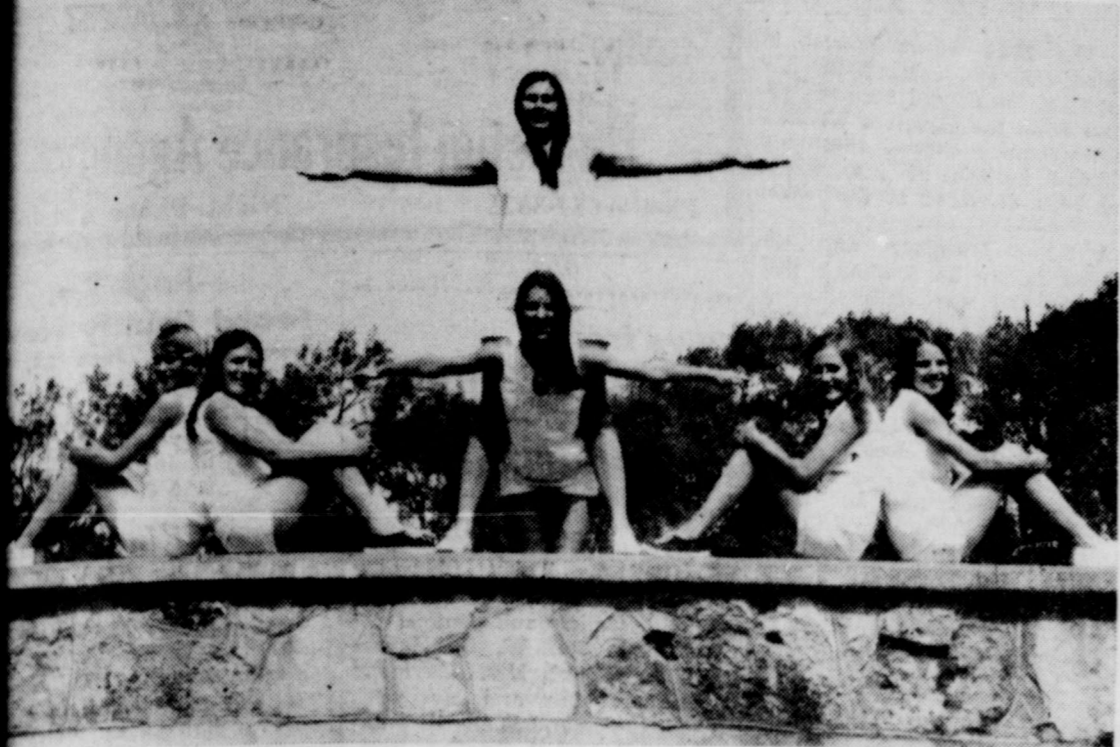

## First Session of Camp Portal Ended Last Friday

The first three-weeks session of camping activities came to a close Friday, June 18, at Camp Portal, Thalia, Texas, with an average daily attendance of 18 students. ## Bill Rake Invents Utensil Leveler For Mobile Homes

### Truscott Resident Receives Patent Application

Bill Rake of Truscott has received a patent application for a "utensil leveler," a simple device which Mr. Rake believes will have a national market.

The leveler was built by Rake to keep skillets and pots level on the stove in his bus camper, and the one he had in Crowell was made from a disc from a commonly-used farm implement.

Containing small rods welded from the outside edge of the disc towards the center, a skillet or pot can be moved slightly in any direction in order to make it level.

Due to the fact that there are thousands of campers, house trailers and motor homes in the nation in which the utensil leveler would be a handy item, Mr. Rake believes they will be fast-selling items.

Mr. Rake said last week that his invention has been placed in the hands of a major concern for further development and distribution.

He said it took him about six months to develop the leveler just the way he wanted it and he is now permitted to sell his invention by using the words, "patent pending."

Rake said last week that this is the third invention he has carried through to obtain patents, while several other ideas of his were returned from the patent office as being "impractical."

## Smith Vetoes Funds for Quannah Parker Center

## ASCS Program Payments Due After July 1st

### Sooner Farmers Certify, the Sooner Payment Made

ASCS program payments will be made as soon as possible after July 1, and "the sooner you certify the sooner your payment will be made," Mrs. Jean Reeder, executive director of the Foard A. S. C. office said this week.

"After your cotton is planted and you do not intend to plant grain sorghum or have planted grain sorghum, you will need to notify this office. Payments have already been submitted for wheat farms and feed grain farms where no feed grain will be planted," Mrs. Reeder added.

