Rattlesnake Hunt Saturday, Sunday

The fourth annual Rattlesnake Hunt for Foard County will be held Saturday and Sunday, March 22 and 23. The event is sponsored annually by the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department. Fire Chief Leonard Tole said this week that since the three previous snake hunts have been hindered by inclement weather, he and the department are hoping for a pretty weekend so lots of hunters can take to the field. Tole said he has many landowners on whose property he can direct snake hunters. With many dens already spotted, many big rattlers should be taken by hunters.

Prizes of \$75.00 will be awarded for the largest snake brought in, \$50.00 for the second largest, and \$25.00 will be awarded for the most pounds of snakes. Barnett Barnett of Iowa Park will be here again this weekend, as he has in the three previous hunts. Barnett entertains the crowds with his nimble handling of the live rattlers. On Saturday night, the fire department is sponsoring a dance at the Lockett grade school.

Proceeds from the snake hunt and dance are used by the fire department in some of its activities. All residents of this section are invited to attend.

School Board Meets with Thalia Residents About School Building

The question of what disposition will be made of the Thalia gym was the topic of a meeting held at the Masonic Lodge hall in Thalia Monday night. Present were members of the local school board and about 120 residents of the Thalia community. The local board at a meeting March 10, voted to

advertise for sale, on a bid basis, the Thalia school property, both land and buildings.

One group of Thalia residents is attempting to form a community corporation with hopes of keeping the building and operating it as a community center. Another faction there wants the building torn down.

Mike Bird, president of the board, told the group that a ruling will be obtained from the Texas Education Agency as to whether the school can legally donate the building to the Thalia community.

Jake Wisdom presided at the meeting.

When the Thalia district was consolidated with the Crowell district back in 1966, the Thalia gym and school were to be used by the people of the community as a center for activities. About 2 years ago, a controversy over using the building for public dances flared up, and the local board stopped all activities at the gym. It has not been used since then.

Truscott 1974 Rainfall Total Is 22.80 In.

Paul Bullion, who operates a government weather station at Truscott, reports that an official 22.80 inches of moisture fell at Truscott during 1974. This is only slightly less than the 24.66 recorded by the government gauge in Crowell during the last year.

By months, Mr. Bullion listed the 1974 rainfall as follows: January .25, February .00, March .32, April 1.98, May 2.89, June 4.05, July .15, August 1.71, September 6.62, October 3.44, November .36, December 1.03.

New Post Office Set in Crowell

The U. S. Postal Service has acquired an option to buy a site for a new post office building in Crowell, C. B. Bolan, manager of the Oklahoma City postal district, reported Monday.

The site is located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Main Street and Donnell St., and is the present location of the postoffice here. The property contains 21,000 square feet. It is owned by the Foard County Development Corporation, Mike Manard, president.

Bolan said the postal service will advertise later for construction bids to erect a building containing 1,856 square feet of floor space. When the building is completed it will be leased to the postal service and the option on the site will be assigned to the successful bidder.

Rains Fall Here Monday

Foard County has received a variety of weather during the last week. A cold front blowing through Wednesday night brought a light snow during the night. Then, on Saturday afternoon, a light shower accompanied by hail blew across the county.

Then on Monday afternoon, thundershowers build up across the county. Late Monday, rain and light hail fell in Crowell and also another shower fell during the night, bringing the total for the period to .58 inch. The light snow and shower of last week measured .13 inch.

I. J. Jackson said Tuesday that he received about an inch of rain, along with some large size hail, Monday night at his place on Pease River. The rains were scattered; with nearly all of the county receiving some moisture. The thundershowers preceded a front which cleared the skies of clouds by Tuesday morning.

Meeting Set for Tuesday

County Judge Seth Halbert said this week that a general draft of proposed projects to aid Foard County as prepared by the Overall Economic Development Plan committee has been completed and will be presented to the general public and the committee members at a meeting to be held next Tuesday night, March 25, in the district court room in Crowell.

