## Crowell-Rotan Bi-District Game Set for Friday Night in Stamford

### Tickets on Sale in Crowell

The Crowell Wildcats, undefeated in District 7-A football action this fall, travel to Stamford Friday night to take on Rotan, champion of District 8-A in a bi-district clash. Rotan is also undefeated in district play this season.

Starting time for this contest is 7:30 p. m. and a big crowd of Wildcat fans is expected to follow the Cats to this game.

Crowell is 9-1 for the season, losing only to AA Electra, while posting wins over Quannah, Seymour, Memphis, Chillicothe in non-district clashes, and defeating Aspermont, Paducah, Knox City, Haskell and Munday in District 7-A.

Rotan's Yellowhammers are 7-3 for the season, losing to Anson, Hamlin and Stanton. In District 8-A they won over Wylie, Albany, Jim Ned, Baird and Merkel.

Crowell's coaches are Printiss Gidney and Randall Ryan. Coaching the Rotan team is Don Mullins, who led the Knox City Greyhounds to a District 7-A title last year.

In Rotan's game with Albany, Tim Allen scored three touchdowns, and James Goodwin scored a touchdown and kicked a 38-yard barefooted field goal for the Yellowhammers. Another fine runner for the Yellowhammers is Jerry Carr who scored touchdowns of 75 and 20 yards in the Albany game, but both were nullified because of penalties.

Coach Gidney said Monday that the Rotan quarterback is 6'3" tall and he throws to a right end 6'4".

Tommy Templen guides the Wildcat attack. Crowell has three big hard-running backs in David Bell, Rocky Glasscock and Ronnie Swan. The Wildcats' offensive thrust is planned around these power runners. Bell is an accurate extra point kicker and has kicked several field goals this season from "way out". Templen's two main targets with passes are Dee Finley and Ernie Myers.

Crowell has both a balanced offense and defense and other members of the varsity include Melvin Westover, William Bachman, Duane Daniel, Gilbert Torres, Richard Naylor, Norman Hopper, Myron and Billy Halencak, Delbert Glover, Rocky Marlow and Jerry Bob Daniel.

The pep rally for the Crowell-Rotan game will begin at 1:15 Friday afternoon in the gym. Parents and friends are invited to join with the students in the pep rally.

Both Crowell and Rotan last got into the play-offs back in 1966. The winner of this game will play the winner of the Seagraves-Iraan game.

General admission tickets to the contest are on sale at the office of J. H. Gillespie, school secretary, in the court house, for \$2.50 for adults and 1.50 for students. They will remain on sale here until noon Friday after which the unsold tickets will be returned to Stamford.

## Meeting on Taxes Is Set

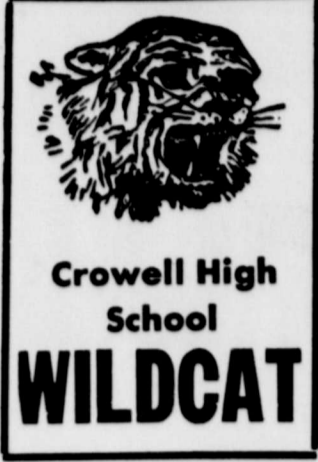
Tax practitioners will study some late developments in their profession during a two-day workshop in Vernon next month.
