## Crowell Schools to Host 7-A Meet Next Monday

Crowell Schools will be host for the 1973 Spring Literary Meet for University Interscholastic League District 7-A on Monday, April 2. District 7-A is composed of Archer City, Crowell, Holliday, Knox City, Munday and Paducah.

Local schools will not be conducting classes on the day of the meet. Principals L. H. Wall, Jr. and Gordon Erwin have scheduled the events and assigned responsibilities to the staff members. The entire teaching staff will be involved, as well as many teachers and judges from other schools.

The athletic department will be operating the concession stand in the gym to provide food and drinks to the contestants.

## Local Young People Prepare Petition Protesting X-Rated Movies on T. V.

Petitions directed to the president of the Columbia Broadcasting System have been prepared and are being circulated by young people of the local Methodist Church. The petition specifically objects to the CBS announced plans of showing X-rated movies at late-night hours on the CBS network.

Text of the petition, directed to Dr. Frank Stanton, president of CBS, follows:

We, the members of the Junior-

Senior class of the First United Methodist Church of Crowell, Texas—and the following classmates of Crowell High School, together with the general populace of Crowell, Texas, wish to express our dismay and strong opposition to the recent decision of the Columbia Broadcasting System to show X-rated movies on its network.

Even though the obscene films will be shown on the screen at such a late hour as to exclude the majority of the youth, even so there will be many who view such immoral behavior and be more prone to experiment along the lines depicted on the screen.

We would also go further and express our convictions to repudiate the questionable claim of any worthwhile benefit for mature viewers, feeling that any further deterioration of our national morals could result in the complete disintegration of our great Nation.

We deplore the efforts of the adults responsible for making smutty and X-rated movies and fully realize their ONLY reason is to fatten their wallets. We believe money has its place in our lives, and we enjoy having it; but we are convinced money should be the means to an end rather than the end itself.

We therefore implore you to use the power which your position as president must provide to reconsider this unfortunate decision—for our sake as well as for our country's welfare.

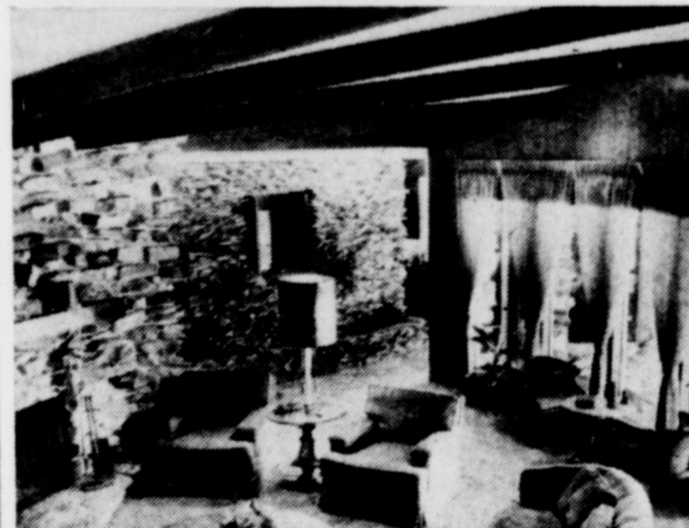

"Cattle Too High? Would You Believe Too Cheap?"

This was the heading on a little essay somebody left on our desk. We suggest you clip it out and show it to people who complain about meat prices.

\* If the price of choice steers had gone up as fast since 1950 as the price of a first-class postage stamp, steers would be bringing \$77 per hundred.

\* If beef prices had increased as much as medical care, steers would be selling for \$72.34.

\* If the rise had been as fast as hourly pay, the figure would be \$80.60.

\* Compared to the cost of having a baby, steers would be bringing \$119.13.

\* Compared to the daily cost of hospital service, steers would bring \$179.69.

And if that is not sufficient to curl your lasso, the live cattle price in Europe at the beginning of 1973 averaged \$56 per hundred.

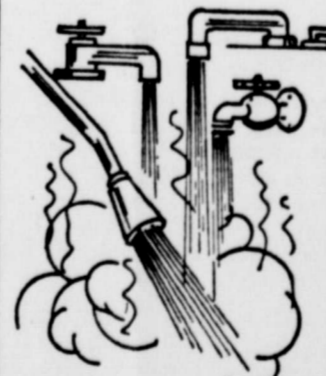

**Two Minutes With the Bible**

Christ the Son of God

St. Paul opens his Epistle to the Romans by stating that the Lord Jesus Christ was "declared to be the Son of God with power," or "powerfully declared to be the Son of God . . . by the resurrection from the dead" (1:4).

