County. By tracing the buyers' papers on the cattle, it is believed by the Commission that the infected cattle came from this area of Texas, and the present scabies inspection is being made in Foard, Hardeman, Wichita and Wilbarger Counties.

Mr. Tiner went from Crowell to Fort Worth where he will be working during the Fat Stock Show. Mr. Davis will be here inspecting cattle herds, but will be gone for about a week when he will be doing cattle inspection work at the El Paso Stock Show.

Mr. Davis said that he is staying at El Mesquite Motel here, and can be reached at telephone number 684-3631 by any stockmen who wish to talk to him. He said that at the present time, all cattle leaving this section of the state bound for the western states must be dipped before they are permitted to cross the state line. This will be in effect, until the Texas Animal Health Commission can certify that cattle coming out of this section are scabies-free.

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California Teen-Ager Helps Children With Birth Defects

Kathy Dent is a typical western beauty: tall, blonde and bursting with energy and good health. Kathy, who is 18 and lives in Bakersfield, Calif., has some concerns that perhaps one would not expect of a happy-go-lucky teenager.



TO KNOW AND TO CARE is the motto for Kathy Dent, 18, Bakersfield, Calif. Kathy is a member of the March of Dimes Teen Action Program (TAP), a nationwide network of young people committed to the prevention of birth defects.

"I have a friend who is the mother of a mentally retarded child," Kathy explains. "Knowing that child made me feel that I have so much compared to him; and then I discovered how good it made me feel to teach him something, or just to make him smile. So now that I have a chance to help other children, I want to do it. Feeling the way she does, it's no surprise that Kathy became a member of the March of Dimes Teen Action Program (TAP). Led by Kathy Garver, who stars in "Family Affairs" on CBS television, the TAPs are junior volunteers. Organized in 1954, they are an integral part of The National Foundation-March of Dimes.

Kathy and the other TAP volunteers take their responsibility seriously. They asked for, and got, Spanish lessons from clinic aides to enable them to talk to the children. They had no funds to provide toys for the children, but that didn't stop them. "We just scrounged. We collected all the toys our little brothers and sisters didn't want any more and took them to the clinic. We discovered the children like to make things, too, so now we make coloring books out of paper bags, and we show them how to decorate coffee cans and make jewelry out of macaroni. It's kind of messy, but their mothers don't mind."

Clinic Volunteers: But they do more than just raise money. TAP groups around the country are "up to here" in community action projects, tailored to meet the special needs of their communities. Kathy Dent, for instance, lives in the agricultural region of California, where there are many Spanish-American migrant workers. The Kern County Health Department has established free clinics to provide general health care for these people and to refer those with major medical problems to the appropriate agency.

Prenatal Care Emphasis: Not only do their mothers not mind, they are delighted. And talking to these women about their children gives TAP volunteers the opportunity to tell them about the importance of prenatal care in order to have healthier babies. Prenatal care is a major concern to all TAPs. As future parents, they want to make sure all of tomorrow's children receive their birth-

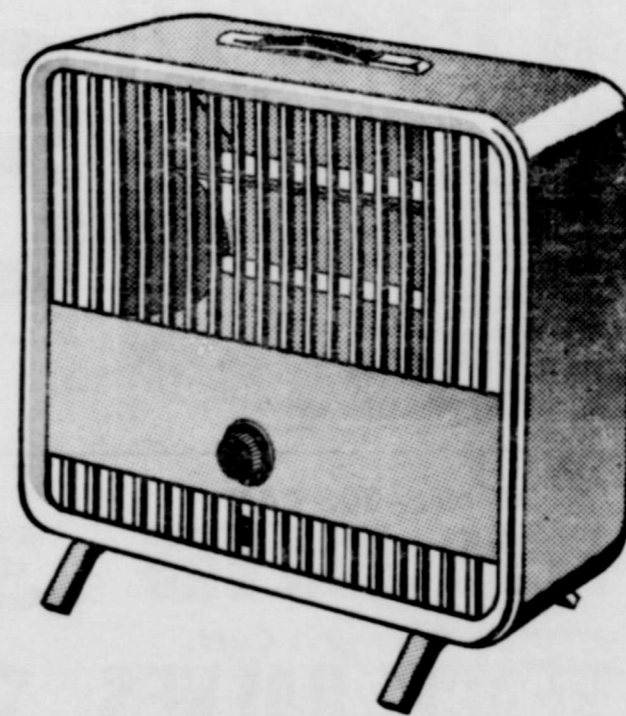

Do You Receive Social Security Checks?

Do you receive social security checks? Do you expect to earn over \$1680 this year? If so, have you told the social security office? Wayne Klipping, social security branch office manager in Vernon, asked these questions last week.

You can earn up to \$1680 and still receive all your social security checks. If you earn over \$1680 a year, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each two dollars you earn. One dollar of your benefits is withheld for every one dollar you earn over \$2880 in a year.

There is a very important exception to this rule: No matter how much you earn in the year, you can receive a check for every month you do not earn more than \$140. If you are self-employed you get a check for each month you don't work in your business.

You will be overpaid if you haven't reported to the social security office that your earnings will be over \$1680, Klipping said. Don't wait and find you have to repay when a simple telephone call can help you prevent it. For further information, call or write the social security office at Vernon. They will be glad to answer any questions you have.

