At the end of the first quarter, Seagraves led by 1, and also at the half, Crowell was behind by only 1. At one point in the contest the local boys were ahead by 6. A four quarter saw Seagraves score 20 points. Klepper scored 21 points in

this game. McGee and Newman had 6 each while Carl Field and Halsell scored 2 points each. The nine boys representing Crowell in this West Texas tournament included McGee, Klepper, Newman, Wasia, Todd, Christopher, Halsell, Field and Lonnie Mitchell. Other teams entered in the meet were Hart, Seagraves, Silverton, Ropesville and Idalou. Seagraves will be playing this week in the national Little Dribblers tournament at Levelland. **New Highway Maps Being Distributed**

A dramatic new section of Interstate Highway 10 as it traverses the scenic Hill Country near Kerrville graces the cover of the 1975 Official State Highway Travel Map, now being distributed. The Texas Highway Department expects demand for the updated 1975 map will exceed one million copies. "Ounce for ounce," Tom H. Taylor, director of the department's Travel and Information Division said, "the Highway Travel Map is the best friend a Texas motorist can have." The new map shows recently opened sections of the Interstate and other highways maintained by the Texas Highway Department. Motorists will find symbols which identify safety rest areas, and distinctive symbols for those with comfort stations, including several completed during the past year. Thirteen special insets on the reverse side of the map chart major urban freeways and arterial streets through the state's business metropolitan areas. The map remains one of the most requested items of almost six million pieces of descriptive literature about Texas distributed annually by the Highway Department. Almost half of that volume, 2.8 million pieces, are produced by the Highway Department itself. The remainder is supplied by chambers of commerce and local visitor industry organizations.

**Heatly Blasts Proposed School Bill**  
Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, District 101 in the Texas House of Representatives, has sent the News some interesting figures concerning school financing under the proposal submitted by Rep. Massey of San Angelo and titled H. B. 1083, which Heatly calls the "Governor's Education Bill." The figures prepared by Heatly show that in 1974-75 local maintenance tax collections within the Crowell District were \$117,800. Under the new proposal the governor's full market valuation in this district would be \$36,790,879 with proposed local tax support going to \$220,745, which is a 60c per \$100 valuation. Heatly added, "As I see the proposal, many of the taxpayers and school districts will be crippled by the new local taxes without helping the children of their districts, therefore, I am of the opinion that it would be in the best interest of my district to oppose this legislation..."

**MILK MARKETING ORDER UNDER DISCUSSION**  
A state milk marketing order is under discussion in Texas and should be studied by both producers and consumers, according to an economist in dairy marketing for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Purpose of a milk order is to provide for orderly marketing. As far as adequate producer prices are concerned, dairymen appear to be relying less on market orders and more on effective bargaining.

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**Hints to Homemakers**

During the month of April, Hints to Homemakers will deal exclusively with housing and home decoration. If you would like further information about home decorating, please contact me at the county extension agents office. Before planning home decorating, arm yourself with the facts. Guess-work, incomplete data, and random opinions aren't enough. Here are a few basic points on achieving an over-all finished look. Fit furniture to the room. Rooms should be lived in and used. Place furniture with regard to the everyday needs of the family—chairs in conventional groupings and large pieces of furniture parallel to the walls. Does the room need to appear larger? Consider wall-to-wall carpeting. Select light wall colors. If the ceiling is low, use furniture with low horizontal lines. Does the room need to appear smaller? Use area rugs and select large figured patterns for walls, upholstery material, and draperies. Large furniture helps here, also. A dark, cold room might be brightened by using light, warm colors on walls, floors, and ceilings. Combine fabrics and carpets in warm colors such as reds, yellows, and oranges. The opposite effect of making a room seem darker may be achieved by using medium cool colors—blues, greens, and purples—on walls, ceilings, and floors. Upholstery and draperies could be in darker cool colors. Home planning has four

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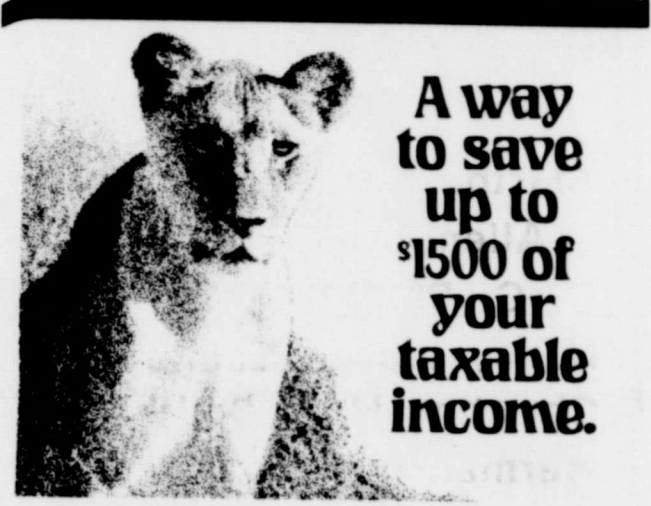

**City Water Purchases Take Big Drop**

The City of Crowell purchased less water from the Greenbelt Authority during March than in any March since joining the Greenbelt group. In March, 1975, Crowell bought 5,058,000 gallons. This is only slightly more than half the total for March 1974 when the city used 9,643,000 gallons. March 1973 saw Crowell use 8,272,000 gallons, while in March 1972 the City bought 6,285,000 gallons. In March '71, Crowell used 5,467,000 gallons.

