Wildcats Drop Non-District Game to Bowie

The Crowell Wildcats made a good accounting of themselves at Bowie last Friday night, although they lost to the strong 2A Bowie eleven 12 to 8.

A steady downpour during the entire game hampered both unit's offensive efforts, and strong defensive efforts by both squads prevented any scoring during the first half of play.

The third period of play saw a continuation of stout defensive efforts, and it was late in this period when Jack Dick, Bowie defensive stalwart, broke through and blocked a Philip Bell punt on the Bowie 20-yard line, picked the ball up and raced across the double stripe. The try for extra point failed.

Bowie's second score came with seven minutes left in the game when Ricky Byars got off a 38-yard gallop—longest of the night for either team—down to the Crowell 1. Ronnie Miller plunged over on the next play for the 6 points. Again the try for extra point failed.

Crowell got on the scoreboard via a blocked kick, much the same way as Bowie scored its first TD. Philip Bell blocked a Jackrabbit punt and picked up the ball and scampered 32 yards for the Wildcats' touchdown. Quarterback Dee Finley passed

Disability Benefits Told

Many people are still under the impression that they cannot apply for social security disability benefits until they have been disabled for 5 months, noted Henry Chustz, manager of the Vernon social security office. This is not correct.

A claim may be filed anytime after a person become disabled. In fact, early filing for these benefits allows ample time to process the claim and assure payment is made at the earliest possible time. Delayed applications may well result in a delayed check.

The social security office will not only assist a disabled person in applying for benefits, it goes one step further by helping the disabled person secure evidence of his disability.