## Cotton Farmers Urged to Certify Acreage Soon

### ASCS Office Says June 20 Was Final Date to Plant Cotton

Sunday, June 20, was the final date to plant cotton in Foard County, and producers are urged by the local ASCS office to certify their acreage as soon as possible after planting is completed.

"If you have not received sufficient moisture to plant, then you will need to file a request for acreage credit. The area will need to be inspected and a charge of \$6.00 per farm will be made. After the area has been inspected and approved, you will be eligible for full payment," Mrs. Jean L. Reeder, executive director of the Foard ASCS, said this week.

## Former Crowell Resident Wins Second In Poetry Contest

Mrs. Wanda Liles Kellett, former resident of Crowell, has been awarded second place in the special golden anniversary contest of the Poetry Society of Texas for her entry "West from Dallas." She has been a member of the Poetry Society less than three months.

In 1954, Vantage Press of New York City published her book, "Wings as Eagles," which is a vivid and moving account of her husband's experiences as a Japanese prisoner of war during World War II. This book is in many public libraries throughout the country, and one copy is in the archives of the War Museum in London, England.

Mrs. Kellett graduated from Crowell High School in 1940. She received her B. A. degree from North Texas State University in 1945 with a speech and English major.

She was very active in dramatic interpretations all through high school, college and the Pasadena Playhouse where she won a scholarship.

The past ten years have been spent teaching English and creative writing in the Florida public schools. During this time, she has studied at Florida Southern College and the University of Tampa. In 1968, she began writing poetry and in less than six months she wrote 150 poems. Her pastel paintings, acrylics and pencil paintings have won considerable recognition in the Florida area.

Wanda quotes: "I shall continue to pen a few lines. I've read and interpreted many lines, but nothing stands so well as the Palms of David and Emerson—they tell me like it really is."

### Ranchers Need Not Sign "Pauper's Oath" to Qualify

Stressing that those participating need not sign a "pauper's oath," the Foard County ASCS office says that applications for emergency livestock feed are still being accepted. Mrs. Jean Reeder, executive director, said this week that it appears that some ranchers have not applied because they heard that they do not qualify.

Mrs. Reeder added, "If you personally feel that you may qualify, by all means apply and allow the county committee the opportunity to review your application and take appropriate action. You will then be notified of their determination at which time you will know whether or not you qualified."

Mrs. Powers replaces Mrs. Mattie Carroll, who resigned the post.

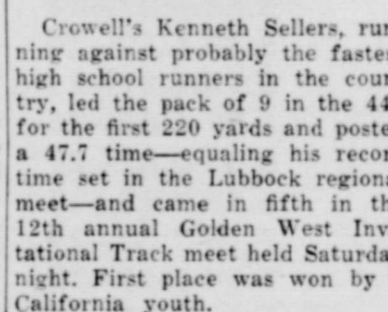
## Joe Powell Observes 81st Birthday June 19

**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

News items below were taken from the Thursday, June 26, 1941 issue of The Foard County News:

The 1941 wheat harvest in Foard County entered its last stage this week and accurate reports from the elevators Wednesday afternoon showed that only 259,644 bushels of new wheat had been delivered at that date.

A heavy downpour of rain started falling at 5 o'clock this morning and was continuing as the News went to press. There has been no report of the amount of rain received this morning, but water was running over the pavement for several blocks west of the square at 7 o'clock.

Loraine Carter and Leo Sanders, selectees from Foard County, who were inducted into the U. S. Army at Dallas last Thursday, have been stationed at Fort Sill, Okla., according to information received here this week.

Every man in Foard County who has attained his 21st birthday since October 16, 1940, and before midnight July 1, 1941, with a few exceptions made by Congress, must register with the Local Selective Service Board in Crowell on Tuesday, July 1.

Members of the Boy Scout Troops Nos. 49 and 51, the Methodist Church and American Legion troops of Crowell, are attending the annual Boy Scout encampment at Camp Boulder, Okla., this week. They left Crowell Sunday and were accompanied by Scoutmasters Granville Lanier and Ernest Patton. Boy Scouts from Crowell who are at the camp are John Thomas Rasor, Billy Coltharp, Billy Bruce, Kenneth Greening, Wayne Greening, Bobby Cooper, Billy Roy Cooper, Perry Todd, Horace Todd and John Calvin Carter.

