Candidates Unopposed in Trustee Election

Two of the three members of the Crowell School Board, whose terms are expiring this year, filed as candidates for re-election before the deadline

passed last Wednesday, and Joe W. Coufal filed as a new candidate. The two seeking re-election are Jeff Bell and Duane Johnson.

Absentee balloting for the election gets underway on March 18 and continues through April 2. The election is set for Saturday, April 6.

Also running for re-election to the county school board are Walter Ramsey, Precinct 1; L. A. Andrews, Precinct 2, and Allison Denton, Precinct 3.

Mr. Andrews is also serving as election judge for the trustee election.

Funeral Services Held at Free Will Baptist Church

George W. Brown, resident of Foard County since 1919, died in the Foard County Hospital Thursday, March 7, following a long illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Brown, 77, were held at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, March 9, at the Free Will Baptist Church conducted by the pastor, Rev. M. L. Crosby.

Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing. Serving as bearers were Jackie Brown, George Brown, Jesse Brown, Jimmy Thompson, Elton Carroll and Billy Ray Dunn.

George Washington Brown was born February 21, 1897, in Eastland County, Texas, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John T. Brown. He married Emma Lucy Wilson in 1913. Mrs. Brown died Nov. 17, 1956. Mr. Brown was a member of the Free Will Baptist Church. He was a retired farmer.

He is survived by one son, Clark Brown of Crowell; one daughter, Mrs. Ellen Bumpass of Hereford; one brother, Jim Brown of Big Spring; one sister, Mrs. Lora B. Hitchcock of Fort Worth; seven grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

Scattered Showers Fall in Foard County

Scattered amounts of rain fell in Foard County Sunday as a cool front pushed through the area. Robert Kincaid said .15 inch fell in Crowell, which is almost as much as received here during the first 2 months of the year.

The west part of the county reported from .7 to over an inch, and southeast of Thalia from .9 to 1 inch was reported. Most of the rest of the county received from none to about what fell here in town.

The county's wheat crop is in desperate need of moisture, as

the county has experienced one of the driest winters of recent years. Also, it has been a much milder winter than last year, when cold temperatures and snow and ice hung on for days.

Girls Track Team Wins Honors at Vernon

The Crowell High School girls track team gave a fine showing at Vernon Friday placing third behind strong Vernon and Paducah teams. Vernon scored 131 points to win the meet. Paducah was next in line with 95 followed by Crowell with 81, Knox City with 69, Holliday 53, and Vernon B with 39.

Placing for the Crowell team were: 440 relay, Crowell, second (Carolyn Sparkman, Teresa Coleman, Kim Norman and Kathy Whitfield) 53.9; Coleman was fifth in the 220 dash; Whitfield was fourth in the 60 yard dash, and in the 80 yard hurdles, Anita Vecera was third.

In the 880 relay, Crowell won second with the same team as in the 440. Coleman took fifth in the shot, Mary Barrera took fifth in the discus, and in the triple jump, Kathy Whitfield and Sparkman took first and second, respectively. Whitfield won second and Sparkman fourth in the broad jump.

The Crowell seventh and

eighth grade girls track team placed second at Vernon Friday behind a much larger Vernon team, scoring 156 points to Vernon's 180. Other team scores were Holliday 69, Knox City 65, Vernon B 33 and Paducah 30 1/2.

The Crowell girls had 7 first place medals to Vernon's 4 and won the 440 relay, 880 relay and mile relay trophies.

Leading the Wildcats in scoring was Beth Graves with 5 gold medals and 35 points. Darlene Tucker had 3 gold medals, a second place and a third place for 29 points. Jan Reeder had 3 gold medals and a third place for 21 points while Eva Neal had 3 gold medals and a fourth place finish for 19 points.

Coach Jerry Don Anderson stated that all the girls on the team gave a good effort and contributed to the success of the team.

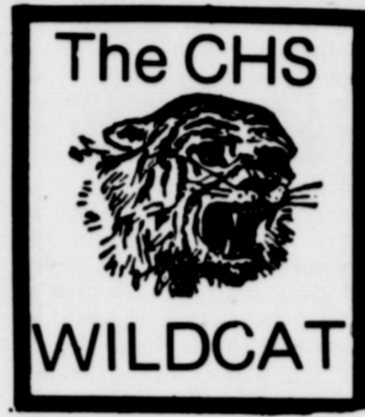

VOTER GUIDELINES

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic primary or a general election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your county tax assessor-collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your county tax assessor-collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the county clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the county clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the county clerk and postmarked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Statewide political candidates are on the campaign trail in earnest, and plenty of action is expected.

The AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education met here this week to choose up sides in the major statewide races.

Both Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances "Sissy" Farenthold began their travels, with Mrs. Farenthold challenging quality of the Governor's leadership and his "accessibility."

Republicans lost a candidate, when former State Sen. Henry Grover of Houston in a surprise move withdrew from the governor's race. He said he could not raise money for a campaign, and "GOP high-ups" don't want to win

anyway."

Main action below the governor's race is expected in the three-way Democratic contest for comptroller.

Bob Bullock of Austin and Hugh Edburg, a former top aide in the comptroller's office, are logging most of the action. Buddy F. Kirk of Houston, another former comptroller's staff member, is also waging an active campaign to succeed retiring Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Treasurer Jesse James has young Houston lawyer Donald B. Ya brought for a Democratic opponent.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White is opposed by Herbert A. (Peanut) Schroeder in the Democratic primary. Railroad Commissioner

Mack Wallace has opposition from C.A. Kelly of San Antonio.

Atty. Gen. John Hill, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong and Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon have no Democratic opponents, but they're doing some campaigning, anyway, in case their Republican challengers get tough in the fall.

FINANCES REVEALED — New required financial reports by state candidates provided some of the more-interesting conversational tidbits at the state capital during the last week.

Governor Briscoe, for example, reported he owns about 332,000 acres of South Texas ranch and farm lands and has vast banking and investment interests, although he did not place a dollar value on his holdings.

Mrs. Farenthold placed her family net worth at \$314,684 assets (including \$200,000 worth of jewels) at \$495,771.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby listed assets of \$3.9 million, and a net worth of \$599,483.

Atty. Gen. John Hill reported assets of \$3.1 million and a net worth in excess of \$2.9 million.

MORE GAS ON WAY — Texas will get 119.7 million gallons more gasoline in March than in February.

The Federal Energy Office said Texas' March supply will be 657.8 million gallons.

Federal Energy Administrator William Simon announced adjustments.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Hill held a state employee cannot be fired merely because she is pregnant.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

The Department of Public Welfare may refuse a client's request for a copy of his complete file only where information is excepted from the open records law and has not been used concurrently in determination of the person's rights.

Whether or not tips are part of the sales price of taxable food and drink depends on whether the employer derives a benefit from their collection.

The Water Development Board need not get a permit from the Antiquities Committee before archeological resources on public lands can be tampered with. But the Board has responsibility to assist the Committee in locating, protecting and preserving such resources. Its funds can be used to study antiquities to be affected by a reservoir, but it may not engage in salvaging operations.

Boards of regents cannot meet in closed sessions to consider granting honorary degrees, unless the honoree is also being considered for appointment or employment.

If a person sells a mobile home that does not meet new code requirements, the Bureau of Labor Statistics can get an injunction and fine the seller. (A variety of other questions on mobile home regulations were answered by Hill).

The comptroller of public accounts has authority to prescribe forms to be used by the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation in obtaining reimbursement for costs of services and supplies furnished by its central services facilities.

SPEEDERS BEWARE — Department of Public Safety troopers have been instructed to intensify enforcement of speed laws.

DPS Chief Wilson E. Speir ordered the effort after receiving many complaints drivers are refusing to obey the 55 miles per hour speed limit.

Speir said drivers are frightened by speeders and "tail-gaters." He noted excessive speed is involved in most fatal accidents.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Briscoe reappointed Tom Gordon of Abilene to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

He also announced these appointments: L. G. Moore of Deer Park to the Texas Amusement Machine Commission; Houston Mayor Fred Hoffenz to the Advisory Council on Community Affairs; Doyle Harrell of Fort Worth to the State Board of Pharmacy and J. Kenneth S. Arthur of Dallas to the Texas State Board of Public Accountability.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. is the Texas delegate member of the Council of State Governments Governing Board. Lt. Gov. William P. Hobby will take over the position after Daniel's term expires in January, 1975.

