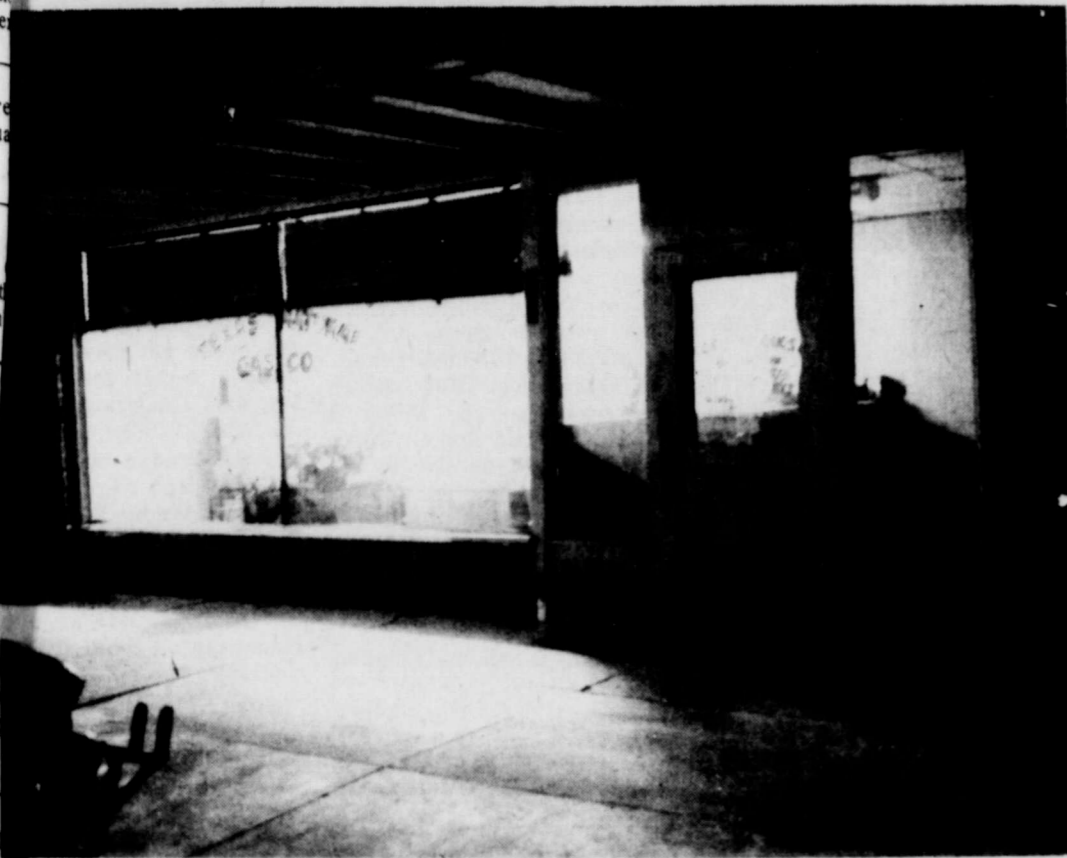

## Big Temperature Drop Recorded Last Week

One of the fastest changes in temperature experienced in Foard County in a long time occurred last week. Tuesday of last week, after about 10 days of extremely cold weather, the

temperature rose to a high of 78 degrees that afternoon. About 6 p.m., a blustery norther blew in and by early Wednesday the temperature had dropped to 18 degrees. About a 60-degree drop overnight.

Then on Wednesday, a freezing rain started falling, and by Thursday morning, this section of Texas was covered with a thin sheet of ice.

The icy glaze melted off the streets shortly after noon last Thursday. Friday was slightly warmer, but Saturday morning the temperature dropped to a season low of 9 degrees.

A warming trend set in over the weekend. Early Monday morning fog covered the area, and by Tuesday afternoon, the mercury rose to the 60's.

## Hightower, Heatly Win Assignments

State Rep. W. S. "Bill" Healy of Paducah has been named to the judiciary committee of the historic Texas Constitutional Convention now meeting in Austin and State Sen. Jack Hightower has been named chairman of the administration committee, assignments which both men had requested. They both represent districts which include Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties.

Healy, an outspoken opponent of any major constitutional change and who has warned repeatedly that local courts and government are in danger of being done away with in the proposed constitution, compared the present constitution to the State Capitol building. "Both are about the same age and neither one needs to be destroyed," he said.

