Mrs. Mittie Atcheson Died Friday

Mrs. Atcheson Was Widow of Former Foard County Judge

Mrs. Mittie Atcheson, 86, widow of a former Foard County judge, died in the Knox City hospital last Friday following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held a 3 p.m. Sunday in the Eastside Church of Christ in Crowell with John Greeson, minister of the Rule Church of Christ and R. C. Williams, minister of the local church officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home of Knox City.

Born Feb. 28, 1887, in Parker County, Texas, Mrs. Atcheson married J. E. Atcheson, May 30, 1909, in Farmer, Texas. Following his death in 1950, she moved to Rochester. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Mr. and Mrs. Atcheson came to Foard County by buggy and settled in the Good Creek community, making their first homes in a tent, a dugout house and a log cabin. He taught school at several Foard County schools. They opened a store at Foard City in 1915 and Mrs. Atcheson managed the store while her husband managed the farm and also the grain elevator. In addition to having been a mail carrier, and Foard County judge for two terms, he also served as county attorney.

Mrs. Atcheson is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Violet Hamilton of Rochester, Mrs. Pansey Mangion of Lincoln Park, Mich., and Mrs. Willis Blackwell of Odessa; two brothers, Arch and Frank Peters of Olney; two sisters, Mrs. Lena Huffman of Dallas and Hattie Rea of Wichita Falls; 4 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Varied Weather Here

Foard County received its first measurable amount of moisture last Saturday when a light shower accompanying a cool front brought .15 inch of rain as measured by the government gauge.

This was followed Sunday and Monday by spring-like weather, and another front passed through early Tuesday, with the National Weather Service giving the area a chance of receiving more moisture.

This section of Texas is getting extremely dry, and a general rain would benefit the entire area.

A spokesman for the Crowell group said Monday that if the proposed transaction takes place, the plant will re-open within a week or two.

Monday, February 4, is the last day to file for a place on the ballot for the first Democratic primary, Ray Shirley, County Democratic chairman, said this week.

As of Monday, there are five announced candidates for Commissioner of Precinct 2 and three men are seeking the commissioners job in Precinct 4.

Local Hospital Gets Refund of \$4,299.44

The Foard County Hospital last week received a check for \$4,299.44 as that hospital's share of overcharges refunded to hospitals all over the state as a result of settlements of the State of Texas' antitrust suit against manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics. The

settlement included a total of \$1,707,084.80 distributed to administrators of 145 Texas hospitals. The checks were mailed to individual hospitals by Attorney General John Hill.

The payment of the \$1,707,084.80 by the Chas. Pfizer & Co. to the hospitals was the third phase of payment to Texas health and hospital facilities as a result of the settlement of the Pfizer segment of the antitrust suit by Texas and the other 49 states in the Federal District Court, Southern District of New York.

The Attorney General's office already has distributed \$1.9 million in checks to individual consumers, as well as \$487,602 to State health centers and eleemosynary institutions. Settlement of the antitrust suit as it relates to other manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics is still pending.

Total of 6,496 Foard Cotton Classed

Total number of samples of cotton graded from Foard, Hardeman, Wichita and Wilbarger counties have moved well ahead of a year ago at the USDA cotton classing office at Altus.

The Altus office graded 982 samples of Foard County cotton last week, for a season total of 6,496, compared with 3,870 this time last year.

The USDA Cotton Division Classing Office at Altus graded 37,100 samples for the week ending January 18, and the

season total stood at 357,700 samples classed. Friday was the first day in nearly seven weeks that the classing office finished with less than a day's grading carried over unclassified, according to C. E. Cox, officer in charge at Altus. A year ago at this date, 252,400 samples had been classed.

Total classed from North Texas counties this year stood at 56,000 samples, compared with 42,100 at this date last year.

Grades on North Texas cotton classed during the week were 52 per cent White and 47 per cent Light Spotted. Predominant grades were grade 41 with 43 per cent and grade 42 with 31 per cent.

