## Awards Presented at 4-H Banquet

Two college students, both of whom were active 4-H Club participants during their school days in Crowell, were named Monday night as Gold Star 4-H winners for Foard County. The Gold Star award is the top 4-H award which can be made at the county level.

This year's winners are Miss Connie Werley, freshman at Texas Tech University and daughter of Mr. and

Mrs. Donald Werley, and Richard Naylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Duane Naylor. Richard is a freshman at West Texas State University in Canyon.

Miss Werley is a 8-year member of 4-H. During those years she entered a clothing project five years, was junior division winner in the county dress revue for three years and senior winner in the local dress revue one year. She was a

county winner and went to district the five years she entered the foods contest. She participated in "Share the Fun" for three years and went to the district level and the state 4-H Roundup each time. In addition to serving as president and vice president of Junior Leaders, she won reserve champion honors two years at the livestock show.

Richard has also been a

member of 4-H for eight years. He has been a delegate to area meetings and last year was president of the Foard County Council. Richard showed hogs for two years at the project show. He was a member of Future Farmers of America for four years and was a member of the land judging team for two years. He was the Foard County representative to the Farm Bureau Citizenship

Seminar in Waco in 1975. During his senior year in high school, Richard was class president and received the Betty Crocker Home Leader of Tomorrow award. He served as tri-captain of the Wildcat regional finalist football team; made all-district and as a highlight of his year, he was awarded the Denny Todd Memorial Award.

At the banquet Monday night, William Bachman, 4-H Junior Leaders president and 4-H Council chairman, served as master of ceremonies. 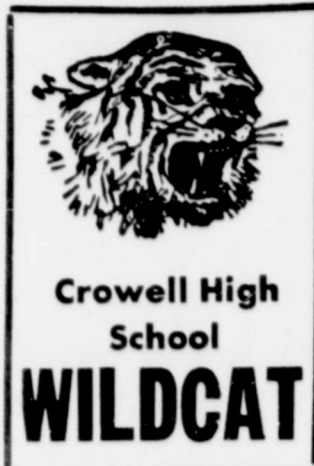



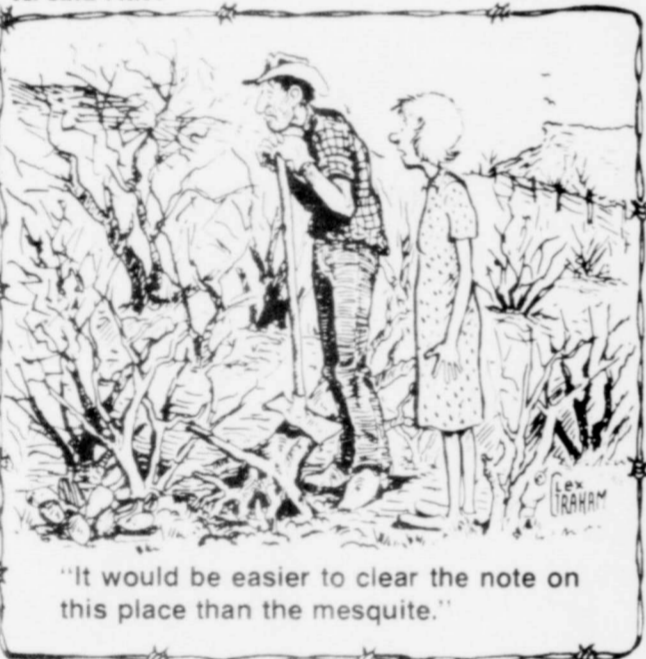
