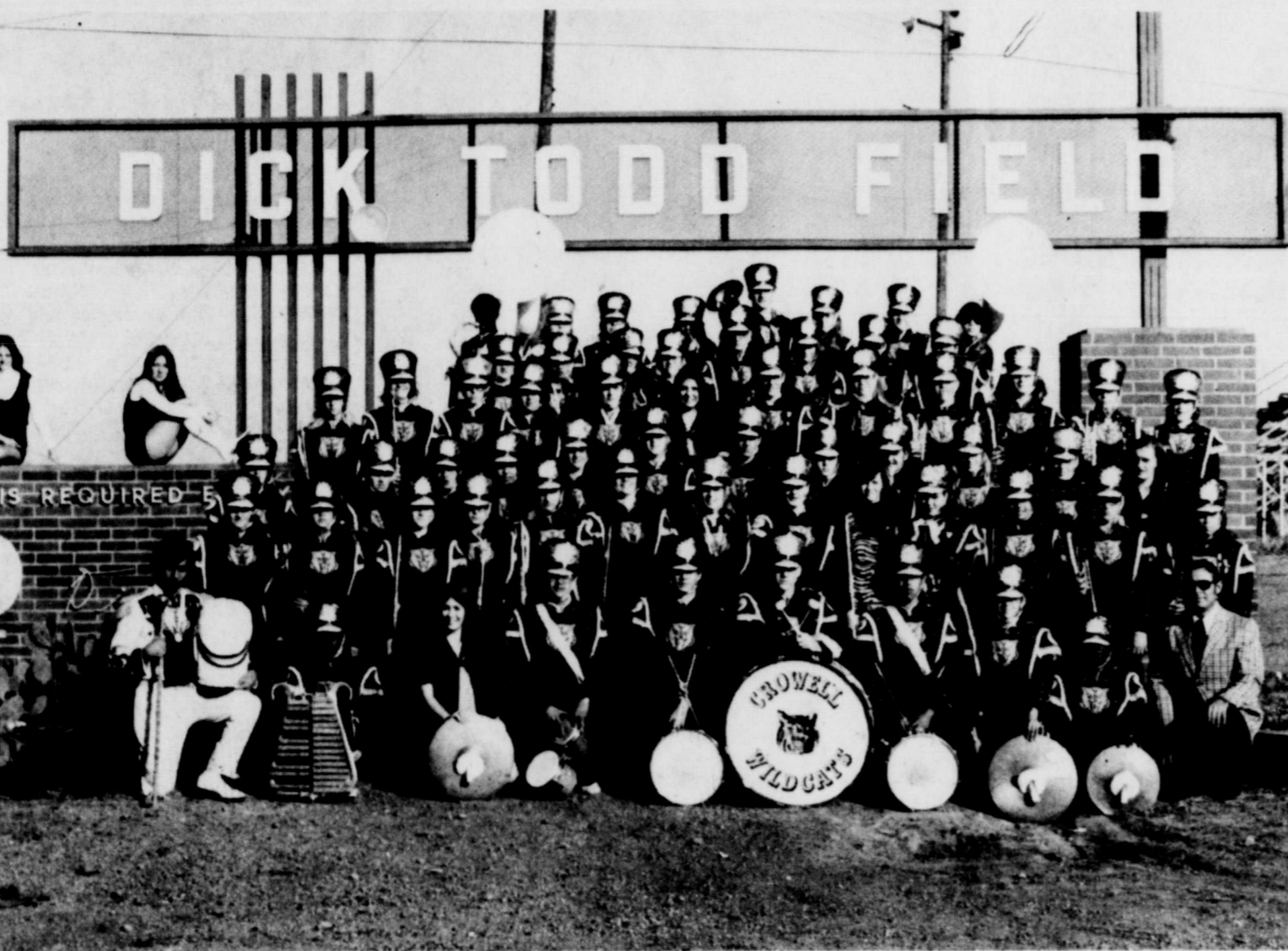

Cecil Driver Enrolled in School at Lubbock

A Crowell groceryman with an intense desire to learn more about the Bible has enrolled in a Lubbock School and is now taking an intensive course on the Bible and Bible-related subjects.

The Crowell man is Cecil Driver who began the two-year course on Monday, February 11. He and Mrs. Driver are living in a mobile home in Lubbock during the week, and return to Crowell for the weekend. He works in the D&T Foodway on Saturday and the couple returns to Lubbock Sunday afternoon.

The school in which Mr. Driver is enrolled is called the "Sunset School of Preaching." There are about forty-six students enrolled, and they come from various parts of the U.S. and the world. Driver said one of the students is from Australia.

