Last Non-Conference Game

WILDCATS TO HOST MEMPHIS FRIDAY NITE

The Crowell Wildcats will be seeking their fifth consecutive win of the season at Dick Todd Field Friday night when they host the strong Memphis Cyclones. The game will begin at 8 o'clock and will be the Wildcats' last non-conference game of the season. The Cyclones boast a 3 won, 1 lost record, losing only to the

No. 2 ranked class A team in the state, White Deer. Memphis rolled up over 300 yards in the White Deer game, yet failed to win. They have won over Chillicothe, Paducah and Wellington.

Memphis has a well-balanced passing and running attack. They have two outstanding backs, one of whom gained 1,700 yards last season.

Coach Scott Boyd Monday listed no changes in his starting assignment for the Memphis game: Offense: split end, Johnny Urquiza; quick tackle, Allen Tapp; quick guard, Ronnie Naylor; center, Doug Pharis; strong guard, Fred Matysek; strong tackle, Rocky Bachman; tight end, Harry Lee Swan; quarterback, Rex Driver; left halfback, Terry Farrar; fullback, Randy Dorsey; right halfback, Billy Ray Neal.

Defense: left end, Bachman, left tackle, Matysek; right tackle, Billy Evanson; right end, Ernest Barrera; strong linebacker, Phillip Bell; rover, Bill Erwin; left linebacker, Naylor; right linebacker, Farrar; left halfback, Neal; right halfback, Bob Taylor; safety, Bob Burkett.

School Board Okays Pant Suits For Teachers

The Crowell School Board at its regular monthly meeting last Monday night, covered a wide area of subjects discussed and action taken ranging from the approval of the current tax roll to the approval of the wearing of pant suits by female school personnel. The tax roll for the district which was approved Monday night showed \$10,899,568.00 in valuations figured at 100 per cent collections to bring in \$196,192.22 in taxes.

The board okayed the construction of a car port at the house belonging to the school on the east side of the campus and occupied by the Scott Boyd family.

Since the board purchased new chairs for the cafeteria, Supt. Larry Jones told board members many of the old chairs had already been sold. Thirty went to the community center in Crowell, and 25 were purchased by the Trusecott H. D. Club.

Due to the movement of families in the district, the board adjusted and changed two of the bus routes.

Supt. Jones read the board a letter from a fire insurance company explaining what changes must be made in the school cafeteria building and equipment to earn a lower fire insurance rate.

Jones also told the board that unless Congress extends the law, the current class of the Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing will in all probability be the last one to be held. The current law authorizing the LVN schools across the country will expire before the current class completes its training.

It was announced that only five members of the local school staff will receive the teacher pay raise; the superintendent, two principals and the homemaker and vocational agriculture teachers. Their contracts began before August 15, and the remainder of the teaching staff did not begin the new year until after the price freeze.

Engineering OK'd For Copper Breaks State Park

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last Thursday gave its staff approval to go ahead with preliminary engineering on Copper Breaks State Park.

Executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, Gen. James Cross, also asked for tentative budgeting and planning approval, which the commission agreed to.

Cross noted that the commission approved \$515,000 about a year ago for planning on the park, and that about \$600,000 in additional funds ultimately will be required.

New Home Under Construction for Mr. and Mrs. David Scott

Work got underway this week on a new 3-bedroom brick veneer home for Mr. and Mrs. David Scott on East Texas Street. Mr. and Mrs. Scott have recently moved to Crowell from Imperial, Texas.

The new home will have a double garage, and will be concrete slab construction. Foard County Lumber Co. will furnish the materials, and Jim Henry is the builder.

The house is located just east of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Nichols, in the 700 block of East Texas Street.

515 ARE ENROLLED IN CROWELL SCHOOLS

Supt. Larry Jones announced Monday that there are 515 students enrolled in the Crowell Schools including 65 transfers. This count was made at the close of the first reporting period which

was September 24.

Supt. Jones reports the following enrollment by grades:

According to Supt. Jones' report, the student body is composed of 88 Negroes, 74 Spanish surnamed and 453 Anglos. There are sixty-five students who are transfers from other school districts. Nine transfers are from the Gilliland School District and 56 from the Vernon School District.

