Thursday, April 18, is a red letter day for Foard and Hardeman Counties as dedication ceremonies are held this afternoon for the new Copper Breaks State Park, which is located 8 miles north of Crowell and 12 miles south of Quanah on Highway 283.

Governor Dolph Briscoe will be on hand to dedicate the park in ceremonies planned to begin at 2:30 p. m. at a special grandstand erected in the Hackberry Grove area of the park.

The Quanah Chamber of Commerce and the Foard County Development Corporation are co-sponsoring the event which will officially open the newly-completed 1,933-acre recreational state park.

Bands from Crowell and Quanah High Schools are expected to be on hand to greet the governor, and a number of riding clubs are expected to attend.

The Crowell Riding Club will not be able to participate as that is the day the local riders leave on a ride to the Paducah rodeo.

Everyone in this area is urged to visit the park for this dedication ceremony and also to look over the new facility which through the coming years will be of great benefit to the two counties.

## One-Car Accident Is Reported

## Registration Starts for Girls Little Dribblers

Registration got underway this week for the second season of girls Little Dribblers basketball in Crowell.

Roy Whitley, general chairman of the Little Dribbler

basketball program in Crowell, said Monday that girls in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades are eligible to participate; however, they must still be 12 years of age on Sept. 1, 1974 in order to be eligible.

Whitley said there will probably be four teams fielded this year, and for the first time, the girls will be playing under boys rules. High school girls have volunteered as coaches and he said he has plenty of coaches lined up for the teams.

Tentative starting date for the 10-game season is Monday, April 22, with games scheduled to start at 7 and 8 p. m. on Monday and Thursday nights.

Last year, which was the first for girls LD here, the local all-stars participated in a regional tournament at Slaton. Plans are for an all-star team to be selected this year to participate again in post-season play.

A treasurer's report revealed that the organization has a total of \$1,333.95, part of which will be used to finance a trip for the band to a band contest in Amarillo the week end of April 25-27. Two buses and two pickups will be used for the trip and the following sponsors will be going, in addition to Band Director and Mrs. James Streit: Mrs. Paul Bullion, Mr. and Mrs. Rusty Russell, Mr. and Mrs. George Scott, Mrs. Ward Kuehn and Baxter Gentry. Mr. Streit said about 65 band students will make the trip.

Mr. Streit explained to the group about the availability of some Title III federal matching funds which provided \$310, matched by the same amount of band booster money, whereby a tenor saxophone, cymbals and a training film for drum majors were purchased.

This was the last meeting of the band boosters until the fall season.

## 80,000 Bushel Wheat Crop Recast by Elevator Man

Ray Brown, farmer and elevator operator, last week predicted that the county would average 8 bushels per acre and make a crop totaling some 650,000 bushels. Brown said he based his estimate on some rain falling soon. (Incidentally, Brown made his talk at the Wednesday, April 10, meeting of the Rotary Club, and the county received a good rain that night.)

This wheat prediction talk by Brown is an annual event for the Rotary Club and in his talk last week, Brown noted that 1974 is the centennial year of hard red winter wheat in the U. S. The first hard red winter wheat was brought to Holstead, Kansas, from the Crimea in Southern Russia in 1874. He added that archaeologists have found wheat seeds in ancient tombs which are known to be 6,700 years old. He said that there are over 30,000 varieties of wheat in the world and over 200 different varieties are grown in the U. S. The USDA has a sample collection of 15,000 of the world's varieties. He added that wheat is being harvested

somewhere in the world in every month of the year.

In commenting on the price of wheat, he said that on February 25, 1974, wheat reached an all-time high of \$5.85 per bushel, and it has dropped to \$3.75 as of last week.

Nationally, Brown said the USDA is predicting a 2 billion bushel crop. About 1 billion bushels will be exported during 1974-75 season and about 750 million bushels will be consumed in the U. S.

Brown predicted that the first wheat will be brought in about May 20 with harvest going pretty good by May 25. He forecasts a long drawn-out harvest as the wheat is in various stages of development, and will be ripening over an extended period. With the stalk so short this year, he said combines will have a difficult time harvesting the wheat and there will be considerable waste in the harvest operation.

