Rattlesnake Hunt Set for March 19-21

The week end of March 19, 20 and 21 will be the dates for the annual Rattlesnake Hunt in Crowell sponsored by the Crowell Fire Department. Fire Chief Leonard Tole said this week that Barney Bennett, professional snake handler, will again be here for snake handling and venom extraction demonstrations. Snakes will be purchased by registered hunters at 50 cents per pound Saturday and 35 cents a pound Sunday, after 1 p. m. Hunters must register to be eligible for prizes. Prizes will consist of \$25 for the longest snake, \$15 for the heaviest and \$10 for the most snake.

Four Men in Race for Two Vacancies on School Board

A total of four candidates seeking the two vacancies coming up on the Crowell School board. The deadline for securing a name on the ballot expired Wednesday, March 3. Jon Don Brown entered before the deadline. He already announced as a candidate were Baxter W. Gentry who is also seeking first term on the board. Candidates Mike Bird and David Borchardt are also seeking re-election.

County Receives General Rain

A slow-falling late winter rain brought smiles to the faces of Foard County farmers early this week and

gave the small grain prospects a boost.

The rain, accompanying a slow moving cold front,

measured an official .96 inch by the government gauge in Crowell. Practically all of the county received at least an inch with 1.2 inches reported in the Four Corners area. About an inch fell at Thalia.

The county had received heavy rains last fall, and there is lots of subsoil moisture. However, the top soil was getting extremely dry after a balmy and dry January and February.

A dry cold front pushed through the area late last week and the mercury dropped to 25 degrees early Friday. Opinions vary as to whether the sub-freezing temperatures held on long enough to ruin the fruit tree blooms which were already out.

The annual Foard County 4-H and FFA Project Show will begin Friday afternoon, March 12. This marks the thirty-ninth year for the show which is sponsored by the Rotary Club.

As in the past, animals (steers, sheep, and swine) must be at the show grounds no later than 2 p. m. on Friday. A health certificate will be issued after the livestock inspection by Dr. Doug Matthews of Vernon.

This year's entries will include a number of steers, swine, and sheep. Also, this will be the first year the

stocker cattle program was conducted by 4-H and FFA members. This program should be of particular interest to area livestock producers.

Having the show in the new Crowell Ag Pavilion will be a big improvement, especially considering the recent weather. All activities will be conducted in this new facility.

Judging of the livestock will begin at 8:30 a. m. on Saturday with the sale to begin at 1:30 p. m.

Exhibitors are reminded that they will not be allowed to sell more than one animal in a division through the auction. Also, the entry weights as set forth in the rules for the show will be followed.

Steers must weigh at least 800 pounds, sheep from 80 to 120 pounds, and hogs from 210 to 240 pounds.

The 4-H Clubs of Foard County will again have the food sale during the show. Money from the sale is used to sponsor county-wide 4-H activities during the year. This activity is being directed by Loretta Hardin, district county extension agent.

All area residents are invited to attend the show.

Walker said another young man, a passenger in the Cash vehicle, was uninjured in the mishap.

Boys Basketball Team Wins Second Place in State Tourney

The Crowell Wildcat basketball team, a battling courageous squad all year who came from behind many times during the regular season and post-season play, clawed their way to the finals in the state tournament at Austin last Saturday before they were overcome by the Broadus Bulldogs in the game to determine the state class A Champion for 1976.

The Wildcats ended a fine season by being presented a trophy as the No. 2 Class A team in Texas. Incidentally, there are 206 class A basketball teams in the state this year, with 4,367 boys participating. Presentation of the trophy was made by Dr. Lynn McCraw, professor of physical and health education and a member of the State Executive Committee.

This squad of Wildcats, by reaching the finals, accomplished what no other

Crowell team in history had been able to accomplish.

In addition to being a fine team, the CHS boys were guided by excellent leadership in Coach Randall Ryan, who is in his second year here.

The Wildcats got into the finals the hard way--after an overtime hard-fought win over Coppell 82 to 74. Coppell had defeated Archer City in the regional tournament at Denton the same week end that Crowell had won over Seagraves at Lubbock. The game was close all the way and was 69-all at the end of regulation play. In the overtime period, Crowell outscored Coppell 13 to 5 to take the win. David Bell led the Crowell scoring with 25 points, Ricky Coleman had 24, Dee Finley 17, Melvin Westover 14, and Marvin Coleman 2.

In the final game, Crowell lost to a fine Broadus team

with lots of height, speed and stamina. Broadus is located east of Lufkin. It has a high school enrollment of 130 students and the school does not have football in its athletic program. Terry Teagle, a 6-3 sophomore who made all tournament at the state meet last year, scored 57 points in two games at Austin this year. Final score of the title game was 82 to 46. Bell with 16 points, led the Cat scoring. Westover and Ricky Coleman each had 9 points. Jack Whitley scored 7, Finley had 4 and Marvin Coleman 1.