Childress continues as the big user of Greenbelt water, purchasing some 17,333,000 gallons during March. Clarendon is second biggest purchaser with 10,604,000 gallons. Red River Authority bought 9,703,000 while Quannah used 9,532,000 gallons. Bestwall bought 4,188,000 gallons. Hedley 1,422,000 gallons and Copper Breaks 38,010 gallons. Total use during March for the entire system was 57,878,010 gallons.



**Grade Standards Change**  
New grade standards by the U. S. Department of Agriculture will go into effect April 14. The grades will only appear on meat graded by USDA graders, which is a voluntary service that meat packers must request.

These new grades are designed to keep quality at a high level and may help lower consumer costs. The major change in the grade standards is that all beef carcasses that are officially graded will be identified for both quality and yield. These two values will give a better determination as to the true worth of the carcass. An additional change will be that conformation or shape of the carcass will no longer be a factor in determining the

quality grade since it is not related to eating quality of meat.

With the new standards, beef carcasses up to 30 months of age will have the same minimum marbling requirements in Prime, Choice and Standard grades as now required for the youngest carcasses classified as "beef". This will mean more lean carcasses in these three grades since animals will probably be put through a shorter finishing period in feedlots.

Furthermore, a new "Good" grade has been established that allows for slightly more marbling in the younger animals up to 18 months of age. Thus beef in the Good grade will be more uniform in quality. Young beef animals up to 15 months of age with traces of marbling will no longer be graded Good but will go to

the Standard grade. Meat quality standards are not being lowered, as many people seem to think. While keeping quality at a high level the new grades will hopefully bring more lean meat to the supermarket.

**Farabee Praises New Bill**

Austin... State Senator Ray Farabee called Tuesday's Senate passage of a proposed constitution a move that will "...give the taxpayers of Texas some return on the 4½ million dollars that was spent on to 1974 Constitutional Convention." Other Senators expressed similar sentiments as the Senate passed a document that would allow an article by article vote on a revision of Texas' Constitution.

Farabee said the Senate passed substantially the same document which obtained a majority vote in the '74 Convention. A 2/3 vote was required to pass a document out of that meeting. This action, Farabee said, "...will give the people an opportunity to vote on revision." The revised Constitution will be divided into eight separate propositions so Texans can accept or reject various articles without having to

approve or disapprove the entire proposed Constitution. Farabee indicated that the proposed document retains many provisions in the present Constitution. The "pay as you go" provision which requires State Government to operate in the black was cited by Senator Farabee as one of those retained.

Another section retained in the proposed document is the "homestead exemption." Senator Farabee said he was pleased with the provisions of the proposed Constitution which would benefit rural areas. Farabee indicated the revised Constitution actually contains provisions not in the present Constitution which would aid farmers and ranchers. One such section would prohibit a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feed, or seed.

In addition, the proposed document speaks to agricultural interests by retaining a section mandating separate formulas on the appraisal of property for tax purposes. These separate formulas would "...promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes..."

The Senate-passed document also retains the prohibition against a state-wide ad valorem tax. As in the present Constitution only two exceptions are allowed, a 10c per \$100 valuation tax for higher education and a 2c per \$100 valuation tax for the State Building Fund.

Even these ad valorem taxes, however, would not apply to "...farm products in the hands of the producer..."

**TORNADO SEASON AT HAND**

Tornadoes were abundant in Texas last year—the state led the nation with 116—and the season for violent weather is here once again. Most tornadoes occur in April, May and June during the late afternoon, according to an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. They are most prevalent in the South and between the Rockies and Appalachians. A "tornado watch" is issued by the National Weather Service

when atmospheric conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A "tornado warning" indicates that a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar. When a tornado warning is issued, seek shelter in a basement or cellar. In open country, lie in a ditch or ravine.

**Texans to Ballot Again on Legislative Pay Raise**

Five times since 1965, Texas voters have turned down pay raises for their legislators and since that time have also rejected a proposal to let a commission set legislative salaries.

Another opportunity will be afforded Texas voters on Tuesday, April 22, when a proposed constitutional amendment will be voted on. The proposal would set the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and set a per diem of \$30 during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

The present salary is \$400 per month and the per diem allowance is limited to \$12 for the first 120 days of a regular session.

The other amendment to be voted on at the same time concerns revising and consolidating provision relating to state and local retirement systems. This amendment has two purposes: to consolidate nearly all constitutional provisions relating to state and local retirement systems in one section of the constitution; and to lift the ceiling on state contributions to state systems from the existing maximum of 6 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals to a maximum of 10 per cent.

Proponents say that the increase from 6 to 10 per cent will offer relief to persons already retired and look to the future retirement of state employees.

**Texas Talk**  
Q: What do the terms "canner" and "cutter" mean?  
A: Canner and cutter are two of the terms used to describe beef cattle carcass classification. Specifically, "canner" is the lowest of the eight common quality grades of mature beef. The designation "canner" would indicate virtually no marbling in the meat and mean the animal was at an advanced age when slaughtered. "Cutter" is essentially the same except generally there would be less maturity and at least a trace of marbling. Canner and cutter grades are used only for the older or mature animals and may include steers, heifers, cows, bulls and stags. The other six quality grades used in the beef class include: Prime, choice, good, standard, commercial and utility. South-western beef, usually finished in the feedlot, customarily falls into either the choice or prime categories.