A special election will be held in Texas on Saturday, June 28, for the purpose of electing a U. S. Senator to succeed the late Morris H. Sheppard. There are 27 names appearing on the official ballot and four political parties are represented. Candidates are from the Democratic, Republican, Independent and Communist parties.

Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel spoke in Crowell Monday afternoon in behalf of his candidacy for the U. S. Senate.

### Campaign Starts For Better Cotton Profits in 1971

Lamesa, Texas, (Special) — Donnell Echols of Lamesa and Dr. J. E. Hutchison, College Station, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, have been appointed co-chairmen for Texas in a "better cotton yields for profits and markets" in 1971.

Objective is to increase cotton yields to the maximum profitable level, utilizing recommended practices for each cotton-producing area, and to improve producer income. The goal also is to stabilize cotton's current competitive position and build a base for market expansion.

Special industry-government task forces are being set up in 14 major cotton-producing states with the over-all drive coordinated by the National Cotton Council and the extension services.

The effort was launched in Washington earlier this month, by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin and National Cotton Council President C. R. Sayre of Greenwood, Miss. They pointed out that the following factors stress the need for maximum profitable cotton production.

(1) This is a decisive year due to a critical supply situation, (2) 1970-71 offtake is projected at 11 1/2 million bales as compared with 10 3/4 million in 1970, and (3) the projected carryover of not more than 4 1/2 million bales is the lowest in 20 years.

They also explained that weather problems in major areas of the Belt have created concern over the 1971 crop, posing the threat of an inadequate supply. On the other hand, Mr. Sayre noted, the strong demand presents an unusual opportunity for grower profit.

### May Sales of Savings Bonds Totals \$1,422,000

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Foard County during May were \$1,442,000, the U. S. Treasury Department reported last week. Sales for the first five months totaled \$10,461,000 for 15 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$70,000,000.

During the month, Texans purchased \$16,476,145 in savings bonds compared to \$14,528,581 (includes Freedom Shares) during May 1970. Year-to-date sales totaled \$86,134,682—47 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationwide, new purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds during May amounted to \$462 million, 25.9 per cent above 1970. Sales the first five months of 1971 were \$2,229 million—19.6 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H bonds amounting to \$105 million were reported for the five-month period of 1971, compared to \$101 million exchanged during 1970.

### Texas' First Bale 1971 Cotton Ginned June 15 Near Pharr

Pharr—Texas' first bale of the new 1971 cotton crop was ginned Tuesday, June 15, near this Valley town, according to Agriculture Commissioner John White and Texas Department of Agriculture officials.

Two irrigated fields, eight and ten acres, respectively, on the Crispin Gamez farm produced the bale, which weighed 528 pounds. Drought conditions have hampered conditions for dryland cotton farming, but seemingly have not disturbed cotton farming on irrigated land. This bale was nearly two weeks ahead of the first bale of 1970, also produced in this rich cotton area.

It took three crews of 50 workers about three hours to accumulate a bale on Gamez' farm. Gamez has farmed in the Valley for more than 50 years. Neal Polk, supervisor of the TDA's field office at Pharr, certified Gamez' fields as 1971 growth. Planting took place Feb. 4, 5 and 6.

## Purcell Goes to Rhodesia for Talk

Congressman Graham Purcell while visiting Rhodesia will ponder running for election in the new 24th Congressional District as a possible alternative to seeking re-election in the 13th District, now dominated following redistricting, by counties from the old district of Republican Congressman Bob Price of Pampa.

Before leaving for Rhodesia last week, Congressman Purcell said he is "looking" at the new congressional seat at Denton, but would not comment on speculation that he would move there in order to face a more favorable race for re-election in 1972. Denton is in the present 13th District now served by Purcell, but is being detached by redistricting.

In announcing his speaking engagement in Salisbury, Rhodesia, Purcell said, "The speech is in response to a request from the chairman of the Agriculture Committee, W. R. Poage (D-Tex.), who was originally invited to address the Salisbury group. I intend to speak in Rhodesia, not as an envoy, but as someone interested in international agricultural production. My speech to the Rhodesia Tobacco Congress will deal with general problems of international agriculture and agrribusiness."

The Texas Democrat indicated that he would, after speaking in Salisbury, join Postmaster General Winton Blount and key House post office and civil service committee members in Germany and Great Britain for a study of the German "quasi-corporate" postal system and a look at the British postal service.

