General Rains Fall Over Foard County

Foard County has been hit by some general rains over the past few days, the many months which

covered the entire county. Sunday morning, .86 inch was recorded here in Crowell. Last Thursday, .5

fell here and .04 inch was recorded Monday morning. The Sunday rain was the most general with .6 inch being reported in the south and west parts of the county. Up to 1 1/2 inches was reported in the east part of the county.

Rains to the northwest of Foard County caused enough run-off into Pease River to wash out the low water crossing between Crowell and Quanah, which is being used while a new bridge is being built.

After the long hot, dry summer, the rains are most beneficial. These rains are bringing up some of the volunteer wheat on the 40,000 acres of Foard County's 1976 wheat crop which were destroyed by hail back earlier in the year.

Anthrax Kills 150 Head Cattle

Dr. G. D. Lindsey of Levelland, veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission, said in Vernon last week that the last livestock death in Foard County from anthrax occurred on Sept. 8, and he added that after such a length of time, it is unlikely that there will be more deaths from the current outbreak.

The disease which was first diagnosed on August 30, killed about 150 cattle and 12 horses in an area west and north of Crowell.

Lindsey told the Vernon Record that a total of 6,400 head of cattle and horses had been vaccinated in Foard and Cottle Counties. He added that 11 premises comprising 28 sections are under quarantine as infected, and that eight premises have been quarantined as adjacent to infected livestock farms and ranches.

Copper Breaks Park Attracts 60,000 Visitors During Past Year

Copper Breaks State Park, located 8 miles north of Crowell on Highway 6, had about 60,000 visitors during the fiscal year ending last

August 31, Park Supt. Bob Martin said last Wednesday in a talk to members of the Rotary Club of Crowell. He added that he expects about

75,000 visitors during this coming year. Martin said Copper Breaks park is now six years old and over \$2 million has been

spent thus far in developing the recreational facility.

A Florida firm is now in the process of preparing exhibits for the interpretative center at the park headquarters. Martin said the firm has done exhibit work for the Smithsonian Institute, the Statue of Liberty and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The interpretative center display will have two themes: tracing the Comanche Indian tribe's existence in the area and telling the story of farming and ranching in this area.

In the center of the building will be three life-size buffalo in their natural setting. Maps showing the area where the buffalo and Comanche Indians ranged will be on the wall while other murals and paintings will be used to dramatize the Indian and buffalo back before the white man arrived on the scene. The contract for the interpretative center is \$130,000 and completion is expected by May 1, 1977.

Martin said the park service receives one penny from the state tax on a package of cigarettes sold in the state and last year that 1c-per-package amounted to \$15 million.

Martin says the lake at the park is three feet down from the spillway and he is hoping for a rain to fill it again. He said fishing is rather spotty at the present time. The lake was opened for fishing on July 1.

The park superintendent was introduced by Rotarian Joe Mike Fish. Other visitors included Rotarian Neil Hofmann of Vernon and student guests Norman Hopper, William Bachman and Tommy Tamplin.

Sales Tax Election to Crowell Next to Smallest School in District

On Friday, retail businesses in the City of Crowell will be collecting the 1 per cent sales tax which was approved by voters in an election Oct. 3.

In addition to the 4 per cent state sales tax, and 1 per cent local sales tax, the City of Crowell will be collecting a total of 5 per cent, the highest in the State of Texas.

The City of Crowell receives a share of the state sales tax.

The mail truck must travel to Vernon and then to Quanah when the bridge is out. A new bridge is going to be built on Highway 6 between Crowell and Quanah as soon as demolition of the old bridge is completed.

Vietnamese Man Lives Here Year

On Sept. 22, Le Van Sau a 24 year old Vietnamese man will have lived in Crowell a year. He is employed by the Crowell Cap Co. making

emblems. He owns a car, pays his debts very promptly and is very appreciative of every kindness that is shown him. He has bought a duplex house at 421 Main St. from Frank Cooper and continues to make improvements there. He is quick to learn and a diligent worker. As a military policeman in the Air Force, he served his country 6 years before being evacuated in April 1975 to Ft. Chaffee, Ark. where he lived about 5 months before coming to Crowell.

