Changes Made in Foard County's Mail Routes

Truck with Incoming Mail Arrives in Crowell at 7:30 a. m.

Changes in delivery of mail in Foard County took effect Saturday, November 11, Postmaster Ted Reeder announced Tuesday.

He said that patrons living to the east of the farm to market road north out of Thalia have been changed from Route 2 to Route 1, which is carried by Fred Gray. Cecil Carpenter is substitute carrier for Route 1.

He added that the Margaret community and five patrons along Pease River will be served by Leroy Gibson, rural route carrier from Quanah. He will come to the local post office each day and pick up and deliver the mail to his Foard County patrons. Nelson Oliphant is substitute carrier for Route 2, Crowell.

Incoming mail will arrive in Crowell about 7:30 a. m., instead of 7 a. m., which will make it a little later each morning that patrons will find all their mail in their box. Mailing time for out-going mail remains at 3:30 p. m., Reeder added.

12th State Auction Date Is Announced

The 12th State of Texas surplus property auction scheduled for November 18 will again offer the highest bidders more than 180 automobiles, trucks, station wagons, dump trucks and pickups, H. A. Foerster, executive director, announced.

Inspection of all surplus property offered by 11 state agencies will begin at 7:30 a. m., Nov. 18 in the Austin city coliseum. The auction will begin at 9 a. m.

Eleven prior State of Texas surplus property auctions have totaled \$1,248,209. Bidders may estimate approximately one minute for each numbered item to be sold, Foerster explained.

The Board of Control, which conducts these surplus property auctions for specific state agencies, is also the central purchasing agency for more than 200 institutions, departments, universities, colleges and special schools. Foerster noted the purchasing division approved more than \$198 million in buying for these agencies during the fiscal year which ended recently. This figure was a new record.

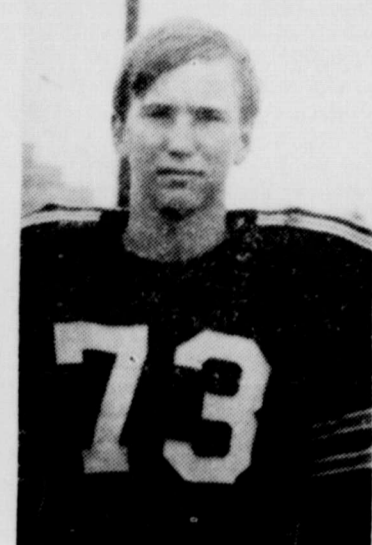

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Tex.—The State Legislature which convenes January 9 will be vastly different from the present one which has served through the 1971 regular and four special sessions.

There will be 77 new faces in the 150-member House and 15 new members of the 31-member Senate. (Five of the House newcomers have served before the 1971 session, and six present House members will be serving in the Senate).

Dolph Briscoe, of course, will succeed Preston Smith as governor, and Bill Hobby will preside over the Senate, succeeding Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Rep. Price Daniel of Liberty will become Speaker of the House, replacing Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine.

Basically, the House is expected to be a more liberal body than the present one, and the new Senate considerably more conservative.

Republicans, women and blacks increased their strength in the House; and the GOP added one more senator, for a total of three. There will be 17 Republican state representatives — seven from Dallas, seven from Houston, two from San Antonio and one from Midland. GOP senators were elected in Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth.

The House, which now has a single woman member, will have five (including two blacks) in January. Mrs. Betty Andujar of Fort Worth, wife of a physician, is the new woman senator. She is a Republican.

The Senate's only woman member at present is Miss Barbara Jordan of Houston, a black, liberal Democrat who was elected to Congress November 7.

Black membership of the House will increase from two to eight.

\$91.2 MILLION IN AID IS SOUGHT — Gov. Smith went to Washington last week in search of \$91.2 million in additional federal social service funding.

Texas has received \$34.8 million in federal matching funds for social services to eligible citizens during the fourth quarter of the 1972 fiscal year.

Smith argues people involved received the same services throughout the year, and the state is entitled to compensation for the first three quarters of fiscal 1972, as well as the last quarter.

The funding will be important in determining whether the next legislature will have to pass a substantial tax bill.

TAX LINE CAN BE HELD — Texas Research League predicts a major tax increase can be avoided next year if lawmakers can keep reasonable controls on spending.

