C.R. Bryson Succumbed Last Week

Charles Robert (Charlie) Bryson, 81, a retired farmer and former service station operator in Crowell, died in the Foard County Hospital Wednesday, November 6, following a brief illness.

Funeral services were conducted at the First United Methodist Church in Crowell at 2:30 p.m. Friday, with Rev. W. O. Rucker, Jr., pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Bryson was born in Williamson County, Texas, March 28, 1893, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Bryson. He moved to Foard County with his parents in 1905. He and the former Miss Hazel Kincheloe were married in Crowell March 27, 1921.

Mr. Bryson was a veteran of World War I, serving with the 21st Engineer Battalion in France and Germany. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Methodist Church.

He is survived by his wife of Crowell; three brothers, Russell Bryson of Hollis, Ok., Malcolm Bryson of Seligman, Mo., and Don Bryson of Los Alamos, N.M.; three sisters, Mrs. R. V. Holman of Arlington, Mrs. Gladys Flesher of Purdy, Mo., and Mrs. R. R. Allen of Exeter, Mo.

Serving as pall bearers were R. J. Owens, L. M. Glover, Kenneth Fox, W. F. Statser, Pat Pittillo, and J. C. Kincheloe.

Construction of Court House Remembered by Local Resident

With the renovation of the Foard County court house in progress, memories of the

construction of the building have been brought to mind by a life-long Foard County resident

who was a 13-year-old boy at the time.

George Self reminisced last week about the fact that the huge stones on the lower one-third of the structure were cut and shaped by skilled craftsmen who did the work at about where the northeast corner of the square is.

The grayish colored stone was brought to Crowell by railroad, since the Orient had completed the tracks through here in 1908. Logging wagons brought the uncut stones from the depot to the building site. Mr. Self remembers the uncut stones as being about the size of a present-day pickup box. The stones were loaded onto the logging wagons by the use of block and tackle and mule power—the same kind of method as was used to move the finished stone into place in the building.

Mr. Self remembers watching the crew composed principally of Irishmen and all skilled stonemasons, as they slowly and carefully measured and cut the stone using chisels and mallets. Requiring extra length of time to prepare exact sizes are the capping stones used at either side of the steps on all four sides of the building.

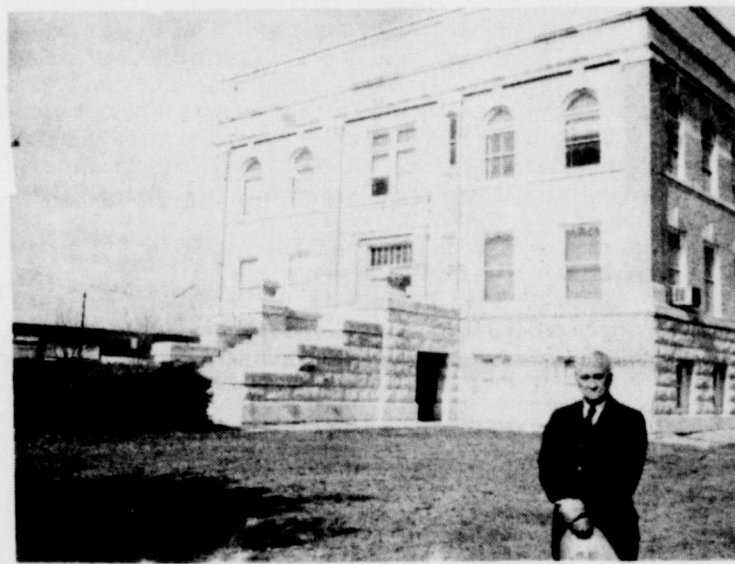
As most people past 40 remember, the court house when completed had a dome with a four-faced clock with a statue on top of the dome. Also, a circular stairway now located on the west side of Gentry's Grocery was located between the second and third stories of the building and went from the district court room on the third story down into the county attorney's office on the second floor. Mr. Self said the purpose of the stairway was to provide passage for attorneys during trials going up and down without walking through the main part of the district court room.

In talking about the old clock, Mr. Self said that the late L. Kamstra personally looked after the huge machine, winding it with a hand winch every Monday and seeing that it was lubricated regularly.