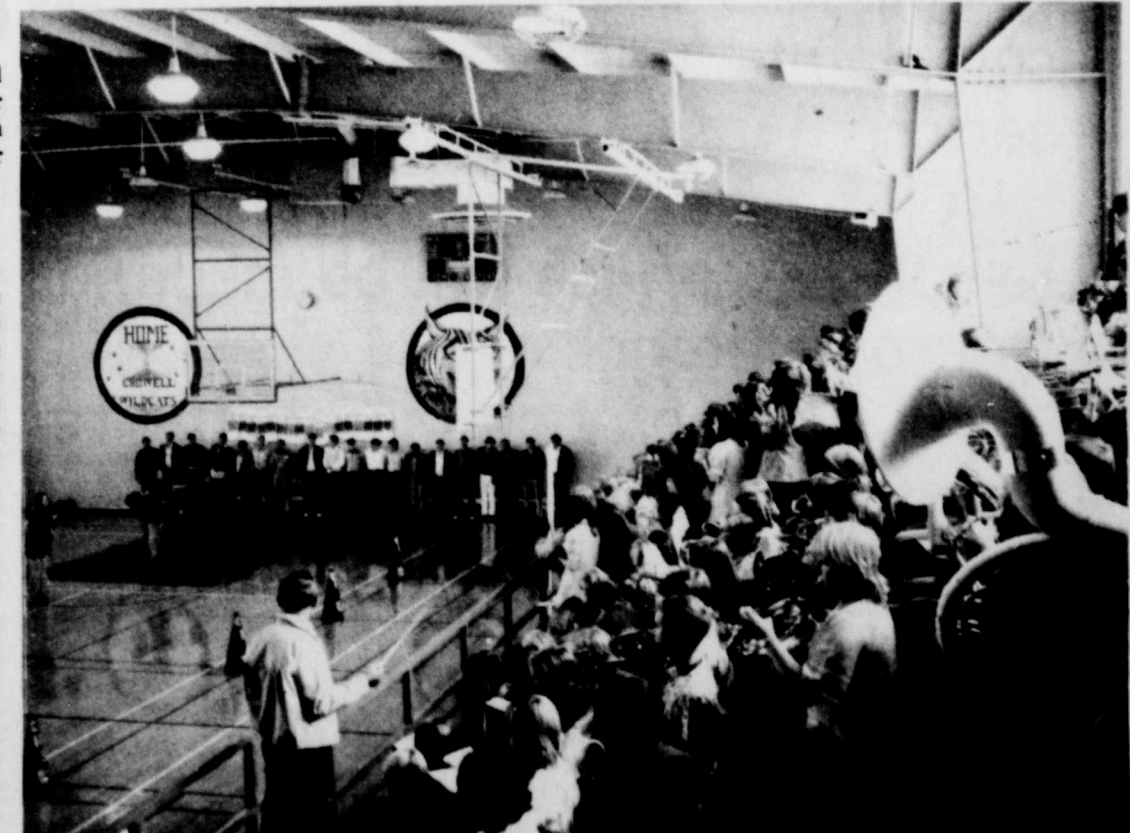

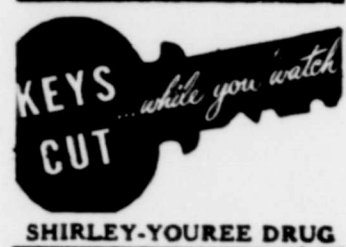

RECORD SHRIMP HARVEST

A preliminary harvest of shrimp from demonstration ponds at Corpus Christi has more than doubled previous catches in Texas. The harvest at Barney M. Davis Power Station determined that shrimp could be gathered using the experimental harvest system in operation at the project. The catch boasted 2,020 pounds of shrimp from the half-acre pond—more than double the previous record catch at Angleton last year. The shrimp had a survival average of 83 percent and were harvested 140 days after stocking, according to a mariculture specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A full-scale harvest is planned in October.

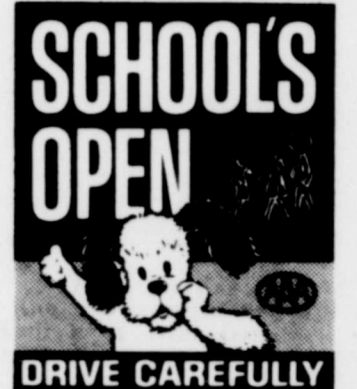

AUSTIN, Tex.—The third largest state oil and gas lease sale in Texas history brought more than \$21.4 million to the state permanent school fund and boosted its total above \$1 billion.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale further may be the "most significant" ever conducted by the state, since it marks the beginning of a new concept in management of mineral resources.

Of 1.3 million acres in 1,712 tracts of state land offered for sale from border to border, more than 392,886 acres were leased at an average price of \$54.65 an acre for oil and gas purposes.

For the first time, leases contain a new "in kind" provision which allows the state to accept its one-sixth royalty (where there is production) in oil or gas for resale as well as in cash.

Armstrong said new pollution control regulations are written into the leases to protect the environment while drilling continues. Additional regulations are written into the leases to protect the environment while drilling continues. Additional regulations were imposed to protect the Padre Island National Seashore.

Gulf tracts attracted more than \$16 million of the bonus payments, bay tracts \$4.5 million and upland leases the balance.

The School Land Board leased 1,440 acres in the Gulf off the mouth of the Sabine River, in spite of a state of Louisiana protest that the area may be within its boundaries. Tracts off Matagorda Island were also leased over protest of the Air Force which has a bombing range in that region. Bid on one of six Gulf tracts which the federal government protested for inclusion in the sale was held in abeyance. The U. S. says it may own the tracts due to shoreline erosion.

CONCON PUBLIC INFO COMMITTEE MEETS

An all out effort to get the news and information about the 1974 Texas Constitution Convention is being planned by a legislative committee headed by Rep. Tim Von Dohlen, Goliad.

Rep. Dohlen met with legislators and newsmen last week to discuss a public information office for the ConCon where all news media can get complete information about the convention.

The office will be set up in the capitol building as close to the convention hall as possible, Von Dohlen said, and asked reporters how they wanted the

The Parks and Wildlife Department will appeal a \$303,667 Gillespie County commission award for 131 acres of land condemned for Lyndon B. Johnson State Park inclusion.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT CITED—For the third time in six years, Texas Highway Department received top national honors from Discover America Travel Organizations Inc.

The Department took the 1973 award for its Infobond program in highway rest areas picturing scenic, historic and recreational features. A total of 188 Infobonds are contemplated over the state.

WATER PROGRAM APPROVED—The Texas Water Quality Management program has been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The state program had to meet federal water pollution control act requirements for Texas to receive \$1,200,000 in federal funds to assist with operation of the state program.

