Wildlife Management Area Proposed in Foard County

AUSTIN—A wildlife management area in Foard County will be sought at the proposed Crowell Brine Reservoir following approval by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The commission acted March 19 on a recommendation of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service that 10,200 acres around the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers project be managed by the state.

In an effort to reduce chlorides in the Red River, brine from four natural emission areas in Childress and Cottle counties will be piped 75 miles to an open reservoir on Canal Creek near Crowell for evaporation. An estimated 1,000 tons of salt

will be removed daily from the Red River.

According to the federal Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act, compensation must be considered when fish and wildlife is lost to impoundment of federally funded or licensed reservoirs.

Compensation for such construction can take the form of structural changes, relocations or acquisition of lands to partially mitigate for wildlife lands destroyed.

The Crowell site, located in the Rolling Plains ecological region, consists of rough range land with red berry juniper, mesquite, prickly pear and associated plants.

The Rolling Plains is an

important mourning dove nesting area, and yearly has one of the highest nesting populations in the state.

In addition to mourning doves, bobwhite and scaled quail are the more important game species. Migrating waterfowl also use the few water sites and the region is within nesting range of blue-winged teal and mallards.

Acceptance of the federal mitigation plans will enable the P&WD to enhance habitat productivity of the Crowell Brine Disposal lands by such means as clearing sites to produce dove and quail foods and construction of freshwater tanks.

City of Crowell Voters Give Approval to City Sales Tax

Residents of the City of Crowell overwhelmingly endorsed the one per cent city sales tax in the election held

Saturday. The vote was 293 for and 25 against with a total of 321 persons casting ballots. This is one of the

largest city voter turn-outs in recent years.

Guy Todd and J. H. Gillespie were unopposed as candidates for re-election as aldermen and Todd received 286 and Gillespie 274 votes. Holdover members of the Crowell City Council are Mayor Robert Kincaid, and aldermen Charles Branch, Leonard Tole and Glyndon Johnson.

City secretary Mrs. Wilma Cates said Monday that she will be forwarding papers to the state comptroller as to the outcome of the election. She said the tax will be collected beginning the next quarter which will be on July 1. Local businesses will file their first reports of the 1 per cent tax at the close of the quarter September 30, and Mrs. Cates says it is doubtful if the City receives any of the tax money before January 1, 1977.

Fish to Be Poisoned at Park Lake

Park personnel will poison fish in the big pond fishing area at Copper Breaks State Park Thursday, April 8, Park Supt. Bob Martin announced Monday.

The poisoning process will begin at 12 noon and the public is invited. No boats will be allowed on the pond during the poisoning process.

Martin said the fish taken in this manner are edible and he added that park rangers will retrieve the fish for those who want them. He added that all state game and fish laws will be enforced.

Incumbents Returned to School Board in Saturday's Election

A total of 455 residents of Crowell school district voted out for the trustee election Saturday and re-

turned the incumbents to new three-year terms. Winning re-election were Floyd Borchardt with 258

votes and Mike Bird with 223 votes. Unsuccessful in bids for a first term on the board were Joe Don Brown who received 221 votes and Baxter Gentry who got 186 votes.

In the election to name three members to the county board, all three candidates were unopposed. Walter Ramsey received 20 votes in Precinct 1, David McAmis got 178 votes in precinct 2 and Allison Denton received 33 votes in precinct 3.

Ronnie Denton recently resigned the at-large position on the board and the county board will name his replacement at the May meeting.

Herbert Fish in precinct 4 is the only hold-over member of the county board.

Will Play Coaches' All-Star Game

David Bell, Crowell High School all-state football player this past season, has been chosen to play in the annual Coaches' School All-Star football game to be played in the Astrodome in Houston July 29.

David is one of 44 players selected from across the state. He will be a member of the North squad. Bell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bell, was named to the second team defense Class A all-state football by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

Deposits in Crowell State Bank Near \$8.5 Million

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the close of business March 31, 1976, totaled \$8,440,764.23 which is an all-time high for a bank at or about the end of the

first quarter of a year. Deposits are up almost a million dollars from last year at this time, when on April 16, 1975, deposits were \$7,466,821.47. On April 24, 1974, deposits were

\$7,074,354.93 and on March 28, 1973, deposits were \$5,036,328.65.

The last previous bank call was December 31, 1975, and at that time, deposits were \$8,865,615.61.

School Trustees Employ Teachers for Next Year

The Crowell school board, in a called meeting Monday night, covered a wide range of topics including the employment of teachers for the coming year.

Employed for next year were Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Miller and Mrs. Bill Fish. Mrs. Miller was employed as kindergarten teacher, Mr. Miller as junior high history teacher and assistant coach. He will receive \$1400 above state schedule for his coaching duties. Mrs. Fish, a resident of the Vivian community, was employed as fifth grade teacher. Mr. and Mrs. Miller are students at West Texas State University in Canyon and expect to receive their degrees before the fall term begins here.

