## Hearing on Crowell Airport Improvements Held Monday

Three members of the Texas Aeronautical Commission from Austin, were in Crowell Monday morning at a public hearing on proposed improvements to the Crowell airport.

Here from Austin were W. O. Karpenko, chief engineer for TAC; Leonard Henry, assistant engineer; and T. R. Fiorillo, flight safety supervisor for TAC.

After Foard County's request for a grant for airport improvements had been made, and which was approved by TAC on Oct. 12, the county had taken no further action on the program and Mr. Karpenko suggested that should the county decide not to continue the plans for airport improvements, the \$50,000 set aside and earmarked by TAC to help with the project would be given to some other community in the state.

Mr. Karpenko estimated that the local airport improvement project will cost some \$70,000 including land purchase, lights and other necessities for the airport. The plans call for lengthening the runway from the present 2,200 feet to 4,000 feet. The added length to the runway will permit the use of the airport by much larger planes than can currently land and take off here.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the county in addition to furnishing trucks, equipment and personnel for the airport project, will have to furnish some cash to help with the county's half of the cost of the project.

Judge Seth Halbert said Monday afternoon that the next meeting of the commissioners court will be held Dec. 13 and he said that he expected the court at that time to decide whether or not to pursue the airport improvements.

## Volumes of FCN to Be Microfilmed at Tech

Bill Klepper, publisher of The Foard County News, is pictured above examining a 1908 copy of The News before it was sent to Lubbock for microfilming. Klepper is standing beside a stack of volumes of the paper. A total of 54 years of this paper's files went to Lubbock for microfilming. The films will

be placed in the Southwest Collection on the campus of Texas Tech University. A number of newspapers in West Texas are being microfilmed as an effort to make a historical preservation of this vast West Texas area. Sylvan Dunn is director of the History Research Center at the University and Mike Hooks was in Crowell Monday to pick up the volumes.

Since the late T. B. Klepper purchased the News in 1929, complete files of the paper have been maintained. Before that time, the volumes are not continuous. A number of volumes of the 1920s are on hand, a few from the early 1900's and none prior to 1900.

The News will purchase a copy of the microfilms for the local paper's reference use in coming years.

## City Faces Suit over Dump Ground

Mayor Kincaid, in a statement Monday, said the City has for some time been attempting to secure a federal grant to assist with the expenses of converting the local dump ground to a land-fill operation which would meet federal standards, but as yet efforts have proved fruitless.

He says the local dump ground, located southeast of town, will have to be closed, and another site selected which must be farther from town than the present dump. It will be necessary to purchase a compaction truck which will cost at least \$15,000 and another \$9,000 to \$15,000 will be needed to purchase a used bulldozer to be used in the trash disposal.

## City Faces Suit over Dump Ground

Also, another man will have to be hired by the City for the trash disposal operation. Kincaid said that efforts thus far to secure federal help such as was received in building the new sewer disposal plant, have been unsuccessful. He is still hoping to get some help for the City in financing these necessary changes for the city dump operation.

At the present time, a bulldozer has been contracted with W. F. Statter to dig a trench to bury the trash.

Following the 15-minute film, a question and answer session will be held.

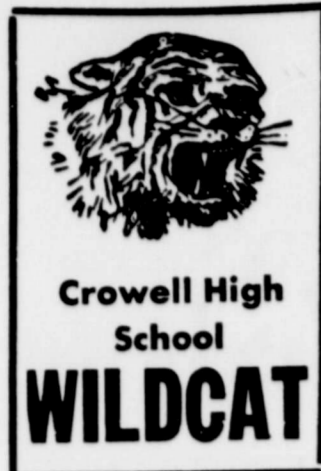

William Granville (Moon) Mullins, 56, a native of Crowell, died Monday, Nov. 22, in a Mineral Wells hospital after a short illness.  
 Funeral services were held Wednesday, Nov. 24 in Baum-Carlock-Bumgardner Funeral Chapel in Mineral Wells. Burial was in Whitt Cemetery. Pall bearers were members of the Mineral Wells Fire Department.  
 Mullins, a fulltime member of the Mineral Wells Fire Department since March 1, 1967, was born Oct. 13, 1920, in Crowell. He graduated from Crowell High School in 1939. He served with the U. S. Marine Corps during World War II, was a member of the Millsap Baptist Church and a member of the Kiwanis Club of Mineral Wells. He was a charter member of the Graham Kiwanis Club, and at the time of his death was a member of the Fire Fighters Association and Palo Pinto Law Enforcement Association.

