Direct Distance Dialing Coming Here

Telephone equipment that provides direct distance dialing for General Telephone customers in Crowell is nearing completion according to G. F. Kehoe, district manager. Kehoe stated the direct distance dialing equipment has been installed and is being tested for accuracy.

Kehoe said all customers in Crowell will be required to give their number to the operator when they dial long distance calls. These customers, Kehoe said, should dial 1 plus (the area code if different from their own) and the number being called.

When the operator requests your number on a 1 plus call, this does not make it an "operator handled" call which is more costly than a station to station call, according to Kehoe.

Crowell Residents "Shine" at FFA Events at Stephenville

STEPHENVILLE—A brown-haired senior beauty from Crowell High School, Sandra Whitfield, was chosen first runner-up in the Area IV Future Farmers of America Banquet at Tarleton State University Friday night.

Sandy had already won the Wichita District Sweetheart competition earlier to earn the opportunity to represent that district against four other big districts submitting sweethearts to the Area meeting.

The other districts Sandy had to compete against at the banquet included Abilene District, Cross Timber, Oil Belt, and Coleman districts.

The beauties were all there—the best of each district

and as the contestants were narrowed down to the two finalists, the choice was even tougher for the delegates as Sandy along with Debbie White, a Gustine High School senior, had the majority of the votes.

The vote was just as close and Debbie, 18, was happy to say the least, to find she was selected to represent Area IV as its FFA Sweetheart which means she will go to the Texas FFA Convention July 12-14 in San Antonio.

"I just can't wait," Debbie said of the state convention.

But all of Sandy's Crowell friends and supporters from the large Wichita District could not have been prouder of her—particularly the group from

Crowell. After all, it was the first time ever for a Crowell FFA Sweetheart to win district and go onto first runner-up at Area IV competition.

Making the trip with Sandy was Marvin L. Myers, veteran agriculture instructor at Crowell High School and Bob Burkett, her escort.

Miss Whitfield's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Whitfield, and her sisters, Kathy and Betty Linda made the journey to the TSU campus also.

Floyd Borchardt put Crowell in the top of the competition again as he accepted his award for placing fourth in the Area IV public speaking contests. Floyd, a busy student at CHS, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd (Butch) Borchardt of Crowell.

It's hard work to become a Chapter Farmer within one's high school chapter and to win district even harder—but to be named the Area IV candidate for Star Chapter Farmer to go to state meet means a fella kept some superb record books, did some hard work, and has the personality his fellow FFA'ers from the five districts felt will best represent them at state.

It was a Petrolia High School sophomore, Kenny Browning to take the vote from the delegation for this Area IV Star Chapter Farmer candidate and it was a former Crowell student, Joe Ray Burkett, who was Browning's agriculture teacher and advisor. Burkett, a 1968 graduate of CHS and a 1972 graduate of Texas A&M University, accompanied his student to TSU. Joe Ray's old stomping grounds before he had transferred to A&M.

Joe Ray, is the son of Foard County agent, Joe Burkett, and Mrs. Burkett.

"I'm very proud of him," Joe Ray said of his student. "And with two more years to go in High School—I feel this is only the start of his accomplishments in FFA."

Thus, it was a big night for Crowell representation—and it wasn't over.

When the report was in from the Committee's selection for the News Media Individual Reporter Award, which covered radio, television and newspaper reporters of FFA events in Area IV, J. T. (Jim Tom) Smith, Abilene Reporter-News farm editor received the award.

Smith, a 1969 graduate of Crowell High School and a 1973 graduate of A&M University is a former schoolmate with Burkett at A&M. He received his degree in agricultural journalism from the University. A night earlier, Smith was made Honorary Chapter Farmer during the Annual Abilene High School FFA banquet and had gone to the TSU Area IV banquet as the news media representative from the Abilene District's nomination. Smith covers farm news in 23 Big Country counties.

Also, at the Abilene High School FFA banquet on Thursday night, Bill Graves, Abilene High School principal, received the Honorary Chapter Farmer Degree for faculty members given each year. Bill who also remembers Crowell as home and graduated from CHS is the son of former CHS superintendent and football coach, Grady Graves now of Stephenville. Bill Scott, long time agriculture teacher at Abilene High, Wendell Decker, also an AHS agriculture teacher, and Grady McNutt, AHS FFA president, presented the awards.

Of the news media award at Stephenville, Smith said: "It means a lot to me because it comes from the young people I
