Snow Falls Here Monday Morning

According to the calendar, winter doesn't officially arrive until later this month, but Mother Nature continues to perform just like winter

was already here. Another blast of Arctic air Monday brought flurries of snow during the day; however, there was no accumulation on the ground. Preceding the front on Sunday night, heavy fog blanketed the area and caused hazardous highway driving conditions for several hours.

The mercury dropped to 20 degrees early Tuesday morning. With clear skies, a warming trend was forecast for the next few days.

Duck Season Resumes Sat., December 11

With quail season getting underway across this section December 1, the second half of the duck season for this area will begin December 11 and continue through January 23. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset each day. The daily bag limit is reached when the point value of any bird taken reaches or exceeds 100 points. Possession limit is the maximum number of ducks which could have been taken legally in two days.

Bank Buys New Proofing Machine

The Crowell State Bank has added another piece of electronic equipment to its banking system, Robert Kincaid, president, said last week.

The latest addition to the local bank's bookkeeping system is a proofing machine, an NCR product. Mr. Kincaid said the machine keeps sixteen different accounts on the bank's general ledger and permits employees to keep a running total on all the accounts. He added that the new machine will be a big asset in keeping the bank's daily transactions in balance.

Several months ago, the Crowell State Bank added electronic posting machines to its operation.

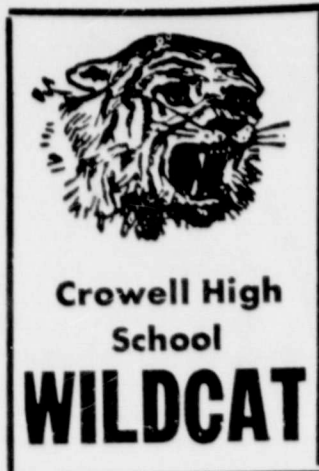

Father of Former Local Dentist Died

Eldon A. Sanders, 74-year-old retired educator and farmer-rancher and religious leader of Childress and father of a former Crowell resident, died Wednesday of last week at one of his farms near Community Center northeast of Childress. Mr. Sanders was the father of former Crowell dentist Dr. Durwood Sanders.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the Childress Church of Christ with interment in the Quanah cemetery.

Mr. Sanders' first teaching position was at Quanah and after nine years was named superintendent, a position he held 14 years. He resigned to become superintendent of the Tipton's Children's Home in Tipton, Ok. Four years later, he resigned and moved to Childress. A short time later, he was named the school system's first counselor and also super-

visor, retiring in 1967. He was serving as minister of the Kirkland Church in Childress at the time of his death. He also was serving as a trustee of Lubbock Christian College, a position he had held for 15 years.

Mr. Sanders was a past president of the Childress Rotary Club, of which he was still an active member, president of District IX of the Texas State Teachers Association, served on the state textbook committee and was listed in Who's Who in America.

Survivors include his wife of the home; one son, I Durwood Sanders of Lubbock; one daughter, Mrs. John Bragg of Midland; and five grandchildren.

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Passes Numerous Resolutions

Farmers Union Has Annual Meeting

The Foard County Farmers Union re-elected all its officers and passed several resolutions at the organization's annual meeting last Saturday night. The officers who were re-elected are:

T. R. Cates, president; Warren Haynie, vice president; Cecil Carroll, secretary and Mrs. Warren Haynie, treasurer; Directors are W. Stater, Johnny Joe Matus III, J. F. Matthews, Freddie Riethmayer, and Kenneth Halbert.

Among the resolutions passed were the following: We urge federal, state and local authorities to control bind weed and wild oats along road right-of-way so that seeds from these plants will not wash or blow into nearby fields.

We recommend that disaster payments for wheat should be based on bushels produced on allotted acres with no penalty on bushels produced on excess acres. Payments should be 75 per cent of cost of production.

We recommend that future farm programs be based on cost of production plus a fair price on all farm commodities. We recommend

target prices on wheat be set at 100 per cent of cost of production per bushel.

We recommend that we promote exports of wheat, cotton, feed grains, soybeans and other farm products.

We oppose the long term Russian grain trade agreement. We oppose labor unions interfering with grain shipments to foreign countries and foreign ship loadings.

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Series Continues on Child Abuse

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child welfare unit, Taylor County, Department of Public Welfare.

An eight-year-old boy has just been beaten by his father, who had too much to drink earlier in the evening.

A little four-year-old girl was doused with a pan of scalding water from her mother, who has had too many emotional problems recently.

If you had been a neighbor, friend or relative and had found out about either situation, what should you have done?