The court house stood unscathed until 1942 when the tornado ripped through Crowell and in addition to much other damage to the town, did a great deal of damage to the court house. It was then that the dome and clock were removed as were the pillars rising from each of the four sets of steps.

The sand blasting of the stone during the past week has shown that the stone is not the color that most people presumed it to be. Since the cleaning of the stone, it is a grayish color instead of the tan color it seemed to be. The long years of West Texas weather, which included untold sand storms, took their toll in changing the color of the stone.

The crew which has been sandblasting the structure is now filling and sealing spaces between the stone which have deteriorated through the years.



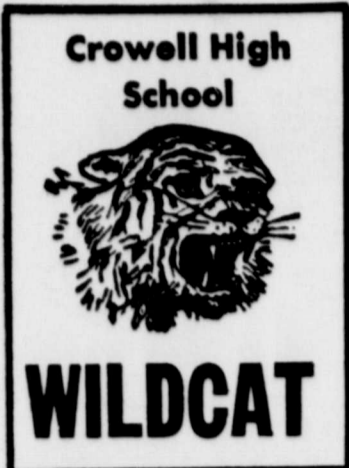
George Self and Foard County Court House.

Hints for Homemaker

You don't have to wait for a holiday to serve turkey. Turn any day into a holiday by bringing that versatile bird to the table.

From an economy standpoint, now is a good time to turn to turkey. Cold storage holdings are at a record level for this time of year.

If you've reached a dead-end on meal planning, you may want to try a variety of new ways to prepare the traditional holiday bird. Its versatility and adaptability will offer you infinite surprises. To suit your variety meals you'll find your favorite parts of the big bird packaged from small or large family meals.

Turkey teams well with other foods. Some combinations you may want to try include curried turkey wings on rice; turkey legs deboned, stuffed, and baked; fricassee turkey wings with tender, light dumplings; lemon barbecued wings with noodles. And those suggestions are just a few of the many ways turkey parts may be served.

Not only is it good eating, it's good for you. Turkey is an excellent source of protein, iron, thiamin, riboflavin, and niacin.

For a different variety dish, this recipe is offered: Stroganoff Turkey Wings. You'll need 1/2 cup flour, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon paprika, 6 turkey wings, 1/2 cup sour cream, 1/4 cup fat or oil, 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt. Mix flour, salt, and paprika. Use to coat turkey wings. Brown turkey in fat or

oil. Remove excess fat. Add water and onion soup mix. Cover tightly and simmer until tender, about 1 1/4 hours. Place turkey on cooked noodles and keep warm. Remove excess fat from sauce in pan. Blend sour cream and garlic salt with sauce. Heat and pour over turkey.

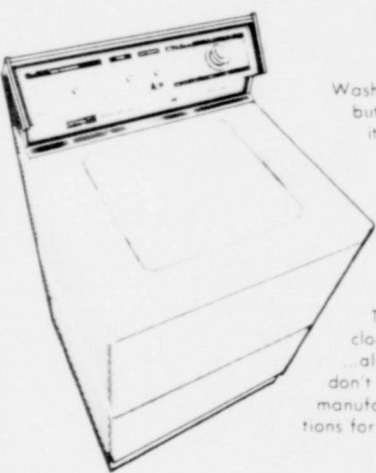

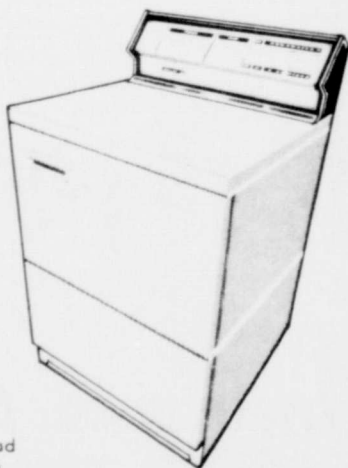

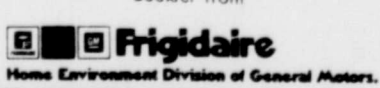

Goose Season Open

Goose and sandhill crane seasons are in full swing in the western part of the state and duck season is also open.

Goose season west of U.S. Highway 81 is Oct. 19—Jan. 19; east of U.S. 81, Oct. 28—Nov. 24 and Dec. 7—Jan. 19.

Duck season in that part of West Texas which is known as the "High Plains Mallard Management Unit" got underway Nov. 4 and runs through Nov. 24, and resumes Dec. 7 until Jan. 19.

