FOOD SHOW TO BE HELD SATURDAY

The public is invited to attend the annual 4-H Food Show. Mrs. Meads, Foard County H. D. said the show will be held at the old gym at the High School Saturday, March 25. Judging will begin at 2 p. m.

At this time, the junior and senior division girls will be showing bread and cereal, fruits and vegetables or the meat group, and displays it on her table appropriate to her menu.

There will be a first place winner in both junior and senior divisions. From the county show, the winners will advance to the district show, which will be held in Wichita Falls at Midwestern University on April 22. The winners of the senior division of the four food groups will then have the opportunity to enter the state contest during 4-H Roundup at College Station on June 5-8.

Pictures of 1942 Crowell Tornado to Be Published

Thirty years ago in April, a tornado struck Crowell, killing 11 persons and doing thousands of dollars worth of damage.

Following the storm, the Wichita Record-News, Fort Worth Star-Telegram and Abilene Reporter-News sent reporters to Crowell and they made a number of pictures of the damage. The newspapers then gave the engravings to The Foard County News, which used the pictures in its storm edition which was printed after publication was halted for one week. That storm edition sold several thousand copies above the normal circulation at that time.

These engravings have been saved through the years, with two of them being used in the 75th anniversary edition of the paper in 1966. For the next few weeks, we are going to use the engravings again, as we feel our readers will enjoy seeing them after such a long lapse of time. Hope you do, anyway.

RED CROSS FUND DRIVE TO START MARCH 27

A meeting of a number of concerned citizens was held in the office of County Judge Leslie Thomas last week to make plans for the annual Foard County Red Cross drive.

The drive this year will begin on Monday, March 27, and will continue the remainder of the week. This is the 30th anniversary year of the tornado which destroyed much of Crowell in 1942. At that time, Red Cross came and helped Crowellites begin again. It should not be forgotten what the Red Cross did here.

Billy Daniel has resigned as general chairman for Red Cross here and Frank Cooper was elected to replace him. Guy Todd, Jr. was elected disaster chairman; and Mrs. Ike Carroll is campaign fund drive chairman.

Mike Bird was re-elected service chairman at the meeting last week. Mrs. Carroll has contacted a number of workers for the town and county and she has asked that all these workers pick up their supplies on Friday, March 24, in the office of Mrs. Sally Archer in the court house.

Mrs. Archer said this week that in the event workers fail to contact everyone, those who wish are urged to mail their contribution to her.

In urging generous contributions to the Red Cross drive, it was stressed by local hospital authorities that only by having an annual drive for funds can the county continue to participate in the Red Cross Bloodmobile program.

"Register Your Vehicle in March," Sheriff Says

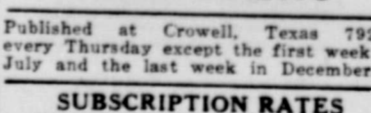

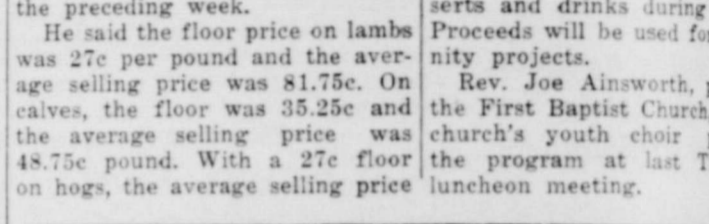

BIG CROWD ATTENDS PROGRAM ON FOARD COUNTY HISTORY; PROCEEDS GO TO BAND

More than 500 persons turned out here Tuesday night of last week to see the much-heralded presentation of "Panorama of the Red River Valley, Episode No. 1," written by Joe Meador, specialist with the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, and produced as a money-raising effort to pay part of the CHS Band's expenses to a band festival at Enid, Okla., later this spring.

