Money Still Solicited for Rest Home

The financial response to the request for money for the establishment of a Rest Home in Crowell has been most gratifying, and various individuals are still contributing. Any one who wishes to contribute is asked to send his money to the Crowell State Bank. Robert Kincaid or Jon Lee Black are the treasurers of the drive. It has been impossible to see everyone, for often times the telephone line is busy or the individual is not at home.

Securing lots for the home has been completed. It is planned to put the home on Block 106,

which has 24 lots. The City of Crowell owned 7 lots which had been given by the Kincaid Estate and the late Mr. and Mrs. Russell Beverly. Through the kindness of Mrs. Jack Roberts, the FCDC was enabled to ascertain the previous owners of two lots that had belonged to the Witherspoons, and these were given to the FCDC for a Rest Home. The house and lots of Mrs. Bill Thompson. Four lots were purchased from the Thacker Estate, and it was necessary to condemn 3 lots, the ownership of which could not be traced.

Any money expended was paid by the Crowell State Bank with no interest. Not a penny of commission has been received by any one. All trips, gasoline, stamps, registered mail, telephone calls, and interest have been donated. All money received has been placed in a Rest Home account in the Crowell State Bank.

It is believed that construction will begin on the Rest Home at a near future. An SBA loan is being obtained and the government seems to never get in a hurry.

To each individual who has had a part in making the Rest Home drive a success, the Foard County Development Corporation wishes to express its sincere appreciation.

The cap factory established here last year by John T. Athletic, Inc., of Vernon has been purchased by a group of local investors and production at the local facility began Monday. The plant was closed down shortly before Christmas.

Caps produced locally will be marketed through sales representatives located throughout the U.S.

Places Shape Up as Filing Deadline Passes Last Monday

Two hotly-contested races for commissioner posts in Foard County dominated the political scene for the spring Democratic primaries in Foard County, the deadline for filing for a race on the ballot passed Monday afternoon.

Candidates is that of Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 which has drawn five candidates. C. V. (Jiggs) Barker is seeking another 4-year term in the office and other candidates for the post include Loyd Black, A. L. (Arnold) Cox, R. P. (Shorty) Gidney and John Rader. Warren Everson, candidate

for re-election as Precinct 4 commissioner, is opposed by Glendon (Rusty) Russell and T. D. (Doyle) Sparks.

In the Democratic primary, Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon and Ray Ruffin, Amarillo rancher, are trying for 13th District Congressional seat and the winner will oppose Republican incumbent Bob Price in the general election next fall.

In the 101st District, Rep. W. S. (Bill) Hearty is opposed by L. Max Courtney.

Those on the local level running without opposition are the following incumbents: Leslie Thomas, county judge; Cornelia McDaniel, county and district clerk; Margaret Curtis, county treasurer; and Mrs. Opal Hazelwood, justice of the peace.

Ray Shirley is again a candidate for County Democratic chairman and the following have filed for precinct chairmen: Walter Ramsey, 1; Cecil Carroll, 2; Kenneth Halbert, 3; James Sandlin, 4; H. L. Ayers, Jr., 5; Mrs. Sim V. Gamble, 6; Eldon Whitman, 7; and Mrs. Billie Cleveland, 11.

Those who may be interested in voting in the Democratic primary on May 4th need to register to vote by April 3rd, if they are not already registered.

Total of 7,786 Bales Foard Cotton Ginned

The USDA Cotton Division ginning office at Altus classed samples of Foard County cotton for the week ending February 1, and the season total

for this county is now 7,786 bales, as compared to 4,455 a year ago.

Total class at Altus from North Texas counties this year is 66,900 samples, compared with 44,700 at this date last year.

Grades on North Texas cotton classed during the week were 44 per cent white and 52 per cent light spotted. Predominant grades were 41 with 32 per cent and 42 with 36 per cent.

The honor roll at MU included students who maintained a point average of 3.5 on a system and no grade below a C for 15 semester hours.