Supt. Larry Jones told the board that there will be at least 39 students in kindergarten next year, which necessitates the hiring of another teacher.

Other teachers hired Monday night were Mrs. Margaret Daniel, Mrs. Anita Phillips, Mrs. Margaret C. Rasberry, Mrs. Faye Cates, Mrs. Dixie Hord, Mrs. Pat Streit, Mrs. Virginia Smith, Carl Brock, Mary Brown, Jim Mack Gafford, Mrs. Jean Halbert, Gary Hobson, Miss Rebecca Hudgens, Don Welch and James Welch.

In special education, Mrs. Billie Crafton was hired for secondary grades and Mrs. Frances Cook for elementary. Title I remedial math teacher hired was Mrs. Myrna Jones and Mrs. Faye Statser was employed as Title I remedial reading instructor.

Aides hired for next year include Mrs. Martha Brock, Mrs. Edith Cash, Mrs. Wilma Coleman, Mrs. Idah Pearl Crowell, Mrs. Rachel Dunham, Mrs. Ruby Hickman and Mrs. Betty Pierce.

Retiring at the end of the current year will be Mrs. Martha Thomas and Mrs. Zelma Justin. Mrs. Randall Ryan will not be teaching this next year, and Mrs. June McLain and Mrs. Myrtle Taylor are resigning, it was announced. Mrs. McLain has been a classroom teacher and Mrs. Taylor an aide and cafeteria bookkeeper.

Mr. Jones told board members there still remains to be hired a third grade teacher and a junior high language arts teacher. In other action, the board: —Canvassed the trustee

election held last Saturday and declared Mike Bird and Floyd Borchardt winners.

—Reorganized the board with Mike Bird re-elected president and Jeff Bell vice president.

—Approved payment of \$4,773.53 in current bills.

—Heard a report that certain disabled veterans may claim tax exemptions. School secretary J. H. Gillespie reported that several veterans have already made application for the exemption allowed under the law.

—Took no action on changing the school day from 6 to 7 periods.

—Approved the requesting that transportation money come direct to the local school instead of to the County as it has been for many years.

—Approved open house for the school next year and stressed that less emphasis be made in preparing special displays in the classroom.

—Adopted next year's calendar which has school starting on August 16 and ending on May 23. This includes 180 school days, 10 teacher workdays and 11 holidays.

—Turned down a request for a bus to be furnished for a wheat producers tour in the county.

—Approved the dates of June 28 through July 12 for maintenance staff vacations. —Okayed spending \$300 for an automatic watering system for the football field. This system will be built by James Streit.

—Heard Mr. Jones tell about the regional school board workshop to be held at McNeil Junior High School in Wichita Falls April 29. He stated that Weldon Tabor, president of the Quanah school board and son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Houston Adkins of Crowell, will be presiding at the workshop.

—Agreed to look into the possibility of providing lights for the tennis courts.

—Heard a report that the pumps used on several water wells located on the campus had been removed and stored. Mr. Streit will probably be using one of the pumps in the football field watering system.

Approved the purchase of a water softener for the school cafeteria.

—Approved the spending of \$6,552.00 for the Hoffman

People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month calendar quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter.

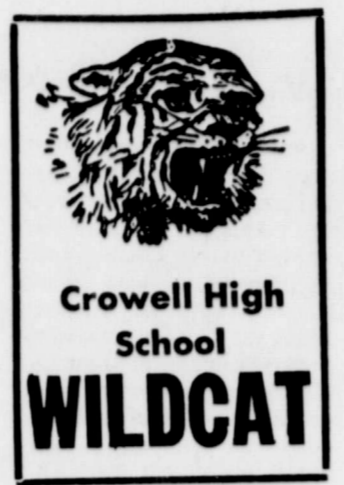

Farmers Are Converting Land to Grass

By Foard County Soil & Water Conservation District

Henry Black, Billy Ray Dunn, Leslie Thomas, Bill Bell, W. F. Statser, and H. L. Ayers plan to convert land to grass this year.

The grass planting season for the Foard County Soil and Water Conservation District is best in March, April and May. Land owners are advised to sprig or sod bermudagrass after March 15 and before May 1. Bermuda sprigging and sodding does best when good, juicy dormant or semi-dormant, well fertilized roots are planted into a moist but firm seedbed. It is very important that the bermuda roots be protected as much as possible from exposure to wind and sunlight between the digging of the roots and getting them transplanted.