Old timers in West Texas have long predicted that if the wind blows out of the south long enough, it will "blow up a rain."

Well, it took many days of wind, but the saying proved true last Wednesday night and early Thursday as a front moved through following days of high winds and dust and brought some moisture to the area.

The official measurement here in Crowell was .78 inch. Other sections reported from one-half to over an inch. The local rain was accompanied by a considerable amount of small hail.

This moisture was more than the total of .6 inch which had been received here during the past four months.

### Houston Adkins Attends Oil Marketers Convention

Houston Adkins of the Phillips Petroleum Company in Crowell has returned home after attending the 25th anniversary convention of the Texas Oil Marketers' Association in San Antonio April 7-9.

He reported that the energy

crisis and the resulting problems to gasoline and fuel distributors attracted a record-breaking attendance of nearly 1,500 wholesalers of petroleum products.

A Phillips Petroleum Company spokesman, Charles Kit-

trell of Bartlesville, Ok., executive vice president, told the convention delegates that even with the lifting of the Arab embargo, little relief from the gasoline shortage could be expected, even by mid-summer. Even under the best of conditions "including continued conservation efforts by the public," a shortage of between three to five per cent will exist.

Tommy Munro of Biloxi, Miss., president of the National Oil Jobbers Council, also explained that an unleaded gasoline program, advocated in Washington to go into effect July 1, will cut into the production of premium and regular gasoline by at least four and two per cent, respectively.

Bill Quortrup of Carrollton, association president, called for an all-out cooperative effort involving all oil industry people and governmental units to assure an "impartial distribution of petroleum products to consumers." "We already have wide price variations, unfair allocations, and more than enough regulations, and we don't need new energy legislation (now being considered in Washington) or an unleaded gasoline program."

The convention delegates also heard talks on how extra petroleum products can be obtained for areas in Texas facing emergencies, especially those in the farm and ranch belts; environmental regulations; and the allocation and the price regulation enforcement program.

Mr. Adkins was accompanied to the San Antonio convention by his wife, and also his sister, Mrs. Mary Matthews of Wichita Falls.

### VP Ford to Visit in Wichita Falls April 27

Vice President Gerald Ford will provide time, in addition to a scheduled luncheon, for "shaking hands" and a press conference during his visit to Wichita Falls on Saturday, April 27, in behalf of U.S. Rep. Bob

Price's candidacy for re-election to the 13th Congressional District.

Scheduled to arrive in Wichita Falls at 11 a.m., the busy program set up for the Vice President and Congressman has been confirmed, Mrs. Jacque Allen, general arrangements chairman, has announced.

The Wichita Falls visit by the United States Vice President will make his first to Texas since he assumed the duties of that high office on Dec. 6, 1973. The first man to take the vice presidential oath under the 25th constitutional amendment, he has become a significant figure in the political history of this nation. Republican leaders have emphasized.

### Texas A&M Muster Set for Sun., April 21st

Texas A&M tradition will be carried on as it has since 1903 with the annual muster of former students from the Greenbelt area at the Ramada Inn in Vernon at 1 p. m., Sunday, April 21.

Purpose of the muster is for surviving former students of Texas A&M to meet the same date each year in honor of those who are absent. The names of the honored who have passed away during the past year are called from a muster roll and a friend of the deceased answers "here."

More than 350 musters will be held around the world on San Jacinto Day wherever former students live or work. Even during wars, the Aggies have mustered in foxholes on the battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals.

The Greenbelt A&M Club is composed of former students from Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties with Martin Raabe Sr. of Vernon as president. Muster chairman for this year is Joe Wilson of Vernon.

Following a buffet dinner, a program on "A&M Today" will be given, followed by the traditional muster program.

## Hints for Homemaker

Are you thinking of buying a new sewing machine? Be an informed consumer and comparison-shop just as you would for any major appliance.

