Mrs. V. A. Johnson Named Clubwoman of the Year

The Adelpian Club recently selected Mrs. V. A. Johnson as clubwoman of the year.

She has been a member since 1950 excelling in many phases of the clubs programs and projects and holding numerous club offices including the presidency in 1953-55.

Mrs. Johnson, who is chairman of the Heritage Department of the Adelpian Club, won the "Special All Over Report" at the state convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in Dallas in 1972.

"Special All Over Report" is the highest award given in the state.

The heritage report consisted of four topics: "Famous Cattle Trails," "Courthouses of Texas," "Barbed Wire" and "Black Gold," (history of oil in Foard County.)

Mrs. Johnson also won a first place on "Famous Cattle Trails" and a second place on "Courthouses of Texas."

This is the first time anyone in Foard County has won a top award at the state convention.

For three years Mrs. Johnson has been District Historian. She has prepared for future reference, a scrapbook on the admini-

For the past five years, the Adelpian Club yearbook has been District first place winner in its classification. Mrs. Johnson has been chairman of the calendar committee for two of those years.

In addition to her leadership ability and personal commitment to furtherance of clubwork Mrs. Johnson is also active in many community and church activities.

CATTLE OUTLOOK IMPROVING BY 1977

As far as cattlemen are concerned, 1977 looks like the year when prices will improve once again. If cow slaughter continues heavy through 1976 and if replacement heifers are kept at low levels, there should be a much smaller calf crop in 1977. This, along with an expanded demand for feeder calves by feedlots, should lead to improved cattle markets, contends a livestock marketing specialist for the extension service. In the meantime, cattlemen must figure every possible way to reduce costs.

Farm Income Takes Leap

Foard County farm income during 1974 totaled \$11 million, according to a report issued by the Texas and United States Departments of Agriculture. This is an increase from \$9.8 million during 1973.

The report, as published in the Vernon Record Sunday showed that in 1974 Foard County produced 5,150 bales of cotton from 13,800 harvested acres; 1.0 million bushels of wheat from 92,100 harvested acres. Inventory of livestock showed 45,000 cattle on farms as

of Jan. 1, 1975, including 12,000 beef cows that had calves, and 2,000 hogs.

Cold Weather and Severe Dust Storm Hits Area

Wild and turbulent weather has blasted Foard County with everything from sub-freezing temperatures to a severe dust storm during the past week.

Tuesday night of last week a norther blew through the area dropping the temperature to below freezing by Wednesday. The weather stayed cold until Friday when a warming trend starting in the afternoon and by game time Friday night at Snyder,

the weather was almost balmy.

However, by Saturday morning, the southerly wind which blew during the Crowell-Seagraves football game, had increased in intensity to almost hurricane proportions and one of the worst dust storms ever seen in Foard County in November reddened the sky all afternoon. The high winds slowly shifted from the south to the north as another front

moved in, and the mercury dropped to 30 degrees early Monday morning.

During the high wind Saturday afternoon, a fire broke out in the burr pile at the Farmers Gin in Crowell. The stubborn blaze was battled intermittently all Saturday night, and at one time appeared to be a threat to the Housing Authority, but it was kept under control and did little or no damage to the gin.

Wildcats Close 1975 Season; Lose Regional Game 6-3 Friday

The Crowell High School Wildcat football team, coached by Printiss Gidney and Randall Ryan, closed out the 1975 season at Snyder last Friday night when the Cats lost a close one 6-3 to the Seagraves Eagles, the No. 1 rated class A team in the state. The Wildcats the week before had won bi-district honors by defeating the Rotan Yellowhammers and this regional game with Seagraves was the first time since 1961 that a Crowell football team had advanced as far as the regional play-offs. That year, the Wildcats dropped the regional contest to Albany.

Although the Wildcats lost the game, they never gave up - and up until the final play of the game were fighting to get into field goal position.

The Wildcats had a great team this year. One veteran Crowell football fan called it the "best Wildcat team ever."

Myron Halencak and

Ronnie Swan each came up with a big pass interception for Crowell, and the only pass the Eagles completed was the one which gave them the touchdown. It came about midway through the third period.

The Wildcats gained 249 yards rushing with Rocky Glasscock accounting for 124 on 23 carries. David Bell gained 71 yards on 21 carries.

The Wildcats' lone points came in the second quarter when Bell kicked a 47-yard field goal to give Crowell the go-ahead after a scoreless first quarter.

The second half started with Crowell kicking off, and following a good return coupled with three first downs, Seagraves moved to the Wildcat 22. From that point, the Seagraves quarterback Bryan Hawkins hit end Brad Woods in the end zone for the lone Seagraves score. The try for point-after was no good as Rocky Marlow got a piece of the ball to send it astray.