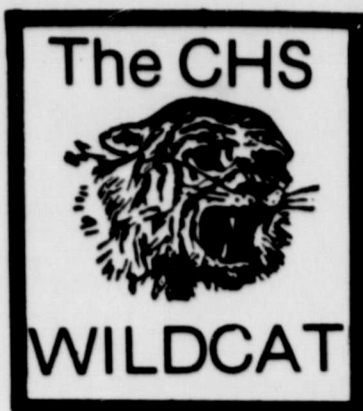

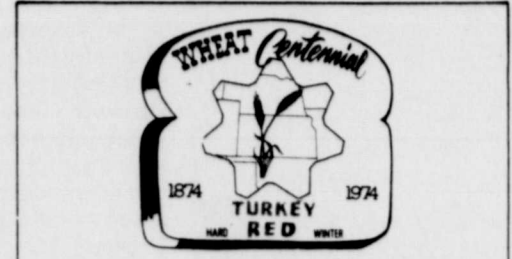
WINTER WHEAT: Most of the 1974 winter wheat crop in the states of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas and New Mexico has received adequate to surplus moisture since the crop was planted last fall; except in the Texas High Plains and adjacent areas of the Texas Low Rolling Plains, in western Oklahoma and in the Oklahoma Panhandle, eastern New Mexico and a small part of southwest Kansas and southeast Colorado, where effective moisture has not been received since before the crop was planted in mid-October.

Adding to the problem of a lack of adequate moisture in this important hard red winter wheat producing area has been a continuing infestation of greenbugs which have caused considerable damage in spite of various control measures. Also at mid-January in much of this moisture deficient area daytime temperatures have been above normal adding to the strain on already stressed wheat plants.

In most of the remainder of the five states moisture supplies have been adequate to surplus, with considerable replanting of acreage following the heavy rains and floods of early to mid-October from north central Oklahoma through much of central and eastern Kansas, resulting in late emergence of the plants, small top and root growth and a

considerable susceptibility to possible winter kill.

In spite of the possible decreased production due to insects and dry weather the hard red winter wheat production in the five states may yet produce almost 90 percent (or about 635 million bushels) of the record crop of 708.5 million bushels harvested in 1973. This record harvest is a fitting climax to 100 years of wheat production started from a few bushels of hard red winter wheat brought to Central Kansas in 1874 by the Mennonite immigrants whose exodus from South Russia was aided by Colonization Agents of the Santa Fe Ry. Co.

Wheat Producers Board Executive Speaks Here

Bill Nelson, Amarillo executive vice president of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, was the speaker at the Wednesday, January 30, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell.

Mr. Nelson told something about the organization of the association which was formed by Texas wheat producers in 1971 to do research, market development and promotion for wheat. The board of directors is composed of wheat producers from over the area, and one of these directors for the first two years of the association was John Cogdell of Crowell. Mr. Nelson said that Mr. Cogdell was instrumental in forming the organization and helped to establish the office and set up the staff. He has recently gone off the board and has been replaced by Winston Wilson of Quanah, who attended the meeting here last week.

Nelson said that 80 per cent of Texas wheat is shipped overseas. He said the reasons are that Texas produces some of the first wheat in the nation each year, and the close proximity to ports makes it desirable for overseas buyers. He said that if bread ever rises to \$1.00 a loaf, it has been estimated that wheat will have to be about \$30 a bushel considering the fact that 4.8 cents worth of wheat goes into a short loaf of bread and 6.9 cents

into a long loaf, at present-day wheat price.

Nelson pointed out that exports of wheat have gradually increased over the past few years. Japan has gone from nearly zero-use of wheat to almost as much as the U.S. consumes. He added that China was the biggest wheat customer the U.S. had last year. Nelson visited Russia last October in the interest of wheat producers and he said he saw some of the best wheat ever in the Ukraine.

Nelson closed with the point that the future of wheat is with the total expanded consumption here and abroad.

Former Crowell Resident Has Busy Retirement

(Editor's Note: The following article appeared recently in an El Paso newspaper and concerns a former Crowell resident, Mrs. Walter D. Guthrie, who was the former Hattie Eldridge of Crowell. We hope you enjoy this fascinating story.)