Mr. Sau has made great strides in learning English and can communicate fairly well with those people who speak slowly and will listen to him. There are times when he is very lonely because he has no relatives in the U. S. A. and cannot

communicate with his mother and those in Vietnam. He knows no other Vietnamese in this immediate area.

He loves football and said he went to see a game because he was lonely but he went home more lonely because no one talked to him. He understands more English than he can speak and loves for people to talk to him.

Some people feel that he may understand better if they speak louder, but his hearing is not impaired. He attends The First United Methodist Church regularly, although there is much of the service that he does not understand, he appreciates the friendship of the congregation.

Vietnamese people use their names reverse to English so although his family name is Le, he is addressed as Sau by friends and Mr. Sau by acquaintances.

Rev. John Pierpont, student at Perkins School of Theology at Dallas, is pastor of the church. The Thalia Methodist Church began in July 1886

All members, former members, former pastors and friends are invited to attend the special birthday observance.

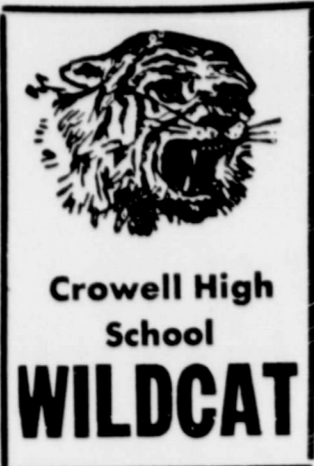


FOOT BALL TEAM CROWELL 1933-34

ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976
NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)
Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueve el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encaucamiento de la calidad de agua y remueve el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

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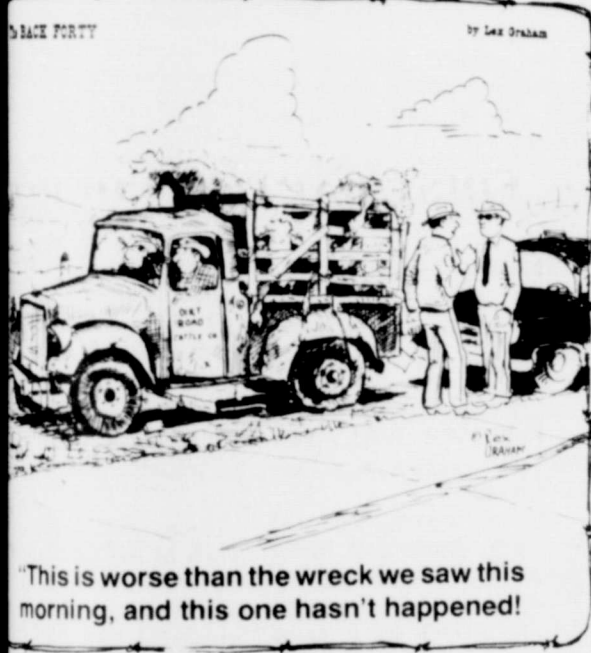

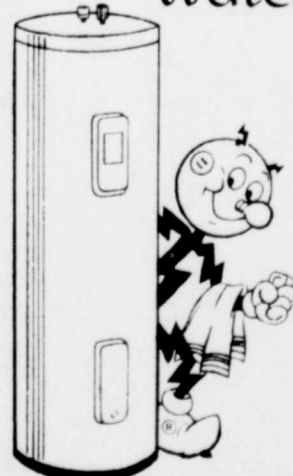

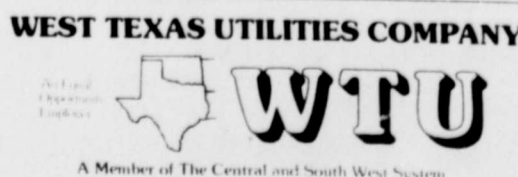