Col. Delmer Nichols of Taylor, Col. George Harper of Houston and Col. B. J. Flores of San Antonio were commissioned brigadier generals in the Texas National Guard.

Billy R. Cowan of Austin was selected chairman of the 35,000-member Texas Joint Railway Labor Legislative Board.

CONVENTION LIVENS — After a dreary, extended wrangle over educational provisions, the Constitutional Convention finally agreed on the school-college article and went on to pound out promptly voter qualifications and elections provisions.

Delegates agreed to restore voting privileges automatically to ex-prisoners. They voted to leave it up to the legislature whether to scrap the ancient requirement of signing paper ballot stubs.

Another controversial provision passed would require voters in bond elections affecting property taxes to be property owners.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has recommended to the West Texas Congressional Delegation that they work for necessary amendments to the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) of 1970 that would produce changes to make the provisions of the act workable and make it possible for the average business to comply with the provisions.

WTCC believes that changes should be made in some of the provisions to produce changes in standard settings, compliance inspections, citations, review and appeal procedures, and on-site consultation that will result in a fair and workable act

for all concerned.

Joe Collins of San Antonio, Chairman of WTCC's Affairs Committee, said "the administering agency's their zealously have overstepped the bounds of reasonableness in standards, or implementation and other procedures. The very real problems faced by employers complying with this highly complex law are largely ignored by the responsible for the administration of OSHA. There is a critical need to find sound and reasonable corrective measures without sacrificing safety."

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taber, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the place at Sherman, Texas, before midnight on the day of the election.

Any person qualified to engage in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, slaughter for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants, sharecroppers, if such would be required to pay assessment proposed.

Any person qualified at the referendum may obtain his name in nomination membership on the commodity producers board application to the organization signed by at least ten other eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974, obtain one at his local Agent's Office.

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College Lobby's Treasury Raid

The following editorial was taken from the Thursday, March 7, issue of The Austin American Statesman and was sent to the News by Rep. W. S. Heatly.

Those naked students racing across campus in the latest and dizziest collegiate fad called "streaking" could be a symbol of the Texas taxpayer of the future if the college lobbyists manage to nail down an open-ended, unaudited raid on the state's assets as they apparently are on the verge of doing in the constitutional revision effort.

Already, Texans are putting up \$500 million a year for higher education, not counting the millions additional in state bond issues to build more, costlier facilities for the institutions.

Unless somebody applies brakes and steering wheel to education spending, Texas is heading for an income tax even faster than anybody had thought.

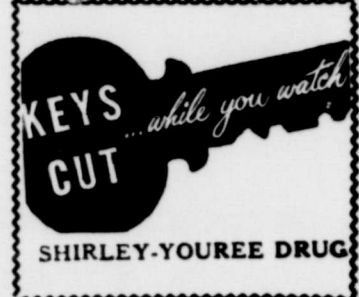
When this prospect sinks in, the chances of a constitutional revision with all the sugar and plums stuck into it by the college and university money-

grabbers should go down the drain.

The brawling over this sugar plum tree during the last two weeks in the Constitutional Revision Convention was notable for a lack of discussion about the sources for all this extra money.

It would be a tragedy if the over-reaching greed of the institutions produced public revulsion against higher education. But that is exactly what is in danger of happening unless reason, prudence and strict management of public funds continue to the rescue.

On the basis of the last two weeks in Austin, the rescue probability seems dim if not out of the question.