In Psa. 2:6, we have Christ, in prophecy, saying, "I will declare the decree: the Lord hath said unto me, Thou art My Son, this day have I begotten thee." Our Lord was, of course, eternally one with the Father, but the word "begotten" here comes from Israel's laws, referring to the time when the child was officially declared to be the father's full-grown son.

But what day was He referring to? On what day did the Father officially declare, "This day have I begotten thee?" The answer is found in Acts 13:33, where the apostle states that God "raised up Jesus again; as it is also written in the second Psalm: Thou art My Son, this day have I begotten Thee."

So our Lord was officially declared—and powerfully declared—to be the Son of God at His resurrection from the dead.

But what did Paul mean in II Tim. 2:7,8, where he said: "Consider what I say; and the Lord give thee understanding in all things. Remember that Jesus Christ, of the seed of David, was raised from the dead according to my gospel."

The answer is that the twelve had proclaimed Christ as the Son of David, to sit on David's throne. Theirs was "the gospel of the kingdom."

But when the King and His kingdom were rejected, God raised up another apostle, Paul, to proclaim "The gospel of the grace

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of God" (Acts 20:24). Christ was, indeed, the dead to sit on David's throne and this will yet come. Paul has a message for us and now: that Christ rose from the dead to certification and to become "the Church with Body."

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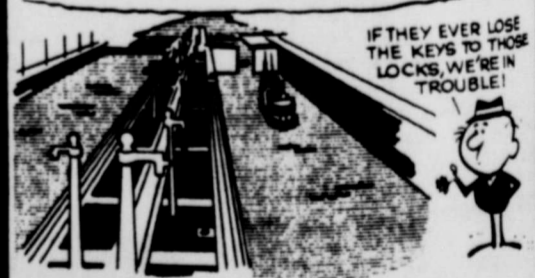
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## Energy and Sense of Purpose Needed Career of Homemaking Teacher

March 22. The subject of the story, Lanette Whitley, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W.

Ask Lanette Whitley, young homemaking teacher now winding up her second year at Canyon Junior High School.

In the first place, you take one part dedication.  
"It wasn't just the skills of homemaking that interested me in this as a career, but the home itself," she said, stressing the word "home." "The home is the center of society, and we always

have to be conscious of how to make it better."

Then you combine that with a heaping supply of energy. Mrs. Whitley has five classes of ninth-grade homemaking a day, and sponsors an active Future Homemakers of America Club besides. A lot of extra hours are spent in planning schedules, shopping for supplies, and making out the financial reports entailed in vocational teaching.

Add a dash of strong will—because there is a right way to do most things in the home, from putting in a hem to setting a table. The homemaking teacher has to see to it that her girls produce garments and dishes they can be proud of.

A smattering of patience is important, too. There are a lot of questions to be answered, and young hands new at a job make mistakes.

Of course, a lot of education and training goes into this recipe for a good homemaking teacher also.

Oddly enough, Lanette Whitley didn't decide on a homemaking teaching career until her junior year at Baylor University. Nor, in fact, did she take any homemaking courses in junior or senior high school.

"I went to a small high school, numbering 150 students, in Crowell, Texas, and homemaking was not offered in our junior high. I wanted to major in piano. I tried to major in piano at Baylor University but the isolation and competition didn't go along with my personality."

Even though she had no homemaking classes before, as a college student Mrs. Whitley was drawn to take electives in homemaking. She had always liked to cook, and a neighbor in Crowell had taught her to sew.

"The homemaking building at Baylor was a little two-story white house with green shutters—and it attracted me somehow," she explained with womanly logic.

"After I got involved, I loved everything I took. There are so many aspects of homemaking, and you get a wide variety of courses. We had consumer education, tailoring, home management, child development and other courses I had never dreamed were included in homemaking." She got to know the seven instructors well in the small department at Baylor and still corresponds with some of them.

But the young homemaking teacher's first experience in teaching was under difficult and turbulent conditions. "The court-ordered busing of students to that particular school was not good, and the students were rebellious. Neither white nor black teachers could communicate with them. I am just grateful I got the chance next semester to teach in Canyon where such problems do not exist, or I might not have taught again," she commented.

Mrs. Dennis Whitley in private life, she is the wife of an aspiring coach. A Baylor graduate also, her husband works with Gene Mayfield at West Texas State University as a graduate assistant and also is employed at the Swisher County Feed Yard.

One of the enjoyable parts of Mrs. Whitley's work this school year has been sponsoring the Future Homemakers of America Club. One of their large projects has been collecting, sorting, laundering and mending clothing for a children's orphanage in Viet Nam. "We sent 32 boxes of clothing at an average cost of \$3.50 a box," she said, and added that more clothing was packed and ready to ship next school year.