## Medical Insurance Premium Under Medicare Increased

The premium for medical insurance under Medicare will be increased by 30c a month beginning July 1, according to Wayne Klipping, social security branch manager.

For most beneficiaries the monthly premium will be \$5.60 and if they are receiving a social security check, it will be automatically deducted from the check. Those people who are not receiving a monthly check will be billed for the additional premium amount on their regular quarterly billing schedule.

Klipping added, "If you need more information regarding Medicare, call your social security office at Vernon, or if you prefer visit the office at 1728 Fannin Street. The telephone number in Vernon is 552-9346."

If you have hospital insurance under Medicare, you now pay the first \$60 (up from \$52) of the hospital bill for each benefit period.

## Texas Teachers to Get \$250 Million Pay Raise

The Texas State Teachers Association reports through its efforts, House Bill 240 remains intact.

Under House Bill 240, Texas teachers will receive raises totaling about \$90 million during the 1971-73 biennium, and additional raises totaling \$150 million to \$175 million in the 1973-75 biennium; or more than \$250 million in increase over the next four years.

## State Sales Tax to Increase on July 1

As Foard Countians are well aware, July 1, 1971, is the date the new 4 per cent sales tax takes effect in this state.

Merchants and store clerks will be happy that the tax break-down is uniform, changing every 25c. A \$1.00 purchase has 4 cents tax while a \$2.00 purchase has 8 cents tax.

The sales tax list currently in use is quite complicated in that the break is not uniform, alternating in 24c and 23c increases, making it very difficult for clerks to figure sales tax without consulting a tax schedule.

Items on the taxable list have been left virtually unchanged.

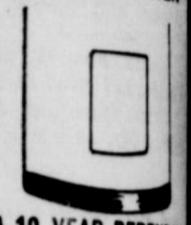

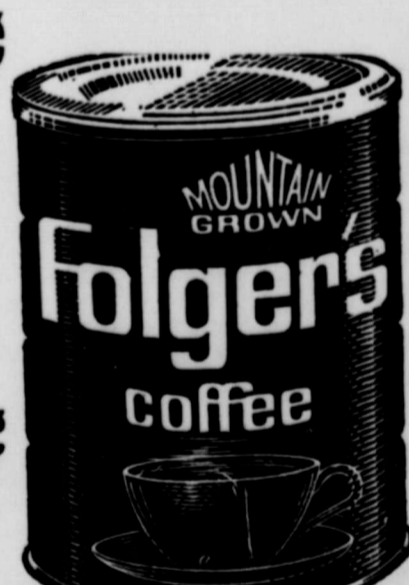

**Program Set on Disaster Loans for Small Businesses**

The Small Business Administration will host a July 1 meeting in Wichita Falls to explain the agency's drought disaster loan program for small businesses.

Fred S. Neumann, SBA regional director in Dallas, said the session—scheduled for 2:30 p. m., on Thursday, July 1, in the auditorium of the Fedway Department Store in Wichita Falls—will "bring to the local level the agency's economic injury disaster loan (EIDL) program to assist small business firms suffering substantial economic injury because of the effects of the prolonged drought on farmers in sections of Texas and Oklahoma."

Some 28 Texas and Oklahoma counties—including Foard County—will be included in the meeting.

Neumann said the SBA can provide EIDL assistance up to a maximum of \$500,000 to small firms to provide working capital or to pay debts, except bank loans, which the borrower would have been able to meet had he not lost income because of the drought.

Interest on SBA disaster loans is set monthly by the Treasury Department, and for the month of June is five per cent.

Neumann also said that representatives of the Agriculture Department, including the Farmers Home Administration, would be present to handle agriculture problems.

The News has received a bill from Rep. W. S. Healy that calls attention to some of the legislation recently passed by the Legislature.