Staples were predominantly 31 through 33, with staple 32 accounting for 50 per cent of the total. Micronaire readings were in the 3.5 to 4.9 range on 88 per cent of the samples. Three per cent was low mike and nine per cent high mike.

Pressley readings showed fiber strength mostly in the range 70,000 to 94,000 pounds per square inch. Thirty-five per cent fell within the 75 to 79 thousand pound range, and 35 per cent in the 80 to 84 thousand pound range. The average was 81 thousand pounds.

Greenbelt Lake 62.79 Feet Deep

Greenbelt Lake, from which Crowell receives its water supply, was standing in 62.79 feet of water last week. This information was provided the News by Henry Black, Crowell's representative on the Greenbelt board.

Basketball Action Listed

District basketball action for local teams continues during the next week with a Friday night date in Archer City for the high school varsity boys and girls and the boys junior varsity.

Next Monday night, January 28, the local junior high boys and girls go to Paducah for games and on Tuesday, January 29, the local high school teams host the powerful Paducah quintets. Action starts at 5 with the junior varsity game to be followed by the varsity girls game and then the varsity boys.

Band Will Sponsor Program

Plans were made at the January meeting of the Band Boosters Club Monday night for a Miss Petite contest and a special band program featuring a "Johnny Carson" type format to be presented in February.

In addition to providing plenty of first-class entertainment for the entire family, the program will raise funds to help finance a trip of the C.H.S. Wildcat Band to a contest in Amarillo in late April.

The Band Boosters also discussed the pancake supper sponsored annually by the organization during Public Schools Week in Texas on the second weekend in March. George Scott, Rusty Russell and Baxter Gentry are co-chairmen for the event.

Treasurer Donald Werley reported the organization had over \$360 at the present time. Mrs. Joe Don Brown, secretary, presided at the meeting in the absence of President Clois Cobb.

Telephone Company Gets Rate Increase

The Crowell City Council has granted rate increases to General Telephone Co. of the Southwest. According to the ordinance being published in this week's News, the rate increases range from \$1.05 on two-party line service to \$2.95 for a business phone.

Also included as a new item in the rate structure is the ability to call Truscott from Crowell

without a toll charge. The ordinance appears on page 6 of this issue.

Little Dribblers Will Register Next Week

Registration of boys for the fourth season of Little Dribblers basketball in Crowell will begin Monday, January 28, at the Crowell Grade School. Roy M. Whitley, president of the local Little Dribbler organization, announced Monday.

Registration will be conducted by Gordon Erwin and Mrs. Edith Cash and the boys will be given one week in which to register.

Whitley says that boys in the fourth, fifth or sixth grade who are still 12 years old on Sept. 1, 1974, are eligible to play with proof of birth upon request. Each boy will be charged \$3.50. This is to help pay for insurance, uniform and other incidental

1974 License Plates Are Received Here

State registration tags for 2130 motor vehicles for Foard County have been received by the county tax collector's office here in preparation for the sale of the tags beginning on February 1. The new tags, white backgrounds with red numerals and letters, will be available either by mail or they can be picked up in person.

To get the tags by mail, according to county tax collector Howard Howard, send the pre-part registration form that

the state office mailed, along with the registration fee to the county tax office. To get the tags in person, bring the three part form to the tax office.

Personalized tags for 1974 are white background with green letters and numbers.

These tags will be the last of the one-year tags as the 1975 tags issued will be valid for five years.

The 1975 tags will be validated each year, however, with special stickers available at the tax office.