Included in the course is New Testament Greek and hermeneutics which is the science of interpretation. Students attend classes six hours a day, five days a week. Additionally, they have about 5 hours of home study each day to keep up with their work.

Classes are held at one of the Churches of Christ in Lubbock. A total of fifteen men are on the faculty. All these men are Church of Christ ministers and all have served as missionaries to foreign lands.

Mr. Driver said last weekend that he became interested in attending the school about three years ago. He has the highest praise for the school and its faculty, and is looking forward to his learning experiences as he becomes more deeply involved in the school.

Foard County to Be Part of MAST Program

The Crowell City Council last week voted to become a member of the MAST program. Standing for Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic, the program is sponsored by the U. S. Military Service to provide helicopter services for use in case of emergency.

An emergency such as moving a severely burned, injured or ill person from Crowell to another hospital or facility where additional treatment or services can be rendered is the purpose of the MAST program. The MAST mission will not be used for a routine transfer of a patient to another hospital.

Sheriff E. E. Howard said this week that the need must be urgent and only he, the local hospital administrator or doctor are authorized to request the MAST service.

This is a service being offered area towns by the military and

in order to accept, the City must provide a suitable landing spot for the helicopter. The City has selected the street on the east side of the court house. This street will be cleared permanently of trucks and trailers, so that it will always be open for use, Sheriff Howard said.

Sheriff Howard says local officials are hopeful the service will never be needed, but if it is used successfully one time in saving a life, it will be well worth the effort involved in becoming a part of the MAST program.

City Council Grants Rate Raise to Gas Co.

Plans are nearing completion for the 37th annual FFA and 4-H Project Show which will be held starting Friday afternoon, March 8, at 2 p. m. and will run all day Saturday, March 9, in the vocational agriculture building at the Crowell school. Dates for the 1974 show were announced by Bill Klepper, president of the Rotary Club of Crowell, the sponsoring organization.

Entries to date indicate that this will be a good show. All entries should be brought in at 2 p. m. Friday, March 8. A veterinarian will inspect each animal and he must issue a health certificate before the animal can be unloaded.

Dr. Dennis R. White, livestock specialist with the Texas A&M extension service will judge all entries in the livestock division of the show. Judging will begin at 8:45 a. m., Saturday, March 9.

Max Shelton of the Grandfield, Ok., Livestock Auction, will do the auctioning of the show animals beginning at 1:30 p. m. Saturday, March 9.

City Council Grants Rate Raise to Gas Co.

An increase in rates for the Texas Natural Gas Co. was approved by the City Council in a meeting last night.

The rate increase, first for January 20, will raise the domestic rate for 1,700 cubic feet of gas less used per month from \$10 to \$12.25. The next 28,300 cubic feet will be raised from .70 thousand cubic feet to \$1.05.

Commercial rate is going up 45 to 65 cents per thousand cubic feet and the industrial rate going from 30 cents to 55 cents per thousand cubic feet. This is an increase of 33 per cent for domestic users, 31 per cent for commercial customers and 45 per cent for industrial use.

In a prepared statement for the City Council, the company explained that the wholesale cost of gas at the well head has increased 5.5 cents per thousand cubic feet recently. The Texas Natural Gas Company has operated in Crowell since 1927, a period of close to 47 years and this is only the second rate increase asked for during that time.

Charles Branch is manager of the local office; Mrs. Clyde Russell is receptionist and bookkeeper. Branch is assisted by Ray Santos in the maintenance department, and the company uses other part-time help during peak periods.

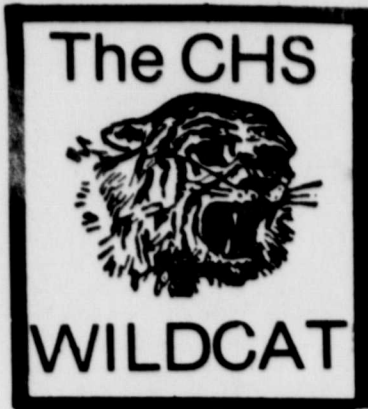

Release, Reapportionment and Transfer of Cotton
May 1, 1974, is the final date to release cotton or request reapportionment of cotton. May 1, 1974, is also the final date for transfer of cotton by sale or lease of allotments. Out of county transfers are not authorized.

Recording Artist to Appear in Crowell

International T.V. and recording artist, Lowell Mason, will be appearing in this community March 7, at 7:30 p.m. at First Christian Church. Minister Bill Posey said this week.

Mr. Mason has been called, The World's Smallest Gospel Singer, because of his unique height of only 46 inches. His voice however, has no comparison to his size. When he sings, his booming, bass voice brings a thrill to everyone that listens.

During the program those attending will hear a variety of songs. The mood can change quickly from a deep spiritual moving hymn like "The Old Rugged Cross," to a rousing, hand clapping gospel favorite like "Daddy Sang Bass."

