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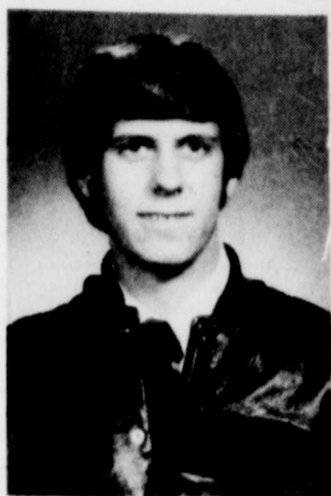
## David Bell to Play in Game July 29th

The Crowell City Council is advising in an ad in this week's issue that there is an ordinance prohibiting the shooting of firecrackers and fireworks in the limits of the City of Crowell. They add that there is a fine for violation of the ordinance.

Although in the past the ordinance has not been enforced, the extremely dry condition of grass and weeds in town add a fire hazard to the always present danger of injury in shooting fireworks. Cooperation of parents in stopping their children from shooting fireworks in the city limits is being asked by the council.

## Crowell Students Rank High at A&M

Two students from Crowell have earned "Distinguished Student" ranking at Texas A&M University. They are Susan C. Haynie, education curriculum and instruction, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Autry Jr. of Crowell, and Rhonda J. Naylor, management, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Vecera of Crowell.

The undergraduate honor is awarded students who have excelled academically. Recipients must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio out of a possible 4.0 during the most recent grading period. "Distinguished Student" ranking is limited to 10 per cent of Texas A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

## Screwworms Found in Haskell Co.

This year, screwworm infestations have already been reported in Haskell and Baylor counties, according to Emory P. Boring of Vernon, area entomologist.

Boring says that producers should watch their livestock closely for signs of screwworm infestations. Any larvae suspected of being screwworms should be sent to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, P. O. Box 969, Mission, Texas, 78572, for identification.

Boring says vials and mailing tubes for this purpose are available at the local county extension agent's office.

## Museum News

When Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Norris Jones of Clovis, N. M. signed the guest register recently, they became numbers 2000 and 2001. During the past week, our visitors have come from Mullins and Charleston, South Carolina; Miami, Okla.; Cincinnati, Ohio.; Las Vegas, Nev.; Prairie City,

Oregon; Great Falls, Montana; Corona, Cal.; Denver, Colo.; Newton, Iowa; Oxford, England, and from points all over Texas.

We don't have the gun that killed Billy the Kid, but we do have a bunk from Crowell's first old jail. When Mack Baswell of Miami, Okla., was a recent visitor at the museum, this reminded him of a day in April, 1931, when the corner stone was closed at the present jail. Camel cigarettes had just started advertising their product in a pack that would keep them fresh indefinitely, so someone went to Reeder Drug who furnished the

package of these cigarettes to be closed in the corner stone "until such time that someone will get to smoke a fresh pack of 1931 cigarettes."

In one of Mrs. Carrie Hart's scrap books, we found the account of this event. In part, it said:

Most of the objects were placed in a copper box which was placed inside the stone after its top had been soldered by O. O. Hollingsworth for the purpose of making it airtight.

A bound volume of all the 1930 editions of the Foard County News was too large to be placed in the copper box, however, it was wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed inside.

A Bible furnished by Ada Evelyn Smith, younger daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Woodie W. Smith, was placed in the box. Other objects included a number of letters; several recent issues of Foard County News; advertising literature concerning the latest automobiles and picture shows; a telephone directory; a number of snapshots such as a picture of the completion of the highway paving to Crowell; Foard County's first real oil well; a view of the residential section of Crowell taken from the water tower; data concerning present prices on various items and services; a folder containing various statistical and descriptive matter about Crowell and Foard County, and a package of Camel cigarettes.

Our volunteer workers have been Ellen Wells, Winnie Brown, Grace Davis, Marie Callaway, Ethel Ferguson, and Bonnie Johnson. Toni Ranjel worked two days at the museum.

Come by and see our "store items". We are having some really nice things coming in which you will want to see.

Our cash donors are: anonymous \$5; Mrs. Don Smith of Austin, \$5; Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Smith, La Grange, Tx., \$20; Nona Backus, Lubbock, Tx. \$10; Oran and Texas Ford, \$10.

Our recent acquisitions are: a set of laminated papers, Mrs. Cone Green, Levelland; a New Testament, presented to Grover Cole in 1898 by his Sunday School teacher, Mattie Beverly; this was brought to the museum by Mrs. Dumas Hopkins. James Welch brought the scalemodel steam locomotive, freight car, oil car, and caboose, all on a track, which was made about 1940 by his brother John Jr. It is powered by a 6-volt Ford car horn.

### Local Resident Hears from National Representatives

Marion Hughston of Crowell, one of the concerned Foard County residents who has written his senator and congressman concerning the dangers of PL 93-641, the National Health Planning Act of 1975 has received letters from two representatives.

The News has had a series of articles recently concerning some of the dangers of the new law and urging residents to write their congressman and senators to change the law which from various reports will cause the closing of small town hospitals.