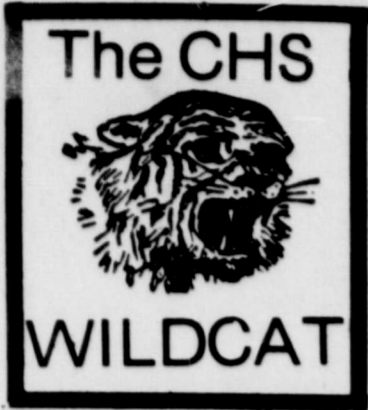

Four Winds Directors to Hear Report Tonite

The printed report is also being presented to the Texas Industrial Commission at their meeting Brownsville Friday. Larmer worked with industrial foundations, local civic groups and individuals in Foard, Hardeman, Cottle and Childers counties on economic development projects under the program the past two years.

Through the help of State Rep. W. S. Healy, the program was funded with \$75,000 in state funds on a pilot project basis. Other similar projects elsewhere in the state are being considered by the State Industrial Commission.

Nortex Gets \$43,253.00 Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today the approval of a State of Texas Regional Planning Assistance Grant in the amount of \$43,253 to the Nortex Regional Planning Commission (Nortex RPC).

The grant program is administered by the Governor's Division of Planning Coordination. James M. Rose, Division Director, stated that the funds are provided to Nortex RPC to assist in meeting their regional planning and service responsibilities.

The Division of Planning Coordination is that section of the Governor's Office charged with assisting the Governor in carrying out his responsibilities as the State's Chief Planning Officer. In addition to administering the regional planning grant program, the Division is actively engaged in coordinating State planning activities and in developing assistance programs for local governments and regional councils of governments.

Funding for the Nortex RPC planning grant comes from a \$1.7 million dollar appropriation of the 63rd Legislature.

Nortex RPC is headquartered in Wichita Falls. It is an association of local governments, with membership including 23 cities, 12 special purpose governments and the counties of Archer, Baylor, Childers, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

The State grant funds will be used to support such Commission activities as manpower planning, water quality and pollution control, criminal justice planning, health planning, determination of regional goals and objectives, technical services to member governments and the coordination of State/federal-assisted programs.

Chairman of the organization of 1974 is E. J. Johnson, Mayor of Nocona. The executive director is Edwin B. Daniel.

Changes Made in Medicare Coverage

In January this year the hospital insurance deductible was increased to \$84 and the co-insurance to \$21 a day according to Henry Chustz, manager of the Vernon social security office.

Some people have become unduly concerned by some recent advertising by private insurance companies that Medicare may not pay most of their hospital bill. He emphasized that Medicare still pays most of the hospital bill for those who have hospital insurance just as it always has.

Hospital insurance is Part A of the social security Medicare program. It pays most of the bill for medically necessary inpatient services provided to Medicare beneficiaries by hospitals which participate in Medicare.

Statistics show that 75 percent of the people 65 and over who are admitted to hospitals have only one hospital stay during a year. About 95

Details Given for 1974 REAP Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture last week announced primary details of a 1974 Rural Environmental Protection measures on American farms and to encourage the development, management, and protection of nonindustrial private forest lands.
In December the Department

announced the initial RECP funding level for calendar 1974 at \$90 million, of which \$10 million was initially earmarked for the forestry incentives effort.
Under long-term agreements, essential practices and practice cost-sharing will be scheduled over a period of 3 to 10 years.
Practices to be offered under the 1974 RECP for annual or long-term agreements, include: establishing permanent vegetative cover, improving permanent vegetative cover, water impoundment reservoirs, constructing terrace systems, diversions and reorganizing irrigation systems.

All are designed to provide enduring protection to soil and water resources. In addition, state and county committees will have the opportunity to develop, with appropriate justification, other practices needed to solve critical local conservation problems.

RC&D Office Will Be Located in Quanah

Offices for a full-time coordinator for the newly approved Four Winds Resource, Conservation and Development Project will be located within the next few weeks in Quanah, it was announced last week by Marvin Daniel of Vernon, Soil Conservation Service area conservationist.

Daniel said a full-time coordinator will be selected from Soil Conservation Service personnel in the state within the near future. John McAlister of the local SCS office has been serving as interim coordinator for the project.