Lowell Mason began his career at the very early age of only 9 years. At that time he joined the staff of the Children's Bible Hour radio broadcast out

of Grand Rapids, Michigan. For seven years, he was a regular feature on that weekly radio program which was heard from coast to coast.

After completion of high school in 1955, Lowell Mason joined the Cecil Todd Evangelistic Team of Joplin, Missouri. From 1955 through this present time, Todd and Mason have been associated in an organization called "The Christian Evangelizers Association."

The Christian Evangelizers Association produces a weekly television series called "Revival Fires." The Revival Fires TV program is seen on more than 150 television stations throughout the United States, and will soon be viewed in other countries around the world.

Lowell Mason is featured regularly on this program. There is no admission charge.

Alternatives to Nursing Home Care

Alternatives to nursing home or institutional care are being offered by the State Department of Public Welfare to Texas' needy aged, blind and disabled.

The new "adult social services" are designed to help those who don't require full-time nursing care to continue living at home. State Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell says.

The new programs are intended for elderly people, and the blind and disabled, who receive a monthly assistance check from the federal government's Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

"With a little help, many elderly people who otherwise would have to enter nursing homes can live at home or in their own communities," Vowell

said. "All they need is someone to help them do things they can no longer do for themselves, like cooking meals and taking care of the house."

To be offered on a statewide basis as community resources become available, the new programs include homemaker, chore, foster care, day care and other services to adults.

Homemaker services provide someone to perform such personal care as bathing, exercising and giving medication, as well as preparing meals and doing light housework. The service will be provided for a few hours a day or on a 24-hour basis for a temporary period until the person is able to do for himself. A similar program is chore services, which is less personal, and provides a home service aide who can help with such things as cooking, cleaning, doing the laundry, shopping for groceries, minor repairs and yard work.

Day care, a familiar service for children, will become available for adults as well, either in a family day home or at a day center. Family day homes are to provide a place for relative to leave an elderly or disabled person during working hours.

Elderly persons will have another alternative. Foster care services for adults offers 24-hour care in foster family homes which are approved and supervised by the welfare department. They are designed for people who are unable to maintain their own homes, but who do not require regular nursing home care.

The Department of Public Welfare pays for these services and is interested in locating people who are willing to offer their homes for day care or foster care, as well as those who wish to contract with the department to provide chore and homemaker services to adults.

Persons in need of such services or who wish to offer their services should contact the welfare department's Sam White at 817-658-3422 in Knox City.

When aged, blind or disabled SSI recipients are found to be living in hazardous conditions or in situations in which they cannot protect themselves, a DPW social services worker will act to correct those situations through the Protective Services program.

Young men born in 1955 will have their selective service lottery numbers drawn on March 20, even though there is no draft or plans to resume callups for involuntary service. Col. Melvin N. Glantz, state director of selective service, has announced.

Although there is no draft, the selective service is a "stand by" system which continues to register and classify young men. Texas has approximately 110,000 19-year-olds who will have their lottery numbers established by this drawing, Glantz says.

The military selective service act requires all young men to register with the system at the time of their 18th birthday. Locally, young men can register with Ray Shirley in Crowell.

Dear Editor:

May I take this means to present a few remarks regarding the dances which are being held in Thalia? I, for one, am ashamed. Someone has said "silence gives consent." So if we are silent on this matter, then every reader of this paper can only conclude that the Thalia residents applaud and condone these dances. Mostly, this is untrue.

First of all, there aren't many people left in Thalia, but I am convinced, after talking with several, that the majority of those here do not attend the dances, and are totally opposed to their being held here. So far, our wishes have been pointedly ignored, even though the building belongs (in theory) to one as much as another. But really to none of us!

From the hundreds of cars at the dances, it is easily deductible that there are indeed many patrons, and therefore much money taken in. Yet consider these two points (1) A quick survey reveals that most of these cars are from other counties. (2) As far as the observer can tell, practically no repair to the building has taken place in many years, though several dances have been held under the guise of raising funds for building repair!

Inside the building, after each of these affairs is concluded, the sight is appalling—liquor bottles, beer bottles, cartons, boxes, cigarette butts and general filth and debris. One can scarcely believe this took place in Thalia!

It is true, the building is in sad disrepair, and it looks considerably worse after every dance. In actuality, it has been some time since it has been used for showers, receptions, family reunions and such. The facilities at Crowell are usually used for events such as these. So it would seem that Thalia is actually keeping this building primarily for dancing and drinking!

The area law enforcement officers are to be highly commended for their fine cooperation in controlling these affairs to the best of their ability, and we appreciate it deeply. Without them, the situation could only have been worse. We hope that very soon it will be discontinued. Most of us are unwilling to furnish a "night club" for anyone and everyone!

