Crowell Wildcats Host Quanah Indians in Football Opener

The Crowell Wildcats will open the 1974 football season at Dick Todd Field Friday night at 8 when they host the Quanah Indians. Regardless of the pre-season ratings of either of these teams, they always provide one of the best games of the season, and another fine contest is in prospect this year.

Coach Printiss Gidney says

the Wildcats will "have their hands full" as they battle the AA Indians.

In announcing his probable starters, Coach Gidney said Randy Prince will be the starting quarterback. Others in the backfield are expected to be Allen Tapp at fullback, David Bell, left half, and either Don Sparkman or Chavelo Ranjel at

right half. The offensive line has Nathan Frater at right end, Rocky Glasscock at right tackle, Ricky Hammonds at right guard, Richard Naylor at center, Hal Williams left guard, Melvin Westover left tackle and Ernie Myers left end.

Among the defensive starters will be Keith McDaniel, Norman Hopper, William Bachman and Rudy Rodriguez.

There are 23 boys on the varsity Wildcat squad this year.

At the last of the two pre-season scrimmages, the Wildcats romped over the Vernon junior varsity here last Friday night by 6 touchdowns to 0. In the JV game it was Crowell 1-0.

Hints for Homemaker

Eggs are a staple food that many homemakers find indispensable in preparing family meals. Eggs contain protein, vitamins A, D, and B-complex; the egg yolk holds a rich store of iron and phosphorus.

In food preparation eggs serve as leaveners, emulsifiers, thickeners, binders, and coating agents.

Eggs and leaveners provide in the beaten whites a structure which expands and gives lightness and fine grain to omelets, souffles, meringues, angel and sponge cakes.

Eggs as emulsifiers cause a liquid to mix with a fat. This emulsifying property is used as a basis for making mayonnaise and salad dressing.

Eggs and thickeners are used in baked and soft custards, cream fillings, and sauces

where the egg protein coagulates during heating and causes thickening.

Eggs and binders exert action in cakes, meat and croquettes.

Eggs as coating agents are used to coat meats and vegetables for breading. A brush of egg white may be used to coat certain breads and cookies for a shiny brown finish.

Eggs as eggs are nutritious, easy to prepare, quick to cook, combine well with other foods and are versatile in use for any meal.

Here are some "egg-tras" with eggs. To beat egg whites, let the whites stand a while, they whip best when at room temperature. For a larger foam add a pinch of salt before beating.

To stretch whipped cream, fold in a meringue made of 1 egg white and 2 Tbsp. sugar to 1 c. whipped cream.

Operation Peace of Mind Is Big Success

Operation Peace of Mind, the Houston-based telephone hotline for runaway children, was the topic of intense discussion at Tampa, Florida, August 28 and 29. Representatives of 26 governors were on hand to examine ways their states could be linked with the 24-hour service.

It was explained that the hotline was begun by Governor Dolph Briscoe a year ago

because of the grisly discovery of the bodies of 27 young men in the Houston area. Hundreds of concerned parents from all over the United States were calling Houston to see if one of their corpses was that of their runaway child. Originally, the operation's costs were defrayed by private contributions with a recent assist by a Criminal Justice Division grant of \$21,000.

Governor Briscoe opened the volunteer staffed service with the idea that if runaways called and their message that they were alive and well was relayed to their parents, then they would have that wanted peace of mind. At that time, no one dreamed how the idea would grow and develop to the status it has received throughout the country.

Supplemental Income Provisions Explained

The new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program administered by the Social Security Administration requires reports from recipients that are not required from people receiving only security benefits, according to Kenneth R. King, manager of the Vernon Social Security Office. It is important that people receiving the SSI payments be aware of their obligations.

"For example," King said, "a person receiving social security may not have to report if he is working, unless he is disabled, if he does not expect to make over \$2400 in a year. A person receiving Supplemental Security Income must report any

work he or she does. Also, any other income that a social security beneficiary would not normally report—such as prizes, gifts, increases in other pensions, interest payments, etc.—must be reported by those receiving SSI payments.