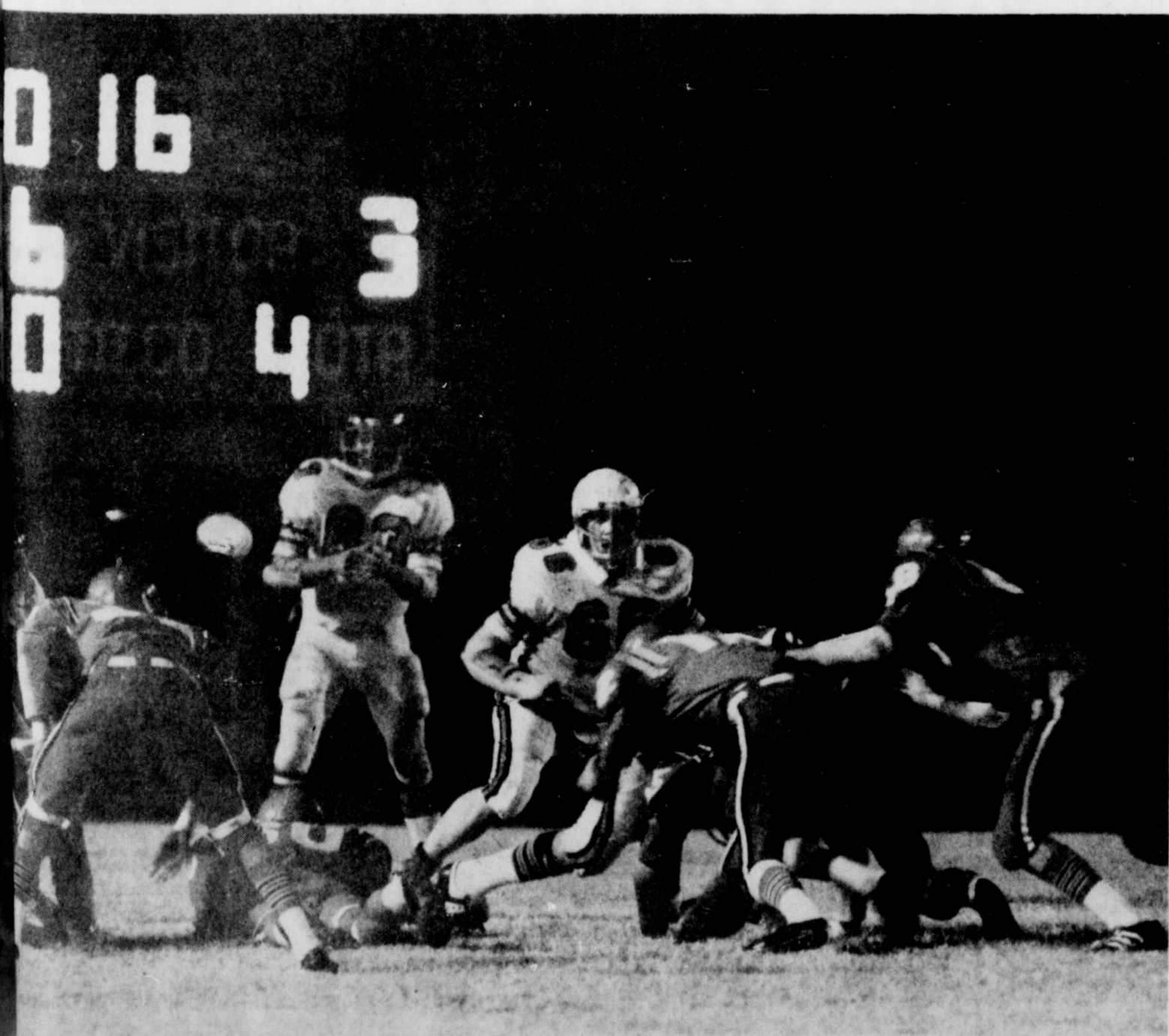
That was the scoring for the night, but there were numerous other drives by both teams which were halted by either pass

interceptions or running out of downs. Early in the game, a Wildcat drive was halted on the Seagraves 18, when the Cats failed to gain on fourth down. Following the Eagle TD, the Wildcats marched from their own 30 down to the Seagraves 21 where a fourth down try failed to gain the first down by only inches.

In the fourth quarter also, another Wildcat drive stalled when a fourth and 1 failed to gain. Two Seagraves drives were halted by Halencak's and Swan's pass interceptions. The awesome Crowell defense kept the Seagraves 11 from crossing the midfield stripe all the first half except for one time.

Eleven Wildcats completed their high school football career with the game at Snyder. They are Glasscock, Swan, Dee Finley, Bell, Myron Halencak, Ernie Myers, Billy Halencak, Delbert Glover, Richard Naylor, Duane Daniel and Melvin Westover.

Coach Gidney will have a number of juniors back for next year, along with a fine crop of sophomores and the Cats hope to be in the thick of the District 7-A race come next fall.

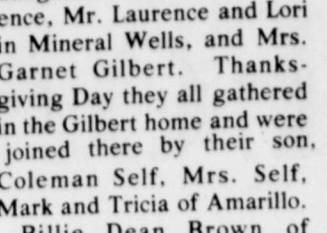

LIFE AND HOPE

Some people look at life in despair. Usually they are men who have no hope in this life nor in that to come.

How much we need to take a spiritual lesson from our physical life. No man hopes to grow a wheat crop until he has planted the seed and cared for the land. This principle can be applied to our spiritual life.

Just as seed are planted in the ground, Christ says "The Word is the spiritual seed. Luke 8:11 tells us, "The seed is the word of God." That spiritual seed can be planted through hearing the word proclaimed or through study. Then it must be nourished so it will produce a Christian. A Christian is one who has allowed that seed to grow and he has been obedient to it.

After the farmer has planted the wheat seed, he then has a hope that it will produce life after its kind. Just as the wheat seed gives hope to the farmer so the spiritual seed gives hope of a spiritual life to the heart (mind) of man. Below we list some scriptures pointing out our hope of a spiritual nature.

If that spiritual seed grows it produces a hope even in death. Proverbs 14:32, declares, "The wicked is driven away in his wickedness but the righteous hath hope in his death." Outside of Christ though, no man has hope.

That hope anticipates the coming of Christ. Paul writes these words to Titus, "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." Titus 2:13. Every man should be able to happily look for Christ to return. No one without hope of the eternal life with God could do so.

Hope is the anchor of the soul. In Hebrews 6:18-19, these words appear, "That by two immutable (unchangeable) things, in which it was impossible for God to lie, we might have a strong consolation, who have fled for refuge to lay hold upon the hope set before us: which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast, and which entereth into that within the veil..."