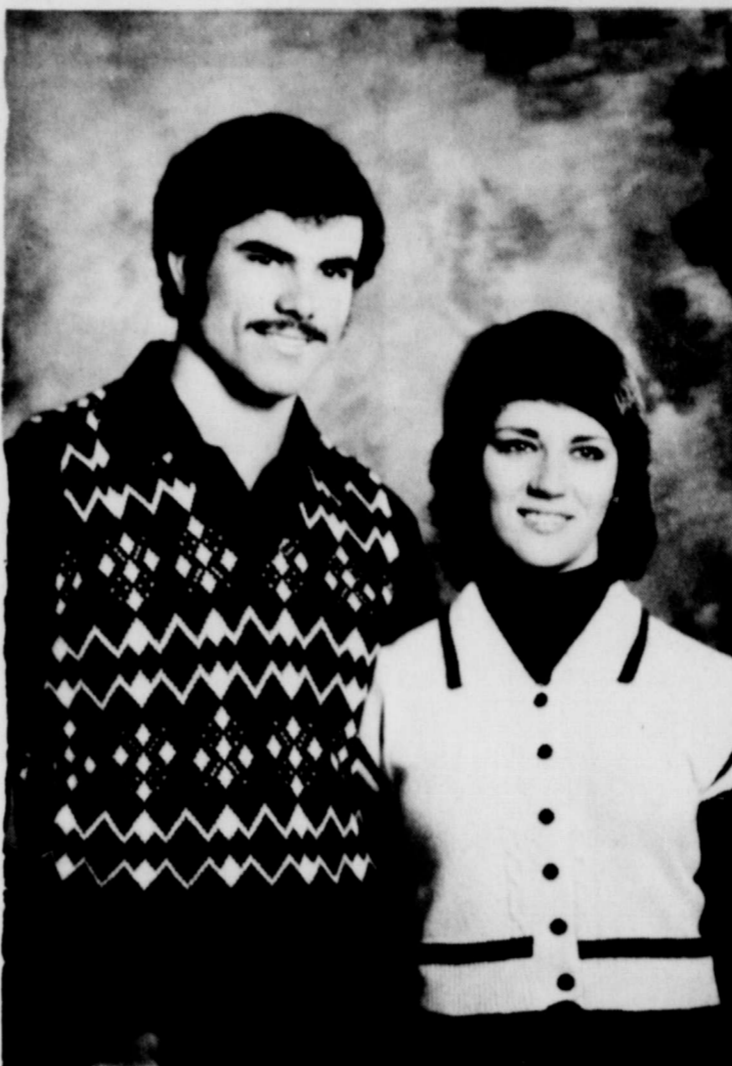

COLUMBIAN CLUB

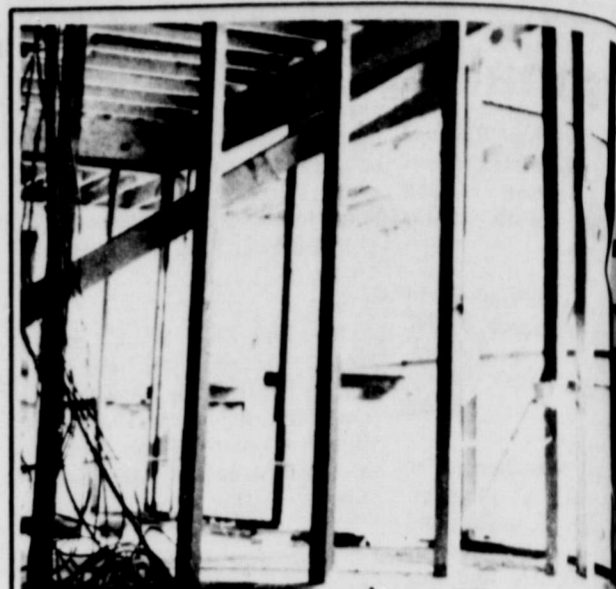
Mrs. Grady Halbert was hostess for the Columbian Club meeting on February 20. "Americanism" was the title of the program.

Completes Waterway

On January 16, 1970, County Judge Leslie Thomas started the construction of waterways on his farm and they were completed on February 20 of that year, according to Woodrow Fielder, of the local Soil Conservation Service.

Fielder says that after the waterways were completed, a good seedbed was worked up for sprigging of coastal bermuda grass. At the last of May, Mr. Thomas had a contractor to sprig the waterways. After the grass was up and growing, the waterways were sprayed with a mixture of fertilizer and herbicides for weed control.

Terracing was done on Dec. 12, 1970. The above picture was made August 2, 1973. Mr.