A total of 720 samples of Foard County cotton were graded at the USDA Cotton Division Classing office at Altus, Ok., last week.

This brought the season total for the county to 5,514 bales as

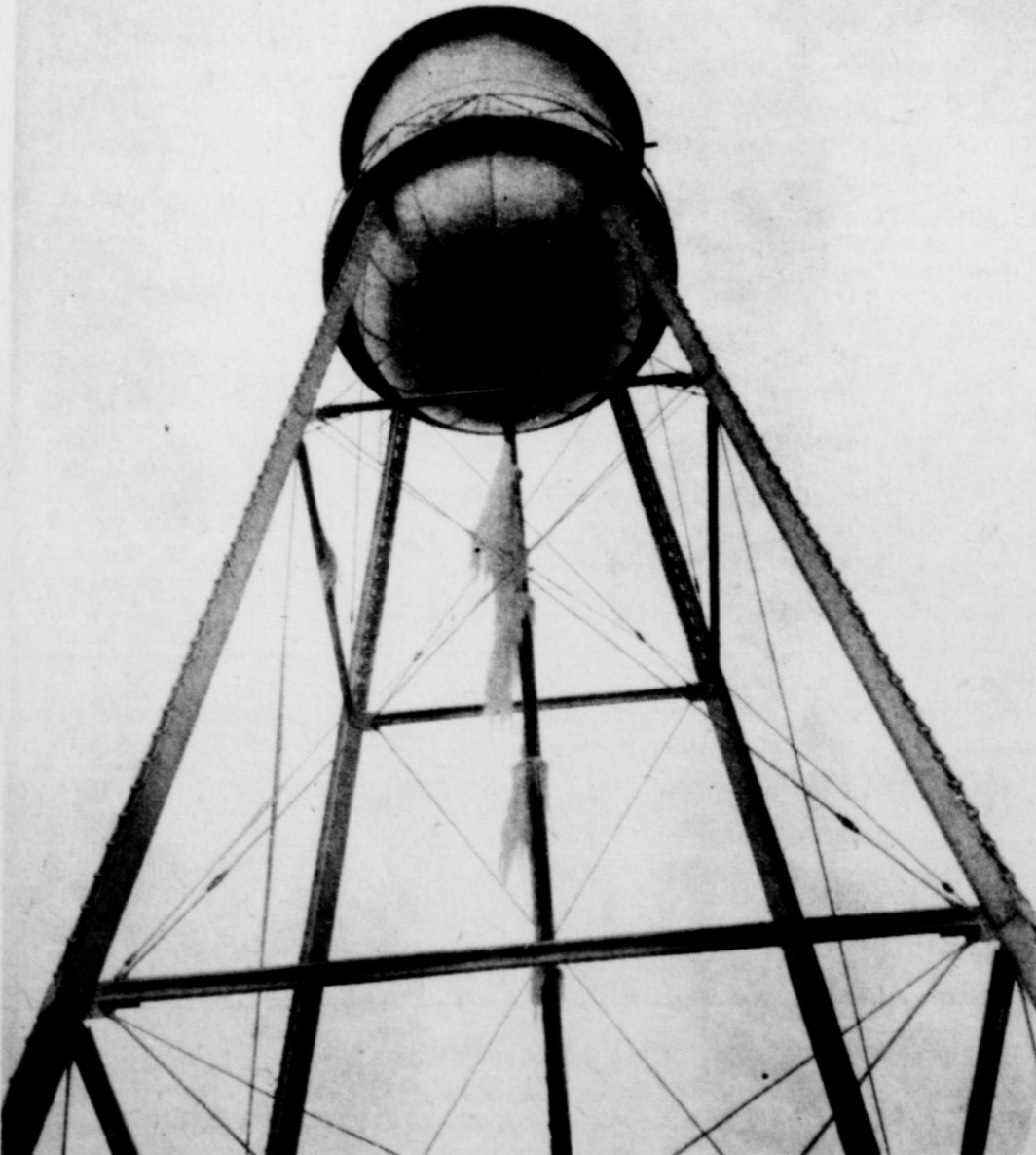

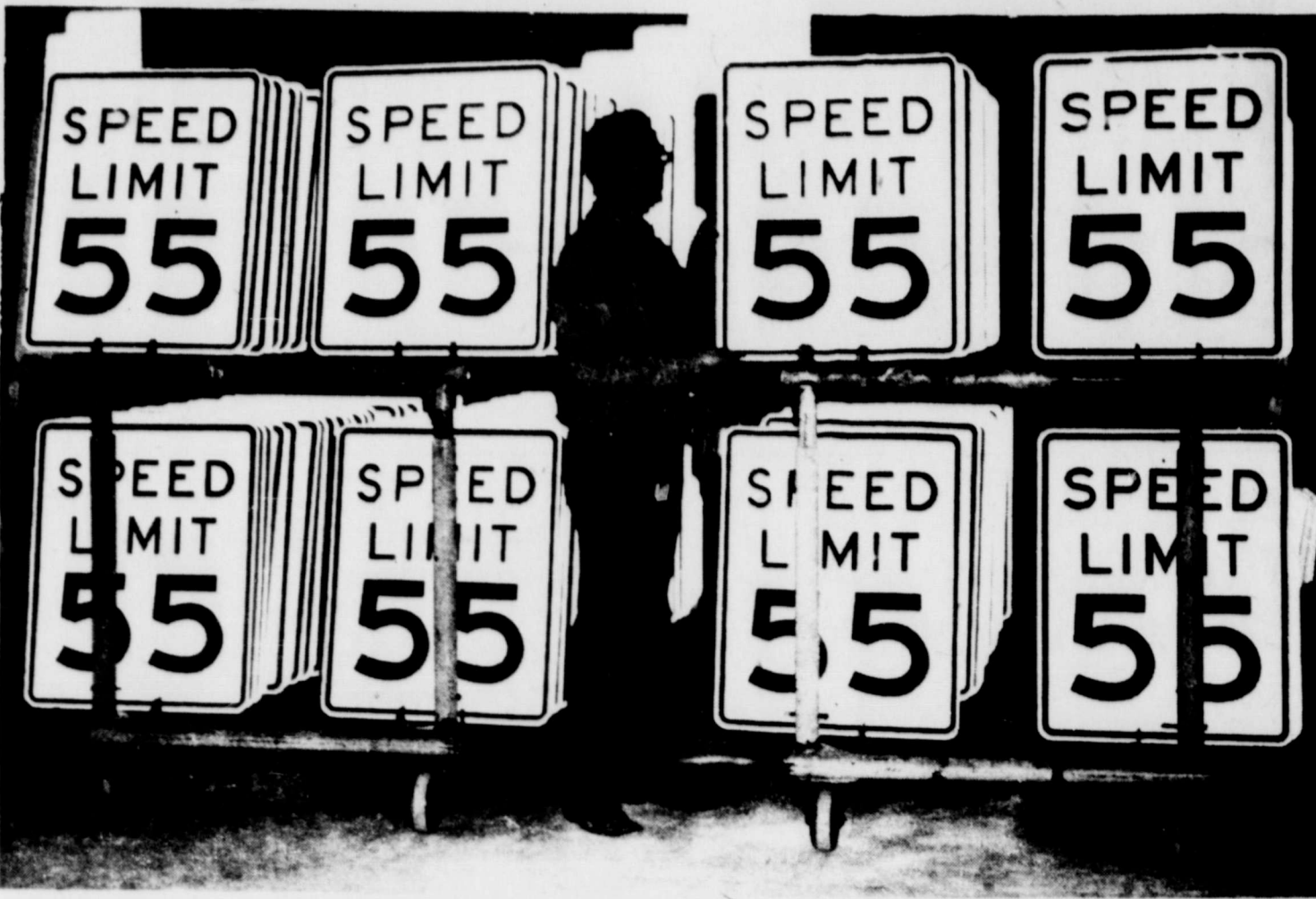
Mr. Herman, a former Crowell resident and employee of the ASCS office here, had served as Hardeman County executive director of the ASCS for many years before retiring in 1972.

## Texas Speed Limit Set as 55 M.P.H.

AUSTIN—The Texas Highway Commission today set a statewide maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour, effective at 12:01 a.m., Sunday, January 20. The action was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the

Texas Legislature, empowering the Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions. Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds. Federal taxes on items related to the operation motor vehicles -- notably a four-cents-per-gallon levy on gasoline -- go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are

## 1974 Water Bank Funding Announced

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) last week announced the operation and funding for fiscal year 1974 of the new Rural Environmental Conservation Program authorized by the Agricultural and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 and the Water Bank Program.