"They should call their local child welfare office,"

said W. Barry Fredrickson, regional administrator in Abilene for the Texas Department of Public Welfare. "or a statewide, toll-free, hotline number, or a local law enforcement agency. The hotline number is 1-800-252-5400."

In the Abilene area, individuals should call the Child Welfare Unit in Taylor County of the State Department of Public Welfare. The number is 673-7811 and the unit is under the supervision of Beula Love.

"If it's a life-or-death matter," Miss Love said, regarding what the child welfare offices does when

they receive the call, "we will dispatch someone immediately to the situation. Depending on the situation, we may call a law enforcement official to meet us there if it appears there is any immediate danger involved."

She also noted that the complainant's name is kept in confidence.

"We only share the nature of the complaints with the persons accused," said Miss Love. "The name of the person making the complaint will remain confidential."

When the report of a possible case of child abuse or neglect comes in, it is usually received by what is known as an 'intake worker.'

In order to make a judgment regarding the complaint, the intake worker will usually make one or two visits to the home in which the alleged incident happened to gather information surrounding the situation.

After the information has

been gathered, the intake worker will come back to the office and classify the complaint in one of four categories.

"Based on the information received," said Miss Love, "the intake worker will classify the report in one of four categories according to the CANRIS (Child Abuse and Neglect Report and Inquiry System of the Texas Department of Public Welfare) standards."

The categories of the complaints include valid, invalid, potential or uncertain.

"If the complaint is invalid," she said, "the investigation will be stopped right there. If the complaint is classified as potential, a report will be made, but the investigation would be placed in a 'hold' position until further evidence indicates that the situation is child abuse or neglect."

"If the situation is classified as uncertain or

valid," she continued, "the case is assigned to an 'ongoing' caseworker who will continue to work with the family involved."

Miss Love pointed out that calls which come from a school official (nurse, teacher or counselor), a physician or a law enforcement officer are usually valid.

"If the case needs long-range help and is assigned to an 'ongoing caseworker,'" she said, "the caseworker will then meet with the parents to determine how serious the situation may be, and which of the available resources should be used to help resolve the situation."

She pointed out that the caseworker will appraise the situation and classify the case into one of three categories—1) counseling with the parents, without requesting the court to remove the child; 2) in situations of grave danger, the court will be requested to

issue a temporary order so that the child can be removed immediately; and 3) when parents are unwilling or unable to improve the situation, the court is requested to remove the children.

Miss Love also said that many child abuse cases stem from impulsive actions of the parents, and that many parents want help before they hurt their children.

"For any parent willing to volunteer to come in," she said, "we are more than willing to talk over the problem. We'd like to help parents who want to work out their problems or potential problems. We can and do make referrals to other agencies."

Miss Love said the child welfare office can counsel the parent, provide resource materials and make referrals. She emphasized that the child welfare office will do anything to assist parents in preventing actions which

may result in abuse or neglect.

Parents who may want to use the services specified should call their local child welfare unit of the State Department of Public Welfare.

Persons wishing to report possible incidents of child abuse or neglect should also call their local child welfare office, a local law enforcement agency or the statewide, toll-free, hotline number.

The local and statewide numbers are maintained by the Texas DPW, the legally responsible agency for the investigation of suspected child abuse or neglect.

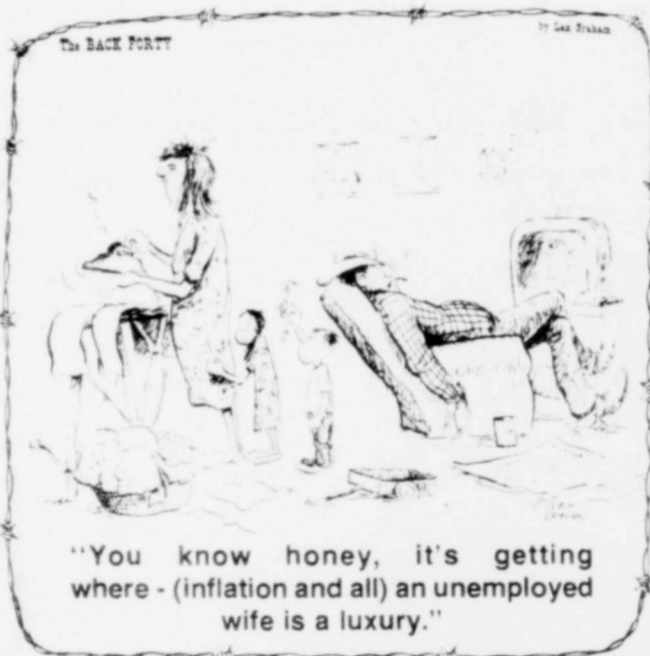

This week, we have had visitors from various points in Texas, South Carolina, and Oregon.