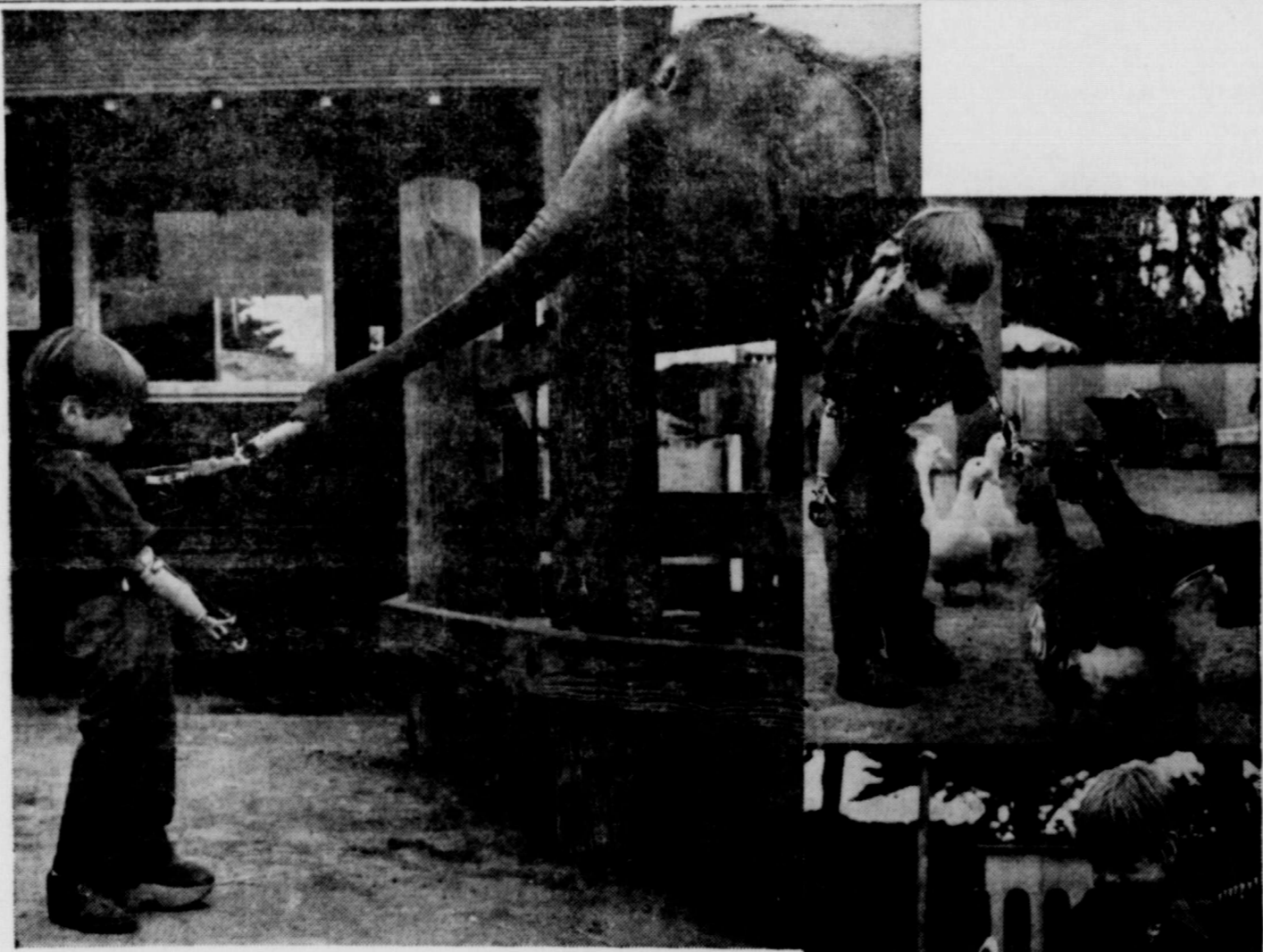

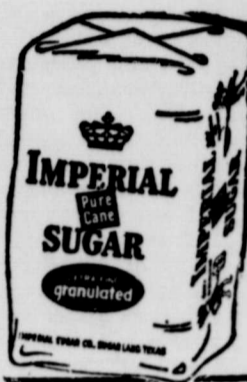

County Federation

The Foard County Federation of Women's Clubs held its regular meeting Monday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. at the Adelphian Club house with the Adelphian Club as hostess. The president, Mrs. Grover Moore, presided. Five clubs were represented with 9 members present.

Mrs. H. C. Brown, treasurer, reported a balance of \$24.21 in the treasury. She reported she sent \$7.28 to the state club house endowment fund from the club's penny donations. The library received only \$93 last year and she urged friends of the library to help support it. In other business, it was announced that the annual Santa Rosa district convention will be March 18 and 19 in Memphis.

Mrs. Jack Roberts presented the program and spoke on "Our Fabulous Century." She reminisced from her own experiences saying that she came to Crowell in 1892 at the age of 10 and she has known all office holders in the county since it was organized. She remembers the only paper in school was the Kansas City Star which came out every week. Everyone had a Bible and read it faithfully. For entertainment there were parties, box suppers, home talent shows, beauty contest and medicine shows, circuses and tent shows that infrequently played Crowell. She remembers the first school house that burned in 1897 and that school was held in the court house for 2 years. All children walked to school and brought their lunches in molasses buckets. Mrs. Roberts said that a majority of the early settlers of Foard County were Civil War veterans—that recently upon checking the cemetery, the historical committee found 65 Civil War veterans' graves.