**Training Program Completed**

Ceremonies in recognition of the completion of the first farm and ranch training program ever held in the United States took place in the community center in Crowell Monday night, Nov. 22. Felix Taylor, executive director of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation, said the local program is a pilot program and he added that it has been termed such a success that a second school will begin shortly.  
 Henry Black served as master of ceremonies for the program last week, and the instructor of the school, H. L. Ayers, Jr., presented certificates to the eleven students who completed the six-month course of training.  
 Completing the course were Jesse Barrera of Crowell, Mike Madrid, Weldon Henderson and Armando Gonzales of Paducah, and J. R. Hill, Vernon E. Hill, Jerry Hill, Alton T. McCarley, Press Mitchell and John Williams of Vernon, and Jim Waldo of Quanah.  
 The training program which was completed November 10, consisted of a 26-weeks period with 12 hours a week spent in classroom instruction and 28 hours a week of on-the-job training. The school was held in the Crowell Ag Pavilion.  
 Attending the ceremonies here were Michael Allen, economic opportunities director for the Texas Department of Community Affairs from Austin, Freddie Castillo, deputy director, Manpower Education Training, Inc., of Wichita Falls; and John Tyler of Amarillo, coordinator of the Texas State Technical Institute. Each of these men spoke briefly and praised the school and the graduates.  
 Among the remarks by the speakers were "The school provides an opportunity to earn a living...it makes the training relevant—something people can use...although the training is listed as free, it costs something. It costs the effort and commitment of the trainees who are all grown men and have family and other obligations to meet.  
 The trainees must have a sponsor, that is someone who promises a job when the training is completed. Sponsors were listed as Joe Don Brown, Wes Ross, Charles V. Schur, Joe Don Brooks, Nelson Hamrick, Prentiss Field, Kenneth E. Trent, Earl Graf, Carl Baldwin and Wayne E. Kootz.

# Series Continues on Child Abuse

(This is the fourth article in a five-part series on child abuse and neglect and is part of a regional campaign sponsored by the Texas Department of Public Welfare. This week's article is on what the attorneys say about child abuse and neglect.)

"One of the most important trends that we've seen recently in dealing with child abuse and neglect is that more and more parents just don't care about their children and feel little if any responsibility toward them," said Patricia Elliott, Abilene assistant district attorney.

A 16-year-old girl was found suffering from malnutrition, having been locked in her room for two years, allegedly by her parents.

A nine-year-old child jumped out of a window to his death to avoid being beaten by the man who lives with his mother.

These two cases of child abuse and neglect could have happened to one of your friends, or could be happening right now in the home next door.

In an interview with the two Abilene assistant district attorneys, Patricia Elliott and Patrick Millar, it was found that the reason for a lot of the child abuse and neglect cases is the inability of the parents to cope with the child's problems.

"When the parents find they cannot cope with the child," said Miss Elliott, who has been dealing with child abuse cases for the last four years in Abilene, "their next resort is to either ignore the situation (neglect) or to beat the child (physical abuse)."

"We have found that parents are exercising less and less supervision over the children," said Millar, who has been dealing with child abuse and neglect cases in Abilene for the last year.

"Some of it is ignorance, and some of it is just omission. Parents need to realize that there are services available to help them with their problems with children, and a call to the child welfare office could help remedy the situation."

The child welfare office would send a caseworker to the home, discuss the problems with the parents, and suggest possible avenues of immediate help.

"A lot of times," said Millar, "the parents would have been able to avoid the confrontations with the child if they knew about some of the welfare services available."

Miss Elliott said many of the problems with child abuse and neglect have been caused by our changing society.

"Our society is more mobile today," she said. This causes parents to be more unstable. Some parents are not ready to have children, are younger, and too immature. The younger parents just need to be continually aware of the child welfare services available and how to take advantage of them."