E. P. Streit, now 71, was too young to play for the Roosevelt visit, although George Streit of Lockett (father of Mrs. Jake Wisdom of Thalia) at 85, was old enough to take part in that historic occasion that brought literally thousands to the Frisco depot in Vernon to welcome Roosevelt.

Boasting a cast of 127 persons, including the CHS Band and chorus, the presentation touched on several important events in the history of Foard County. Rev. Joe Ainsworth, pastor of First Baptist Church, was narrator for the show.

Part of the presentation highlighted a great musical tradition of a Wilbarger County family that is now being continued into at least the fourth generation by the family of James Streit, director of the Crowell High School Band.

Nobody is certain how long previously the musical tradition of the Streit family may have preceded in Switzerland the migration of the Streit to Wilbarger County in 1884.

But at least five generations of the family in a direct line from the late Christian Streit to the children of James Streit have been residents of Wilbarger county, and four generations of the family have been actively engaged in organized musical groups in this area.

It was the late Fred Streit, a son of Christian Streit, who organized and headed the Streit family band in Wilbarger County. Fred Streit's son, E. P. Streit of Lockett, was the youngest and latest member of the family to join the band—well after it performed in Vernon for a visit by President Theodore Roosevelt in the early

1900's.
 Some of the original instruments used when Roosevelt visited, were used by Mr. Streit and his musicians in the performance here last week.
 Ray Shirley introduced the 19 contestants in the Miss Petite contest and announced the winners: Miss Randa Kay McBeath, 28-month-old daughter of Mrs. Ruth Ellen McBeath of Thalia and the late Lindell McBeath, won named the winner. Mr. Shirley also introduced district attorney Bill Neal of Vernon who presented orchids to Mrs. R. G. Nichols as the last child born in Hardeman County before Foard County was created, and to Mrs. Paul Shirley, who was the first white child born in what is now Foard County.

Some of the eight different scenes included in the two acts of the show included: Indian war dance, promise of Comanche chief, love of Peta Nocona and Cynthia Ann Parker, Texas Ranger war camp, community meeting at Margaret, county seat of Hardeman County, visit of President Theodore Roosevelt, and a climax featuring early settlers who were part of the history of Foard County.

Escorts for the Miss Petite contestants were Bob Cook, Jackie Blackburn, Rex Driver and Bob Burkett.
 Mr. Meador, who wrote the script from historical documents after two weeks of research, has produced historical pageants in Vernon, Matador, Lubbock and Ralls. He was the co-author of the "1946 Varsity Show" at Texas Tech in Lubbock. He is a graduate of that institution.

Mr. and Mrs. Meador had prominent parts in producing the show here and their two children, Joe Douglas and Stacy, were members of the cast. The Meador family moved to the Homer Zeibig farm home north of Crowell in August, 1971, from Ralls. He is a state technical assistance specialist for the Community Action program and serves the western half of Texas in this capacity.

The climax of the show was the dramatic ending as students read from the Bible and patriotic and religious songs were sung to end

Rotarians Hear Talk on New Housing Authority

Mrs. Wilma Cates, executive director of the Crowell Housing Authority, was principal speaker at the Wednesday, March 8, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell.

Mrs. Cates said that the project is designed to be self-supporting, with the property to be owned debt free—regardless of whether it is paid for or not—at the end of 40 years.

Who will be tenants in the 30 units to be built will be determined entirely by the executive board which is composed of Glen Goodwin, chairman; Irving Fisch, vice chairman; Frank Cooper, Mrs. E. W. Gentry and Ora Mae Fox. A non-voting member of the board is the mayor of Crowell.

The project will contain about 26,000 square feet of floor space, Mrs. Cates said, and she added that the construction cost will be about \$15.75 per square foot.
 She emphasized that the board does not have to rent to anyone, in spite of their economic condition, and the units will be inspected once a month. She added that tenants who do not take care of their unit will be forced to move out.

