One of the aims of the group is to have all branches of agriculture represented in Washington with all of them housed in a single building and forming a national marketing association.

Masterson said one of the goals of the association is to stop the importation of beef into the US and pointed out that during the current year, 1 billion, 500 million pounds of beef will be imported into this country from Australia and New Zealand. "Remember, orders must shut off. be placed by February 25 for Another important goal of the group is to kill the land use bill, which was defeated in the last session of Congress by only 7 votes. The land use bill would make all land a commodity and would make all land public land for all Americans to use as they see fit. In other words. Masterson said the law would allow, if passed, anyone and everyone to go onto another person's land for camping, fishing, hunting, to ride a motorcycle, put up a travel trailer, or anything else. This would all be legal, even without the

landowner's permission. Masterson said one man told him that should the land use bill ever pass, it will be 'the bloodiest days in this country since the Civil War.'

In his closing remarks, Masterson blasted more government controls and so-called aid, and added that at the present time, for every farmer in this country, there are now eight-persons employed in the Agricultural department telling this farmer what he can and cannot do.

Masterson was introduced by Robert Kincaid. Kincaid and George Self were instrumental in setting up the local meeting last week.



VALENTINES DAY

On February 14, 270 A.D. a Christian martyr named Valentine was beheaded in Rome. There is a theory that Claudius II. Emperor of Rome wanted all of his men to be soldiers, so he issued a decree forbidding any of them to marry. Saint Valentine disobeyed and secretly married young couples. For this he was beheaded, and became known as the "Saint of Lovers"

The customs connected with Valentine's Day, however, have nothing to do with the Saint. An ancient Roman festival called Lupercalia was held annually on February 15. This festival honored human fertility and the coming of spring. When our early Christian ancestors started getting rid of wild pagan celebrations by substituting Christian holidays, they renamed the Lupercalia Saint Valentine's Day.

Valentine's Day was an important holiday by the 15th century. There were many customs concerned with romance or the choosing of a mate. Originally all the eligible young women would put their names in a hat, then young men would draw, and would be obligated to give

their valentines expensive gifts. This custom was gradually replaced by sending sentimental messages which took many hours to

Valentines Day reached the height of its popularity about the end of the 18th century. By this time, many people were spending large amounts of time and money preparing valentines. They were trimmed in everything from seaweed to satin and mother-of-pearl. Then it happened. Some bright person decided to cash in on Valentines Day with a book entitled "The Complete British Valentine Writer or the High Road to Love for Both Sexes." #### Grant Received by **EOAC** for Part-Day **Headstart Program**

Forty children from lowincome families are being served through an Office of Human Development grant that Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday.

The grant is to Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties for \$21,037 in new federal funds and \$4,956 in carryover funds for a Head Start program. Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant is effective retroactively from Dec. 1, 1974, through Nov.

According to Felix Taylor, executive director of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties, the part-day Head Start program will serve the 40 children in two centers through two classes, five days a week, six hours a day.

### Son of Local Man Subject of Article

A story in the November 27, 1974, issue of the Baptist Standard tells a story of the work done in Fort Worth by a former Crowell resident whose father still lives here.

The young man about whom the story is written is Joe Coffey and he is the son of Hayden Coffey of Crowell. The story tells about Joe going to jail every Sunday morning. A Baptist layman, Joe joins an interdenominational Christian group at Fort Worth's Tarrant County jail, trying to let the prisoners know somebody

The Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission, where Coffey has worked for four years, has long ministered to persons in prison through broadcasting. But, the story goes, Coffey has an added reason for wanting to visit the prisoners, as he says if he had not found Christ he could have ended up in jail himself.

### CATTLE SLAUGHTER TO

Even more drastic increases in commercial cattle slaughter are expected in 1975 by a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Beef supplies will come primarily from bulls, cows, calves, and non-fed steers and heifers. Slaughter of non-fed animals is expected to be up 56 per cent over 1974, while calf slaughter should increase 33 percent and cow slaughter, 32 per cent. Slaughter of fed animals is expected to remain on the same level as last year.