The two attorneys said that child abuse and neglect cases could be classified into three categories—physical, sexual and neglect, and both attorneys agreed that all three categories have increased in number recently.

"The physical abuse cases usually involve children under six years of age," said Millar, "and include such incidents as beatings, scaldings, etc."

"Sexual abuse cases usually involve an unstable situation," said Miss Elliott. "In many instances, it involves the children of a woman who has been jumping from man to man."

Millar said that the neglect cases usually come from situations "where parents have left their children unsupervised."

"We've found cases where the parents have left their children at home all day by themselves and did not make any attempt to have the children at school that day," said Millar. "And the child is the victim of it."

Miss Elliott noted that because of this disinterest on

the part of the parent, there have been more termination suits filed this year than ever before." The suits are the preliminary steps to permanently remove the child from the home and move them into a foster home.

While the parents are becoming disinterested in the care of their children, the general public has become more interested in the children.

Miss Elliott said that the district attorney's office has handled more cases of child abuse and neglect this year

than ever before. "It's because the public is becoming more aware of their responsibility toward children," she said, "and then they are doing something about it by reporting possible cases of abuse and neglect to a child welfare office, or to a law enforcement agency."

What can the public do to help? They can help by being willing to get involved," she added, "by reporting the possible case of abuse and neglect, and then to testify

or serve as a witness for the incident."

Barry Fredrickson, regional administrator in Abilene for the Texas Department of Public Welfare, further stated the problem with today's society.

"Our society makes a terrible mistake," he added. "We think children are the property of their parents. They are not."

"They are in the care of their parents at this time. But how they are reared concerns us all. We are all influenced by how they are raised. Children are the responsibility of all of us. But they and their parents are low on the list of our priorities."

"Stop and think. Today's children are the next generation. What can be more important than raising them?"

Fredrickson said that persons knowing of possible cases of child abuse or

neglect can report it at any hour of the day or night by calling their local welfare office or by dialing the statewide toll-free, hotline number at 1-800-292-5400.

The local and statewide numbers are maintained by the Texas DPW, the legally responsible agency for the investigation of suspected child abuse.

"Child abuse or neglect can leave a physical or emotional scar that will never be erased," he added. "The public must get involved so possible future cases can receive immediate attention. You may save a child's life."

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# Series Continues on Child Abuse

(This is the fourth article in a five-part series on child abuse and neglect and is part of a regional campaign sponsored by the Texas Department of Public Welfare. This week's article is on what the attorneys say about child abuse and neglect.)

"One of the most important trends that we've seen recently in dealing with child abuse and neglect is that more and more parents just don't care about their children and feel little if any responsibility toward them."

A 16-year-old girl was found suffering from malnutrition, having been locked in her room for two years, allegedly by her parents.

A nine-year-old child jumped out of a window to his death to avoid being beaten by the man who lives with his mother.

These two cases of child abuse and neglect could have happened to one of your friends, or could be happening right now in the home next door.

In an interview with the two Abilene assistant district attorneys, Patricia Elliott and Patrick Millar, it was found that the reason for a lot of the child abuse and neglect cases is the inability of the parents to cope with the child's problems.

"When the parents find they cannot cope with the child," said Miss Elliott, who has been dealing with child abuse cases for the last four years in Abilene, "their next resort is to either ignore the situation (neglect) or to beat the child (physical abuse)."

"We have found that parents are exercising less and less supervision over the children," said Millar, who has been dealing with child abuse and neglect cases in Abilene for the last year.

"Some of it is ignorance, and some of it is just omission. Parents need to realize that there are services available to help them with their problems with children, and a call to the child welfare office could help remedy the situation."

The child welfare office would send a caseworker to the home, discuss the problems with the parents, and suggest possible avenues of immediate help.

"A lot of times," said Millar, "the parents would have been able to avoid the confrontations with the child if they knew about some of the welfare services available."

Miss Elliott said many of the problems with child abuse and neglect have been caused by our changing society.

"Our society is more mobile today," she said. This causes parents to be more unstable. Some parents are not ready to have children, are younger, and too immature. The younger parents just need to be continually aware of the child welfare services available and how to take advantage of them."