The Wildcats were humble in their victories and dignified in their defeat.

Concluding their basketball playing days for Crowell High School were Rocky Glasscock, Jack Whitley, Ricky Coleman, David Bell, Steve Stapp, David Crafton and Dee Finley.

Conservation Program
We are now taking applications for conservation practices for 1976. If you have any questions about the program, please contact this office.

Wheat and Barley Certifications
Producers that have any intention of proving their wheat or barley yields in the future should report their planted acres before May 1st. In order to prove yields we must have production records and planted acres for five consecutive years. If you do not report your wheat or barley planted acres this year, it would be 1983 before you could prove your yield.

Final Grazing Date
The Texas State ASC committee has set March 29, 1976, as the final grazing date for wheat and barley in Foard County.

If you plan to graze any wheat off, these acres should be reported before March 20th, so they will not be counted against your disaster allotment.

Failed Wheat
Wheat that has been damaged by a natural disaster must be reported to this office and appraised before it is destroyed in order to be eligible for a disaster payment.

Cotton Transfers, Released, or Reapportionment
The final date for releasing or requesting reapportioned cotton allotments is May 1, 1976. The sale or lease of cotton allotments within Foard County must also be completed by May 1st.

If you are not planning to use your cotton allotment, releasing it to the county committee will protect the yield and history for one year.

Allotment Notices
Last month we mailed the 1976 allotment and yield notices. Since then I have had quite a few complaints about wheat yields being cut. The wheat allotments and

yields are set for the nation at Washington, D. C., this office has no control over what allotment or yields individual farms receive.

Handicapped Children Are Sought

The Texas Education Agency is beginning a statewide effort to locate and identify every handicapped child of school age not now in school.

State Board of Education Chairman Joe Kelly Butler of Houston announced the beginning of project "Child Find" at a Capitol news conference in Austin.

"Child Find," he said, "is designed to search out young people between the ages of 3 and 21 who are blind, deaf, physically handicapped, emotionally disturbed, or mentally retarded, and those with learning disabilities."

The program will be implemented by education service centers in 20 regions throughout Texas, with the cooperation of the state's 1,121 independent school districts. In each region, door-to-door contacts will be made in one specific community served by a school district with an average daily attendance of approximately 3,000 students.

Kelly said through the news media and through door-to-door canvasses, handicapped children not in school will be contacted, their families will receive counseling services, and the children will begin receiving the education they need.