BOLLWORM DEADLINE EXTENDED—Deadline for cotton stalk destruction in the pink bollworm control program in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and five Coastal Bend counties was extended to October 15.

Agricultural Commissioner John C. White extended the deadline for clean-up operations in Nueces, Bee, San Patricio, Kleberg, Jim Wells, Cameron, Willacy, Hidalgo and Starr counties due to rains which upset planting and plow-up schedules.

SHORT SNORTS
 governor Birscoe asked that ort Bend County be declared a disaster area as a result of floods and requested federal aid for flood-damaged Hidalgo, Guadalupe and Wilson counties.

The State Textbook Committee began a new series of meetings here on October 9 to select \$11.8 million worth of new textbooks.

October 7-13 Is National 4-H Week

4-H youth and their volunteer adult leaders throughout Texas and the nation are "getting it all together" as they observe National 4-H Week, October 7-13.

"Traditionally, since 1927, National 4-H Week has been a time for 4-H'ers, their leaders and friends to take stock of the year's accomplishments and achievements," say Mrs. Rhonda Ward and Joe Burkett, County Extension Agents.

"4-H Gets It All Together" is the theme of this year's observance and in countless ways, 4-H has "gotten it

together" by involving more young people between the ages of 9 and 19 than ever before. Latest available figures show some 5.5 million young people across the nation participate in 4-H annually. About 146,000 of these are in Texas, and 215 in Foard County.

4-H groups exist in nearly every U. S. county and in about 85 countries around the world.

Foard One of 97 Texas Counties on Program

The 97 Texas counties which converted to the Food Stamp Program on Oct. 1 represent the largest block of counties in one state to go into this U.S. Department of Agriculture food program at one time.

That's the report of Martin Garber, Dallas, West-Central regional administrator for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. The Food Stamp Program is administered in Texas by the State Department

of Public welfare in cooperation with USDA.

The addition of these 97 counties brings the total number of Texas counties in the program to 139—leaving 115 to enter the program on Nov. 1, at which time every county in the state will have food stamps available to its needy citizens.

Under the food stamp plan, households spend a certain amount each month for food stamps, based on the number in the household, income, resources and other factors. They then get additional stamps free of charge, increasing their food buying power.

Food stamps are then used like cash at local food stores, authorized by USDA to accept them.

Legislation recently passed by Congress will require this program to be operating in every "political subdivision" of a state by June 30, 1974.

VETERANS AND SOCIAL SECURITY

Veterans, if you receive social security benefits and had active military service after 1956, you should contact your local social security office as soon as possible. A recently-enacted law grants extra social security credits for active service after 1956. This might result in an increase in the amount of your monthly social security check. However, you must apply to the Social Security Administration for any increase that might be due. It will also be necessary for you to submit evidence of your military service. This law applies also to survivors of deceased veterans who had active military service after 1956. So don't delay—contact social security today.

Veteran's Day to Honor More Than 29 million Americans

Veterans Day this year will honor more than 29 million Americans, the most in the nation's history, according to Jack Coker, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office at Waco. Texas' veteran population has risen to a record 1,430,000.

More than half of the 43.5 million who served from the American Revolution through Vietnam are alive today, the VA says. The oldest in this group are the less than 2,000 veterans of the Spanish-American War with an average age of 93. Veterans of World War II represent the largest group, about 14 million. The current Vietnam Era has produced 6.6 million veterans.

Once known as Armistice Day, the event commemorated the end of World War I on November 11, 1918. Following World War II, sentiment grew for the day to be a tribute to veterans of all wars. A Congressional resolution by Rep. Edwin K. Rees of Kansas was passed and signed into law in 1954.

That same year, President Eisenhower created the Veterans Day National Committee, which coordinates the national ceremony and the observances within each state. "Peace with Honor" was chosen by the committee as the official Veterans Day theme and has been in use continuously since

What One Person Can Do

Bill Wilson, Alcoholic
William G. Wilson was successful in the bullish Wall Street market of the 1920s. But the more money he made, the more he drank. His wife expressed concern. He told her: "Men of genius conceive their best projects when drunk."

When the market collapsed, Bill Wilson sought consolation in the bottle. His wife worked to support him. He joined a church, but soon resumed drinking.