Ermelo lovegrass and kleingrass plantings have done best when planted in April and early May because of our having better moisture conditions and less high winds. A firm and moist seedbed are important during the time that the seed is sprouting and making the new roots. Competition from other plants that remove moisture and sunlight should be eliminated as much as possible. The native grasses such as the blue grama, sideoats grama, indiangrass and switchgrass can be seeded in early spring, if there is an adequate dead litter to plant into. The native grasses are planted very shallow. The use of a dead litter cover is recommended because without a dead litter to plant into, the native grasses have trouble from the wind removing the surface moisture necessary to keep the new plants from dying.

Most grasses are planted on land that is depleted or low in fertility. The use of fertilizer on weak soil will be the difference of success and failure in establishing grass.

Chris holds the God and Country Award and is a member of the Order of the Arrow. He has also made the mile swim and is a scout life guard, a den chief and an assistant senior patrol leader. He is an eighth grade student in Clarendon Junior High School.

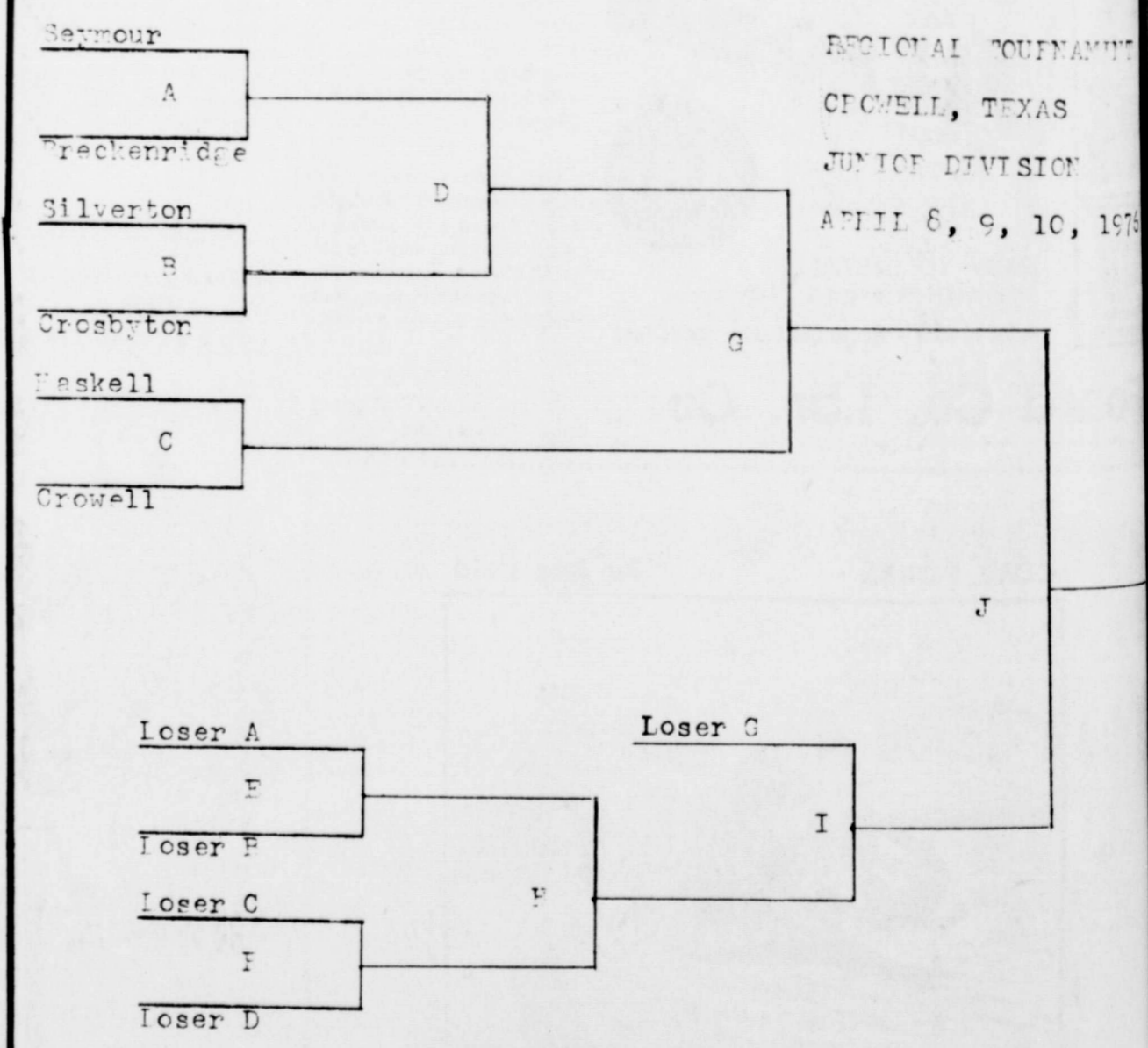
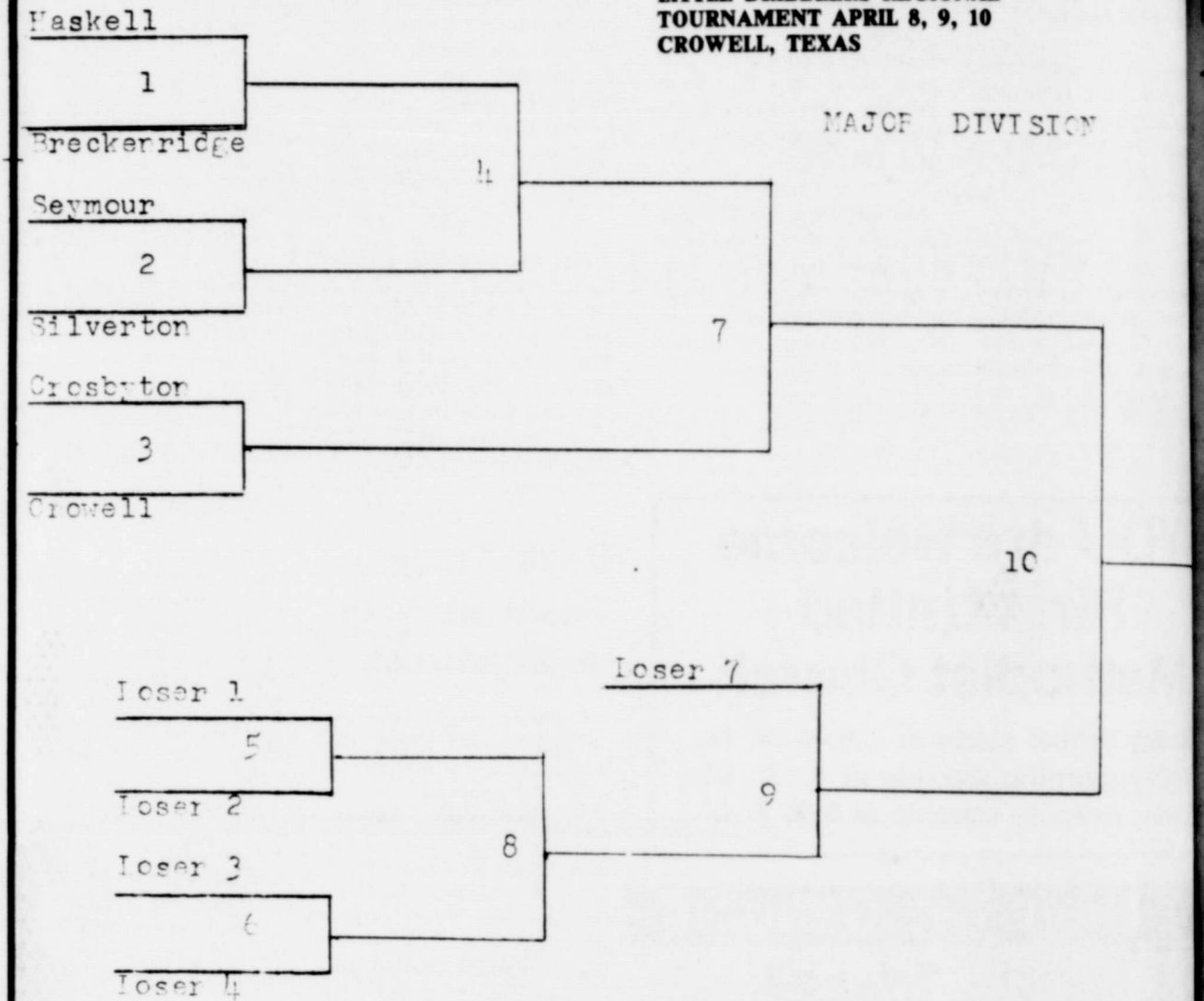

The only lesson that we seemed to have learned from the war is that we have to stay armed and prepared. There seems to be as much selfishness in the world as ever. Each group is out to get all it can regardless of consequences or the rights of others. This, it seems, was the thing that caused the war.

The radiator repair shop at the C. E. Dunn place three blocks south of the square has been re-opened.

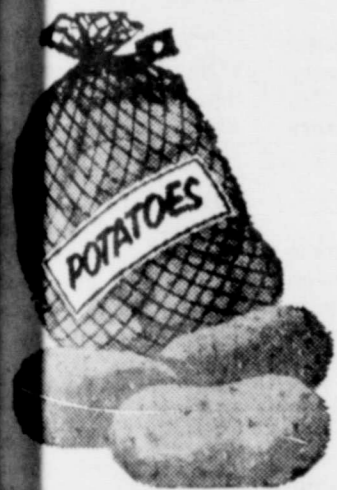