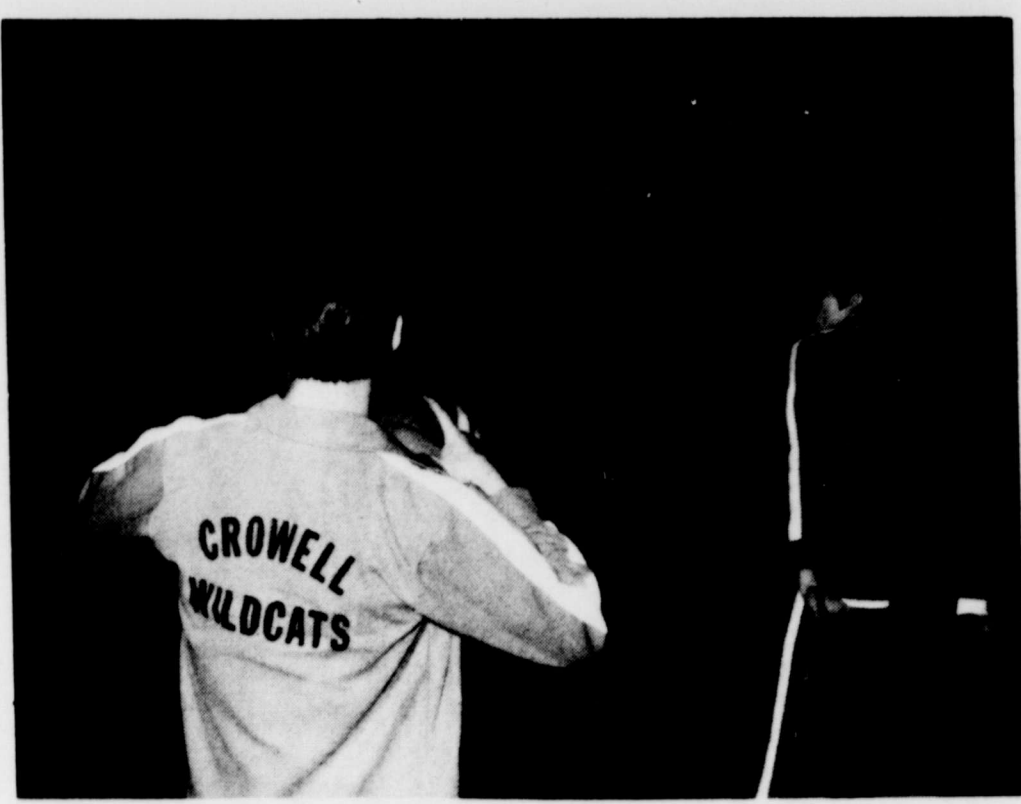

**Gene Heatly
Is Rotary
Speaker**

on the Supreme Court and this number can be changed at any time by the Congress. He added there are 9 circuit courts of civil appeals across the country. He added that federal judges are appointed for life, and mentioned that in some instances this has been a detriment for the nation. He added also that "some federal judges are tyrants."

Methodists Planning Revival

It isn't exactly commonplace for a minister in the United Methodist Church to have been born in Beirut, Lebanon and have as parents a Greek Orthodox priest and wife, the late Reverend and Mrs. Anthony Nader. Dr. Sam Nader, pastor of Lubbock's First United Methodist Church, had such an introduction into this world, and a resume' of his life reveals many other interesting facts.

Scheduled to speak at revival services March 21-24 at the First United Methodist Church at Crowell, Texas, Dr. Nader has an impressive background of study, travel and both church and civic accomplishments. He came to America at an early age and attended schools in Louisiana before entering college and the seminary at SMU in Dallas.

While in the university he was active in sports and served as sports editor of The Campus, the SMU publication. Although Nader realized extremely early in life he was called to the ministry, even to receiving his local Preacher's License at the age of fifteen, he maintained his love of football and even served as head football coach at one of his ministerial appointments.

Among other accomplishments Dr. Nader must have had a knack for building and for rebuilding needed facilities for there are several sanctuaries and educational buildings which should bear his name on the cornerstones - including two church buildings and a parsonage in Louisiana destroyed several years ago by Hurricane Audrey.

A resume of Dr. Nader's travels looks like a tour agency until it explains his selection by the U. S. Air Force to tour SAC and NORAD headquarters. He has the distinctive honor of having been the second Methodist minister to preach behind the Iron Curtain and once he interviewed Madame Indira Gandhi.

Proteins such as fish, poultry and meat contain enough of all the essential amino acids, but in other foods such as peanuts, dried beans or wheat, the amount of one or more of the essential amino acids is low.

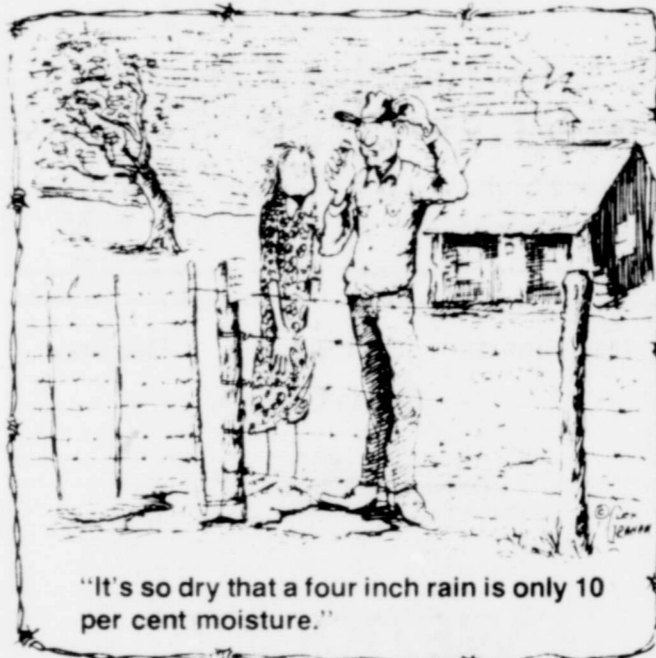

Warning Issued on Pakistan Yarn

The Texas Department of Health Resources in Austin has notified Dr. Walter H. Stapp of Crowell that some hand-spun yarn from import shipments may present the possibility of Anthrax contamination.

The yarn is imported from Pakistan and is distributed nationwide. One shipment of the yarn has a label which says "Tahki Imports, Ltd., imported from Pakistan." The other is sold by Creative Handweavers, Inc. of Los Angeles, Ca., and bears no label.

Consumers who own this yarn should seal the yarn or products made from it in an airtight double plastic bag and call Dr. Stapp for disposal instructions. Consumers should not attempt to sterilize the yarn, incinerate it, or throw it away because of the risk of further contamination.