Before shopping for a sewing machine, decide whether you want a cabinet or portable model. Consider your needs as well as your pocketbook. A sewing machine may have straight-stitch, zigzag stitch, or

a combination of zigzag and utility or decorative stitches. Buy a machine that has features you will use.

When checking a machine, notice if it runs smoothly and quietly and is free from vibrations at all speeds. Does it have a choice of speeds? Does it operate as well at a slow speed as fast? Will it stop and start quickly?

Test the stitching on fabric swatches. Two strips of fabric, cut equal lengths and seamed, should be the same length after stitching. Stitches should be balanced and not drawn to one side.

Try threading the machine and winding a bobbin. It should be easy to do with accessible threading guides. The bobbin case should be easily removed and replaced. Are all the parts accessible for cleaning and oiling? Is the light situated where it throws light on the work surface?

The instruction manual should have precise instructions and clear illustrations on threading, cleaning, and regulating the machine.

After comparing machines and making your choice, read the fine print of your contract. Your sewing machine is a longtime investment—make a wise choice.

## CONGRESSMAN AND MRS. BOB PRICE VISIT IN COUNTY

Congressman Bob Price Tuesday stressed the need for future water supplies for Northwest Texas as he and his wife, Marty, toured throughout the 13th District during the week-long Congressional Easter recess.

Price brought news of continued OEO funding, during May and June for the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties, headquartered here in Crowell; and stressed his continuing support for the important King-Cottle Water Supply Corporation activities to supply a new water system for rural families in Foard, King and Cottle Counties.

Price also lauded the Four Winds program providing technical and financial assistance through the Soil Conservation Service now that the proposal, including portions of Childress, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman counties, has been approved.

The Congressman congratulated local citizens for cooperative inter-county action to look primarily to their own needs and call on the federal government to grant "needed assistance instead of a hand-out."

"Important future water supplies for municipal, industrial and agricultural use can come through quality improvements in the Red River and its tributaries, and through water importation proposals," Price said, noting his support in the Congress for both methods.

Price said "What we need now, is to form some cooperative ties of communication between Texas members of Congress and the Governor's Task Force on Water so that we can complement each other's action. I hope the task force will meet soon with myself and other Congressmen from Texas to work on this vital issue."

Regarding the Red River Chloride Control project, Price said, "I have just received information from the Corps of Engineers that they are capable of proceeding in fiscal year 1975 on \$900,000 worth of construction on the project.

"This includes work on Site Area VIII on the South Fork of Wichita River in King County. A brine collection pond there will help to improve the water

quality downstream and throughout the area east to Wichita Falls.

"THE IMMEDIATE problem is that the current federal budget does not include funds for this project," Price said. "I will be urging the appropriations committee next week to include the full Corps capability figure in this fiscal 1975 budget."

Price appeared in Crowell at a non-partisan, open-to-the-public "town hall" meeting beginning at 4 p. m. Tuesday in the old community center.

When questioned about the fuel crisis, Price said, "It may be a blessing in disguise for the cotton industry. We almost became a synthetic world. The opening of two new cotton mills on the Plains is forthcoming. They will be using the short staple cotton in the manufacture of denim, one of the hottest items on the clothing market today."

# Plainview Woman Is Candidate for Senator



A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state Republican Party circles for many years has announced her candidacy for nomination as the Republican candidate for state senator from the 30th Senatorial District in the May primary.

Mrs. Mary Virginia Kirchhoff, who presently serves the 30th District as state committee-woman for the GOP, made the announcement in her hometown of Plainview.

Having lived in Texas 40 years, Mrs. Kirchhoff is a native of Missouri and a graduate of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, and has attended Wayland Baptist College and Texas Tech University. Mrs. Kirchhoff is an instructor in Speech and English at Coronado Junior High School in Plainview. She will take a leave of absence to campaign for the state post.

Discussing her candidacy on the Republican ticket, the 47-year-old Mrs. Kirchhoff said, "I don't believe party lines really make any difference if the candidate is someone the people can trust, who has their confidence, who is interested in

our area, and who will speak out for us in Austin." The first woman elected to serve on the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, she organized and served as chairman of the Woman's Activities Committee of the WTCC, which covers 132 counties in the western half of Texas.

