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

The Crowell Wildcats. undefeated in District 7-A football action this fall, travel to Stamford Friday night to take on Rotan, champion of District 8-A in a bi-district clash. Rotan is also undefeated in district play this season.

Starting time for this contest is 7:30 p. m. and a big crowd of Wildcat fans is expected to follow the Cats to this game.






All in all, it was a fun night of entertainment for those attending and the proceeds derived from the program will help with the expenses of the bands trip to San Antonio next February.

The entire Crowell squad saw action in this contest. and the Crowell B team scored two of the Crowell TDS.