One of the features of the housing program will be the community management building which in effect will give the City of Crowell another community center. This building can be used by all residents of the community for meetings, family reunions, etc.
 Mrs. Cates said the rent will be 25 per cent of a family's income, and all utilities except electricity will be paid by the author-

ity.
 In the authority, there will be 18 1-bedroom units for the elderly and two 2-bedroom units for elderly; four 1-bedroom units, regular; 4 2-bedroom units, regular; and 2 3-bedroom units, regular.
 Mrs. Cates was introduced by Rotarian Goodwin, who said that efforts to get the housing authority here have been in progress since 1965.
 It was announced at the Rotary meeting last week that the club will meet in Truscott March 22.
 According to U. S. Treasury Department figures, the 1972 Savings Bond goal for Foard County is \$70,000. January sales of E and H United States Savings Bonds totaled \$1,577.00 for 2 per cent of the sales goal.
 The 1972 sales goal for Texas is \$202.3 million. During the month sales were \$19,365,593 compared to January 1971 sales of \$17,375,765—an increase of 11.4 per cent.
 The Department of the Treasury announced that during January there were new purchases of Series E and H Bonds amounting to \$521 million, 21.3 per cent

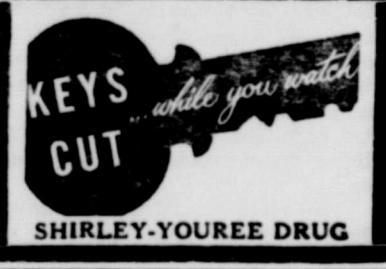

Two Minutes With the Bible

The Visiting Preacher

Paul and Barnabas had seated themselves in the large synagogue in Pisidian Antioch. They were soon recognized as "clergymen," however, for "after the reading of the law and the prophets" they were asked whether either of them might have some word of "exhortation" for those who had gathered.

These details are important, for as Moses, in giving the Law, had declared God's moral standards, the prophets had for centuries challenged the people to obey the law and had warned them of the dire consequences of breaking its commands. Hence, in the synagogues, passages were generally read from the law and the prophets, and the religious leaders would then "exhort" the people to heed the prophets and obey the law.

Paul and Barnabas, the visiting preachers, therefore, were asked whether either of them had a "word of exhortation for the peo-

ple." Paul responded to the invitation, but rather than merely exhorting his hearers to keep the law, he proclaimed Christ, who in love had died for all law breakers, closing with these words: "Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins; and by Him all that believe are justified from all things from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses" (Acts 13:38,39).

How we need this message today! We may forever exhort one another to keep the law, but who of us has not already broken it?

Let us thank God, then, that He is a loving Savior as well as a just Judge, and that as God the Son, He paid for our sins Himself at Calvary, so that we might be "justified freely by His grace." "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us" (Gal. 3:13). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

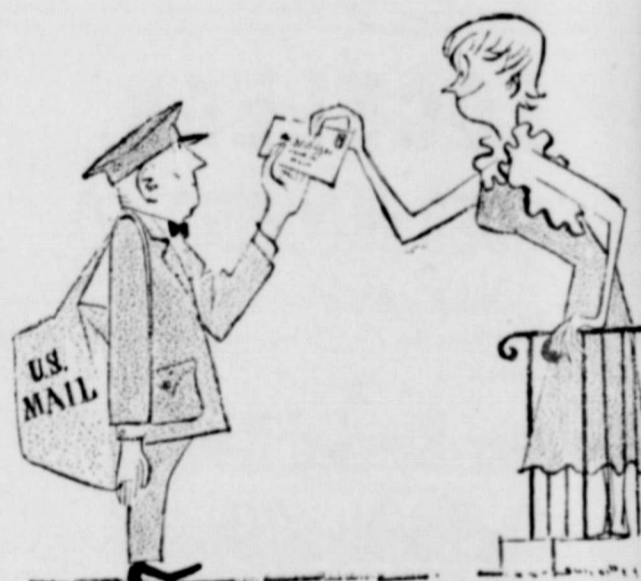
