He was selected for membership in Phi Beta Kappa, the national honor fraternity which was founded in 1776.

BIG TEXAS COTTON CROP

The 1976 Texas cotton crop may pass the billion dollar mark if market conditions continue strong and good harvest weather prevails. This would make the crop second only to that produced in 1973 which tipped the scales at \$1.2 billion, notes an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Cotton acreage on June 30 totaled 4.9 million which is up from the 4.3 million acres planted last year.

Judge Named to Committee

Foard County Judge Seth Halbert has been appointed to the National Association of Regional Councils Human Resources Policy Committee, according to a letter he has received from Wes C. Uhlman of Washington, D. C., president of the association.

Board Okays Purchase of New Doors for School

The Crowell school board in a regular meeting Monday night covered a wide range of topics including the purchase of doors for 12 openings in the high school and grade school.

The cost of the doors will be \$12,230.00 and will include five sets of doors for the grade school building and seven for the high school.

The doors will be purchased from a Lubbock firm. Also, the board bought a used copying machine from a Wichita Falls firm for the sum of \$845.00.

In addition to approving the minutes for three board meetings in June, the payment of some \$2,364.57 in current bills was also okayed.

The board ordered a new 54-passenger school bus anticipating that it will probably be delivered in August 1977.

For the first time, the board adopted a budget for the athletic department of the school. Athletic director Printiss Gidney met with the board to explain his proposed budget which is expected to be about

\$20,000.00 for the coming school year. The budget includes all sports for both high school and junior high.

Mrs. Ruth Daniel was employed as secretary to Supt. Larry Jones replacing Mrs. Marion Crowell who has resigned. Mrs. Daniel's salary will be \$5,130 per year.

The four cafeteria employees were rehired for the coming year. They are Mrs. Gloria Pierce, supervisor; and Mmes. Bertha Brasher, Anna Eavenson and Jodie Miller. Each received 15c per hour wage increases. Approximate wages for the four are \$2,994 per year for the three workers and \$3,549 for the supervisor.

The board dismissed Betty S. LaFlower as director of the Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing for "unprofessional behavior" and hired the assistant, Mrs. Hazel Marlow, as director of the school for the remainder of the term. The school will be completed in October.

Supt. Jones read a letter to the board from the Dallas office of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare stating that complaints

had been received by that office in regard to the local school's hair policy for boys.

HEW has determined that school policies having different hair rules for males and female students is a violation of civil rights. The school was given 20 days in which to send HEW a copy of the school policy in regard to hair length. The local policy as taken from the school handbook, states "Males are to have clean shaven faces and acceptable haircuts. Hair should not extend over the eye brows, ears, or collar."

Jones was directed to send the entire local handbook to the Dallas HEW office.

The superintendent told the board that attendance records must be much more complete than in the past and will require more work than previously. He reminded the board that the school system now has one less aide than last year.

Due to the absence of one board member Monday night, no bus foreman was hired. Another meeting is set for Thursday, July 15, at 8 p. m. to hire a bus foreman, employ the maintenance staff and bus drivers.

ASCS Issues Newsletter for July

James O. Sabbe, executive director of the Foard County ASCS office, issued the following July newsletter to Foard County producers:

Cotton Producers

The final day to report cotton in Foard County is July 15, 1976. If you released or transferred your 1976 cotton allotment you will have nothing to report, only producers with effective 1976 allotments must report. If you have an effective allotment but didn't plant any cotton you still will have to report to zero cotton for 1976.

Wheat Producers

We are still computing disaster payments, obtaining signatures and making field visits, as soon as these things are completed we will start making payments.

We think we should be able to start payments in the next two or three weeks.

Crop Reports

In early July, about 24,700 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas. Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county.

Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals.

Emergency Conservation Measures

All ECM practices that were approved last fall for flood damage must be completed by September 1, 1976. After September 1st each application that has not been reported will no longer be eligible for Federal Cost-shares. We are paying 80% of the cost of restoring conservation measures.

Canning probably offers greater money-saving opportunity than other methods of home food preservation. But the most economical methods depend on the family's eating habits. Money is not saved by canning green beans, for example, if the family only likes frozen ones, reminds Frances Reasonover, with the Extension Service.

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STATE 4-H HORSE SHOW

Calendar Turn-Back Is Refreshing

As county residents pause this year to observe the 200th birthday of our nation, a turnback of the calendar could be refreshing.

Foard County, in 1776, was a site of rolling prairies covered with an abundant growth of native grass and without the presence of unwanted "invaders" such as mesquite and prickly pear.

Buffalo and other wildlife grazed the prairies and provided food for the native American Indian. However, nature and the Indian kept wildlife population in check and the rangeland did not suffer from over-use. Water and wind erosion was no problem as the roaming buffalo herds left sufficient cover on the land for protection.

The herd would graze the succulent plants and then move on to "greener pastures", giving the grazed area time for rest and recuperation. Many progressive-minded cattlemen of today have adopted this theory in their grazing plans with deferred grazing and pasture rotation.

Near the turn of the century the first white settlers arrived, afterwards farmers began to break-out the fertile prairies into farm land.

The first major change in the country side in centuries began to evolve in Foard County.

Inadequate equipment and improper farming techniques on the rolling prairies led to severe water erosion problems. The scars are still present and conservation-minded farmers in the county, with the assistance from Soil Conservation Service technicians, have waged a battle to restore the land.

Many years of proper grazing use, cropping systems and conservation practices will be needed to restore the countryside to what it was in 1776.