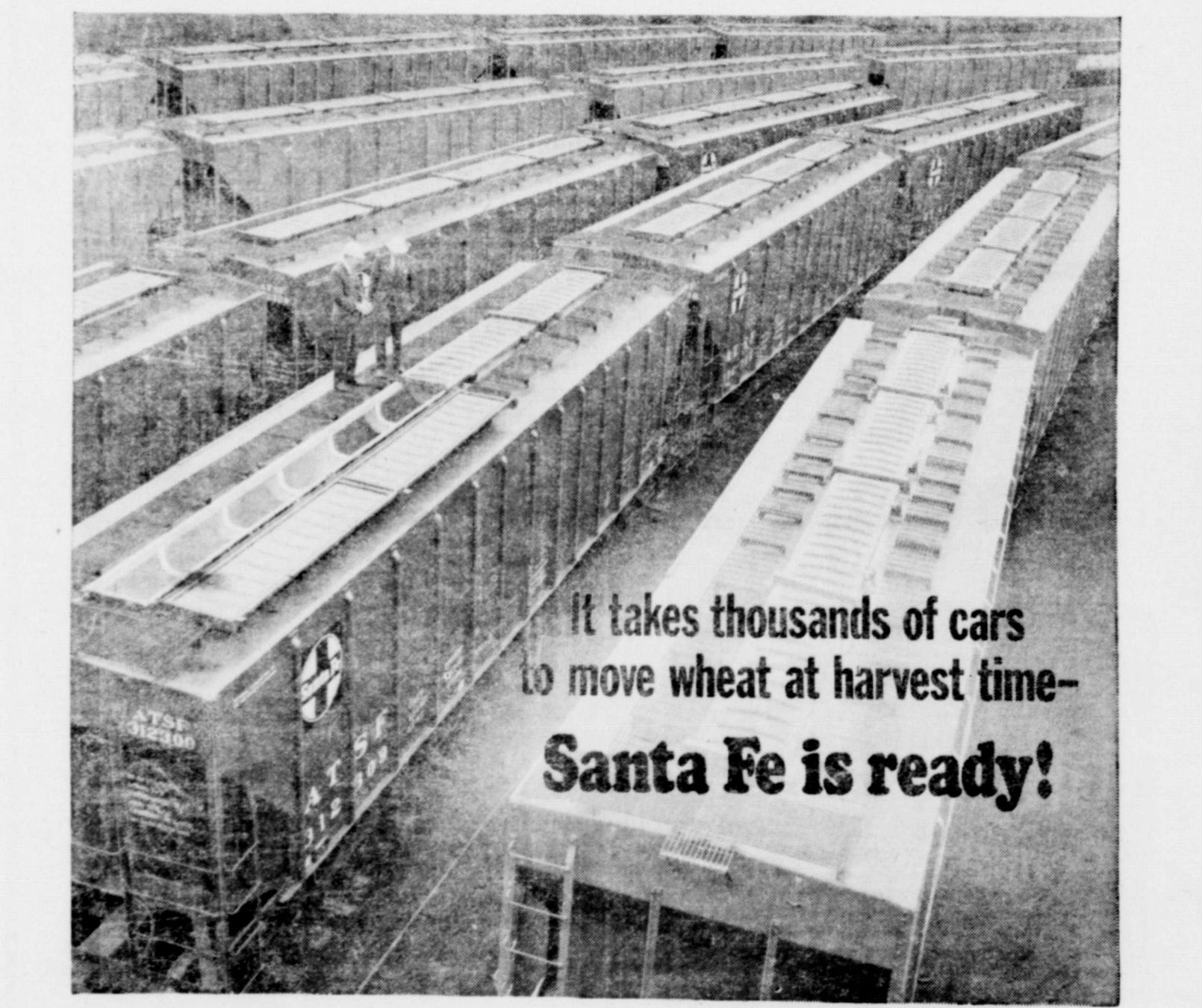

420-million bushels is the estimated harvest now getting under way in the southwest and midwest wheat belt. This harvest has to be moved from growing areas to elevators and mills, also to ports for export.

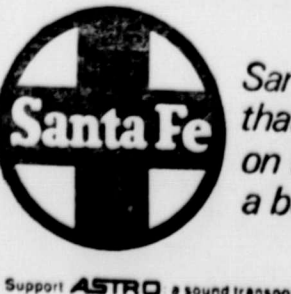

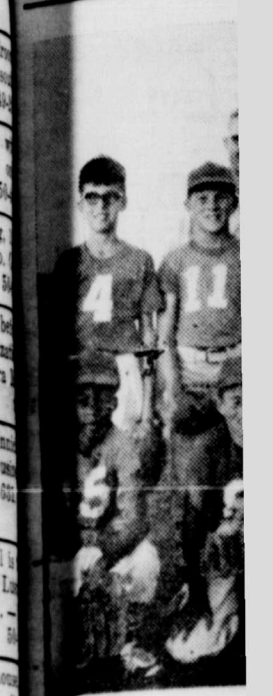