Alone, in a hospital, Wilson prayed. He said later that he had a profound spiritual experience that changed his life. Bill Wilson never drank again.

In 1935 in Akron, Ohio, he met a surgeon named Robert H. Smith who couldn't stop drinking. Wilson helped "Doctor Bob," as he was later to be known, to get sober. Both men worked with several others, who also achieved sobriety. That was the beginning of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Wilson had big plans. He foresaw "chains of A. A. hospitals and tons of free literature for suffering alkie." Approached for funds, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., turned him down. "I think money will spoil this," he said. Ever since then, A. A. has been supported entirely by its own membership.

Today Alcoholics Anonymous claims half a million members in 16,000 groups in the U. S. and 90 foreign countries. It promotes the idea that alcoholism is a disease that can be arrested by abstinence from alcohol. A. A. continues to offer help, without charge, to anyone who has "a desire to stop drinking." That is the only requirement for membership.

Bill Wilson turned personal tragedy into a triumph that has helped hundreds of thousands. Next time you're tempted to give up, think of this drunken Wall Street analyst who got sober. It might change your mind.

During his tour, Bullock "Texas taxpayers are in \$82,500,000 in tax dollars a year because some retailers pocketing the state and sales taxes they collect instead of reporting it to a comptroller."

Bullock, a veteran of Korean conflict, resides in Austin with his wife and children.

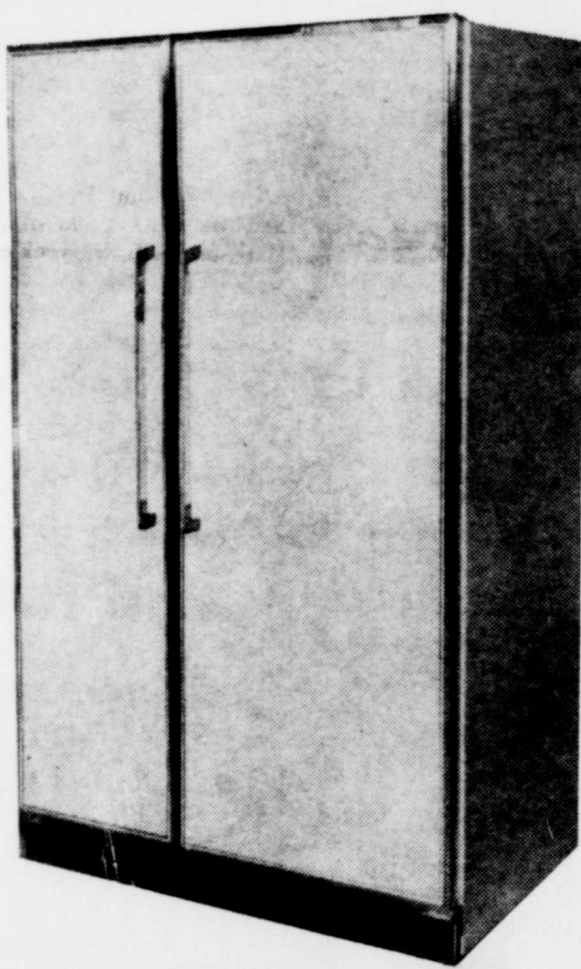

Hubert Brown Is Speaker at Rotary Meeting

Hubert Brown, member of the Rotary Club of Crowell since 1934, was the speaker at the Rotary meeting Wednesday, October 3 and briefly told some of the highlights of his life.

He said his parents and family moved to Foard County in 1899 in a covered wagon, and settled in the Four Corners community. That land is still owned by members of the Brown family.

Mr. Brown said the farm contained 40 acres in cultivation and 400 acres of mesquite. His father bought the land for \$3 per acre and in later years said he could have bought all the land from his place to Foard City for \$3 per acre. His reason for not doing so was that he didn't have the \$3.

Mr. Brown related some of his business ventures during the years. He was the first manager of the Farmers Co-Op. Elevator in Crowell, did custom binding of grain for threshing, did custom combining back in 1927, bought the Foard County Mill in the 30's and at one time owned a car dealership, a man's furnishings store, and built a 5 mile pipeline in the Texas Company field many years ago.