From the replies received by Mr. Hughston, the cause for alarm over the bill is apparently not shared by this area's congressman.

Rep. Hightower in his letter to Mr. Hughston concerning the law, stated "In talking with the Texas Hospital Association and others, I am convinced that one of the dangers listed are not real. PL 93-641 directs that a system of planning agencies be developed to best utilize resources for future health care facilities. Parallel to and in conjunction with this law, the state of Texas has implemented a new certificate of need program under the Texas Health Facilities Commission to examine the need for the construction of new health care facilities.

The commission is directed by state law to especially consider the requirements of rural and under-served areas. I have been assured that the federal law contains no authority to close a hospital or nursing home."

So, the differences of opinion continue.

### CHRYSANTHEMUMS FOR FALL COLOR

Get your landscape in shape for fall color by planting rooted cuttings of chrysanthemums, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The plants will be compact and will not need much staking. Plant chrysanthemums in a sunny area in fertile soil. Use a mulch to conserve moisture and control weeds. Side-dress with ammonium sulfate fertilizer six weeks after planting and again in mid-August. For a lot of flowers, pinch one inch off the end of each new shoot when the shoots are three inches long. However, no pinching should be done after July.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is releasing twin-seeded sorghum breeding material to commercial seed companies, and the outcome should be another boost in sorghum production. However, two to three years will be required by commercial companies to produce enough planting seed for sale to producers. The twin-seeded trait in the

It was a warm and friendly time, a pleasant time, a happy time. It was back in the good old days when people had time to visit together. It was.....

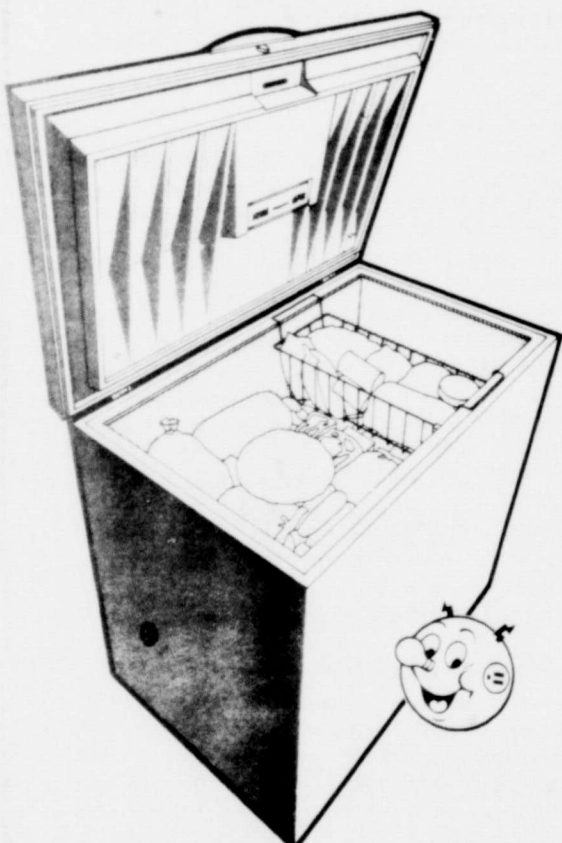

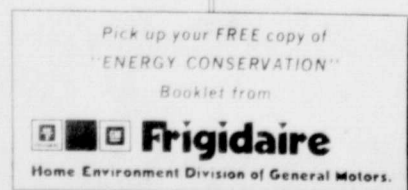

Patterns for the adopted flowers of the then nations 48 states were printed weekly in a Texas newspaper. Mrs. Todd faithfully secured these. Following instructions, she then applied in actual color each flower on a block and embroidered the flower's outline and the abbreviation of the state. Colors in fabric were not as varied as they presently are. To assure the realistic color of the flower, it was often necessary for Mrs. Todd or Mrs. Turner to first color the material with the desired

shade crayon then press with a heated iron and then proceed as usual with the block. The quilt bears the date March 12, 1932.

A friendship quilt made in 1902 was Mrs. Todd's wedding quilt. Scraps from the dresses of her girl friends were pieced into blocks and then given to Mrs. Todd. One block is made from scraps of her wedding dress. This quilt covered the Todd's bed at their golden wedding reception.

Also shown was a "crazy" quilt which contains no two blocks alike. Mrs. Turner was able to identify the majority of these patterns. She noted the different stitches in the quilts and that each was quilted according to the design.

The speaker gave some background information on the ancient art of quilting which has become a current rage. During the 19th century, the time consuming art flourished in the form of the quilting bee—also a social occasion. Presently the quilting revival is a collector item and prices are expensive. The Oklahoma 4-H organization had made a bicentennial quilt featuring the resources of the state.

## Monthly Medicare Premiums Going Up on July 1st

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up starting July 1.

The basic premium rate will go from \$6.70 to \$7.20 a month, according to Carl R. Beisner, Social Security Claims Representative in Vernon.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The protection is offered to people reaching 65 and over who are eligible for social security or railroad retirement benefits, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security or similar railroad retirement disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more, and to many people under 65 with permanent kidney failure.
