

The categories of the complaints include valid, invalid, potential or un-

fare) standards.'

"If the complaint is invalid," she said, "the investigation will be stopped right there. If the complaint is classified as potential, a report will be made, but the investigation would be placed in a 'hold' position valid," she continued, "the case is assigned to an 'ongoing' caseworker who will continue to work with the family involved.'

Miss Love pointed out that calls which come from a school official (nurse, teacher or counselor), a physician or a law enforcement officer are usually valid.

"If the case needs long-range help and is assigned to an 'ongoing caseworker', "she said, "the caseworker will then meet with the parents to determine how serious the situation may be, and which of the available resourses should be used to help resolve the situation."

She pointed out that the caseworker will appraise the situation and classify the case into one of three categories-1) counseling

issue a temporary order so that the child can be removed immediatley; and 3:) when parents are unwilling or unable to improve the situation, the court is requested to remove the

children. Miss Love also said that many child abuse cases stem from impulsive actions of the parents, and that many parents want help before

they hurt their children. "For any parent willing to volunteer to come in," she said, "we are more than willing to talk over the problem. We'd like to help parents who want to work out their problems or potential problems. We can and do make referrals to other agencies."

#### Quail Season Promising

Reports by field observers indicate that quail hunters were "satisfied" on opening day. Biologists and game wardens with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department agree.

According to Clyde Holt, wildlife biologist in Decatur, 'this could be the best quail hunting season we have had in several years. The population is good, the birds are mature, and they are in good body condition. We have what seems to be adequate food and cover. The moisture conditions are near perfect." Holt said that this could all change in just a short time. It does not take long in this area to dry out, even for this time of year, and then a "duster" on top of that would really hurt the hunting.

Hunting opened in the North Central Texas Area Dec. 1 and will run through Feb. 13. The daily bag limit is 12 birds with 36 in possession after the first day. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise and one-half hour after sunset.

A resident hunting license is required of every Texas citizen who hunts quail outside of the county of his residence. Persons under 17 or over 65 years of age, or persons hunting on land where they reside are not required to purchase this license.

Hunters should always seek permission from the landowner before going afield. Additional regulations should be checked in "A Guide to Texas Hunting & Sport Fishing Regulations 1976-77" published by the department and available at sporting goods stores and P&WD offices throughout the state.
