## Crowell Bank Deposits Show Continued Gain

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the close of business are up over \$900,000.00 since the bank call on April 30 last year. Deposits on April 20 this year are \$4,953,225.49 and on April 30, 1970, they were \$4,035,385.53.

Savings and time deposits, which are included in the total deposits figures, are up almost \$600,000 over this time last year, a comparison of the two statements shows.

Deposits in the local bank since the first of the year have dropped some \$168,000. Deposits here at the first of the year were \$5,121,267.13.

Savings and time deposits have grown steadily from the \$663,532.31 reported on April 18, 1968, to the present \$1,965,783.79. Total deposits are up almost \$2 million since April 18, 1968, when they were \$2,962,979.39.

Loans in effect April 20 this year total \$2,641,079.16 which is over \$200,000 less than the \$2,854,082.87 reported on April 30, 1970.

## Local Boys Break Two Records

# WILDCATS WINNERS AT REGIONAL TRACK MEET

The Crowell Wildcats shattered two records last Saturday as they handily won first place in the Class A Regional Track and Field Meet in Lubbock Saturday. The Wildcats amassed a total of 69 points to out-distance second place Kress with 40 points.

In the preliminaries Friday, Kenneth Sellers broke the 49.5 record for the 440 set by Paul Page of Eldorado in 1969, when he galloped to a 48.4. Then on Saturday, Kenneth broke his own record in the 440 with an amazing time of 47.7 which tied the Crowell senior for the best time this season in any class. The only other schoolboy performer to match the 47.7 this season is a Houston runner from a AAAA school.

Crowell's mile relay team of Sellers, Junior Urquizo, George

Evanson and Mike Weatherred also set a new meet record by winning in a time of 3:23.5. Previous record for the mile relay was a 3:24.0 set by Cooper in 1970.

The same foursome also took first place in the sprint relay with a time of 42.9, which is only .2 of a second off the record of 42.7 set also by Cooper last year.

Junior Urquizo also qualified for the state meet on May 7 and 8 in Austin by winning the 880-yard run with a time of 1:59.7.

The Wildcats also scored points with a fourth place in the shot put by Jesse Barrera with a toss of 48-11 $\frac{1}{4}$  a fourth in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles by Mike Weatherred with a time of 40.5; and a sixth in the 220-yard dash by Johnny Urquizo.

The Wildcats, coached by Scott Boyd, will be back in Lubbock this week end for the state qualifiers meet preceding the Austin finals May 7-8.

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal in its Sunday morning article on the meet said, "The meet's outstanding performance was turned in by Ken Sellers of Crowell, who sprinted to a 47.7 clocking in the 440-yard dash. The time tied the previous best in Texas this year, set by Horace Grant of Houston Jones."

## Virgil Johnson Attends National Federation of Grain Cooperatives

# MAY 1 IS DEADLINE FOR CERTIFYING WHEAT

With only two days left in the month, Mrs. Jean Reeder reminded Foard County farmers that the May 1 deadline on two important matters is almost here. First, May 1 is the final date to certify wheat acreage, and, 2, it is the final disposition date for wheat.

Mrs. Reeder also urged wheat farmers to leave any wheat cover on the land instead of plowing it under. If drought conditions continue and the land is plowed, it will add to the wind erosion problems that already exist, Mrs. Reeder says. She added "You may file a written request at the ASCS office to leave the wheat for cover only."