Often when retirement comes to an active person, he finds that giving up a fulltime occupation can be pretty hazardous to his mental attitude. He must learn to cope with a life that is full of adjustments and adaptations. But fortunately for one El Pasoan, Mrs. Walter D. Guthrie, retirement brought new interests, marriage, and activities that keep her as busy—if not busier than ever before. In May 1970 when she retired from the teaching profession after 40 years, Mrs. Guthrie, then Mrs. Hattie Lamb, had not made any concrete plans as to what she would do in the future.

"I have worked hard all my life and I certainly didn't plan to sit in the rocking chair," she quickly and emphatically stated. "When school was 'out' for me, I decided to do more volunteer work. I picked out several

places to go."

One of these "places" was the Rescue Mission, where she immediately began to devote much of her time and energy to their charitable projects. Too, this was one way she could spend her summer days before she was to take a trip to the Far East in that fall of 1970. But marriage to the mission director, Walter D. Guthrie, on Aug. 28 disrupted her plans.

NOT AS FAR

"I never did get away," she laughed. "The Rescue Mission is as far east as I got. I've been so busy I wonder how I ever had time to work!"

But work, indeed, has been a way of life for Mrs. Guthrie. Born in Plano, Tex., the oldest of three children, she says her father greatly inspired her at an early age to learn and to teach.

"My dad always told me that an education was the only way a poor girl had a chance to rise above humble birth. He saw education as an American heritage, and I grew up feeling that it was a privilege to go to school," she commented, in turning back her thoughts.

Consequently Hattie mustered up enough courage to leave home without any money and then began her college career waiting on tables in the dormitory and by other means during the depression years. She received her bachelor of science degree from Sul Ross State College (now University) and began to teach when she was barely 18 years old. To further her education, she attended summer schools and afternoon and evening classes until she was awarded a masters degree.

CONTINUES TEACHING

From Alpine, the dedicated teacher came to El Paso in 1944 to continue the span of a 40-year teaching career. During the last 11 years of her profession, she became intensely interested in the problems presented by deaf children in the public educational system. Hattie's sympathetic heart and crusading spirit led her to take special training at the University of Southern California and the John Tracy Clinic for deaf children in Los Angeles. Later, she took additional courses in the field of Special Education at Texas Woman's University and New Mexico Western University. These years of training and effort helped her teach the aurally handicapped at Hillside Area School for Deaf Children in El Paso.

Hattie was always interested in little children. But for the deaf, she pursued a never-ending quest for more effective ways of teaching, and felt strongly toward the democratic principle that every child in America deserves an education. Her work involved finger-spelling, lip-reading, and the combination of spelling and talking at the same time. She believes that people should not

feel sorry for the handicapped youngsters.

SENSE OF HUMOR

"The deaf are happy children with a sense of humor," she explains. "They do require a special education that will prepare them to live and compete in a 'hearing' world."

Her devotion to the education of the deaf won Hattie the nomination for Outstanding Career Woman of 1968 by the American Association of University Women. Earlier, in 1964, she had received the title "Teacher of the Year" given to her by the West Texas District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. Honors have come easily and deservedly to this vital, enthusiastic woman who has long served in so many worthwhile activities.

But whether in club work or in civic matters, Hattie Guthrie has a reputation as a hard worker. And during her lengthy period of teaching, she wasn't exactly sitting idly outside the classroom. While president of the Five Points Pilot Club, she established a School Children Shoe Fund for poor children in South El Paso and Ysleta. The seed that was planted was nourished, and the project is still functioning. Other projects were contributing funds for the mentally retarded and collecting clothing for the Rescue Mission.

For years she taught a Sunday School Class for young married couples at Grace Methodist Church. She also was the church treasurer for two years and served twice as a member of the Board of Stewards.