He urged all concerned residents to attend and find out what the committee has suggested, and offer any suggestions they wish.

Absentee Balloting Underway

Absentee voting for the city and school elections got underway in Crowell Monday, March 17, and will continue through Monday, March 31.

In the city election, Robert Kincaid is unopposed on the ballot for re-election as mayor. Glyndon Johnson, L. N. Tole and Charles Branch are all asking re-election as aldermen and a fourth candidate for alderman is W. N. Chatfield.

In the school trustee election, Jack Brown and Roy Whitley are both candidates for re-election while Ward Kuehn is also seeking election as a trustee.

The top three vote-getters in the alderman race will be elected, while the top two vote-getters in the trustee election will be the winners.

April 1 is the final date to release allotment, request reapportioned acreage or transfer cotton acreage, the Foard ASCS office said last week.

Another date mention was May 31, which is the final date to put 1974 cotton in the loan.

Students to Have Easter Vacation

Thursday, March 27, will be the last day of the fifth six weeks of the Crowell schools, and March 28 will be a holiday for students and a work day for teachers. The week of March 31-April 4 will be the annual spring break, with classes resuming Monday, April 7.

On April 4, the girls will enter a track meet in Knox City, and the boys will be going to a meet at Knox City on April 5, Monday, April 7. CHS girls will be entering the district tennis contest at Knox City.

Payment Limitation Is Set

The Foard County ASCS office reminds producers that the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 provides a payment limitation of \$20,000 for each "person" under one or more of the annual programs for wheat, feed grain and upland cotton for 1974 through 1977 crops.

The ASCS says anyone with any questions concerning this limitation should contact the local office.

The CHS boys track team won fourth place in the Quannah Invitational meet Saturday.

In the shot put, Melvin Westover of Crowell won first, Rocky Glasscock fifth and David Bell, sixth. Bell took second place in the discus throw while Glasscock took fifth.

Crowell's sprint relay team, composed of Myron Halenak, Ronnie Swan, Chavelo Ranjel and Tommy Tamplen, won sixth in that event. Also winning sixth was the mile relay team composed of Tamplen, Glasscock, Swan and Bell.

Bell won first in the 330 intermediate hurdles and second in the high hurdles. Randy Prince won second in the 880 and Mark Christopher took sixth place in the mile run.

Crowell's track team will be going to Albany Saturday to participate in the Albany relays, one of the outstanding track meets in this section of the state.