In the remainder of Texas, duck season is Nov. 9-24 and Dec. 9—Jan. 19.

Sandhill or little brown cranes are legal Oct. 26—Jan 26 in what is known as "Zone A" generally the westernmost part of the state. The big birds may be hunted in "Zone B" Nov. 30—Jan. 26.

The daily bag on sandhills is three per day with a possession limit of six.

Migratory bird regulations require that a fully feathered wing remain attached to such game birds while being transported from the place taken to the residence of the hunter or to a commercial processing facility.

The big cranes are arriving late in the Panhandle this year, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game warden Bobby Goff of Lubbock.

"Hunters will have to search for the birds the first part of the season," said Goff. "But cold weather will send the rest of the cranes south later in the year."

Large playa lakes on the South Plains are ideal for wintering cranes and they usually number over 200,000 by January of each year.

A federal migratory bird stamp is not required for hunting sandhills, but the stamp is necessary for hunting ducks and geese.

Cattlemen Are Invited to Join Vernon Group

Wilbarger cattlemen who Tuesday night of last week voted to conduct their first annual club calf sale in Vernon next April, have invited Foard County cattlemen to join the organization which is to be incorporated under the name of Greenbelt Beef Breeders Association.

Newell Hofmann of Lockett, president of the organization, was in Crowell last Thursday to announce the invitation to Foard producers, and said at the meeting last week, the group decided to open the sale to breeders in counties adjoining Wilbarger.

Membership fees of \$15 were set, and membership in the organization will be necessary in order to be able to participate in the sale.

Hofmann said that the organization will have a judge and sifter who places animals so that only high quality animals will be offered to young exhibitors as prospective show animals.

The sale will be conducted at the new Wilbarger Exhibit Building.

Wilhelm, who owned and operated a splendid cotton gin at Margaret; Bell Brothers Theatre; Wm. Cameron & Co. Lumber; C. D. Shamburger Lumber Co.;

Beverly Real Estate and Land agents; Bell-Robert Land and Abstract Co.; J. W. Allison Dry Goods Company and the grocery firm of McKown Co.

Among the pictures in the edition was one of people picking cotton, a scene at the local cotton yard, harvesting and shocking wheat and also a scene at the thresher. Also pictured were some of the homes of the county including that of J. N. Bryson, Judge Robert Cole, J. Gordon Witherspoon, W. S. Bell, and J. E. Bray. Also pictured is the Hinds Hotel.

Since the news has an article this week about George Self remembering the construction of the court house, one of the stories in the early-day paper went like this:

"As a well established and reliable contractor and builder, the Foard County News is more than pleased to accord G. W. Water Consumption in Crowell Takes Big Drop During October

Consumption of water by Crowell residents during October, 1974, is the least

purchased here since October, 1970, the first year of the report of water usage by the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

James L. Kuhn, general manager of Greenbelt, reported last week that during October, 1974, Crowell, water sales totaled 4,562,000 gallons. The first year of the Greenbelt usage in 1970 saw Crowell use 2,965,000 gallons. Biggest October usage was in 1972 when Crowell used 7,791,000 gallons. The total in 1971 for October was 7,379,000 and in October 1973 Crowell used 5,740,000 gallons.

Childress continues to be the biggest user of Greenbelt water, having bought a total of 16,306,000 gallons in October, 1974. Quanah was second biggest with 12,330,000 gallons. The Red River Authority, which buys water for the Thirsty Water System, is making a dramatic growth in use of water and moved into third place in October by buying 11,285,000 gallons.

Clarendon bought 9,760,000 gallons. Bestwall bought 4,784,000 gallons, Hedley 1,530,000 gallons and Copper Breaks State Park used 50,000 gallons.

Total amount of water sold by the Greenbelt Authority during October, 1974, was 60,607,000 gallons.

FOREIGN TRADE AND LIVESTOCK PRICES

Foreign trade can't shoulder the blame for current low cattle prices, contends a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. During the first six months of this year, imports of beef, veal and pork were down three per cent from last year's level while cattle imports were down 21 per cent for the same period. However, hog imports were up 184 per cent. On the export side, beef and veal were down eight per cent and pork was down 77 per cent but cattle exports were up 87 per cent.
