Unpaid Bills Still Plague Hospital

The Foard County Hospital board of directors at the September meeting last night, heard a report that some \$49,046.86 of unpaid hospital bills have accumulated at the local hospital since January 1 of this year. The board is presently making a study of possible use of a

collection agency in an effort to secure some of these unpaid bills.

Ray Brown, appointed recently by the commissioners court as a new member of the board replacing Bud McLain who resigned, attended for the first time. Two other members, J. C. Autry Jr. and A. L. McGinnis Jr., have both resigned from the hospital board. No replacements have as yet been appointed by the commissioners.

Dr. Walter Stapp attended the board meeting. He and board chairman M. M. Welch have recently been to Dallas to look at ambulances. Ambulance service is being discontinued by Womack's and the county and city and hospital are studying ways to continue to provide ambulance service for Foard County residents.

Judge Seth Halbert presided at a meeting Monday night in his office in the court house as representatives of the county, hospital and city met to discuss the ambulance problem.

The Crowell school board in its regular meeting Monday night appointed Don Daniel of Truscott as a member of the board to replace Jack W. Brown, also of Truscott, who resigned from the board after his wife was named to the local school faculty.

Minutes of two previous meetings were read and approved and the payment of \$1,743.94 in current bills was okayed. The board heard secretary J. H. Gillespie report that tax renditions in the local district total \$13,117,516.00 for the current year.

Charles Trull was named as special education teacher in Crowell-High School replacing Mrs. Billie Crafton who resigned shortly before school started. Trull has 16 students assigned to him, it was reported to the board.

The board spent considerable time discussing securing a maintenance

worker for the school, the local school's hair code which has been determined to be discriminatory by the federal government, and a change in one of the bus routes.

Football coach Printiss Gidney met with the board to report that a number of football players quit Monday afternoon.

Thalia Methodist Church to Observe 90th Birthday

The ninetieth anniversary of the Thalia Methodist Church will be observed with a special program at the church Sunday, September 26. All members, friends and former members and former pastors are invited to attend, Mrs. H. W. Gray, one of the members, said Monday.

Rev. Jarrell Sharp of Seymour, District Superintendent, will conduct the morning worship service. Out of town members will be guests of the resident members for the noon meal to be served at the church.

The Thalia Methodist Church had its beginning in July, 1886, when a small group of people met under a large elm tree on Paradise Creek near Thalia. When the church was first organized at Thalia, it was called the Farmers' Mission. The six charter members were Mrs. J. A. Stegall, Mrs. Hamp Courtney, Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Ricks, and Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Bradbury. In 1889 the church was added to the Vernon District as a part of the Thalia-Margaret Mission. Rev. J. T. Hosmer was the first pastor appointed to serve the church.

After meeting under the large tree the first year, then at the old Nowlin School and later the Thalia School, the first church building was constructed in 1906. The only couple married in this building was Miss Pearl Brown and the late Hiram W. Gray who were wed Dec. 24, 1911. The present church building was built in 1939 and 1940 and on March 1, 1940, the rock veneer structure was dedicated by Bishop Ivan Lee Holt, assisted by District Supt. Cal

Wright and the pastor, Don Cuberson.

More than 45 ministers have served the church since its organization.

Rev. John Pierpont, student at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, is pastor of the Thalia church.

County to Repair Airport Runway

The Foard County commissioners court studied fiscal expenditures for the coming year, but did not adopt a new budget at the regular court meeting Monday morning. Adoption of the budget is expected at the next court session.

In addition to authorizing the payment of current bills, the court authorized Judge Seth Halbert to make some plans and specifications for repair of the women's restroom in the court house.

The court voted to repair with redi-mix the county airport runway and aprons. They also discussed making passable a road north of Rayland to Pease River which for years has been used as a community dump ground. Washes through the years have made the road

Wildcats Host Memphis Friday in Last Non-District Game

The Crowell Wildcats, in their last non-district game of the year, hosts the Memphis Cyclone Friday

night at Dick Todd Field. Game time is 8 o'clock for this traditional battle between two fine Class A

football teams.

Crowell got off to a fast start this year by defeating the Quanah Indians in the season opener, but last week were played to a 0-0 tie by a strong Seymour Panther team. Coach Printiss Gidney said Monday after viewing the Crowell-Seymour game film, that he felt lucky that the Wildcats got out of the game with a tie and not a loss.

Memphis again is a strong power and has a back who is 6 feet 3 inches tall and weighs 195 pounds who runs the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds. Coach Gidney said he broke two long runs in the Cyclone game with Childress last week. Memphis had an open date the first week and lost 20-12 to a strong Childress Bobcat squad which is rated No. 3 in the state in class AA competition.

Coach Gidney said Monday that he will probably be making some changes in the Wildcat lineup for the Memphis contest. None of the Wildcats were injured in the Seymour contest.

County Airport Now Has Lighted Runway

For the first time since the Foard County airport was built back some 25 or 30 years ago, the runway is now lighted for the convenience of aircraft using the field at night.

The lights were provided by donations by the airport board and various pilots who use the runway. The same group also has bought and installed a unicom radio for plane to ground communication at the airport.