Bridge over Pease River Slated

\$1.43 million over Pease River and in Counties is being by the Texas Department. New structure will be an old bridge on which had several sections washed out a number of years ago. 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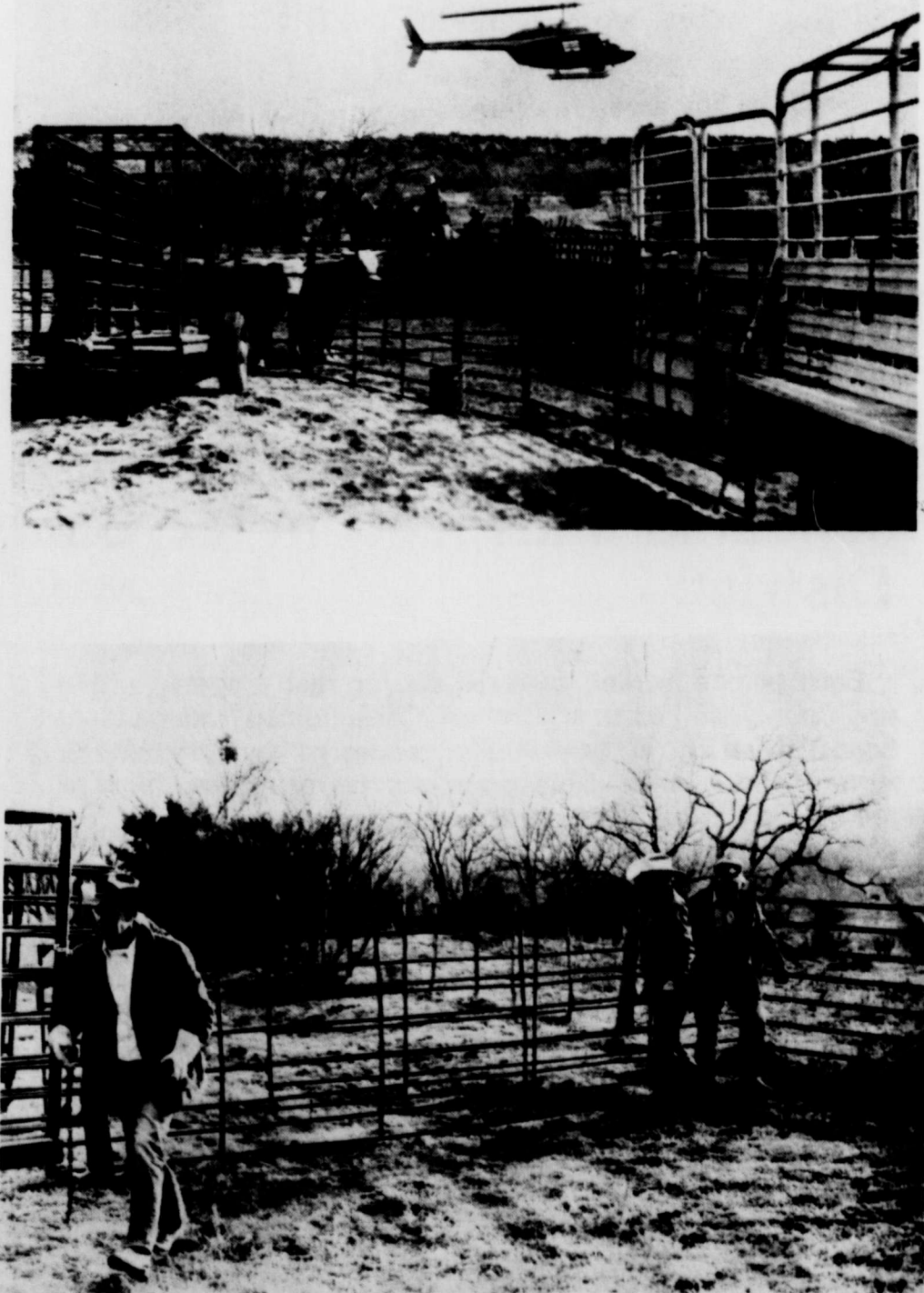
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Community Center Service Tuesday

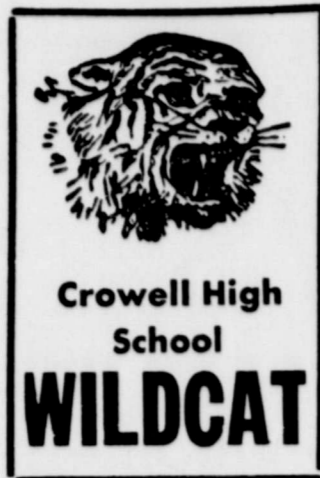
A community-wide service sponsored by ministerial associations will be held next Tuesday night, March 26, at the First Baptist Church at 7:30 p.m.

You Ought to Know...

Tight supplies and high prices for commercial fertilizers have brought a rash of products, claiming to replace regular fertilizers, cost less, make nutrients more available in the soil, supply micronutrients, etc. Among these products are liquid fertilizers sold by the gallon with only a few gallons recommended per acre—not to be confused with commonly sold commercial liquid fertilizers.

While the quality and analysis of some of these liquid products are similar to commercial fertilizers, we suggest that you compare them, primarily on the basis of analysis, price per pound of nutrient and amount of nutrients actually applied if you follow their recommended rates. Discount any claim that a pound of nutrient will go further or is more readily available to the crop.