Total funding level for the two programs, the Department said, will be \$100 million. RECP will receive \$90 million and Water Bank \$10 million. RECP is a new program which carries forward some features of the old Rural Environmental Assistance Program, but with increased emphasis on tree planting in states and counties to be designated. Annual cost-share agreements will be used as well as phasing-in of the Title X Authority in the Farm Act which authorizes the Secretary to enter into long-term cost-share agreements with landowners to establish conser-

vation practices. These programs will help landowners establish and follow recommended permanent type conservation practices while farmers are being called on for all-out production to meet consumer and export needs.

Water Bank continues a program established by Congress in 1971 providing agreements with owners and operators of eligible wetlands in important migratory waterfowl nesting and breeding areas. Participants agree not to drain, burn, fill, or otherwise destroy the wetland character of such areas. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer the cost-share agreements through its farmer-elected committee system, in close cooperation with other agencies of USDA. Planning, technical and educational assistance will be provided by Soil Conservation Service, Forest Service, Extension Service, and State Forestry Agencies.

apportioned back to the state for the federal government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit were not set by early March.

Today's action is subject to review within eight days by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70-m.p.h. maximum speed limit on the State's major highways will be in place by the effective date. The Highway Department will begin immediately the task of making and posting the new signs.

The Commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circumstances "which might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis." This is in order that the Commission may make findings as to whether the 55 m.p.h. limit should continue in effect.

Many motorists in Texas already have voluntarily reduced their driving speeds to below 55, Highway Department spokesmen said.

## Altus Cotton Classing Office Gives Report

The USDA Cotton Division Classing Office at Altus graded 57,000 samples for the week ending January 11, and the season total stood at 320,600 samples classed. A year ago at this date 245,600 samples had been classed. During the past week the classing office recorded the largest single week of the season, according to C. E. Cox, officer in charge at Altus, and it was also the largest single week in more than 20 years. This season has also been unique in that grading has never been more than three and a half days behind receipts.

Total classed from North Texas counties this year stood at 48,000 samples compared with 41,000 at this date last year.

Grades on North Texas cotton classed during the week were 44 per cent White and 54 per cent Light Spotted. Predominant grades were grade 41 with 33 per cent, grade 32 with 26 per cent, and grade 42 with 27 per cent.

- For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
- A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on the Clean Filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
- A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house wasting heat.
- To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extreme cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
- Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
- Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

## RECRUITMENT URGED

# Physician Shortage Is Serious Problem

(Editor's Note: The following article was written by Lois Luecke, staff writer for the Wichita Falls Times and appeared in the Thursday edition of that newspaper. Since the article mentions Foard County, the News believes it will be of interest to our readers.)

A SHORTAGE OF doctors, particularly "primary care" physicians poses a serious problem to the 12-county area served by Nortex Regional Planning Commission according to a preliminary health objectives plan drawn by Randy Hempling, director of health planning.

So recruitment and retention—expending "every effort to attract physicians to the area"—goes to the head of a list pinpointing current major issues in comprehensive health planning.

HEMPLING'S SAMPLE plan will be presented to the Nortex health advisory committee when it meets at 7 p.m. Thursday at Holiday Inn Downtown.

According to a survey by Hempling, there are 199 practicing physicians in the 12-county area of Nortex, with a population of 212,528.

"If you take the rule of thumb that you need at least one physician per 1,000 population, the need is for 212 right now.

"BUT THE PROBLEM is compounded by the need for more primary care physicians. Wichita County is the center for specialty care in the North Texas area and therefore has greater than one physician per thousand but the need for primary care is anywhere else in the region," Hempling commented.

The ideal number of physicians in the region, he believes is for 223 doctors in 1976, 225 in 1977, 230 in 1978, 235 in 1979 and 239 in 1980. Nortex serves Wichita, Clay, Baylor, Montague, Childress, Foard, Cottle, Young, Hardeman, Archer, Jack and Wilbarger counties.

"The activities of the tri-county medical society and the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry to gain physicians should be expanded," Hempling said.

"NATIONAL SERVICE Corps physicians should be secured for Foard and Cottle counties. Efforts to secure licensure and acceptance of paraprofessionals should increase. Nurse training should be increased and nurses recruited, especially public health nurses," the plan emphasized.

Other recommendations include those in the public health services field—one proposing possible expansion by 1980 of