Spending, says TRL, probably can be held within bounds of a \$750 million raise over the next two years—unless federal court rulings require sharp increases in funds for public schools.

An increase in revenue from existing taxes is estimated at \$375 million. A \$40 million surplus is expected to be available at the end of the fiscal year, and federal revenue sharing may provide the state as much as \$315 million during the biennium, according to TRL. That is within \$20 million of the new spending projection.

Texas Highway Department is

due to ask for a two-cents-a-gallon gasoline tax hike next year, which would add another \$70 million to key fund revenues in addition to earmarked road building purposes.

SET ASIDE FOR WHEAT ANNOUNCED

The ASCS office is again offering a set-aside provision under the 1973 wheat program to encourage retirement of additional land to prevent excessive wheat production, according to Mrs. Jean Reeder, executive director of the Foard ASCS office.

An acreage of up to 150 per cent of the domestic allotment may be set aside for payment if the set-aside base is this large or larger.

The voluntary set-aside is determined by adding the 1972 wheat acreage certified as planted for harvest with the 1972 additional set-aside to determine the 1973 set-aside base. In cases where the 1972 certified acres plus additional set-aside is less than the allotment, planting credit will be used to the extent needed to bring the set-aside base up to the domestic allotment.

From the 1973 set-aside base determined above, any intended 1973 additional set-aside is subtracted and the result is the wheat permitted acreage remaining for harvest.

The 1973 set-aside base is important only to those who wish to offer additional acreage for payment in excess of that required to participate in the program. If only the required or minimum acreage is to be set aside, the farmer will still be eligible for wheat certificates and wheat acreage is not restricted.

Robert serves as president of Circle K, is past lieutenant governor of Circle K International, and is presently serving as youth director at the First Baptist Church in DeLeon. He was graduated from Mesquite High School with honors in 1969.

Tax on Gasoline . . .

Gasoline taxes have climbed steadily, Commerce Clearing House Inc. reports—but not everywhere. Seven states—Alabama, Hawaii, Nevada, Ohio, Oklahoma, Texas and Tennessee—haven't raised their gasoline taxes in 10 years. The current top rate is Connecticut's 10 cents a gallon. The steepest rise came in Missouri, from three cents a gallon in 1961 to seven cents currently.

Farmers Home Adm. Explains Emergency Loan Benefits

Texas farmers and ranchers who have suffered crop, livestock or property losses from a natural disaster since June 30, 1971, may be eligible for benefits from Public Law 92-385, Lynn Futch, state director of Farmers Home Administration—Texas, announced last week. Provisions of this law, signed by President Nixon on August 16, 1972, are now fully operative, Futch said.

Benefits are divided into two time frames: 1. Farmers and ranchers who received loans from Farmers Home Administration as the result of losses due to a natural disaster that occurred between June 30 and December 31, 1971, may be eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000 of the principal of the loan. Interest on the remaining loan would be three per cent.

2. Those who received loans as the result of losses from natural disaster that occurred after December 31, 1971, are also eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000. Interest on the outstanding balance would be charged at one per cent.

Futch emphasized that it is not necessary for those who are entitled to benefits to contact the local FHA office. These are blanket provisions applicable to all who have received loans, and each will be contacted and told of the action he should take.

Futch also advises that any farmer or rancher who receives an emergency loan from Farmers Home Administration between now and June 30, 1973, may have up to the first \$5,000 of the loan cancelled, with the balance at a 1 per cent interest rate. The amount of cancellation is limited to the loss or damage not compensated by insurance or otherwise.

Meeting Held Concerning New Development Act

Plans for early implementation of the new Rural Development Act were discussed at a joint meeting of the Four Winds Industrial Foundation board of directors and representatives of the Farmers Home Administration at a recent meeting in Quanah.

The new act passed by Congress will provide direct federal loans and grants for commercial and industrial development of areas that have been hard-hit by loss of population and economic resources during the past 30 years.

The law will be administered by FHA in cooperation with area development groups such as the Four Winds.

Ernie Larmer of Fort Worth, economic development specialist employed by Texas Industrial Commission to work with Four Winds Foundation, described the new law as the "broadest piece of legislation ever devised by Congress to get the job done" in rural development.

Larmer, with R. A. Yarborough of Childress, executive director of Four Winds, discussed the act and pointed out the facets of the program that can be utilized in area economic development.