Members of the airport board include T. R. Forister, chairman; Joe Ray Setliff, Robert Kincaid, Jon Lee Black and Paul Glover. County Judge Seth Halbert serves as secretary for the board.

Robt. Grimes Employed at Local Bank

A new employee in the Crowell State Bank who recently began his duties there, is Robert D. Grimes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Grimes of Crowell.

Mr. Grimes and his wife, Charlotte, have moved to Crowell and plan to build a new home soon. He is a 9-year veteran of the United States Air Force and served in Vietnam in 1969 and 1970. A pilot, Grimes held the rank of captain at the time he left the Air Force.

A graduate of Monterrey High School in Lubbock, he received his bachelor's degree from Texas Tech in 1967. He enlisted in the Air Force in December of that year and served until shortly before moving to Crowell.

His last assignment in the Air Force was in England.

Cool Front Brings Showers

As a cool front pushed through this area last week, the front spawned a few scattered showers over Foard County. On Tuesday, .60 inch was recorded by the government gauge and on Wednesday afternoon, 1.30 inches fell here. The south and west parts of the county did not receive any moisture and reports from other sections indicate that the rainfall was right here in Crowell.

The front brought the mercury down into the 50s by Friday morning.

Another series of scattered rain fell in parts of the county late Monday. Only .05 inch was recorded by the government gauge here in town. However, Hubert Brown said Tuesday that about 2 inches fell in the Four Corners area southeast of town. Margaret reported 2.5 inches, while Tommy Carpenter said only .4 fell at Thalia.

Tractor Starters Being Stolen

Foard County Sheriff Emmitt Howard this week cautioned Foard County farm tractor owners to keep a close watch on their machines as a number of thefts of starters from farm tractors have been reported.

He added that most of the tractors which have had starters stolen were parked near a major highway or farm-to-market road.

The "National Interim Primary Drinking Water Regulations" was promulgated by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency on December 24, 1975, with these regulations to become effective on June 24, 1977.

A chemical analysis of Lake Greenbelt water has been made and Greenbelt director Henry Black of Crowell, has been notified that the water being supplied by the Greenbelt Water Authority meets the limits established by these new regulations.

RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976

NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Río Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueve el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encaucamiento de la calidad de agua y remueve el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

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**Brush Control
Field Day Set
at Ranches**

Two famous Texas ranches and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will show the public next month some results of eight years in extensive brush control studies.

The annual Statewide Brush Control and Range Improvement Field Day is Oct. 7 this year at the Four Sixes Ranch near Guthrie in King County and at the Pitchfork Ranch 13 miles to the west in Dickens County.

The morning part of the Oct. 7 program is one of tours in air-conditioned buses that will depart the Pitchfork headquarters from 8:30 until 11:30. A Dutch-treat lunch at the Pitchfork Hay Barn will precede the afternoon program that ends at 3 o'clock.

"Those persons touring the ranches," said Harold T. Wiedemann, "can see and hear about the latest developments in the Experiment Station's eight-year program of expanded research into chemical and mechanical means of brush control. They can also inspect what the Four Sixes and the Pitchfork have done in 25 years of extensive brush control."

**Catfish Being
Distributed to
Landowners**

Channel catfish and sunfish now are being delivered to private pondowners who applied for such species of fish prior to Jan. 1 of this year.

Officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Inland Fisheries Division say they now are taking requests for channel catfish, sunfish and largemouth bass to be delivered in 1977.

According to P&WD hatchery coordinator Ted Lowman, deadline for receiving application is Jan. 1, 1977, but Lowman encouraged landowners with ponds to apply early.

"The department will provide the three species of fish free of charge," said Lowman. "To qualify for the service, a pond either must never have been stocked with the requested species, have completely dried and refilled since the last request."

Lowman said the P&WD keeps computer records of all stockings in private waters and will not stock fish in ponds that presently contain the three species of native fish.

With domestic use of rice and foreign shipments both down and a bumper crop this year, there's plenty of rice on hand, says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. A record carryover of some 42 million hundredweights by next Aug. 1 appears likely despite increased activity abroad under the P. L. 480 program (Food for Peace). A big reason for the huge carryover is the more than 31 million hundredweights left over from the 1975 crop. Rice prices will continue under pressure. Better quality long grain Texas rice brought \$6.78 to \$7.25 per hundredweight during the last week of August.

Fall Hunting Seasons Are Announced

Duck and goose seasons have been announced for this fall by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.
For the eastern two-thirds of the state, which includes Foard County, a split duck and coot season is set for Nov. 13-28 and Dec. 11-Jan. 23, a total of 60 days, the maximum allowed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for this year.
In the High Plains portion of western Texas, ducks and coots may be hunted from Nov. 2-Jan. 23.
Goose hunting in this area is concurrent with the Nov. 2-Jan. 23 duck and coot season. Daily bag is five geese, no more than two dark geese daily, and possession of five, no more than four dark geese in possession.
A 100-point-plus system for determining duck bag limits is again in effect this year.
Sandhill crane hunters again this year will be required to obtain a free permit from the Parks and Wildlife Department before hunting.
Hunting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset for geese, ducks, coots, cranes, snipe and woodcock.
Dove season, which opened here September 1, will
