City of Crowell to Construct New Sewerage Plant

Final plans and specifications have been drawn up for a new sewerage disposal plant for the city of Crowell and bids are expected to be taken in the near future. The new plant will be the oxidized ditch type with an aerator. Total cost of the project will be \$42,000 and a federal grant of \$14,120 was made to the City for part of the cost.

Light Turnout in Trustee Election

Twenty-nine residents of the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District voted in the election Saturday and returned the four incumbents on the Crowell Board to new terms. Beverly Gray, Jeff Bell, Floyd C. Borchardt and Duane Johnson each received 27 votes. Otis Gafford, candidate for re-election as trustee-at-large on the county board, received 26 votes, and Herbert Fish, candidate for re-election as trustee from Precinct 4 on the county board, received 3 votes.

Mrs. J. H. Minnick Died Saturday at Home in Crowell

Funeral Services To Be Held in Vernon Thursday Afternoon

Mrs. James Herbert Minnick, 84, died unexpectedly at home in Crowell Saturday afternoon. Funeral services will be held in the Grace Episcopal Church in Vernon at 3 p. m., Thursday (today) with graveside rites at the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of Womack Funeral Home. Rev. James Eubanks, Vicar, will officiate.

Pall bearers will be Robert Kincaid, Hubert Brown, Foster Davis, J. T. Hughston, Fred Youree, Ray Brown, A. M. Hiatt of Vernon and Fate McDougle of Wichita Falls. The former Adelaide (Della) Cornelia Holthausen was born December 7, 1886, in Union City, N. J., to the late Mr. and Mrs. Arendt Holthausen. She graduated from the Hoboken Academy in Hoboken, N. J., and then attended a finishing school in Geneva, Switzerland.

Her first visit to Texas was in 1906 when she and her two brothers were with a group of paying guests of Mr. Minnick on his ranch in Foard and Knox counties. While vacationing on this first dude ranch of the Southwest, her horse fell with her and she suffered a broken shoulder. A courtship followed the accident and on April 29, 1908 she and Mr. Minnick were married in Union City, N. J. They lived on the ranch until 1921 when they moved to Oklahoma City. In 1925 they moved to Norman and remained there until 1946, at which time they moved back to Crowell. Mr. Minnick, an internationally known polo player, rancher and one of the founders and first inspectors of the American Quarter Horse Association, passed away on April 30, 1947.

Mrs. Minnick was an Episcopalian for 66 years, and was a charter member of Grace Episcopal Church in Vernon.

She is survived by one son, James H. Minnick Jr. of Augusta, Ga.; five daughters, Mrs. Helen Wardell of Rockville Centre, N. Y., Mrs. Muriel Schmidt of Tempe, Ariz., Mrs. Betty Cantwell of Trenton, N. J., Mrs. Peggy Adams of Morongo Valley, Calif., and Mrs. Virginia Shirley of Crowell; one brother, Ernest Holthausen of Tenafly, N. J.; two sisters, Mrs. Hugo Oswald of Maplewood, N. J., and Mrs. Anton Grulich of East Orange, N. J.; 13 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.

The family requests no flowers. Memorials may be given to Grace Episcopal Church in Vernon.

Wildcats Break Records in District Track Meet

The Crowell Wildcat track team finished second in the district 8-A track and field meet at Holliday Saturday, but two Crowell athletes broke existing records in winning their events.

Kenneth Sellers smashed the 440 dash record with a 49.7, and Jesse Barrera broke the shot put record of 47.9% with a tremendous heave of 50-7.

Holliday won the meet with 178 points with Crowell coming in second with 134 1/2.

The Wildcats' 44.0 in the sprint relay and 3:29.4 in the mile relay were both easy victories. Composing both relay teams were Junior Urquizo, George Eavenson, Mike Weathered and Sellers.

Urquizo won his specialty, the half-mile run, in 2:05.6 and Weathered clocked a winning 41.7 in the intermediate hurdles.

Harry Lee Swan of Crowell won first place in the mile run with a time of 5:01.1.

Other Crowell track men who placed were: Philip Bell, fifth in the 880; Tim Daniels, third in the 120 high hurdles, fifth in the 330 intermediate hurdles; Billy Ray Neal, fifth in the 120 high hurdles and sixth in the 330 intermediate hurdles; Johnny Urquizo, second in the 220 yard dash; Eavenson, fourth in the 220; Bob Taylor, fourth in the mile run; Rocky Bachman, third in the discus; Billy Eavenson, sixth in the shot put; Sellers, third in the long jump, and Sellers was fourth in a three-way tie in the high jump.

The first and second place finishers advance to the regional meet at Lubbock on April 24.

The Crowell Junior High track team, coached by Printiss Gidney, placed fifth in the district meet in Holliday Saturday with the local boys accumulating a total of 61 points. All but one of Crowell's team were seventh graders, and the local boys were competing against eighth graders.

David Bell won first in the discus throw with 130-5, which set a new record for the district junior high meet. Rocky Glascock was fifth in this event with 109 feet and Allen Tapp was sixth with a throw of 107 feet.

