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

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

Studies show that a combination of 2,4,5-T and picloram is especially efquite.

Cecil Meadors, Jr., a member of the brush control team at the A&M center, reports that aerial application of a combination of one-fourth pound of 2,4,5-T and one-fourth pound of picloram per acre gave an average mesquite kill of 44 per cent for 16 West from a low of 23 per cent to a high of 76 per cent kill.

At the same locations during the two years, a combination of one-fourth pound of 2.4,5-T and one-fourth pound of banvel gave pound of 2,4,5-T alone resulted in an average kill of 24 per cent.

According to the researcher, all three treatments were applied as an emulsion of one gallon of diese oil and three gallons of water per acre. 
