### FEEDLOTS TO DETERMINE CATTLE PRICES

Cattle feedlots will play a big part in determining prices of fed and feeder cattle for 1976, says a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Fed cattle supplies are increasing and continued growth will depress prices. Recent resurgence in cattle feeding has been due to better prices for fed cattle as well as a decline in feeding costs due to a large feed grain crop last year. A seasonal decline in cow and non-fed cattle slaughter this spring should boost Choice fed cattle prices.
