School Board Hires Three New Staff Members

Three new staff members were employed by the school board at the October meeting. Henry Barrera was employed as a secretary to replace Ronnie Howard who resigned. Mrs. Howard was hired to fill the resignation of Mrs. Hickman, and Mrs. Barrera was employed as a school custodian. The board also discussed liability insurance for board members, and had a lengthy discussion of the financial situation of the school district, for which a deficit of some \$67,000 is anticipated during the coming year.

Average Wheat Yield Is Lowered

The average wheat yield for Foard County has been lowered from 20.1 bushels in 1976 to 18.7 bushels for the 1977 crop. Joe Sabbe, executive director of the Foard County ASCS office, told Foard County producers in the October newsletter of the ASCS office.

Sabbe also stated that cotton producers have reported a total of 9,420.9 acres planted to cotton in the county for 1976. He reminded cotton producers not to destroy any cotton acreage without first reporting to the ASC office. He said "Failure to report could reduce or completely cancel your disaster payment."

Hospital Board Studies Ambulance Operation

A study of the operation of the new county-city ambulance took most of the attention at the October

meeting of the Foard County Hospital board of directors last Thursday night at the office of one of the board

members. The board authorized Mrs. Edna Fish, hospital administrator, to contact Nortex

Regional Planning Commission to find out how neighboring counties have handled the problem when they went from a funeral home-operated ambulance to a county operated vehicle. She is to report at the next board meeting on information she received.

Delinquent hospital bills continue to harass the hospital financial picture and the board authorized a study of the use of the bill collection organization sponsored by the Texas Hospital Association and used by a number of Texas hospitals to collect at least a part of their delinquent accounts. The board will contact area hospitals and clinics to study the success attained by those who currently use the bill collecting agency.

Joe Sabbe, executive director of the ASCS, says there will be two practices available: shelterbelts and grass planting.

He added that his office will be taking applications from now until November 30, 1976.

Last week's rains fell slowly, and did not provide an appreciable amount of stock water.

Crowell is 1-1-1 in non-district action this season.

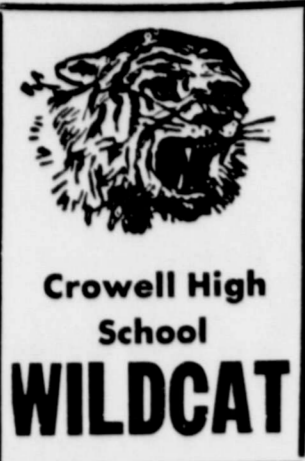
When Crowell and Knox City get together, anything can and usually does happen.

Money to Be Available Here for Training
 Foard County will receive \$15,000 from federal sources for manpower training and work experience programs for low income and unemployed persons in fiscal 1977 under a new budget approved last week in Wichita Falls by the 12-county North Texas State Planning Region Consortium.
 Total budget for the 12 county area is \$1,057,724. Of this amount, \$816,950 will be distributed in salaries to those in the program which started its new year Oct. 1. Most of the funds are fed into the Mainstream or job training and work experience programs.
 The consortium agreed to consider a suggestion by Foard County Judge Seth Halbert of Crowell for an alternative method of allocating the funds in fiscal 1978. Judge Halbert said that under Titles 1 and 3 of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) funds are supposed to help the economically disadvantaged. He said he thought the allocations to various counties in the region should be based on the incidence of poverty in each

 There have been confirmed cases of screwworms in Foard County, of the county's four neighbors, two have cases of screwworms and have not. Cottle County had 3 confirmed cases, Knox County has 1 confirmed case, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties neither reported a case of screwworms during 1972.