"The average daily attendance for the first reporting period was 485 (gross); redefined ADA was 474. A redefined ADA of 467 for the year is necessary to maintain our present allocation of teachers (21 CTU's)," Jones added.

"The per cent of attendance was approximately 97% for which the administration would like to commend both the students and their parents for such a fine record," Jones concluded.

Mrs. Meads and her family will move from Quanah to Crowell. Her husband, Marion, will commute to Vernon where he has the Culligan Soft Water Service. Mr. and Mrs. Meads have three children: Deborah Lu, Sharon Lynn, and Byron Layne.

She holds a B. A. degree in home economics from Texas Woman's University in Denton. She is a member of the Episcopal Church, and has been active in community services while she has been out of the Extension program.

Texas OEO Chief Is Speaker at Lions Club Meeting

Captain George P. Taylor of Austin, director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, was the principal speaker at the Lions Club Tuesday and told those present something of the history of OEO, what it has accomplished and what is hoped for in the future.

Captain Taylor said there are now 46 active Community Action Agencies in the state, and they have made strides in helping to alleviate poverty, and to help the poor help themselves.

Created in 1964, the Office of Economic Opportunity attempts to mobilize the leadership and physical resources in a community. He expressed the opinion that with the almost certain passing of a revenue sharing bill by the Congress, federal funds will be discontinued for the OEO.

Captain Taylor also explained the duties of Keith Vaughn, a specialist in rural development, who has begun a year's stay in the 4-county area hoping to assist the area in securing industry.

Captain Taylor, in his concluding remarks, told of some of his personal life. He said that when he was a small child, his parents, and brothers came to Foard County to pick cotton in order to make money for the family to use when they returned to their ranch in Old Mexico. The Taylor family was forced to leave Mexico during the teens and early 20's due to revolutions plaguing that country during that time.

Captain Taylor was introduced by Joe Meador of Crowell, field representative for the OEO in the West Texas area.

Wildcats Continue Winning Ways With Lop-Sided Victory Over Knox City

What started out for over the first quarter as a scoreless battle of defenses, suddenly erupted into a wild scoring spree as the Crowell Wildcats, coached by Scott Boyd, trounced the Knox City Greyhounds 61 to 0 at Dick Todd Field last Friday night.

It looked during the first quarter that it would be a close contest with the Wildcats unable to move the ball out of their end of the field, and with the Greyhounds moving the ball more consistently, although unable to push across a score.

With 4:44 left in the second quarter, Wildcat fullback Terry Farrar went over for the first TD. Before the half ended, the Wildcats pushed across 22 more points and went into the dressing room with a 29-0 lead. Following the first touchdown, Rocky Bachman kicked the extra point.

On Crowell's next possession, scabbard Randy Dorsey slipped through the Knox City defense and scampered 54 yards for the touchdown. Bachman again kicked the point after. A short time later, Billy Ray Neal plunged over from the 2 for the TD with Farrar carrying over for the two-point conversion.

Near the end of the half, Phillip Bell intercepted a Greyhound pass and went 28 yards for six

points. Bachman again kicked for the extra point.

The Wildcats continued their scoring in the third quarter as quarterback Rex Driver kept the ball and raced 61 yards for the score. Bachman again added the kick for extra point. Dorsey carried the pigskin in from the 2 for the Wildcats' next score. The point after attempt failed.

Dorsey gained 144 yards and Driver 104 yards in the contest. Early in the fourth quarter, Ronnie Naylor intercepted a Knox City pass and scampered 34 yards for the score. The final Wildcat tally came on a 14-yard run by halfback Tim Daniel. Bachman again converted the point-after.

THIRTY YEARS AGO

Due to the tax for national defense placed on everything, an additional 5 cents is necessarily added to the price of admission tickets to the football games. This measure went into effect last Friday night and from now on, adult tickets will be 55c and student's tickets will be 30c, according to Supt. I. T. Graves.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Borchardt are the parents of a baby daughter, weight 7 lbs., born Wednesday morning at Vernon.

With 1.95 inches of rain falling Thursday and Friday, and .47 Saturday, the total rainfall for this county reached 35.5 inches for the year, according to records at the Crowell State Bank. The rainfall this year is the greatest since 1926 when 36.96 inches were recorded. The greatest precipitation recorded in this section fell in 1919 which reached 39.49 inches.