FAVORITE SPEAKER

A renowned world-traveler, Mrs. Guthrie has been a favorite speaker at many groups in and out of El Paso. Through this medium she has shared her experiences in Europe, the Far East, Canada, Hawaii and all the states, and South and Central America. In the summer of 1969, before her last year of teaching, she flew with friends to Spain, Portugal and Morocco for 21 days. (When asked for a comparison of Spanish and Mexican food, she revealed: "It is quite different. In Spain the food is not as hot and they serve more seafood and rice.")

Even in "retirement" the former educator is active in many organizations. For more than 20 years she has been a member of the El Paso Business and Professional Woman's Club and the past district director of District 8, which she represented at the State Fair of Texas in 1966. One of the highlights of this club work was when she attended the International Convention in Stockholm, Sweden, in 1953. She has served on all committees of this

organization. A past president of the XI Chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa, honorary teachers sorority, she is also a member of Kappa Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, the Ysleta and El Paso Woman's Clubs and Retired Teachers Association.

DID HER PART

During World War II, Hattie did her part by working with the USO. In the Korean Conflict, she was active as a Gray Lady. Her educational interests have taken her to many areas of the globe, including Central and South America, Europe and Asia when she was a participant in the National Educational Association tours. Locally, her "helping hand" has extended to the El Paso Heart Association and the March of Dimes. For two years she was secretary for the Sun Chapter of the Council on Exceptional Children of the National Education Association.

The Guthries reside at 431 Lomaland. After their marriage they had to find ways to dispose of some belongings or be a little crowded. Walter, a widower, brought along a few of his own utensils, and now as Hattie puts it, "We have two of everything! You name it—two toasters, two electric skillets, two refrigerators, two washing machines."

AMUSING STORY

Endowed with a delightful sense of humor that has been an asset in her years of teaching as well as her charitable work, Hattie also has this amusing story to tell: "We didn't know each other's birth dates until we went to get the marriage license. Then as we filled out the papers, we learned we were born on the same day of the same month in the same year."

At least five days a week Hattie spends her time at the Rescue Mission. Describing herself as a "permanent volunteer," she sorts and distributes clothing and often plays the piano for the religious services. Other days she may be seen taking people to the hospital or visiting the ill and troubled. She is quite capable of these duties and derives a satisfaction from being able to do for others and working with her husband. In a sense, it is a time of spiritual refreshment for her.

Hattie Guthrie could hardly be portrayed as a "do-nothing, think-nothing" person. She once said, "I believe almost anything is possible if someone will study a problem, learn as much as there is to know about it, and then work hard and patiently to solve it."

Applying her own philosophy to her retirement, Mrs. Guthrie continues to serve, bringing happiness and continuity to her particular pattern of living.

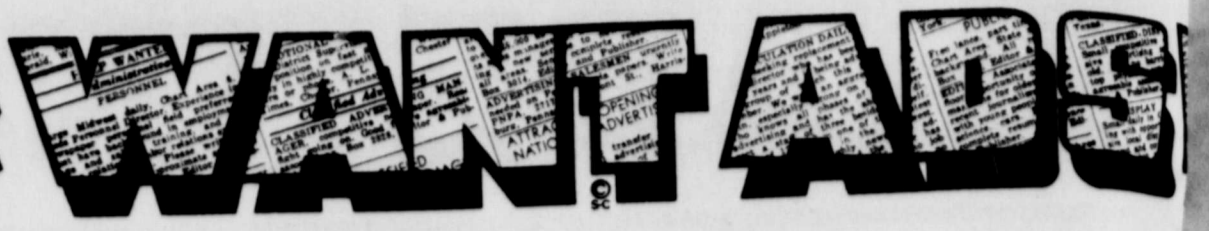

Mrs. Allee said in her diary: "We did not accomplish much in a material way, but we got many spiritual blessings." Methodist women were first organized as the "Ladies Aid Society" and in 1940 the name was changed to Women's Society of Christian Service, and now the name is United Methodist Women.

Twelve members and one visitor attended the meeting and the next meeting is set for March 4 in the home of Mrs. Fern McKown.