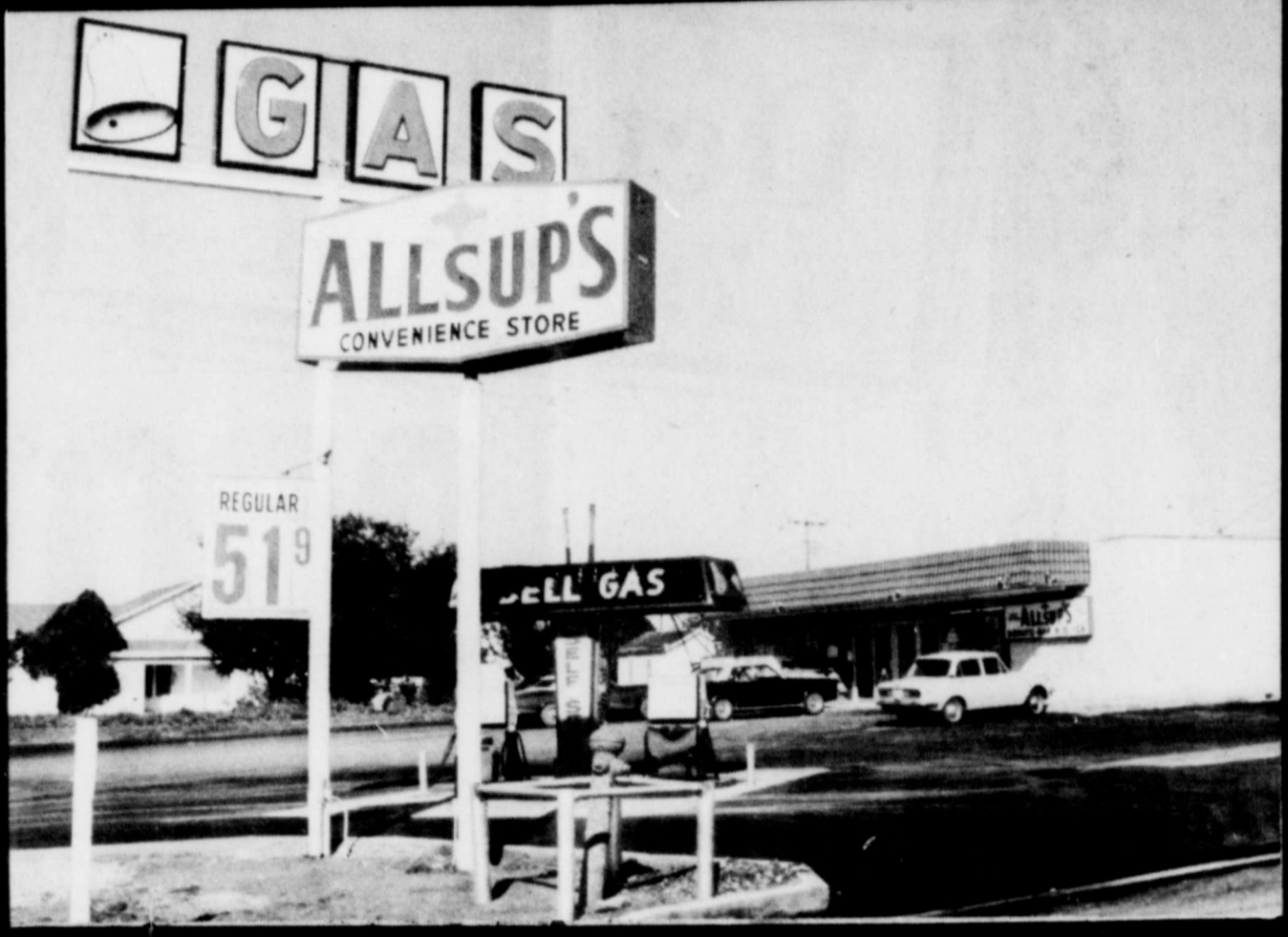

Museum News

Another exciting week at the museum! We had visitors from five different cities in California, from Missouri, Florida, Mississippi, England, and many points of Texas. It was a pleasure to have two family groups, that of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Fairchild and a reunion of the Powell family who moved to the Black community in 1910. They were all guests of Mrs. Don Welch whose grandmother was a member of this fine family. It is always a pleasure to have our guests.

Ricky Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Vernon Smith, is one of our most loyal supporters. He brought us some hand scales (which we did not have) an old can opener and some old copies of The Baptist Standard for our chapel. We appreciate having Ricky come by.

Mrs. Verda Bell gave us a water pitcher which was bought in 1910 and used in the Middlebrook Hotel in Margaret. It was given to Mrs. Bell for her pitcher collection in 1941 by Mrs. Ibb Middlebrook. Thank you, Mrs. Bell, for the pitcher.

Another acquisition this week is the ironstone ware from Mrs. John S. Ray. The service includes a large rectangular platter, a soup tureen and six soup bowls. These were brought from County Donegal, Ireland in the early 1800's by the Pratt family, great grandparents of John S. Ray. The P. S. Ray family brought the dishes to then Hardeman County in 1884 and they had remained on the same farm for 92 years. Besides some smaller items, Mrs. Ray brought us what is perhaps the oldest picture in the museum—an old wheat harvest scene of 1892 made on the W. W. Wright farm between Margaret and Rayland. Mrs. Ray, these are the things which make our museum a place of real interest.