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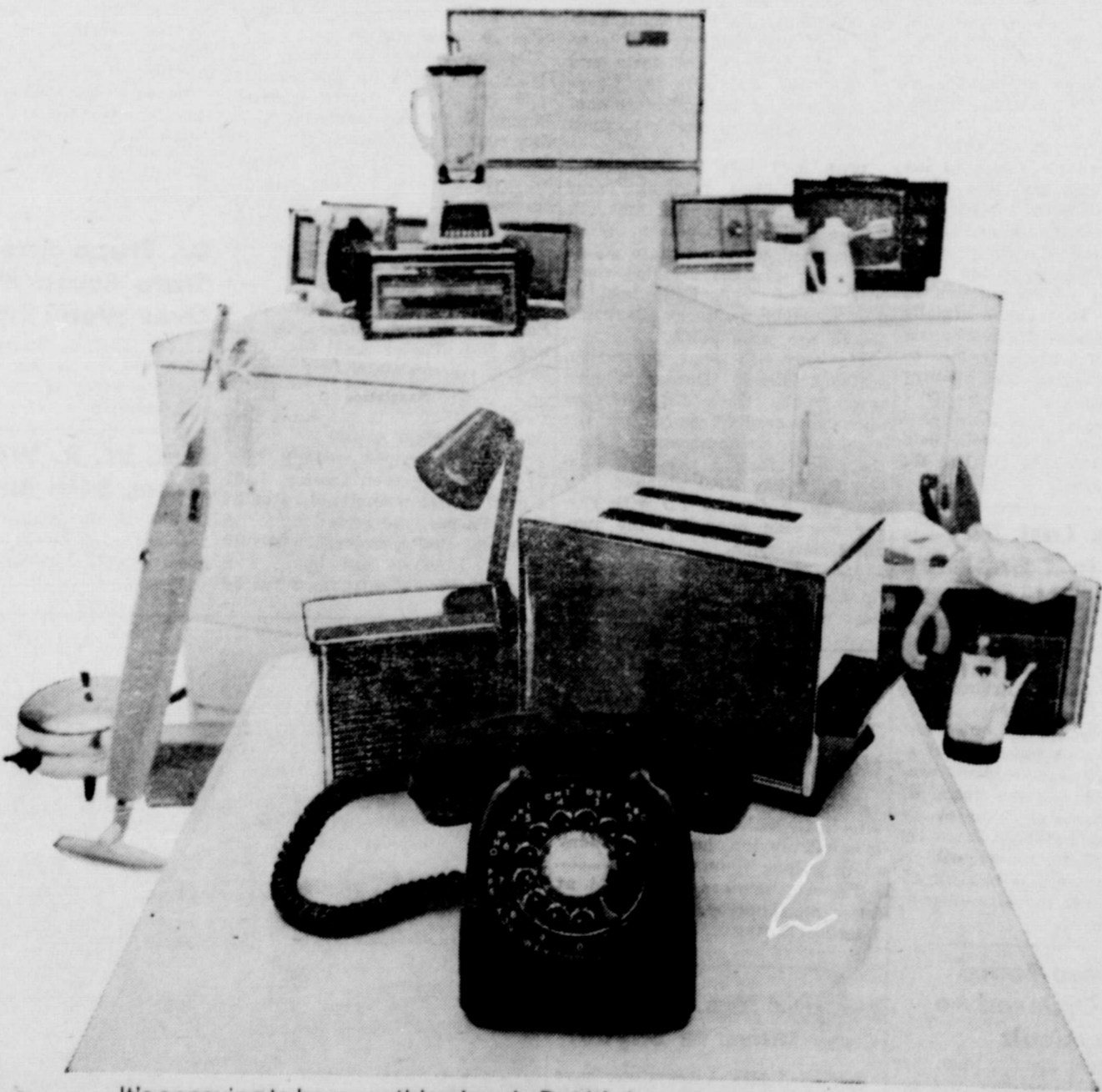

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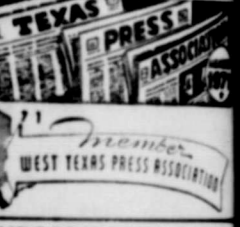

 in Dallas.

