To the Taxpayers of Foard County and Crowell Consolidated Independent School District:

Each person owning personal and/or real property within the County of Foard or Crowell Consolidated Independent School District, is respectfully requested by Emmett E. Howard and J. H. Gillespie to come by the respective offices at his earliest convenience and render such property for the purpose of taxation.

The law, in effect, provides that all property shall be listed or rendered by the owner thereof, if he is of full age and of sound mind, but when it becomes necessary for the respective tax assessors, their deputies or others who have to be hired for such purpose to seek out each property owner to secure the individual renditions, the expense involved is greatly increased, and this additional expense is borne by the TAXPAYERS.

According to a tabulation kept by Carl Zeibig, the average temperature of Crowell during the month of January, was a little more than 34 degrees and for the month of February it was very little more than 39 degrees.

The Truscott community, with a quota of \$600 in the Red Cross drive, has exceeded that amount with donations totaling \$632.25. Mrs. T. B. Masterson Sr. is Red Cross chairman at Truscott.
