## CHS Band Winner of Sweepstakes Award

I'm sure you are" was one of the comments of judges who last week awarded the Crowell High School Band Division I ratings in sight reading and concert playing at the UIL contest in Vernon Regional Junior College Wednesday of last week.

The Division I rating in sight reading and concert, together with the I rating received by the band in marching last fall, gives the Wildcat band a I rating in three divisions and for the second time in the history of the school a sweepstakes trophy. It was in 1972 that the band won its other sweepstakes award, and James Strelt was director of the band both years.

Holiday was the only other class A band in the area to win sweepstakes. Munday had a II and II. Paducah II and II. Knox City I and III, and Archer City III and III.

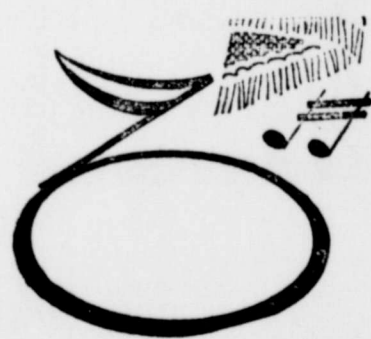

**Hints for Homemaker**

How many times a week do you use commercially frozen foods? Convenience, value, and diversity in meals are provided by frozen foods. Commercially produced frozen food includes a variety ranging from hors d'oeuvres to desserts. Those sold in greatest volume include orange juice concentrate, peas,

strawberries, French-fried potatoes, pot pies, lima beans and dessert pies.

Consumers face difficulties in determining the quality of frozen foods they buy. The fact that a package of frozen food is cold and hard is no indication that high quality has been maintained. When buying frozen food consider the following suggestions. Know the brand, know the store, and know your own responsibility for quality. All the results of good care in preparation, processing and handling of frozen foods can be lost through careless handling and storage after the product is bought. Select frozen foods just before going to the checkout stand. Take frozen food home as soon as possible and place in the freezer.

For best quality, frozen food should be kept frozen until time for use. Under certain conditions frozen foods that have been thawed may be refrozen safely. If food has thawed partially—due to being left in the refrigerator instead of the freezer overnight, temporary power failure, or having thawed while being brought home from the store—it may be refrozen safely if it still feels cold and contains ice crystals and you know it has been thawed for only a brief time.

Frozen foods differ greatly in their reaction to fluctuations in temperature. When frozen vegetables are subjected to temperatures above zero degrees F., they show quality loss through color changes and loss of flavor. In frozen poultry, loss of flavor doubles for each rise of ten degrees in temperature. Other types of frozen foods—baked goods, prepared meats, and fish—lose quality when subjected to temperature above zero. While the storage life of different products varies, it can be stated generally that for each rise of ten in temperature the storage life is cut in half.