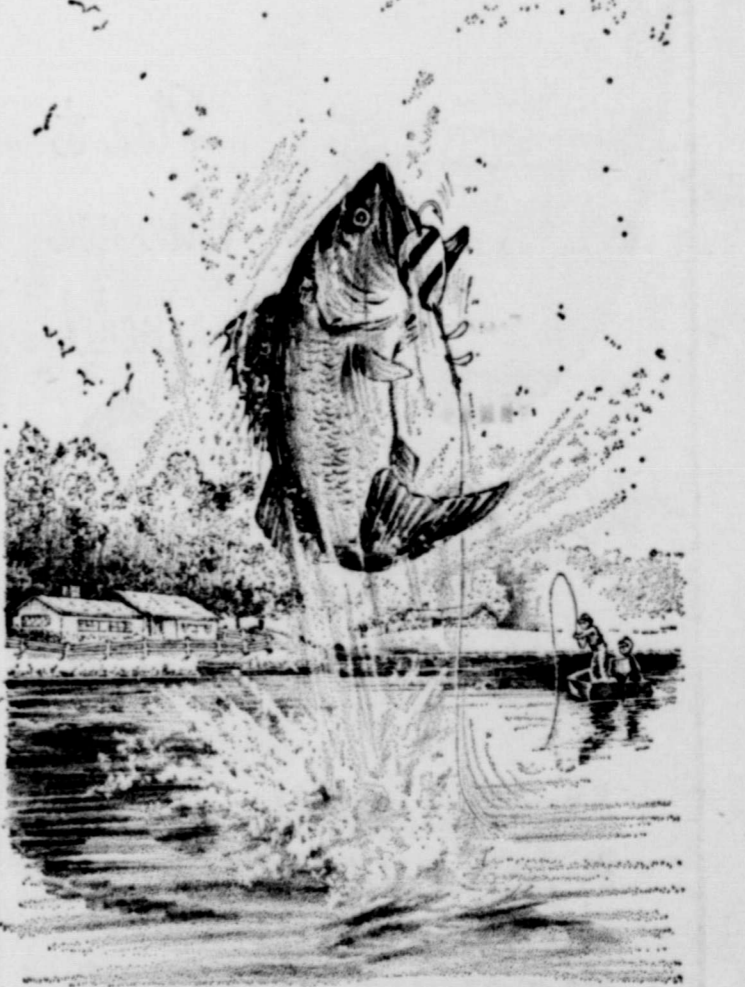
One of the projects is for the

Foard County Changed to 1-Community County for 1972 ASCS Elections

The September newsletter of the Foard County ASCS has a number of important items noted for Foard County landowners.

Foard County has been changed to a one-community county for 1972. This means that nominations for county committee-men will be by petition. Instructions for nominating by petition have been mailed to landowners, according to the newsletter.

1971 Cotton Production
Because of drought and to encourage producers to harvest poor cotton crops, the county committee has authority to make upward adjustments in 1971 cotton yields. These adjustments are limited to 90 per cent of the 1971 payment

yield. The committee will have to be able to determine that the low yield was due to natural causes. Cotton farmers will be asked to submit a statement of those causes if they request an adjustment.

Mrs. Jean L. Reeder, ASCS office manager, says that cotton settlement sheets should be submitted to her office as soon their cotton is harvested and sold.

Set-Aside Requirements for '72
Mrs. Reeder says that it is very important for landowners to take the following provisions into consideration when planning their farm operations for 1972:

A. Productivity of designated acreage shall be at least equal to the average of other cropland on the farm normally used for crops. In determining the productivity of set-aside, comparison shall be made with land on which program crops normally are produced.

B. The designated set-aside acreage should be in one field where possible and parts of fields of reasonable size and shapes should be designated only to complete set-aside requirements.

C. Acreage used as set-aside will not be eligible for prevented or failed acreage credit. This is a change from 1971, Mrs. Reeder noted.

Foard County has been suspended under the Emergency Feed Grain Program as of Sept. 30, 1971.

In conclusion, Mrs. Reeder says that emergency livestock water facilities must have been substantially completed by Sept. 30, and facilities not under construction by that date have been cancelled.

Members of the Foard County ASCS committee are Bill Cates, chairman; R. J. Owens, vice chairman; and Harold H. Fish, member. The county committee will be meeting October 15 and 29.
