





Historical Marker | Doug Chowning, **Dedicated for Old Buffalo Road**

Famous Wagon Road Went Through **Foard County**

On Sunday afternoon, May 2, torian and writer, dedicated the activities. historical marker which marks the Old Buffalo Road. The marker has forty-four other students from the River and Beaver Creek.

This famous wagon road was so well known that when the Cattle Raisers Association was organized at Graham in 1877. it was named as a boundary line. It went across Foard County, winding its way through the ranch land in the west part of the county; then it bore southeast, crossing the Crowell-Benjamin Highway at approximately the Henry Borchardt farm house south of Crowell.

Buffalo hunters and hide haulers used this old road in the 1870's. Later it was used by bone haulers. On their return trip, the bone wagons furnished transportation for many settlers in the early 1880's, whose families and household belongings reached Henrietta by train.