As Christmas time approaches, keep in mind that we still have some bicentennial coins, Foard County History books, Luzier cosmetics, oil paintings, and many other gift items.

We want to express our appreciation to Mrs. Bess Ray of Odessa who sent us some group pictures of local people. The pictures are of the 1907, 1909 and 1914 vintage.

Dale Grimes brought us a "Sacker" and a sack which we places in the country store. Thank you, Dale, for this unusual acquisition.

We appreciate the cotton cards which were brought to the museum by Virgil Dockins.

We are grateful to Alton Bell for giving us a front page of "The Seattle-Post-Intelligence", dated April 16, 1912, and told of 1,200 lives which were lost on the Titanic.

Our cash donors this week were Milton and Joe Mark Magee, \$20.00. They are mailing a number of old photographs, booklets and publications which were kept by their mother, Mrs. R. R. Magee, and their grandmother Allee. We are certainly looking forward to getting these things of historical value.

This week, we want to tell you about the Hynes buggy which is one of the real attractions of the museum. When Furd Halsell bought this buggy in 1904 from J. H. Self in Crowell, it was truly the class of the range. The tires, made of polished brass, are raised in the middle of the wheel; it is also equipped with an odometer to measure the distance traveled.

On one of her visits to the museum, Mrs. Furd Halsell of Fort Worth told of making trips in the buggy with her husband from their Foard County ranch to the Clay County ranch. On one return trip, the mules became frightened and ran away with them.

In 1936, the buggy, drawn by two fine mules, was the center of attraction when Mr. Halsell, J. W. Wishon and G. B. King of Clay County, rode in the 45th anniversary parade of Foard County.

A number of years ago, the chamber of commerce at Kokomo, Ind., where the buggy was manufactured, issued a national appeal for a Hynes buggy. The thorough search ended with the conclusion that there was not one available. For that reason, we feel most fortunate to have on display at our museum such a rare item.

Our volunteer hostesses this week have been Ruth Andrews, Elizabeth Grimes, Bonnie Johnson, and Mae Solomon.

Occasionally, Social Security or Medicare representatives will contact an individual at their home. However, all Social Security representatives are provided with a readily identifiable identification card. Anytime someone comes to your home alleging to be an employee of Social Security or Medicare, you should request to see his identification card. There are several private insurance

companies that solicit enrollment by making their appeal similar to Medicare. The Social Security Administration and Medicare do not sponsor or endorse any of these private insurance policies or companies. Remember, if you are ever approached by someone posing as a representative of Social Security, refuse to talk with him unless he first properly identifies himself. The Vernon Social Security Office is located on the corner of Cumberland and Pease. The phone number is 817-552-9346.

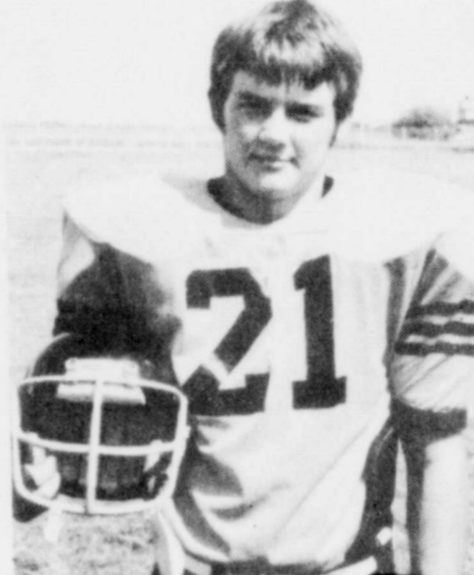

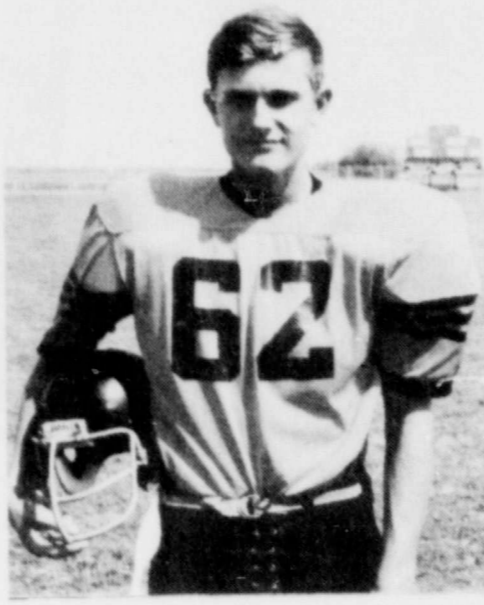