Wouldn't it be great if county residents celebrating the tricentennial could look out across the county and say, "that's the way it was 300 years ago".

Foard County SCS personnel, in cooperation with the Foard County Soil and Water Conservation District, are ready to assist farmers and ranchers in obtaining this goal.

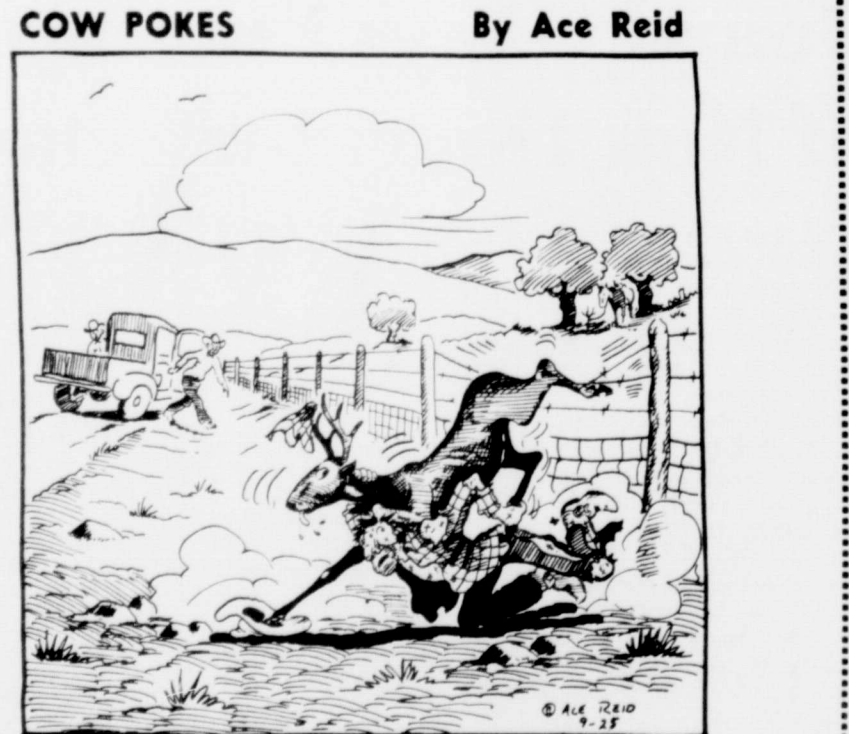

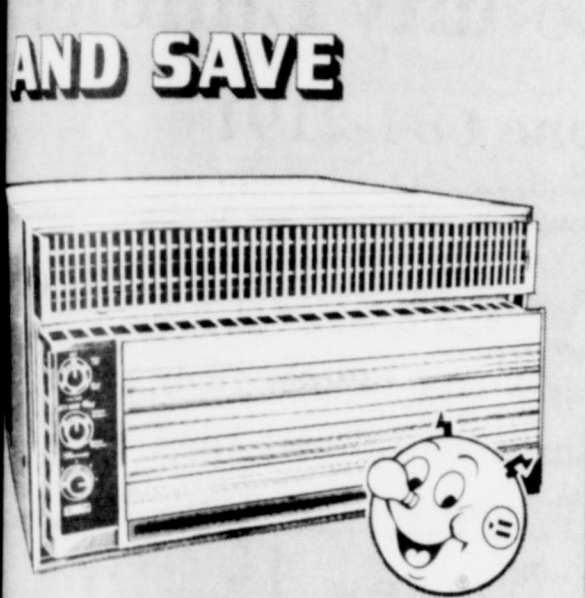

RC&D and Local School Sign Contract

The Four Winds project of Childress, Cottle, Foard and Hardeman counties will have first construction work started within the next few weeks. The Crowell Independent School District signed the first measure plan for RC&D financial assistance in the project area on May 17, 1976. A project agreement to do the first years work was signed by Superintendent Larry Jones on June 24, 1976.

A concrete curb will be installed within the next few weeks around areas on the campus to be shaped and seeded to grass during the following years. The curb installation will be paid for with RC&D funds at an estimated cost of about \$4,500.00.

The school will install about 1600 feet of pipeline over parts of the campus to water grass scheduled for establishment in future years. Cost of the pipeline is about \$1,700.00.

Both of these projects are scheduled for completion before school starts this fall.

Next summer the RC&D will be used to establish about 1800 feet of wind-breaks over the campus, shape and establish grass on about 2 acres and install two waterways to flow excess water from the campus. The school will be responsible for watering the trees and grass during establishment for their share of the work.

Mental Retardation Series

MERCURY USE FORBIDDEN AND BANNED

Citing health hazards, the Environmental Protection Agency is banning use of Mercury in most pesticides and in paints.

The EPA's "preventive measure" was said by the Associated Press to have been sparked by the case in Alamogordo, New Mexico, where members of a family became blind and suffered nervous system damage after eating meat from pigs fed seed contaminated by mercury-treated pesticide. The agency also said deaths resulting from human consumption of mercury contaminated food have been reported in Iraq and Japan.

The EPA order on mercury does not apply to products already on the market, but bans future use of mercury in these products. The ban applied to paints, varnishes and lacquers, where mercury is used to kill bacteria in the can, and after the paint is applied, to kill fungi and prevent mildew. The ban also covers mercury used to treat seed, including wheat seed, to kill bacteria and mercury used for treating turf to combat fungus, an application that is widespread on golf greens.

Mercury has long been designated as a hazardous air pollutant. In addition, mercury is one of 9 toxic substances due to be restricted in the amount which can be released into waterways.
