## Senior Citizens Group Strive for Healthier, Happier Lives

"Grow old along with me...the best is yet to be" is a poetic myth, according to many older people. Growing old with someone is fine as long as that someone is there. But when one is alone, growing old can become a very unhappy, debilitating experience. Eating meals alone, if one eats at all; lacking transportation, because one's driver's license has been taken away or because one doesn't drive; all these add up to an almost unbearable loneliness for older people.

The Crowell Senior Citizens Center and volunteers strive to make the lives of older citizens happier and healthier. Believing that food and good nutrition, transportation, and contact with others are among the important needs of an older person, those at the Center try to make it a happy gathering place not only where old friends meet, but also where old friends make new friends.

Perhaps two of the biggest handicaps older citizens must overcome are timidity about taking advantage of what the Center has to offer, and lack of knowledge about what is available.

Food isn't just food, it's

fellowship, being with others, and companionship. A hot covered dish luncheon is served at noon each Tuesday and games and recreation are available throughout the day. Each Thursday crafts or dominoes and 42 are planned. Once a month a program is taken to the Nursing home. Senior Citizens like to do for others also. Special parties are planned for each month. The last Tuesday of the month is the birthday luncheon, honoring all senior citizens with a birthday that month. The second Thursday evening at 6 p. m., a 42 party is held. An LV nurse visits the Center once a month. Trips are taken to points of special interest such as the Copper Breaks State Park for picnics, Palo Duro Canyon to see the musical "Texas." Programs are shared with the surrounding communities and towns.

Officers, made up of members, and the Senior Citizens Aide plan programs for each Tuesday luncheon. The ministers from the churches in town come and give devotionals, colored slides and films are shown by different volunteers. Programs are given by the social security office, food stamp

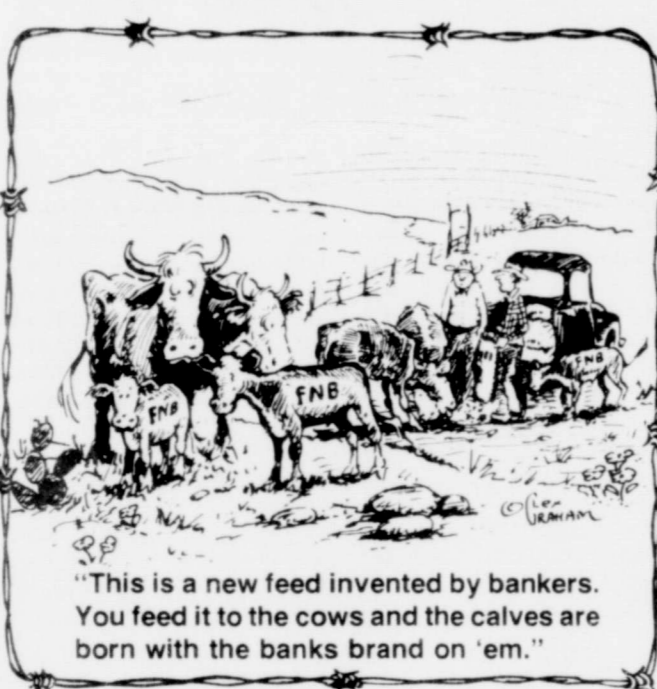

Storewide clearance sales in January offer a great opportunity for the careful shopper to save 10-50 percent or even more.

For the best selection, shop during the early days of the sale—but for best prices,

shop toward the end of the sale.

Some of the biggest savings during January are found on Christmas cards, wrapping paper and decorations, but consider storage space before stocking up on large quantities of Christmas notions. These items are "quick sellers," so be prepared to face a crowd.

Traditionally, January is "white sale" month—so check your linen closet to see what needs replacing among sheets, towels, tablecloths and other household linens.

Remember that sheets and towels can be used for a variety of creative purposes including curtains, tablecloths and pillow covers.

Clothing is also a good buy this month as retailers are making room for their spring merchandise.

Clothing that is particularly for fall and winter may be out-dated next season, so shop with an eye on fashion trends.

But since the clothes on sale are often from last season, before buying consider whether the item can be worn soon or if you'll have to wait until next year's season. 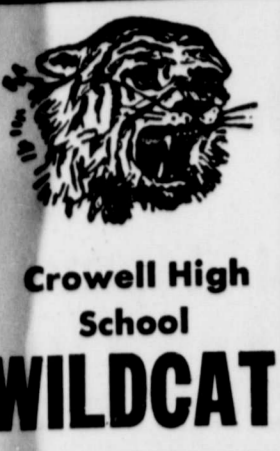

Miscellaneous extensions include 2 meters on the Merl Kincaid estate, A. V. McCombs and Fred R. Borchardt.