Usually, liquid fertilizers weigh around 11 pounds per gallon, meaning that there are about 182 gallons per ton. Multiplying 182 gallons by the cost per gallon will give the cost per ton. For example, a product with an analysis of 3-18-18, selling for \$3.25 per gallon, would cost about \$591.50 per ton, while commercial dry or liquid fertilizer having a 6-24-24 analysis might cost around \$200 per ton.

Also, figure the nutrients supplied per gallon and compare the suggested rate to crop requirements. One gallon of a 3-18-18 product selling for \$3.25 per gallon will cost you 76c per pound of nutrient and will supply only 4¼ pounds of nutrient per gallon. Applied at a few gallons per acre, only a small fraction of total crop requirements will be met at a very high cost.

The Foard County Agent Says...

The beef cattle producers in Foard County will be interested in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed number of changes in regulations concerning indemnity payments for cattle destroyed due to brucellosis.

Common broomweed is known as Bang's disease. The changes are as follows:
1. Allow indemnity payments of \$50 for nonregistered (grade) bulls affected with brucellosis.
2. Limit to 15 days the extension period for identifying infected cattle, thus allowing producers a maximum of 30 days in which to accomplish this task.

3. Limit to 30 days each the maximum time allowed for destroying infected and exposed cattle and for cleaning and disinfecting contaminated premises.
4. Allow producers to select independent professional appraisers when deemed necessary by the veterinarian-in-charge with the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

The proposed changes would also clarify conditions under which indemnity payments would be made when an entire herd is destroyed after exposure to brucellosis.

Brucellosis is a contagious bacterial disease of cattle and other livestock and also affects humans. A cooperative state-federal brucellosis eradication program has been underway for several years in an attempt to eliminate the disease from the United States.

Common broomweed is an annual weed that infests much of our country's rangeland. Seedlings of common broomweed become established during the winter and grow rapidly during the spring. They utilize much of the soil moisture and nutrients before the more palatable grasses begin active growth. This usually results in reduction of usable forage because of the competition from common broomweed reduces grass forage production and common broomweed forage is unpalatable to cattle.

As most producers have recognized in the past, common broomweed is more abundant some years than in other years. Usually common broomweed is most abundant during a year with a mild, wet winter and adequate spring moisture. Conditions are favorable for an abundance of common broomweed this year.

Most ranchers are familiar with the "broom" of the

mature common broomweed plant. Once the plant reaches this stage of growth (about the first of June) it is difficult to control and it has already used considerable soil moisture and nutrients. Broomweed that is in the vegetative stage and growing rapidly is highly susceptible to herbicides. This is usually during the period from mid-April to mid-May. Therefore, ranchers need to recognize that common broomweed may be a serious problem this year and should check their rangeland within the next 30 days for presence of common broomweed seedlings. If broomweed

seedlings are present in large numbers, plans should be made to control it.

Effective control of common broomweed is obtained by applying one-half pound of 2,4-D per acre when the broomweed is between four and eight inches tall and the central stem is elongating. This is usually between April 15 and May 15.

Positive identification of broomweed early in the season and timely application of herbicides are keys to a successful program for control of common broomweed.

Texas Talk
by Bud McLain

WHEAT IS NUMBER ONE—The most important grain crop in the world. Wheat, is grown on over 300 million acres of land in more than 60 countries. Although even the top agricultural historians disagree on the exact origin of bread-wheat, they usually concede cultivation of the crop has been under way for at least the past 5000 years. One reason for the world-wide appeal of the wheat grain is the versatility evidenced by the production of both spring and winter crops.

HARD RED WINTER—is a classification often used for much of the wheat produced on the Plains. When using this particular classification method the other best known types are: hard red summer, durum, red durum, soft red winter mixed and white.

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