Mrs. Kirchhoff also assisted in organizing the West Texas "Small Towns task force" for the WTCC. Her instructional material is used on the local, state and National level.

Active in District Girl Scout Work, the Plainview Junior Service League and a life member of the Parent-Teacher Association, Mrs. Kirchhoff also has served as president of the Plainview Classroom Teachers' Association and was elected teacher of the year for Coronado in 1972. She has served the District and State in many capacities, including advisory to the Constitutional Revision Committee.

An active member of Plainview's First Christian Church, she was among the first woman to serve on the board of directors in 1953, and at various times also served as a deaconess, choir director, president of the Christian Women's Fellowship, and youth director.

A steady worker for the GOP since the early 1960's, Mrs. Kirchhoff has been a delegate to the state convention six times since 1964, attended the 1964 national convention as an official guest, and served as a delegate to both the national and state Federation of Republican Women since 1971.

She also has served as campaign chairman for numerous GOP candidates, and her daughter, Karen, seems to be following in her footsteps. Karen, a sophomore at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, served as a page representing Texas in the 1971 National Federation meeting in Washington, D.C.

Her husband, John, is a farmer, stockman and investor and her son, John E., is also a farmer and stockman.

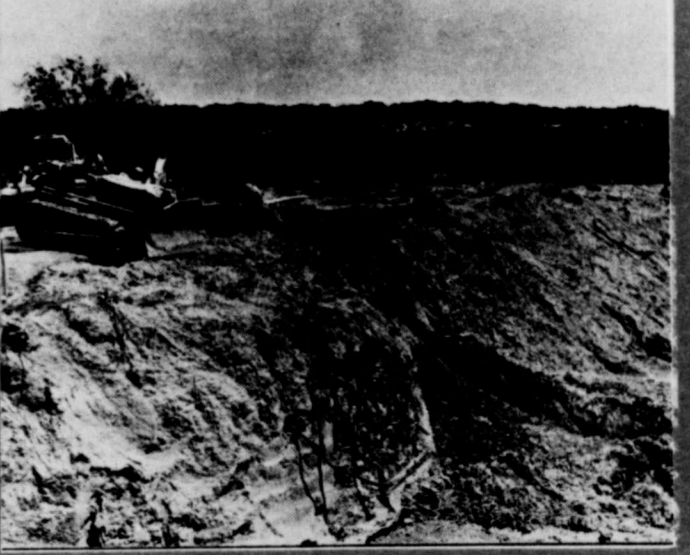
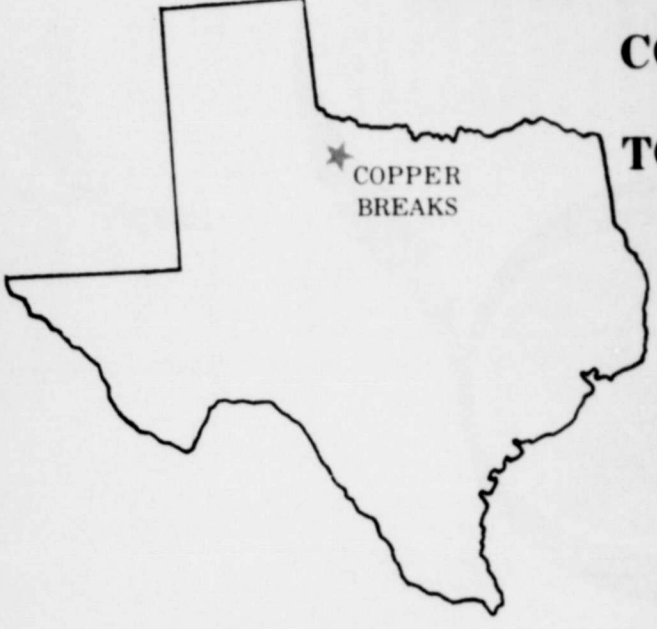