Mrs. Whitley first learned of the project through a program presented in her Sunday school class at First Baptist Church by Col. John Childs. The tapes and slides had been prepared by Col. John Osborne, a Canyon man then serving near the orphanage.

Explaining the FHA program, she said, "We have an Encounter Program that is taking the place of degrees. This is a personal growth program for individual work in FHA. The girls set their own goals for themselves for the year. This year has been a year of self study. Some have set the goal of losing weight or improving their fingernails—some have set goals in their spiritual lives, such as reading a book of the Bible each week."

As an incentive, the top 25 per cent earned in points the right to go to Lubbock the week end of March 16 and 17 to attend the Regional FHA Convention. Later on, the two top point earners will go to the state convention in San Antonio.

Mrs. Whitley feels that girls take naturally to homemaking and plunge eagerly into the activities involved. "I think a majority of women are geared to be homemakers and mothers. . . . It is possible for some women to combine a career and homemaking, and it is necessary for most women to work at some time during their lives. But I still think women are built in their make-up to feel close to activities going on in the home."

In her spare moments at home, Mrs. Whitley has tackled such projects as re-upholstering a sofa and crocheting scarf and cap sets,

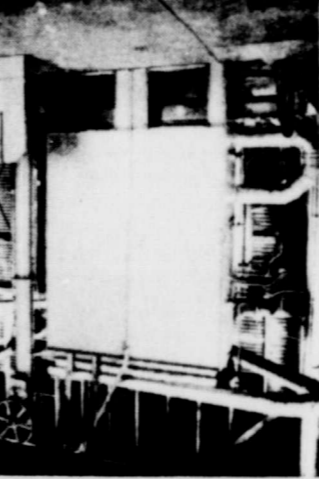

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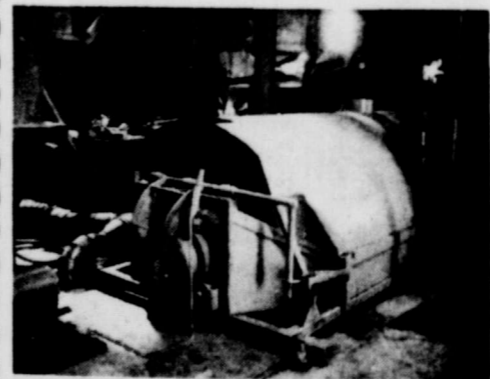

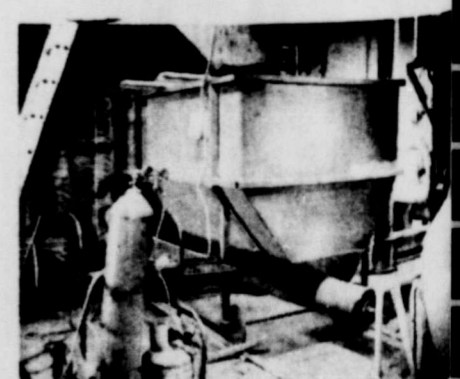

First, she read "Ingratitude," by Alton B. Bell, member of a pioneer family, and "Primeval Foard County," by S. P. McLaughlin, father of the late Claude McLaughlin.

Miss Jacquelyn Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Brown of Truscott, presented her prize-winning 4-H foods demonstration, "Six Breads for Texas." Using the six flags, she told of the bread that each group brought to Texas. She showed each of the different breads, even a jar of sour dough starter. With this demonstration, Miss Brown was

the 1972 winner in the district 4-H contest, and second place winner in the state contest, breads division.

Mrs. Bill Klepper's topic was "Escapades of Pioneer Brides." She chose escapades from "They Loved the Land," featuring the lives of Mrs. C. P. Sandifer, Mrs. Joe Johnson, Mrs. E. V. Halbert, and Mrs. J. H. Minnick. She showed pictures of Mr. and Mrs. Poe Johnson and their small son, Baxter.

Before going to the Carter home Mrs. Johnson gave a brief history of the Crowell family who came to this area in 1886. Their first home was a dugout on the lot now occupied by the brick home of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Black. Later, lumber was hauled from Harrold to erect a two-room house. It was in this home that the town organizers met and decided to name the new town, "Crowell." In 1893, the two rooms were moved to south of the court house just across the railroad. Three other rooms were added to the structure. In 1908, Mr. and Mrs. Crowell built their fine home which is one of Crowell's best examples of a vanishing style of architecture. Mr. Crowell died in 1909, but it was Mother Crowell's home until her death in 1946.

At the Carter home, members of the house party, wearing long dresses, showed guests through the beautifully decorated home, much of which has been done by the Carter family.