The two attorneys said that child abuse and neglect cases could be classified into three categories—physical, sexual and neglect, and both attorneys agreed that all three categories have increased in number recently.

"The physical abuse cases usually involve children under six years of age," said Millar, "and include such incidents as beatings, scaldings, etc."

"Sexual abuse cases usually involve an unstable situation," said Miss Elliott. "In many instances, it involves the children of a woman who has been jumping from man to man."

Millar said that the neglect cases usually come from situations "where parents have left their children unsupervised."

"We've found cases where the parents have left their children at home all day by themselves and did not make any attempt to have the children at school that day," said Millar. "And the child is the victim of it."

Miss Elliott noted that because of this disinterest on

the part of the parent, there have been more termination suits filed this year than ever before." The suits are the preliminary steps to permanently remove the child from the home and move them into a foster home.

While the parents are becoming disinterested in the care of their children, the general public has become more interested in the children.

Miss Elliott said that the district attorney's office has handled more cases of child abuse and neglect this year

than ever before. "It's because the public is becoming more aware of their responsibility toward children," she said, "and then they are doing something about it by reporting possible cases of abuse and neglect to a child welfare office, or to a law enforcement agency."

What can the public do to help?

They can help by being willing to get involved," she added, "by reporting the possible case of abuse and neglect, and then to testify

or serve as a witness for the incident."

Barry Fredrickson, regional administrator in Abilene for the Texas Department of Public Welfare, further stated the problem with today's society.

"Our society makes a terrible mistake," he added. "We think children are the property of their parents. They are not."

"They are in the care of their parents at this time. But how they are reared concerns us all. We are all influenced by how they are raised. Children are the responsibility of all of us. But they and their parents are low on the list of our priorities."

"Stop and think. Today's children are the next generation. What can be more important than raising them?"

Fredrickson said that persons knowing of possible cases of child abuse or

neglect can report it at any hour of the day or night by calling their local welfare office or by dialing the statewide toll-free, hotline number at 1-800-292-5400.

The local and statewide numbers are maintained by the Texas DPW, the legally responsible agency for the investigation of suspected child abuse.

"Child abuse or neglect can leave a physical or emotional scar that will never be erased," he added. "The public must get involved so possible future cases can receive immediate attention. You may save a child's life."

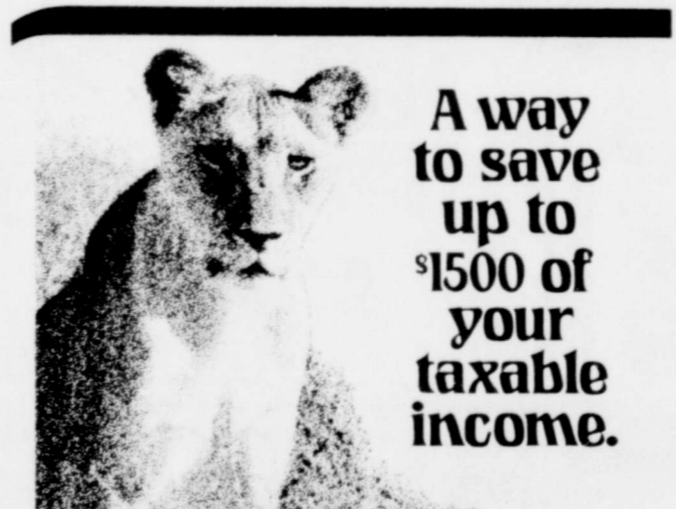

## Entomologist Gives Weekly Report on Insect Situation

Wheat is growing slowly due to cool temperatures. Grazing is limited to older fields. Moisture is adequate. Planting is about 80% complete but is only about 30% complete in Archer and Throckmorton counties. Yellowing of wheat in most fields is due to poor fertility condition and not greenbugs.

Greenbug populations are light, 0.5 per foot of drill row, in Archer, Baylor, Childress, Foard, Jones, Knox, Motley and Wilbarger counties. Populations of 60 to 80 greenbugs per foot of drill row were reported from one field in Hardeman County and from a few fields in Dickens County but only light numbers of greenbugs were present in most fields.

Fields that are suffering from poor fertility can withstand numbers of greenbugs as large as those fields that are well fertilized.
