Independent Cattlemen's Association

New Organization Is Established Here

An organization designed to give American agriculture a stronger voice in Congress was established here last Thursday night when a group of about 60 Foard County farmers and ranchers voted to form a Foard County chapter of the Independent Cattlemen's Association.

The group selected a slate of officers composed of Duane Johnson, chairman;

Jon Lee Black, assistant chairman; Robert Kincaid, treasurer; Henry Black, secretary. Three directors elected were John Glenn Halsell, J. A. Marr and George D. Self.

The group selected the Crowell State Bank as the depository and a resolution was passed requesting that the organization be granted a charter. Membership is not

limited to any group and anyone, male or female, may join. At present, there are no dues, only donations are accepted. Ninety per cent of the money given as donations will remain in the county with the other 10 percent sent to the state headquarters at Goliad, Texas.

Preceding the organization of the local association, Bill

Masterson of Cottle County, told those present about the new organization, how it is growing and some of its goals.

Masterson said the name of the organization—Independent Cattlemen's Association—is a misnomer. Actually the organization is for everyone connected with agriculture, whether it be cotton, cattle, wheat,

peanuts or anything else.

He said at the present time the ICA, organized at Goliad last October, has 131 counties in Texas organized with 124,000 members.

One of the aims of the group is to have all branches of agriculture represented in Washington with all of them housed in a single building and forming a national marketing association.

Masterson said one of the goals of the association is to stop the importation of beef into the US and pointed out that during the current year, 1 billion, 500 million pounds of beef will be imported into this country from Australia and New Zealand. This is from 2 to 2½ million head of cattle imported each year, Masterson added.

Another goal of the group, Masterson said, is the marking of meat in the grocery store so that the housewife will know what she is buying, whether it is grain fed, grass fed, or "foreign junk."

Masterson predicted that price of beef would advance from 3 to 7 cents a pound in this country if imports were shut off.

Another important goal of the group is to kill the land use bill, which was defeated in the last session of Congress by only 7 votes.

The land use bill would make all land a commodity and would make all land public land for all Americans to use as they see fit. In other words, Masterson said the law would allow, if passed, anyone and everyone to go onto another person's land for camping, fishing, hunting, to ride a motorcycle, put up a travel trailer, or anything else. This would all be legal, even without the landowner's permission.

Masterson said one man told him that should the land use bill ever pass, it will be "the bloodiest days in this country since the Civil War."

In his closing remarks, Masterson blasted more government controls and so-called aid, and added that at the present time, for every farmer in this country, there are now eight persons employed in the Agricultural department telling this farmer what he can and cannot do.

Masterson was introduced by Robert Kincaid, Kincaid and George Self were instrumental in setting up the local meeting last week.

Grant Received by EOAC for Part-Day Headstart Program

Forty children from low-income families are being served through an Office of Human Development grant that Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday.

The grant is to Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties for \$21,037 in new federal funds and \$4,956 in carryover funds for a part-day Head Start program. Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant is effective retroactively from Dec. 1, 1974, through Nov. 30, 1975.

According to Felix Taylor, executive director of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties, the part-day Head Start program will serve the 40 children in two centers through two classes, five days a week, six hours a day.

The main goals of the Head Start program are to provide target area children with first-time classroom experience that would develop an appreciation of education in both children and parents; needed medical and dental attention for some of the children; a nourishing meal and snacks; and to give them an opportunity to be strong competitors when they enter regular school. The program strives to give the children a better emotional outlook concerning their environment and to provide the children and their parents with a glimpse of the community by visits to various businesses, community buildings, and city and county government offices.

Grant processing for the state was performed by the Texas Department of Community Affairs' Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

CATTLE SLAUGHTER TO BE UP
Even more drastic increases in commercial cattle slaughter are expected in 1975 by a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Beef supplies will come primarily from bulls, cows, calves, and non-fed steers and heifers. Slaughter of non-fed animals is expected to be up 56 per cent over 1974, while calf slaughter should increase 33 per cent and cow slaughter, 32 per cent. Slaughter of fed animals is expected to remain on the same level as last year.