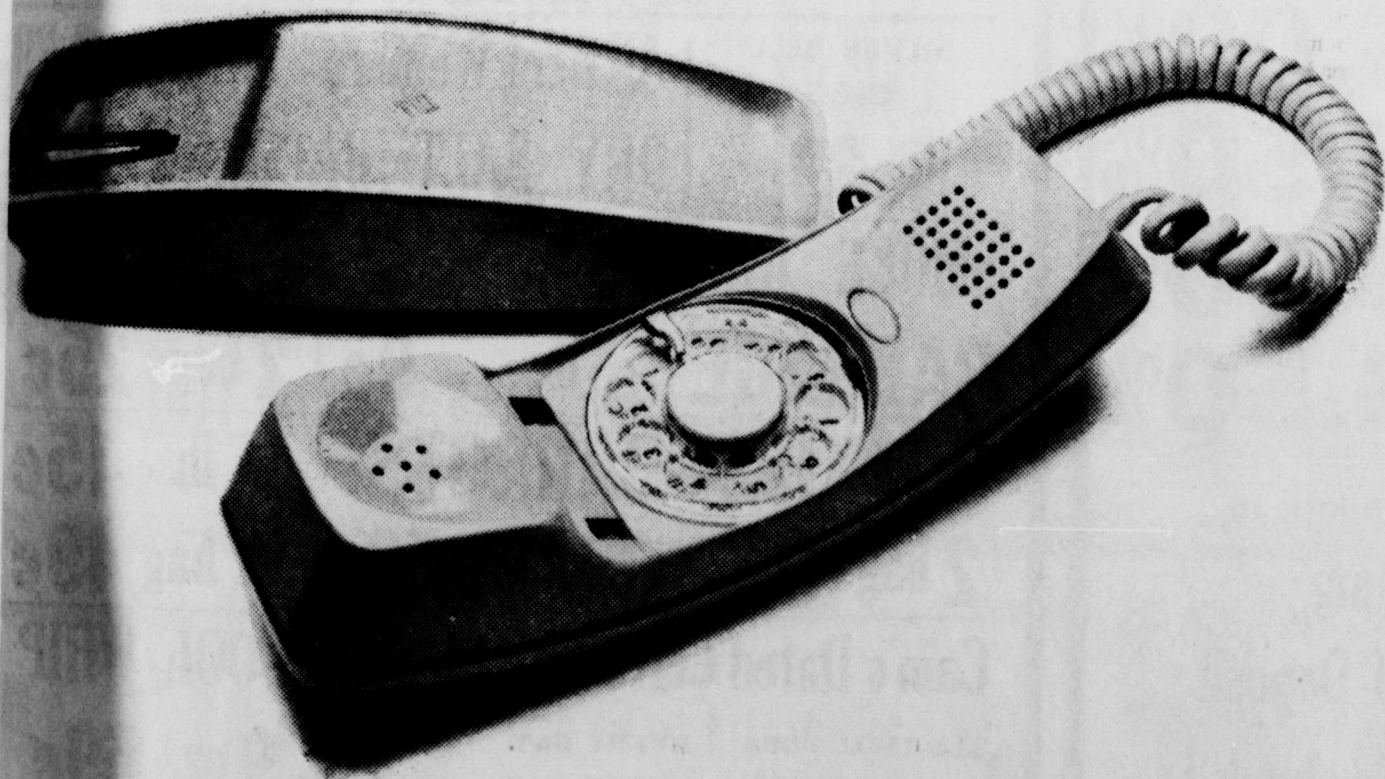

Mrs. Eva Sloan Is Speaker at WSL

"Japan and West Germany are very progressive countries," Mrs. Eva Sloan noted in highlighting her seven-week tour of Europe last summer to members of the Women's Service League, Thursday. It was apparent that workers in both countries were proud of their skills and eager to compete with the world. Representatives of the two nations were found throughout the 23,000 mile tour making further business connections.

Mrs. Sloan said that Paris had the poorest driving record with the highest fatalities in the world. The French can not understand why the Americans build speedy, powerful vehicles and then have a speed limit. The people there drive small cars with the accelerator usually to the floor and park any place they can find including the sidewalks.

The American dollar was certainly deflated at the time the guest speaker was making her tour. Some countries were more liberal than others but the exchanged rate was something like \$7.00-8.00 to the U.S. \$10. Visiting East Germany via bus, Mrs. Sloan learned that the residents weren't allowed to come out until they were 65 while the West Germans could, one month a year. No phone calls were permitted across the

wall which bore many crosses where persons had tried to escape and had been killed.

Denmark was the favorite country of the speaker. She emphasized that citizens enjoyed equal taxation and social security from cradle to the grave. She found Belgium to be a spotless country.

Older European women never wear pants and only some of the younger ones do. Their guide encouraged the tourists to dress for dinner. The meals—usually served by men—had many courses and were ordinarily delicious.

Mrs. Sloan found that the U.S.S.R. rated first in world power with the United States second. The U.S. manufactures 33% of the automobiles. The recent European visitor displayed a number of her purchases while abroad.

First class mail for delivery on rural routes will be 3 cents for each ounce or fraction of an ounce, when the increased postage rates go into effect on Sunday, March 26, it was announced this week by Postmaster Alva Spencer.