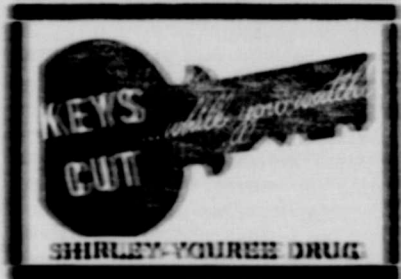
Easter's Message Is Hope and Praise

Easter season is typified by colored eggs, white lilies, and school vacation. Easter gives hope and encouragement to man, who, in return, gives praise.

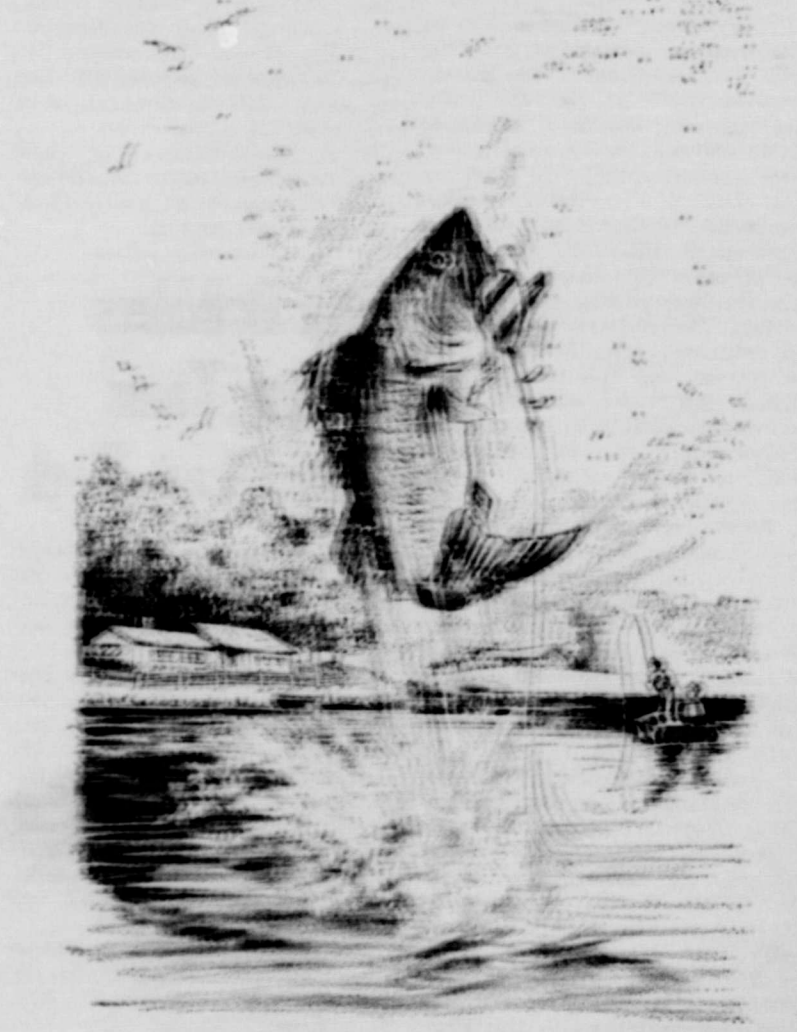
This beautiful season offers a time to behold the triumph of life and purity. It is also a time for a personal look at the debts and credits of life.

Swine Producers Reminded of 60-Day Restriction Provisions

The Texas Animal Health Commission has ordered a 60-day restriction on the movement of swine in Texas, effective March 29, as an aid to the control of hog cholera. Hogs can be moved to market without a permit but all other movement is by permit only, advises W. W. Bailey, extension livestock and meat specialist. Tom, the USDA, has announced that producers may no longer remove apparently healthy hogs from their herds infected by or exposed to hog cholera. All exposed or infested herds must be destroyed. Herd owners are paid state and federal indemnities to help pay for losses.

Board County hog producers can contact Dan Reynolds, phone 552-5911, Vernon, concerning the inspection of their swine. Reynolds is a member of the Animal Health Commission.

State Capitol . . . NEWS

Austin, Tex.—Gov. Preston Smith has called on President Nixon to declare 60 Texas counties eligible for drought disaster relief and requested initial allocation of \$5 million in federal aid.

All the counties, said Smith, received less than 1.5 inches of accumulated rainfall in the past six months, creating a critical drought condition which adversely affects ranches, farms, dairies, businesses and employment throughout the entire state.

Smith said he would not call for emergency disaster legislation from the state legislature because of the "extremely critical" state financial problem. State and local health, employment, agriculture and welfare agencies, the governor stated, are performing emergency duties as required.

Governor asked an initial allocation of \$5 million. In addition, he urged that the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Department of Labor, Health, Education and Welfare and Small Business Administration representatives be assigned to counties to collaborate with state and local officials in inspections, cost estimates and technical guidance.

Just imagine, hearing the actual last words of the pilot while he and eighty others were being hurled more than 5,000 feet to their death amid the flaming parts of their stricken plane!

Yet, one does not have to be in a plane to meet death suddenly. He can stumble off a curb and be killed or die suddenly in a hundred different ways.

The important thing is to be ready. We do not wish to scare people into accepting Christ as Savior, but it is a fact that we ought to think more about the uncertainty of life. Prov. 22:3 says: "A wise man foreseeth the evil and hideth himself, but fools pass on and are punished."