"The Four Winds Foundation has the best coordinated group of leaders of any similar organization in the state, and is ready to take full advantage of the act," Larmer said.

The program will be administered by Farmers Home Administration through local committees and district offices. Representing FHA at the meeting were Bill Parker, Roy Brandon and Cliff Hargheiser, members of the Hardeman County committee, and Chester Sinclair of Childress and Milton Wilfong of Paducah, district FHA managers.

Four Winds directors attending were Dr. Gene Blackwell of Childress, president; Mrs. Carroll Koch and Ridley Gibson of Quanah and Jack Powell of Paducah.

Representing area EOAC were Felix Taylor, executive director, and Joe Don Brown, economic development director, both of Crowell; and Tim Porter of Paducah, self-help housing coordinator.

Mrs. Mack Ghazal Is Speaker at Rotary Club Meeting

Mrs. Mack Ghazal of Benghazi, Libya, North Africa, was the featured speaker at the Wednesday, November 8, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell. Mrs. Ghazal is the former Miss Cindy Erwin of Crowell. She was married about a year ago to Mr. Ghazal and she has been living in Libya since that time. He is a native of that country and he and his wife met while he was in the United States attending college.

In commenting about her new home, Mrs. Ghazal said she had enjoyed this year of her life in a country completely different from her native land.

She said that Arabic is the language of the Libyan people and their principal religion is Moslem. Moslems worship in a mosque but it is "men only" as the women are not allowed to enter a mosque. The older women still go out into public covered completely except for one eye. However, Mrs. Ghazal said the younger women are getting away from the complete concealment idea and are adopting western dress.

The Moslem religion is the basis on which everyday life proceeds in Libya and five times a day the Moslems stop for prayer. They have just finished a 30-day period of fasting as a part of their religious life. Each day for 30 days, they did without food, water, or anything pleasurable from sunup until dark.

Mrs. Ghazal says she is now able to communicate in the Arabic language, and it has been a difficult task learning the language and also the monetary system.

"There is not freedom of speech in Libya as we know it here in the United States," Mrs. Ghazal stated.

She and her husband recently returned from a week's trip to Cairo, Egypt, and she said the Mideast war has affected life in Libya more than in Egypt. She said that Libya since 1949 has been ruled by a 12-man body.

The use of alcoholic beverages is forbidden by the Moslem religion and liquor is forbidden in the country with a prison sentence assessed for possession.

Oil is the principal export of Libya. The oil camps of the nation are out in the Sahara Desert while most of the population lives along the Mediterranean coast.

She said Libya has a climate very similar to that of Texas. In conclusion, Mrs. Ghazal said the country grows the finest vegetables, has good doctors but poor hospitals, and allows no churches except Moslem.

Mrs. Ghazal is here visiting relatives.

She was introduced by Rotarian Ike Everson.

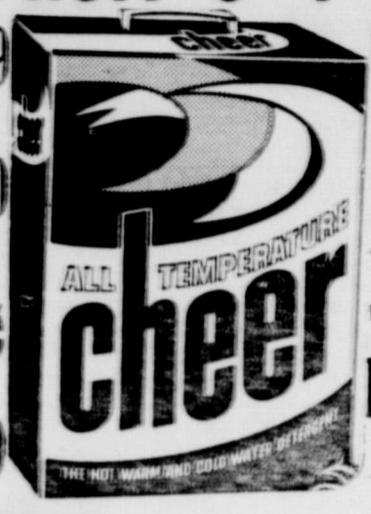

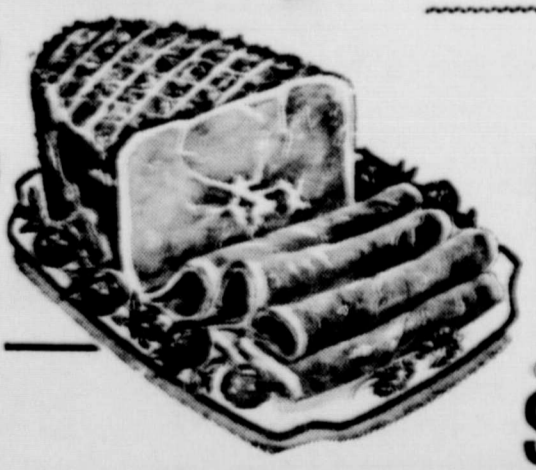
