### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.I.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water develop ment purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development Mississippi River and also project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:



### EXEMPTION MAY LOWER Died Sunday FARMLAND TAXES

A recent Texas Supreme Court decision could save part-time farmers and ranchers many tax dollars, according to an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The court held that farmers and ranchers may qualify for agricultural tax exemptions on farm real estate even though they earn more than half their income from other sources. This ruling will help farm and ranch owners who get incomes from a variety of sources, such as business investments, royalty payments and other jobs, but who spend a majority of their time on the farm or ranch.

Officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division say they now are taking requests for channel catfish, sunfish and largemouth bass to be delivered in

According to P&WD hatchery coordinator Ted Lowman, deadline for receving application is Jan. 1, 1977, but Lowman encouraged landowners with ponds to apply early.

'The department will provide the three species of fish free of charge," said Lowman. "To qualify for the service, a pond either must never have been stocked with the requested species, have completely dried and refilled since the last request."

Lowman said the P&WD keeps computer records of all stockings in private waters and will not stock fish in ponds that presently contain the three species of native



### Fall Hunting Seasons Are Announced

Duck and goose seasons have been announced for this fall by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

For the eastern two-thirds of the state, which includes Foard County, a split duck and coot season is set for Nov. 13-28 and Dec. 11-Jan. 23, a total of 60 days, the maximum allowed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for this year.

In the High Plains portion of western Texas, ducks and coots may be hunted from Nov.2-Jan.23.

Goose hunting in this area is concurrent with the Nov.2-Jan.23 duck and coot season. Daily bag is five geese, no more than two dark geese daily, and possession of five, no more than four dark geese in possession.

A 100-point-plus system for determining duck bag limits is again in effect

this year. Sandhill crane hunters again this year will be required to obtain a free permit from the Parks and Wildlife Department before

Hunting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset for geese, ducks, coots, cranes, snipe and woodcock.