From a table covered with a burlap cloth, the hostesses, Mrs. Duane Naylor, Mrs. Otto Bachman Jr. and Mrs. Felix Taylor, served sandwiches, cookies and chips tied in colorful red and blue bandanas and soft drinks.

At the Pease River Battlefield, Mrs. Johnson told of the importance of natural water sources, such as Antelope Springs, Mule Creek and Dunn Springs.

The Wesley and Dunn families were the first permanent settlers, although a few others were here for a brief period. Atussa Ann Snyder Reynolds, mother of Charlie Reynolds, lived at Mule Creek as a child. The journal of frontier Methodist preacher Pete Graves says that he preached at Mule Creek in 1881. He had preached in the back of a store at Vernon where he had 11 members.

The U. S. Ray family came from Kentucky in 1884, bringing with them some pear trees; two of the number are still living after nearly 90 years.

The Ayers family came in 1888. Five generations have lived on the Ayers farm and their cattle brand has been in continuous use longer than any other brand registered

in Foard County.

Mrs. Johnson closed by giving a brief history of the capture and re-capture of Cynthia Ann Parker, one of the most touching stories in Texas history.

Twenty-five members and two visitors, Miss Jacquelyn Brown and Mrs. James Sandlin, were present.

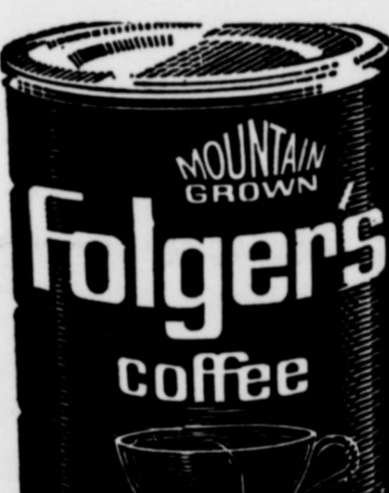

Mrs. Ruth Andrews has been appointed Presiding Officer for said election and she shall select two (2) Clerks to assist in the holding of said election. And said election shall be held in the same manner prescribed by law for holding other elections.

Every qualified person who has attained the age of eighteen (18) years and who has resided within the limits of said City for six (6) months next preceding the date of said election and is a qualified voter under the laws of the State of Texas shall be entitled to vote at said election.

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

Austin, Tex.—A widely-publicized ruling of the U. S. Supreme Court relaxed pressure on the Texas Legislature to overhaul school finance laws and the property tax system this year.

Predictions are the major revisions will be undertaken in special session—if they are undertaken at all before the 1975 regular legislative meeting.

The High Court, reversing a San Antonio three-judge federal court ruling of December, 1971, upheld property tax financing of local schools and concluded education is not a right assured by the Constitution. The lower court had invalidated the Texas system of financing schools on grounds it varied quality of education from district to district rather than fixing it on the basis of state wealth.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Atty. Gen. John Hill emphasized that inequities must still be abolished in public school finance. House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr. and others agreed the heat on the Legislature to "act now" has been turned down several degrees.

Bills are pending in both Houses backed by Texas Board of Education and Texas State Teachers Association to revamp finance formulas.

The bills are slated for House Education Committee hearing on April 4 at 6 p. m.

Under the Board of Education bill, the state would assume virtually all basic education program cost over a five-year period.

TSTA's proposal calls for local districts to pay 30 per cent (instead of the present 20 per cent) of program costs and would require the local school districts to meet state standards for assessing property and setting tax rates.

With the heat off, legislators aren't expected to rush into anything so far-reaching and controversial as school finance.

**ALTERED PRESS BILLS ADVANCE**—Weakened versions of open meetings and newsmen's privilege (called the "free flow of information bill") measures moved forward last week.

HB 3—the open meetings bill—advanced to the Senate calendar with Jurisprudence Committee approval in a form criticized by the Texas Joint Media Committee and Common Cause.

Amendments to the measure are being prepared to tighten the sections on real estate transactions and attorney-public body meetings. These amendments should make the bill more acceptable to the Senate, media groups, House sponsors and other supporters of public access to information.

The "free flow of information" bill, HB 10, to protect sources of information from forced disclosure was due for Jurisprudence Committee consideration after winning sub-committee approval.

Critics noted that an amendment to the open meetings bill permitting closed deliberations on "negotiated contracts" and real estate sales covers a lot of territory never contemplated in the original House bill.

The shield law as it cleared subcommittee on a 4-0 vote would permit the State Supreme Court to order source and information disclosure if it can be obtained by no other means and if withholding it would cause or threaten "substantial cause or injury, endanger public health and welfare or cause substantial injustice."

Spokesmen for the Texas Joint Media Committee said this was a "qualified" privilege, but better than the present common law which gives no privilege at all.