The Four Winds RC&D project is the sixth of its kind approved within Texas to date and the first in this general vicinity. The closest to this area probably is one in the rural areas around Santa Fe, N.M.

Daniel said the project has been approved only for planning and the first step will be to develop a comprehensive plan during the coming year.

Projects will be originated from the local level on the basis of needs which local agencies of government feel will be most beneficial.

Projects could include construction of lakes and recreation facilities, parks, wildlife development, special conservation projects, encouragement of light and medium industry to locate in the area or other programs of

economic development considered by the area to be beneficial.

Included in the Four Winds are Foard, Hardeman, Cottle and Childress counties, with Wilbarger County being considered for membership in the project area.

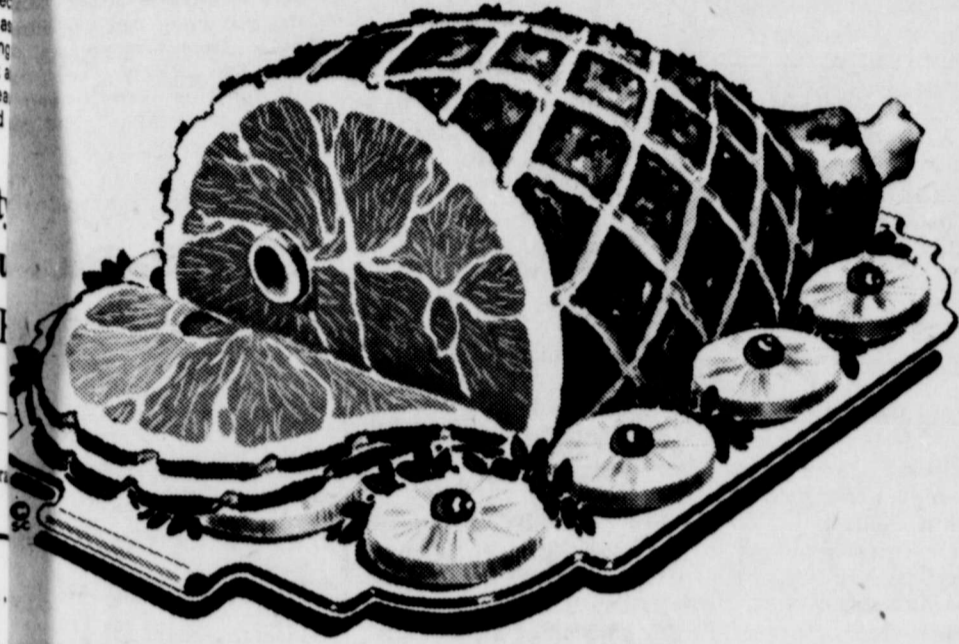
According to Ron Moreau of the park operations staff, all but 12 of the monument's 56 spotlights have been extinguished.

Fred Carpenter Presents Program at Rotary Meeting

Fred Carpenter, a Vernon Rotarian and band director in the Vernon schools, presented a program on railroading at the Wednesday, January 16 meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell.

Mr. Carpenter explained that he is a native of Chicago, Ill., and rode trains and street cars all his life. In recent years, a railroad museum has been established on 60 acres of land near Union, Ill. The museum has 50 active and 1,000 associate members, most of whom were never connected with the railroad business. However, their keen interest in railroads has resulted in the establishment of the museum where electric and steam trains operate during the summer months to the delight of children and adults who ride the street cars and steam trains in the museum.

It is a hobby of Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter and they spend 2 or 3 weeks at the museum each summer where Mr. Carpenter operates either a street car or a steam engine. The station at the museum was built in 1852. He stated that the red street car he sometimes operates required 4,000 man hours of labor by museum members to be redone to its original condition. He added that on some summer Sundays, over 4,000 people ride the cars in the course of the day.

Mr. Carpenter was introduced by Bud McLain.
